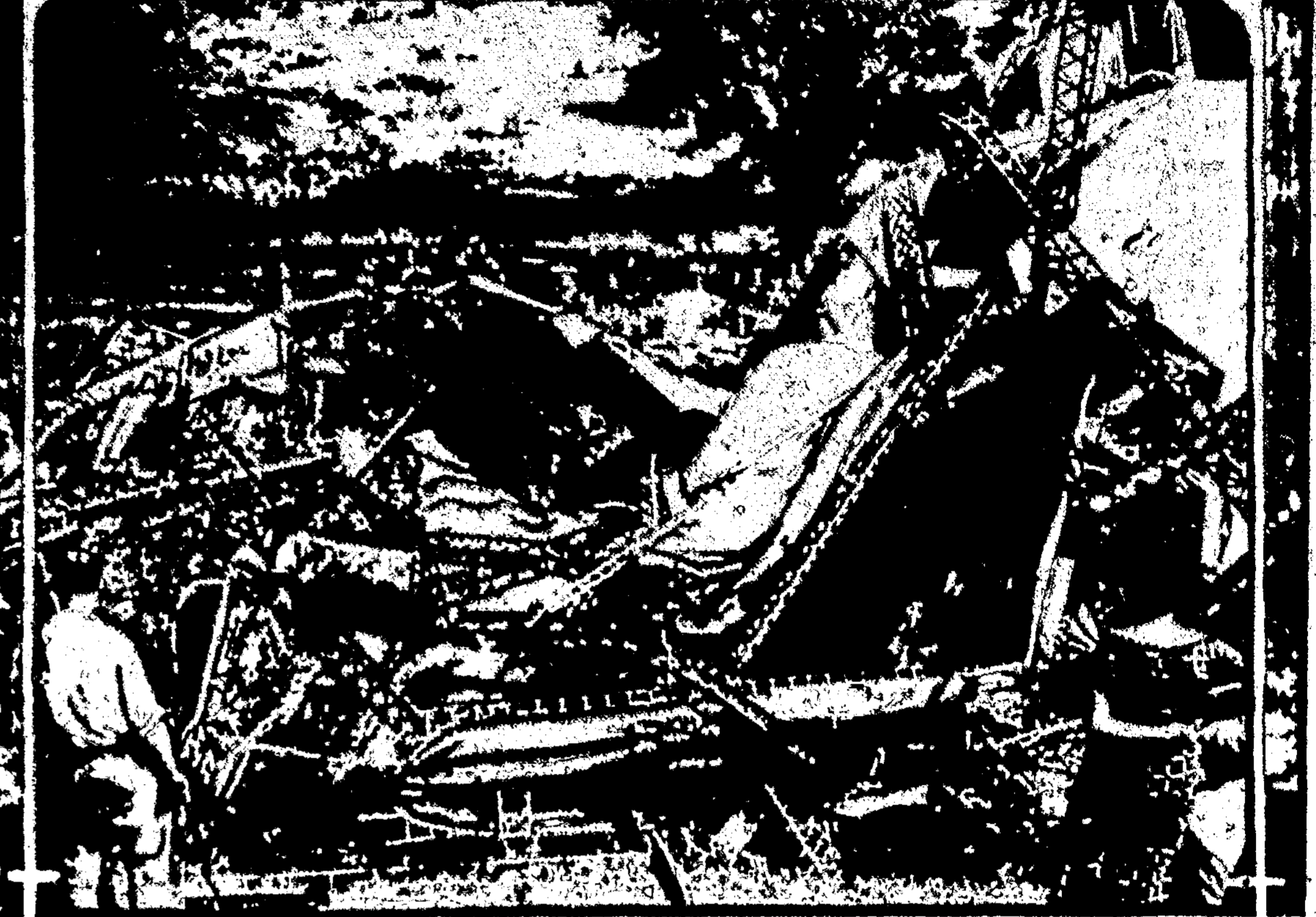

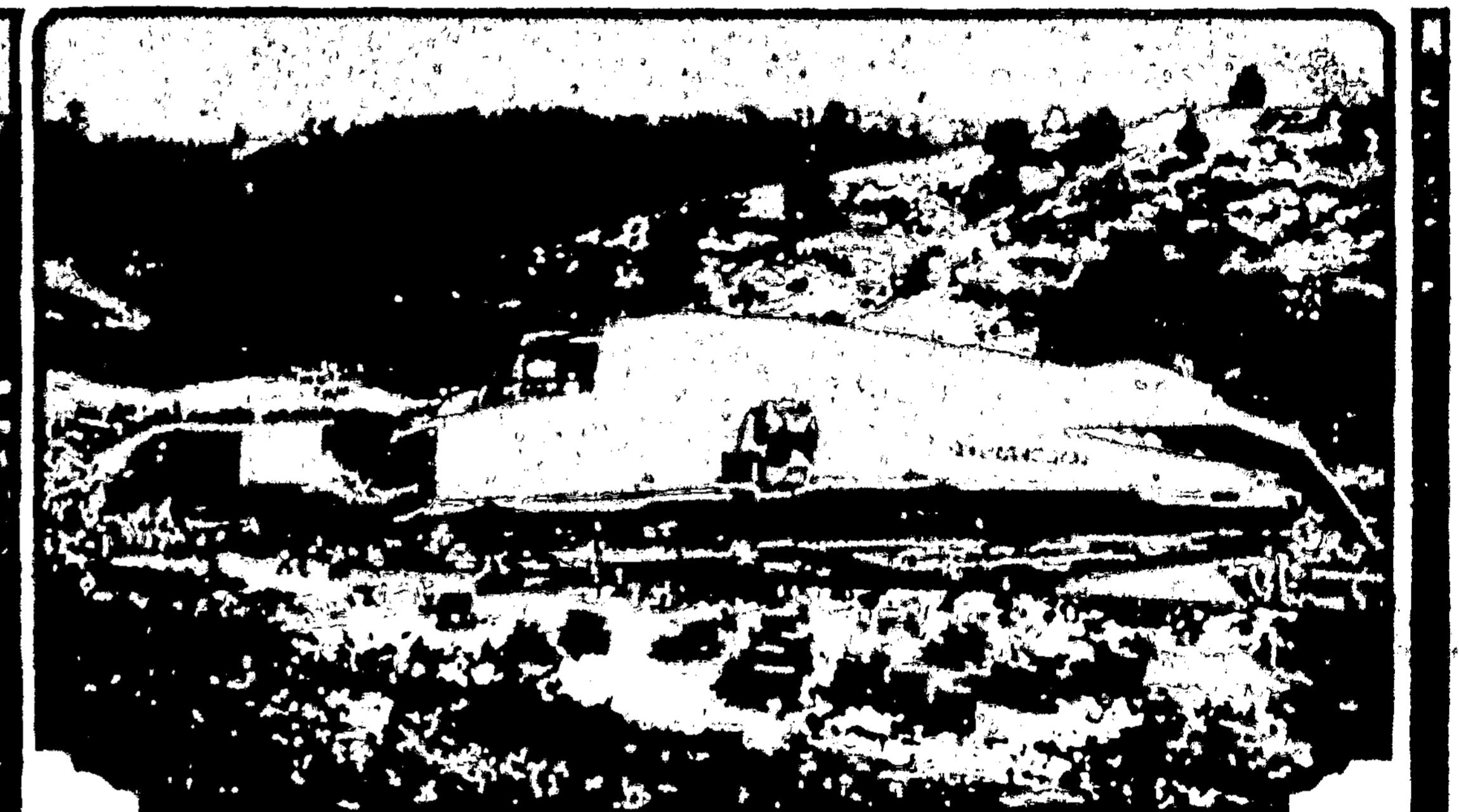

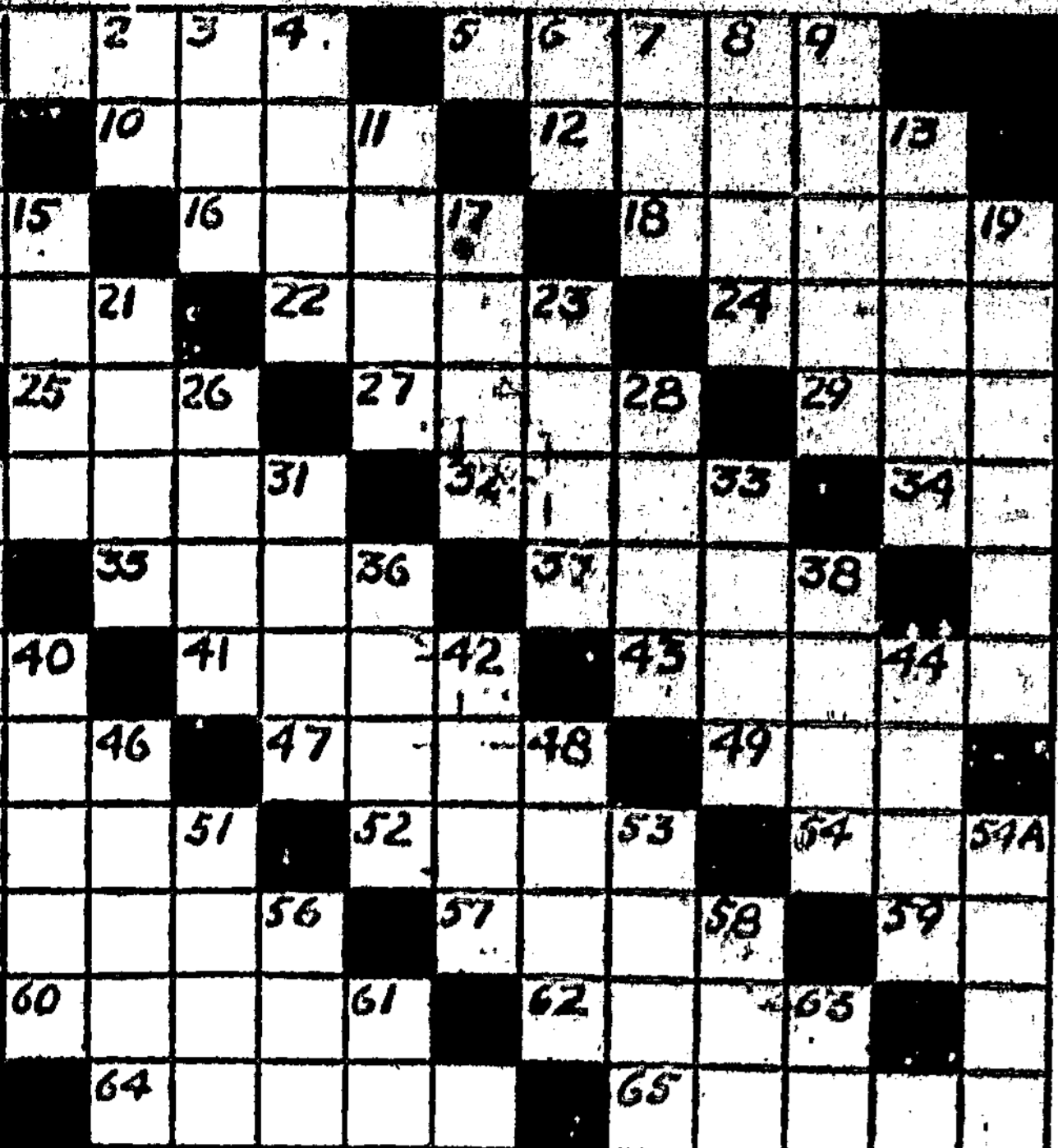
Iron Ore Production

Ore differs mostly in the per cent of iron it carries. Alabama and Virginia iron ore carries from 35 to 40 per cent iron; Pennsylvania's a little less than 50 per cent, and Minnesota's 60 per cent. There are chemical differences. Pennsylvania ore is high in phosphorus and is called magnetite, which signifies that the iron is separated from the ore by a magnetic process. All southern ores belong to the Clinton group, and have to be washed before shipped. Superior ores are richest in iron and the metal is more easily isolated. In the iron itself there is no difference wherever mined. Ore occurs in similar form in all of the districts as large rocks, as gravel and as powder. Southern ore as a rule is coarser than that taken from the Great Lakes region.

Earliest Footwear

The first articles of footwear of which there is record are the sandals worn by Egyptians 6,000 years ago. The shoes were of simple construction but lavish ornaments were placed upon them. The Greeks carved the names of their wives and sweethearts on the soles of their shoes. This was intended as a compliment, but the Egyptians had a habit that was just the reverse. 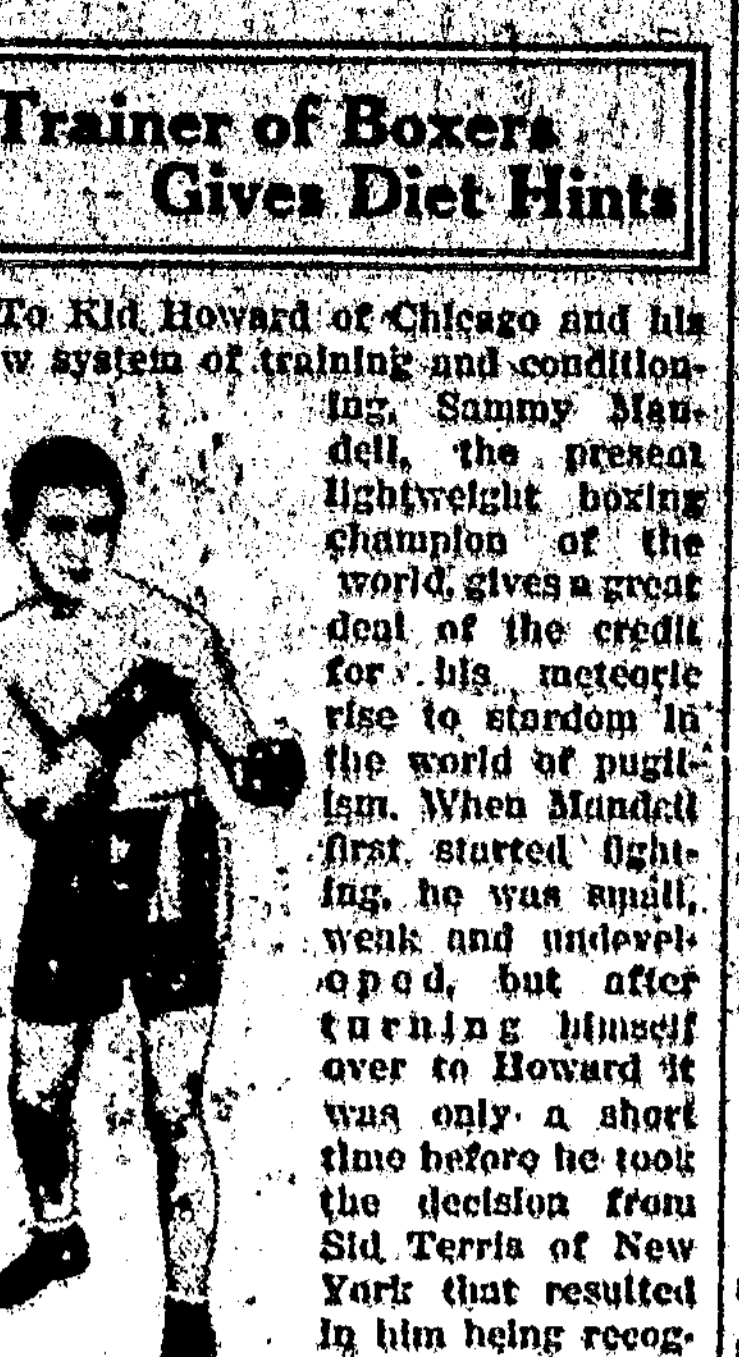

FARM STOCK

SOME ADVANTAGES IN RAISING SHEEP

Farmers are becoming interested in raising sheep as a profitable undertaking. One of the first problems that comes up before the farmer who is interested in the proposition, is the advantages and disadvantages of sheep. There are several advantages in raising sheep, and with a little care most of the disadvantages can be overcome. In general, sheep raising will pay provided the sheep are given proper attention, says L. V. Starry, chief of the animal husbandry division at Clemson college, who gives below some of the advantages and disadvantages that the farmer may expect to find in sheep.

The outstanding advantage of the sheep industry is that they require less grain than any other class of live stock. This does not mean that sheep can get along without feed. There are times when they must have plenty of feed. A good grade of legume hay is one of the most satisfactory feeds.

Sheep will consume about 60 percent of the weeds and bushes grown in the ordinary pasture. In this way they make the pastures better. They also spread their manure over the parts of the pastures which need it most. They seem to like to occupy the spots which are too poor to grow grass.

There are two money crops, the lamb and the wool. It is often the case that the wool will pay for the feed and the lamb are clear profit. If the lambs come early they will bring a good price on the market.

Diseases, parasites and dogs are the three drawbacks to the sheep industry. Diseases and parasites may be controlled to a certain extent by changing pastures frequently. If sheep are brought up into a lot at night dogs are not likely to bother them. Dogs very seldom attack sheep in the day time.

Proper Feeding Is Best in Growing Market Hogs

"Farmers will some day learn that it pays to feed hogs properly and market them wisely," says W. W. Shay, swine extension specialist for the North Carolina State College of Agriculture.

"On February 10," states Mr. Shay, "County Agent C. A. Sheffield of Davidson county weighed nine pigs belonging to J. E. Young of Lexington. At that time the pigs weighed 245 pounds.

Tankage, red dog, and corn meal were mixed in what has been proven by the North Carolina experiment station as the best ration to meet the requirements of such pigs from the standpoint of both gains and profits.

"At the expiration of five weeks," says Mr. Shay, "the pigs were again weighed and fed in different proportions was mixed for another period of five weeks. This was continued during four periods of five weeks each, the feed being changed each time, and all the time an amount of corn equal by weight to the slop mixture was fed."

As a result, Mr. Shay reports that, on July 1, the pigs were sold for 18 cents per pound. At that time they weighed 1,231 pounds and brought \$223.01.

After paying for all the other feeds at actual cost, these nine pigs paid \$221 per bushel for the 53% lard of corn which they ate during this 140-day period. If Mr. Young produced his corn at a cost of 75 cents per bushel, the profit on that eaten by his pigs was \$122.23.

Live Stock Items

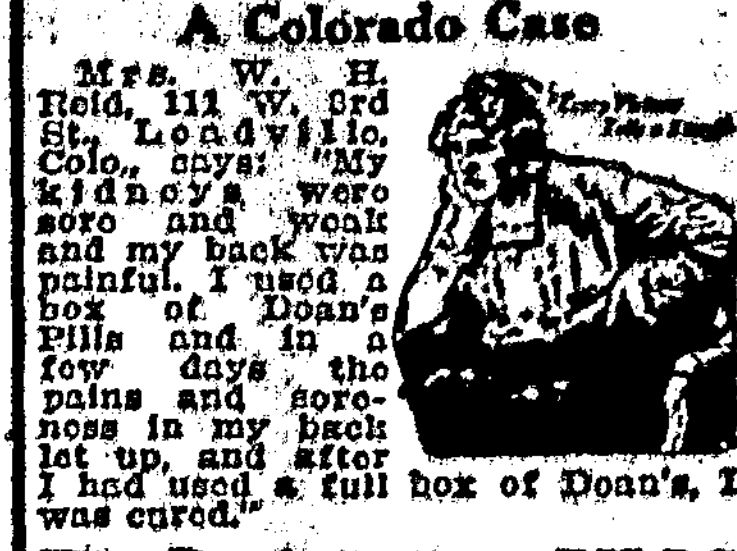
- Don't waste your surplus feeds.
- Don't turn cattle or sheep on luxuriant clover when the dew is on.
- Don't allow pregnant breeding animals to become too fat.
- Don't feed a ration containing corn alone to any class of stock.
- Empty corn cribs help explain why stockmen are feeding and marketing lambs so much these days.
- Don't allow your breeding animals to become so thin that they have to apologize for their condition.
- Hogs and mineral matter, placed where the swine can meet at all times, will produce thrifty porkers.
- Sheep and hog parasites live inside the animals; you can't get at them with external remedies.
- Don't use pastures too early in the spring and don't graze pastures too closely.
- A good feeding ration for steers, bo they yearlings or two-year-olds, is corn, clover and alfalfa hay.
- Breed cows, bred to farrow in the spring, should be kept in good flesh, but not allowed to become too fleshy.
- A good grade of alfalfa hay is much appreciated in small quantities by the cow and helps in producing milk.
- Don't feed more grain mixture or concentrate than the animal will clean up quickly, except when forcing fattening animals.

The period of lambing is as truly the harvest time of the shepherd as is the season of cutting the grain for the wheat grower.

The feeding of a little grain to the ewes about two weeks before the breeding season opens is an excellent investment from many points of view and should be practiced.

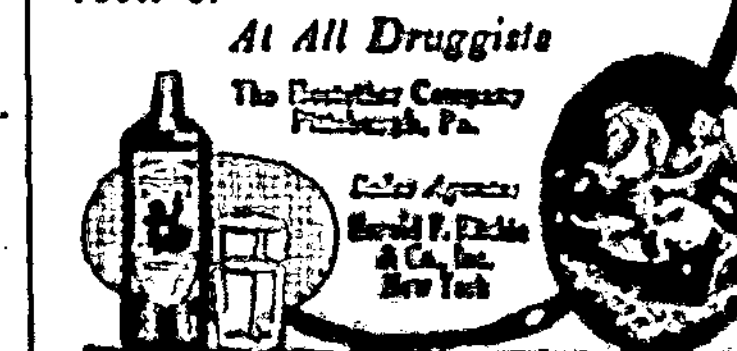

HUDSON BAY COUNTRY

Prepared by the National Geographic Society, Washington, D. C.

HUDSON BAY and its 2,500 miles of coastline are having their annual steamship contact with the rest of the world at this season. Except in the summer months the people of the bay region live to themselves, shut in by ice along their water lanes, and on the land side, by rough and frozen terrain that the transportation devices of the modern world have not yet conquered.

There are more people and more activity around Hudson bay and its supposedly dreary hinterland than is generally supposed. For two and a half centuries permanent settlements of whites have been maintained along the coast. The first, Rupert House, near the southernmost tip of the bay, was established as a post of the Hudson Bay company soon after that corporation of romantic history came into existence in 1670. Since then the trading posts have grown in number, until nearly a score are scattered along the coast, and west coasts. At each of the Hudson Bay company posts a Canadian, English or Scotch "factor" is in charge. Assistant factors reside at the larger posts, and many of the officials have families with them. In recent years posts of a rival fur company, Revillon Freres, a French concern, have been established beside the older posts or in entirely new locations, in charge of French managers.

The typical trading post in the Hudson bay country consists of a substantial store stocked with food supplies, fabrics, tools, guns, ammunition and miscellaneous goods; the home or homes of company officials; a church; a few cabins of settled Indians, and perhaps a mission school building where instruction in trades is given by missionaries. At the posts in spring and early summer Indian and Eskimo trappers and hunters gather to trade the furs of their winter catch for needed supplies.

Great Osa Rather Than a Day.

"Hudson bay" is a misnomer. This huge body of water, 900 miles long and nearly 600 wide, is more than a bay or even a gulf. It is really a great inland sea, an arm at once of the Atlantic and Arctic oceans, which bites deep into the vast bulk of the North American continent. It is one of the most characteristic features on the map of the continent, standing out as strikingly as the Gulf of Mexico and covering almost as great an area.

Early in August of each year steamers belonging to the fur companies, from Newfoundland and the St. Lawrence ports, push through Hudson Strait north of Labrador and nose their way down into the bay. They are loaded with miscellaneous cargoes of trade goods which they distribute to several of the major posts. There call-boats from the smaller posts meet the steamers, bringing the past winter's accumulation of furs, which are to be replaced by cargoes of trade goods. When the steamers have made their rounds and are ready to steam homeward, they are loaded with furs worth hundreds of thousands of dollars. The visit of the steamers from the outside world is the event of the year at the posts where they touch. The posts are not isolated at other times, however, for there is considerable movement of small boats along the coast in the open season from post to post. Even in winter sledge journeys by dog teams may be made to the nearer posts.

On the map, Hudson bay does not appear to be exceedingly inaccessible from the more settled parts of Canada to the south. The Canadian National railway, extending east and west, passes only 175 miles south of the southern tip of the bay, a distance roughly equal to that between New York and Boston. From Cochrane, one of the stations on the Canadian National, a rail line has been pushed down the Athabasca river, nearly half-way to the bay. It is extremely difficult to construct a railway over the rough, forested wilderness, however, and the completion of the line at an early date does not seem assured. This railway will eventually reach Moose Factory, near the mouth of the Moose river, one of the oldest and most important of the Hudson Bay company posts. Moose Factory gains added importance by the fact that it is one of the few Hudson Bay communities that can communicate with the outside in winter. After the Moose and Athabasca rivers are frozen over early in December they constitute highways along which dog teams sometimes make the trip to Cochrane.

Around James Bay.

The southern 200 miles of Hudson bay is a narrow tongue of water known as James Bay. Around James Bay the fur trading posts are most numerous and there and in the country farther inland the Indian population gives way to the Eskimos who hunt in much of the country between Hudson bay and Labrador. On the west coast the Indian population persists as far north as Fort Churchill, 300 miles north of James Bay.

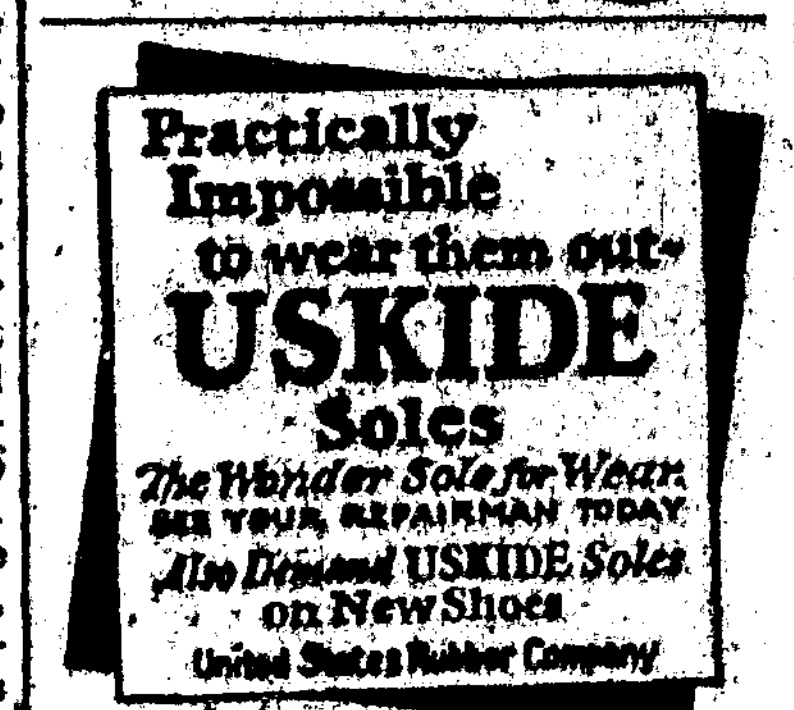
Civilization has affected very differently the Indians and the Eskimos of the Hudson bay region. The Indians, having adopted the clothing, food and to a certain extent the housing of the whites, without their methods of sanitation, have fallen prey to the diseases of civilization and are rapidly degenerating and dying out. In the face of contacts with the whites the Eskimo has stuck pretty closely to his mode of life, and he is still a con-

MAKING SIGNALS SECRET
