

New Mexico State Items

Cattle sales have been good in Luna county this fall, according to reports from the Cattle and Horse Growers' Association. The total sale is over 6,000 head.

Hugh McKee, one of the best known stockmen in the Alma district, received a carload of Hereford bull calves last week from a prominent breeder in Kansas.

According to reports of the Chamber of Commerce of Artesia, there is a big shortage of homes and many people, who would like to become residents of the city, find that they are obliged to go elsewhere to find a place to live.

Formal dedication of the new water plant three miles east of Tularosa occurred last week when many citizens went to the site to witness the turning on of the water in the mains. The new plant is modern in every way and the water, coming from the springs in the hills, is said to be equal to any in the state.

Plans for the annual state convention of the New Mexico Wool Growers' Association were formulated in Albuquerque at a meeting of the executive committee. The convention will be in Albuquerque, Feb. 1 and 2. Of chief importance will be action on a project to establish three bonded warehouses in the state.

Three men were burned, one of them badly, in a gasoline explosion near Pecos, a few days ago. They were: W. B. Fisher, A. C. Fisher, his son, and William Christian. The elder Fisher, who was in the most serious condition, was burned about the body and face. For a time his chance of recovery was regarded as doubtful.

Thomas C. Van Stone of Santa Fe, son of Mrs. Berta Van Stone, has been awarded a Bowditch scholarship in the Harvard Engineering school, an award based on a previous scholarship record of highest distinction. Mr. Van Stone, who is now continuing his studies in the engineering school was a first group scholar in the rank list for last year.

One of the most enthusiastic meetings of the ex-servicemen ever held in Dawson took place the last week at the Dawson opera house when a local post of the American Legion was formed with twenty-five members. More than the necessary number of members have signed the roll and the charter has been applied for under the name of the Brady-Army post.

John Sloan, Santa Fe and New York, one of the fourteen American artists who have been classed as the later men who developed original ways of doing things, has shown another streak of originality. It might be called good luck. Sloan has sold a collection of twenty paintings to one man and has reaped a financial harvest to the tune of \$20,000. The purchaser is Mr. Hamlin of New York, a grand-nephew of Hannibal Hamlin, vice president of the United States during the Civil War.

"Cattle in New Mexico are in good condition generally; the ranges are not overstocked and there is plenty of grass to winter them in good shape," declared John H. Hicks, one of the most experienced livestock men in the state. The shipping of stock is still active but the prices in all cases are not satisfactory to the growers, although their products are selling for more than last year at this time. One of the real assets of the state, said Mr. Hicks, is the raising of large quantities of alfalfa so that the cattle men will not be obliged to import feed from out of the state.

The first meeting of what is to be known as the Gallup Rotary Club was held at the Manhattan Cafe in Gallup last week, when the by-laws were adopted and the officers elected. The club started off by adopting constitution and by-laws and electing officers and board of directors, as follows: President, J. W. Chapman; vice president, T. H. Seymour; secretary, L. N. Cary; treasurer, C. W. Davis.

The second section of the west-bound Golden State Limited, running over the El Paso & Southwestern tracks, ran into the rear of the first section at Luna, N. M., a few days ago, due to one of the worst snowstorms in the history of this section. No one was injured. The locomotive of the first section was derailed in a snowdrift one mile west of Luna. The second section, running exceptionally slow, hit the tourist car at the rear of the first train. The tourist car and the locomotive of the second section were damaged. The first section consisted of baggage, mail cars, a day coach and the tourist car. The second section was a solid Pullman train.

One of the most complete Boy Scout club houses in New Mexico was opened in Dawson recently. After the completion of the new building the debt on it is only \$250 and this will be cleared up during the coming year. A large number of the residents of the city attended the opening.

A new company, to be known as the West-Central Oil Company, is soon to start drilling in the vicinity of Alamogordo, according to reports of Californians who have been in the city. The company has taken a lease on about 25,000 acres of land.

At the two-day session of the legislative body in Albuquerque it was decided to hold the annual state convention in Clovis next year. The choice was made in order that the delegates to the meeting would have an opportunity to see the big hospital at Clovis which was recently taken over by the Hospitalists of the state.

With Walter D. Miller as the manager, a new Dulek stage line has been placed in operation between Gallup and Farmington and daily service will be given between the two cities.

COLORADO GOLDEN JUBILEE TO BE SUGGESTED TO STATE CONFERENCE.
Denver.—Colorado Golden Jubilee! That is the name which will be suggested to a meeting of representatives of all parts of the state on Saturday, Dec. 15, for a joint celebration in 1920 of the fiftieth anniversary of the admission of Colorado to statehood and of completion of the Moffat tunnel.

The suggestion will be made by a committee appointed last week by Gov. William E. Sweet for consideration of the advisability and feasibility of holding a celebration of the kind. The committee, of which Cass E. Herrington is chairman, believes the jubilee could be made of immeasurable value to all Colorado, but decision as to whether the big affair will be carried out will rest with the meeting representative of the different sections of the state a week from next Saturday.

The presidents of all chambers of commerce in Colorado, the mayors of all the larger cities, all former governors of the state, the president of the Sons of Colorado and the president of the Territorial Daughters of Colorado will be invited to participate in the meeting.

The governor's committee sees an opportunity in the jubilee to advance the development of all the principal parts of the state in a most practical way.

Laying their own suggestions and ideas before the conference, the governor's representatives will ask for suggestions and criticisms and a decision as to whether or not Colorado should go ahead. If the decision is for a jubilee, steps toward perfection of the organization to do the work will probably be taken immediately.

This the members believe can be accomplished by working out a complete balanced program in which different weeks or periods can be devoted to different sections of the state where special attractions and features would be held during these weeks. Automobile trips and railroad excursions to these sections during the feature weeks and generally throughout the jubilee would supplement the efforts of the various sections.

The other members of the committee appointed by Governor Sweet to start the ball rolling include: Clara N. Stansard, A. B. Trott, C. O. Parks, Charles A. Johnson and Calvin H. Morse.

Chicago.—A poet to sing of the graces and worth of blooded animals of the farm is sought by Ralph E. Johnson of Chicago county, Minnesota, one of the 1,500 boy and girl club workers who won the right to represent 700,000 boys and girls at the international livestock show. The Drutus, he explained, will sail from this port next February for Manrovia, on the west coast of Africa, with 2,000 tons of freight and 200 Afro-American
