**Next Legislature.**

(By Guthrie Smith)  
 Santa Fe, N. M., Nov. 16.—The  
 House of the sixth New Mexico  
 Legislature, to be convened in  
 January, will be about as strong  
 as Democratic as previous legis-  
 latures have been. Republican  
 Retirees that are now complete,  
 but official, show that the Dem-  
 ocrats will have 82 members.  
 Only five short of a two-thirds  
 majority. Republicans will have  
 only 17 members.  
 Other extraordinary features  
 of the membership of this next  
 house are: Democrats return  
 only three members of the fifth  
 Legislature; Republicans return  
 on two; not many veterans to  
 cope with the senate, which has  
 a majority of the opposite belief;  
 fewer Spanish American mem-  
 bers than in any previous state  
 Legislature; Mrs. Bertha M. Pax-  
 son, Democrat, of Dona Ana  
 county will be the first woman  
 ever elected to a  
 New Mexico legislature.

The division of powers and  
 authority, after the inauguration  
 of Governor James F. Hinkle,  
 Democrat, and convening of the  
 Legislature, will mean a division  
 of responsibility as well. It will  
 be possible for either branch  
 of the Legislature to enact law  
 in which the other does not con-  
 cur. Under these circumstances  
 it is reasonable to look for legis-  
 lation which will run more to  
 the public good and less to the  
 advancement of partisan inter-  
 ests. Even Republicans are  
 hopeful that the division will re-  
 sult in favor of fewer laws.  
 There is little reason to fear  
 that Governor Hinkle will veto  
 any measure upon which the  
 senate and house are able to  
 agree. It is not anticipated he  
 will have any trouble in securing  
 confirmation by the Republican  
 senate of his appointees. The  
 senate is composed largely of  
 men who hold the best interests  
 of New Mexico above partisan-  
 ship.

**Two Vote Victory**

The election in Gaudin  
 county was exceedingly close.  
 Frank Furecloth, Republican, is  
 elected by a majority of two  
 votes. He was opposed by  
 "Uncle" John, H. Hicks, the  
 veteran livestock grower.

**Auto Thief Sentenced to  
 Attend Church for 3 Years**

Los Angeles, Calif., Nov. 14.—  
 To attend church once each  
 Sunday for three years, was the  
 sentence upon John Kezma, who  
 pleaded guilty to having taken  
 for his own use, an automobile  
 which was found parked outside  
 a church.  
 "You understand," remarked  
 Judge Russ Avery, of the su-  
 perior court, in passing sen-  
 tence, "that this is in no way a  
 punishment. If I wanted to  
 punish you, I would send you to  
 jail. But sending you to church  
 will make a better citizen out of  
 you."

**Potatoes Hit Bottom.**

Washington, D. C., Nov. 18.—  
 Prices of potatoes have reached  
 the bottom, according to the De-  
 partment of Agriculture, aver-  
 aging only 20 to 30 cents a bush-  
 el in growers in the west and  
 ranging from 40 to 50 cents a  
 bushel at eastern shipping points.  
 Some western farmers are giv-  
 ing potatoes away to any one  
 who will dig them and others  
 will not dig them.

 term. The school rooms that  
 have been unable to secure a  
 attendance can begin their record  
 for the month of December next  
 Monday November 26th. I visit-  
 ed the White Oaks school and  
 found pupils doing good work  
 under the direction of A. T.  
 Pfingsten and Kathryn Spence.  
 The White Oaks community  
 makes life as pleasant as possi-  
 ble for teachers in their midst.  
 Teachers attending the New  
 Mexico Educational Association  
 which convenes in Albuquerque  
 November 27th, will be allowed  
 the time without any reduction  
 in salary. Teachers remaining  
 at home will teach every day  
 but Thanksgiving day. A large  
 attendance of teachers at this  
 meeting is desired because of  
 important measures regarding  
 teachers' certificates, salary of  
 rural teachers, etc., will be dis-  
 cussed at the Council meeting  
 Monday night and presented to  
 the General Assembly in the  
 form of resolutions, for the  
 adoption or rejection. It is  
 your duty to be there or able  
 by decision without complain-  
 ing. Excellent programs have  
 been arranged for all sections.  
 The Parsons school was visited  
 Monday of the present week.  
 This is a small school but is  
 composed of healthy girls and  
 boys who have promised to make  
 the Parsons school the best in  
 the County.  
 The Christmas vacations must  
 be made up. I would advise  
 that schools be closed not more  
 than from December 22nd to  
 January 2nd. Please notify me  
 of your plans, as I intend visiting  
 all schools before January and  
 would not like to make a trip and  
 find schools closed. An excel-  
 lent program has been arranged  
 for November 24th at the Lin-  
 coln County High School, at  
 Capitan, every body cordially in-  
 vited. School Directors are asked  
 to send all legal accounts  
 against school districts to this  
 office by December 20th, in or-  
 der that bills may be paid and  
 report of conditions made by  
 December 31st, according to a  
 decision of the Court, budgets  
 must be followed as passed upon  
 by the State Tax Commission,  
 a copy of which was mailed to  
 District Clerks as soon as re-  
 ceived by me.

We have thought the matter  
 over seriously and have reached  
 the conclusion that all people  
 stand for enforcement of law.  
 Do not understand from this  
 that all people are in favor of en-  
 forcing all laws against all peo-  
 ple, for they are not; but all peo-  
 ple favor enforcing some laws  
 against some people. All of us

 laws to be violated, and we are  
 willing for some people to violate  
 laws that we would gladly see  
 others punished for violating.  
 Run this through your mind and  
 see if it isn't true of you. The  
 laws we favor we would like to  
 see enforced, but if there are  
 laws we oppose, we raise a fuss  
 when they are violated. And  
 then, if we like a fellow real well,  
 and he is with us on some lead-  
 ing issue, we are perfectly will-  
 ing to forgive him if he does a  
 little law violating.—Copied from
