



Dublin.—Further talk of peace between factions in Ireland is heard as "Christmas approaches." Action taken by the Dail Eireann of the Free State in appointing a committee to work for the immediate cessation of hostilities has developed some indications that a considerable section of the Republican party is willing to treat for peace and that the rank and file is moving in that direction.

Philadelphia.—Thousands of persons representing virtually every walk in life did homage at the bier of John Wanamaker, whose body lay in state in Anthony's Presbyterian church where the famous merchant had worshipped before his death and where he was a familiar figure in the Sunday school and other religious work.

Leaves Houses to Tenants.
Los Angeles.—Tenants of George Noe, who died here recently, were his heirs. His estate, valued at \$25,000, consisted of five houses, which were bequeathed to the families occupying them. He was survived by no known relatives.

Netherlands a Large Foreign Market.

Washington.—Nearly half the exports of corn from the United States in 1921—or 53,000,000 bushels—went to Canada, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. Much of this corn, however, eventually went to Europe. Exports of corn during each of the first three months of 1922 were larger than during any month of 1921. The second largest foreign market for American corn was the Netherlands, where 17,000,000 bushels were imported.

Twelve Men Charged With Robbery.
Chicago.—Twelve men and a woman were arrested, charged with robbing P. J. Caldwell, a messenger for the Logan Square Trust and Savings bank of \$10,000 last Tuesday. Several thousand dollars in cash were recovered. At the same time, police spread a wide dragnet for two bandits who robbed the offices of James E. Morrison, downtown diamond broker, of \$100,000 worth of diamonds and \$2,000 cash.

New Mexico
