RECORD OF IMPORTANT EVENTS CONDENSED FOR BUSY PEOPLE.

WESTERN

Reurrence of the Wyoming-Colo-
rado long contested dispute over the
division of the irrigation waters of the
Yampa river was assigned for Jan.
1, 1922, by the Supreme Court recently.

The body of John Edward Dreschel
of Moline, Ill., one of the two sailors
whose lives were lost in the sinking of the
submarine R-6 in Los Angeles harbor recently,
rose to the surface of the water about twenty feet from where
the craft sank.

Three western senators joined in
telegrams to officers of the principal
western railroads urging that the west
ern carriers grant a 1-cent-mile rate
to the Kansas City convention of the
American Legion. Eastern railroads
have already granted such a rate.

Fire destroyed 140 cars of asphalt
belonging to the Elephant Butte Asphalt
Association at Taos and for a
time threatened the entire town, which
is twenty miles east of El Paso.
The loss is estimated at \$50,000. Insurance of \$20,000 was carried.

After writing and signing a will and
a series of notes, Mrs. Christian
Maurer, 75-year-old widow and her
son Henry W. Maurer, 32, of St. Louis,
committed suicide by scaling them
selfs in a room of their home and
turning on the gas. Their bodies were
found by the police.

Also the American Legion of
the New Mexico Highway Associa-
tion was organized and incorporated
in Topeka several months ago, will be
placed from California to Kansas City,
Mo., by Nov. 1. The marking of the
highway is to start from the coast
to Denver.

The percentage of poverty in the
state of Washington, according to cen-
sus figures, amounted to 12.7

any language. Of this number, 1,022
were native whites of native parentage,
761 of mixed parentage, and 11,
030 of foreign birth; 2,127 Indians, 472
Chincas and 1,003 Japanese.

WASHINGTON

President Harding's unemployment
conferences will be asked to recom-
mend the appropriation of \$400,000 for
the work of the United States employ-
ment service during the coming winter,
Secretary of Labor Davis has in-
structed.

The species of parole or pardon by
George V. has been "cold called
for a while," by the Department of
Justice according to Attorney General
Daugherty, who said that such recom-
mendation as he had prepared would
be "signed in formality" before
going to the President.

Final findings of the department
were found by the Labor Department
to have declined in all but two of the
cities in which it conducts investigations.
Decreases amounted to 2 per
cent in Minneapolis and Portland, Me.,
and 1 per cent in Atlanta, Philadelphia
and Salt Lake City.

The Western Pacific railroad has ap-
plied to the Interstate Commerce Com-
mission for authority to issue \$3,000
of first mortgage 6 per cent gov-
ernment bonds to be used for
reconstruction of its 450-mile
lines and to reinforce the treasury of
the company for equipment, largely
furnished and paid Aug. 1.

In order that the coal mining industry
might begin to feel the effects of the
acute unemployment and in order
that the miners and experts may
have increased knowledge of conditions
over the country in the event of
the formation of the United States Employ-
ment Service, the coal miners of the
Associated Press have been invited to
the headquarters of the Service in Wash-
ington to be informed of the status of
the coal mining industry.

The Associated Press
indicates an audience invited to the
headquarters of the Service to be
held on Oct. 21, 1921, at 10 a.m. The
miners will be given a full report of
the coal mining industry in the United
States.

A new record of 4,500 car-
loads of coal was set by the Western

FOREIGN

According to the latest statistics the
German casualties in the war were 1,
808,045 killed and 4,247,432 wounded,
including cases returned to the
wounded list more than once.

Sir Ernest Shackleton and his party
have arrived at Lisbon on board the
vessel Quest, which has been damaged
by a heavy storm off the west coast of
Portugal. It is recalled that when
the Quest started out from England on
its voyage of exploration to the Ant-
arctic, dispatches from London stated
there was not a single able-bodied
seaman in its crew.

Damaged by one vessel in a dense
fog off the southwest coast of Scotland
and then sunk by another coming
to its aid, was the fate of the Laird
line steamer Rowan, sailing between
Glasgow and Dublin. Thirteen of the
Rowan's crew and three passengers
are missing. Two passengers died after
being rescued by vessels which responded
to the wireless S. O. S. call.

Weakness in the transverse girders
of the dirigible ZR-2 had been reported
long before the fatal flight when two
score British and American air sailors
were killed, the coroner declared in
summarizing the testimony given at
the inquest. Weakness in the trans-
verse girders had been shown in tests
in May, said the coroner. He based
his declaration upon evidence intro-
duced from experts in the form of de-
positions.

The American freighter West
Comat, bound with cargo from San
Francisco for Glasgow, rammed the
Laird liner Rowan, a Glasgow-Dublin
night passenger boat, in a thick fog
off Coweswallpoint, Scotland, near the
mouth of the river Clyde. While the
Comat was lowering its boats to pull
the stricken ship, a third steamer, the
Clyde liner Clan Malcolm, from Glas-
gow for Natal, South Africa, sped out
of the fog in answer to an S. O. S. call
and crashed amidships of the Rowan,
which sank a minute later. Thirteen
members of the Rowan's crew and
three passengers were lost.

GENERAL

Eight children were seriously in-
jured when a flying swing device at the
fair grounds at Brockton, Mass., gave
way, throwing one of the swings into
the crowd. The children were taken
to a hospital and several other persons
were treated at an emergency station.

Walter Bernard Sullivan, 36, port
owner of the Charlotte, N. C., Ob-
server, died in his hotel apartment
after a brief illness. A widow and a
young daughter survive him. He went
to New York a few days ago, on his
way home from Denver, Colo., to see
the world series.

Ray V. McGraw, formerly vice pres-
ident and general manager of the Mis-
souri Valley Cattleman Company of
Omaha, which was declared bankrupt
some time ago, has surrendered to the
sheriff on indictments, one of which
charged embezzlement of \$100,000 of
the company's funds.

Flying at the rate of 141 miles an
hour, a flying boat piloted by Clifford
Webster, completed a trip of 1,020 miles
from Aberdeen, Md., to Fort Washing-
ton, N. Y., in 80 minutes without a
stop. A speed of 160 miles an hour
was maintained between Philadelphia
and the Battery, New York.

Every Rumanian in the United States
was urged to "add one more employee
to your payroll this winter," to aid in
relieving the unemployment problem, by
Harry Karr of Rumania, international
president of Rumania's club, to address
before the meeting of the Pennsylvania
district at Pittsburgh, Pa.

More than \$100,000 a week was
spent on the highways in Ohio during
the past summer, beginning the low-
est point of the year for work done
between June 15 and July 1. This is
the largest amount ever spent in that
short period of time since the depart-
ment was organized.

The State Bank of Monroe, Kansas,
was robbed recently, and in an ex-
change of shots between the robbers
and bank officials, it is reported, L. E.
Washington, cashier of the bank, was
shot. Telephone wires between Stan-
ton City and Monroe were cut, prob-
ably by the robbers.

A broken engagement and the
annunciation that her promised fiance
was preparing to marry another girl
led to the fatal shooting of Boyd Elmer,
near Lead Hill, Ark. Miss Allie Elmer,
21, his former sweetheart, in the
scuffle for the gun, was shot in the
knee. Elmer died four hours after
the shooting. Miss Elmer never
returned to the police.

HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

No Soldier Tax Exemption Possible Before 1923.

The Lincoln County High
School Team played an exhibi-
tion contest at the County Field
Meet at Carrizozo held last
week. The Girls Team played
the Town Team of Carrizozo and
lost by a score of 27 to 7. The
score does not indicate the na-
ture of the contest, since nearly
all the points were made by one
forward on the Town Team.
Then, too, it must be remem-
bered that the Capitan team for-
ward played their first game
and they showed remarkable
team work with but three weeks
practice. The boys teams were
also forward on the Town Team and the
L. C. H. S. Team had no difficul-
ty in defeating their neighbor
across the mountains. Their
pass work was far superior to
their opponents and speed con-
fused the other team so as to be
unable to locate their respective
individual opponents. The boys
score was 25 to 14. This is not a
true index of the game because
the court was not regulation,
baskets loose and no nets.

The letter reads: "The amend-


