EDUCATIONAL NEWS.

The following changes have been made in the High School Books for the coming term:

English 1-2, Brubaker & Snyder; English 3-4 Brooks & Hubbard; Algebra 1, Durrell & Arnold. Other courses will be the same as last year and any pupils having books for sale should bring them to the room of the Superintendent, next to the Post Office or to the Office at the school. New books will be here when school opens and school will start September 5th, registration completed; September 8th pupils will bring their money and purchase all books necessary for the course; also, assignments will be made; September 7th regular recitations will be called.

Supt. W. J. Klopp is in receipt of a letter from the New Mexico Chapter of the American Mining Congress of Silver City informing him they will cooperate with him in collecting specimens of the precious minerals and other minerals mined in the state of New Mexico. In Grant county alone twelve precious are mined.

This collection will be placed in a beautiful glass cabinet in the assembly of the Lincoln County High School.

Howard Hall has just been leased to Supt. W. J. Klopp for the purpose of conducting the manual training, Cabinet Making, Dramatic club practice, Musical concerts, lectures and other social functions of the Lincoln County High School. This is a great improvement on the old building, isolated from the school, and gives the administration an opportunity to conduct all the school functions in a place where there is more room and where electric lights may be used for lighting the hall. Mrs. Price will have charge of all social functions and organizations. We are exceedingly fortunate in securing the services of so efficient an instructor as Mrs. Price and I feel confident that the younger people will cooperate with her in making this year one filled with whole some enjoyment which will be a credit to Capitan as a whole and to her Educational institution.

It might be of interest to the general public to know that there is a movement under consideration to rent a suitable building for a dormitory to house all those who desire to remain during the school year at a very nominal expense and will be in charge of a reliably and thoroughly competent person. Further information concerning this proposition will appear in the next issue of the Mountaineer.

Washington Letter.

Men high in the councils of the nation besought Senator Burton's opinions on the recognition of Mexico on the day of his departure for New Mexico. Senator Burton has spent his life in the country adjoining Mexico on the north—living not far from the border and his associations have been those calculated to give a thinking man knowledge of actual conditions most valuable indeed in arriving at safe conclusions regarding United States recognition of this really great republic. Senator Burton gave the following digest of his reasons and conclusions:

"In my judgment, Mexico should be recognized at the earliest possible moment. There is every reason for this. First, it is essential to the stabilization of Mexico that we accord recognition. Without recognition from the United States the task of maintaining a stable government will be very difficult because the general impression that we were not sympathetic towards bringing about settled conditions would be conveyed to the people of Mexico. In these distressed times and at this period of reconstruction and rehabilitation of industry and commerce, especially is this true with the promotion of American exports in view, a return to the most cordial relations with Mexico—a great factor—that would do more toward rehabilitating foreign exports on a permanent basis than anything else.

Mexico is our natural ally, and occupies the peculiar advantages position, so far as the United States is concerned, toward promoting and encouraging peaceful relations with the Orient. We should finance her and cultivate the most cordial relationship, and actively promote trade with that country. Mexico is badly in need of live stock with which to restock her ranges. She is badly in need of all kinds of machinery, which can be supplied from our factories. Mexico has wonderful resources, more so than any of the Latin-American republics. President Obregon has made wonderful progress during the short period of his incumbency as President. He has demonstrated that he is a man of capacity, possessed of a constructive mind, recognizing thoroughly the necessities of a sound economic basis, and its relation to the possibility of maintaining a stable and peaceful government.

"I see no reason why we should not urge a most liberal policy in behalf of prompt recognition, after which, a treaty might be negotiated covering all the differences which exist. It is unthinkable that there will be any disposition on the part of Mexico to fail to recognize and preserve inviolate all of the usual obligations customary between all the

nations of the world, and, at all times, to guarantee property rights lawfully acquired under the laws of that country and ample protection to all foreigners engaged in lawful pursuits. I have talked with members of the Mexican Congress, who have assured me that there is no disposition to interpret any law or constitutional provision as retroactive in violation of lawfully acquired rights, and that in due time interpretations will be made by the proper constituted authority in line with this policy, that the most friendly feeling exists in Mexico toward the

United States. I am sure that both President Harding and Secretary Hughes are anxious to promote these friendly relations at the earliest possible moment compatible with a discreet, sound, national policy.

"Let us place Mexico in a position to officially negotiate and ratify a treaty. By so doing all possibility of intervention will disappear and we will be lending a hand to build up and rehabilitate Mexico and incidentally, build up our own commerce and industry. Let us trust to the good faith of Obregon and the Mexican people.

The business in Senator Burton's office will be promptly attended to during his absence and all important matters forwarded to him and doubtless those in haste will address him at his home in Socorro. It has been remarked that politics have had no place in the office of the Senator as no lines are recognized but the needs of the applicant for relief of any kind.

All have been treated alike and their ills remedied if possible, all willingly and speedily as possible. Soldier requests in particular have received immediate and personal attention.

Congressman Montoya's last act in Congress before leaving for New Mexico was to introduce a companion bill to the Burton bill exchanging forest lands. Mr. Montoya expects to remain in New Mexico till the winter session of Congress opens, unless Speaker Mondell should summon him sooner.

Two hundred and forty (\$240) dollars must be deposited with each bid to be applied on the purchase price, refunded or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids reserved. Before bids are submitted full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and the submission of bids, should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Alamogordo, New Mexico.

RECALLS OLD ROME

Ancient Coin of Surpassing Historic Interest.

Two Thousand Years Since It Came From the Mint, What a Story of Adventure This Tollen Could Tell!

A coin 2,000 years old, which may have reposed in the treasure box of a Roman senator, passed from hand to hand in the dice games of members of the Roman Imperial guard, been tossed to the rubble by a patrician as he passed through the streets on his way to the baths, or thrown to a victorious gladiator by one of the vestal virgins, now is in the possession of Arthur S. Hibler, United States Immigrant Inspector at New Orleans. On its way to Mexico, where it was obtained by its present owner, the coin may have been carried as a keepsake by one of the Spanish conquerors and exchanged for the gold and jewels of the Aztecs. Two thousand years afford ample time to pass through a few adventures.

The coin is valued by Mr. Hibler, not only for its age, but for the queer history attached to its gaining possession of it. While he claims he is not superstitious, he admits he regards the coin as a good luck talisman. The piece was sold to him by a Mexican, who wished to cross the border at Brownsville, Tex., and had not enough money for his toll. To pay his way across the international bridge he offered the coin with several others to Mr. Hibler, asserting that it had a strange significance and a blessing attached to it. It had been given him, he said, by the mother of a member of Villa's band, who had been murdered in a cafe brawl. As he lay dying, he had begged the man to take a handkerchief, stained with his life blood, to his mother. The Mexican had sworn to fulfill the trust, and delivered the handkerchief to the old woman. She opened the corner of the handkerchief, which was tucked tightly, and took out several coins. Then she retired into an inner room and, returned, placed a small ivory disk in the messenger's hand, saying it was a talisman that would mean much to its possessor.

The coin is small and white, resembling a modern United States dime in size and color. On its front is a relief of a Roman emperor, with the inscription: "Domitian VIII. Imp. Caesar" and several other characters which are indistinguishable. On the reverse side is what seems to be a reproduction of the temple erected to Jerusalem by Solomon. It is worn, this by the touch of the millions of hands in which it must have rested. "I have no doubt that it is genuine," Mr. Hibler said. "But how did it come into the possession of the Villa bandit? Well—quien sabe?"

The Tale of an Egg.
Frank Lafferty, a captain of police at Muncie, once answered a call late at night from a restaurant whose owner asked that a drunken man be taken from the place.

"It was the strangest case of intoxication I ever dealt with," said Lafferty, relating the experience. "In the restaurant I found sitting on a high stool at the counter an elderly man who was weeping into his plate containing the remnants of what evidently had been a hard boiled egg.

"What's the matter?" asked the copious individual and he answered between choking sobs I weep to think that by this act of cruelty in devouring this egg I have deprived some poor innocent chicken of the right of being born!"

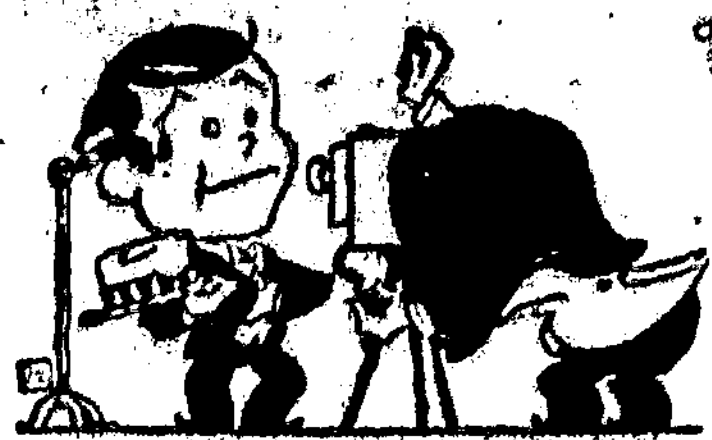

German Black List in Peru.
Publications in Peru do not believe to soon forgetting the intrigues of Germany or letting the flag go unpolished. Newspapers there carry a complete list of merchants who showed anything like a friendly disposition to Germany throughout the war. It is known as the "Official Allied Black List." The boycott of these merchants includes trade with any of the employees of the firms. The notice at the top of the list includes this warning:

"Any transaction with an employee of a firm on this list is naturally the same as a transaction with the firm in its own name and will have the same consequences."

American University in France.
At Douzou, 175 miles southeast of Paris, is the seat of the new American Army university, which is, perhaps, the most outstanding of the educational work carried on by the American expeditionary force, says the Popular Mechanics Magazine. Housed in what was formerly an American hospital are 10,000 soldiers, students and a force of 500 teachers. The curriculum is notable for its agricultural college with a 600-acre farm.

Orchardists Ooak to Encourage the Woodpecker to Cattle in Their Midst, as it Were.

It may sound like a joke to speak of the manufacture of woodpecker nests, but there is actually a factory in Maine that takes many orders for such nests.

The birdhouses are constructed of pine blocks 15 inches long and from five to six inches in diameter. The back of the block is squared to permit of the patent adjustment being properly attached to the tree or placed where the house is to be located, a canopy or top piece to keep out the weather being made like a roof. A perfect nest is drilled by a reamer. Within three inches of the bottom a corker indentation is made to the bird entrance, as the top of the woodpecker are in pairs, two before and two behind, with sharp, strong claws, the whole structure of the foot making it adaptable for climbing.

The houses are sold to orchard owners, as the claim is made by the ornithologists that the woodpecker's feed habits chiefly of insects and their larvae, which the birds get by digging into the bark and wood of trees. The woodpecker's tongue is an important instrument in obtaining its food, as it can be extended far beyond the bill, its tip being horny and furnished with a barbed filament.

Men of Many Metals.

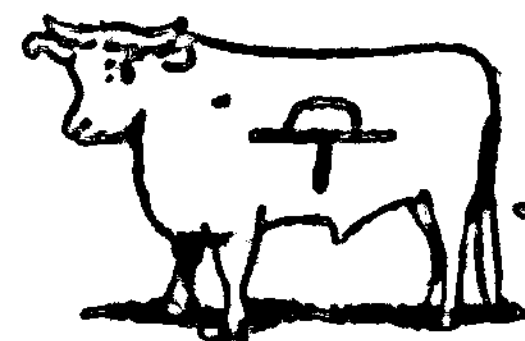

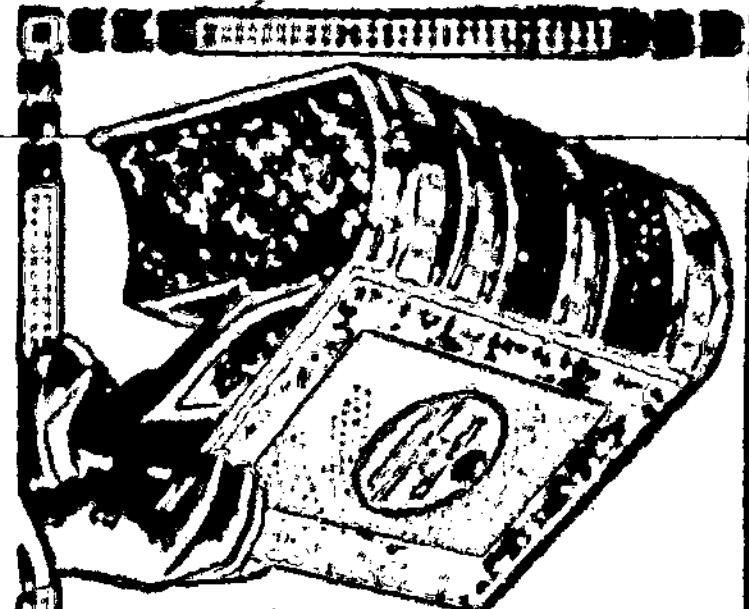
