WESTERN

Because he treated federal prisoners sent to the Fulton county jail as his guests, Sheriff J. B. Crane was haled into the United States District Court at Carson City, Nevada, and fined \$300 on contempt charges. The sheriff permitted his prisoners to accompany him on arrests, to attend the movies alone at night and to enjoy the freedom of the grounds outside the jail.

Colorado's contention that it should have certain jurisdiction over the highways within the Rocky Mountain national park and that others than government licensees should be permitted to operate vehicles for hire within the park, was partly sustained at Washington, D. C., when the United States Supreme Court there sent the case back to the United States District Court in Denver for trial on its merits.

The high cost of distribution can be reduced by shifting the initiative from selling to buying. John Benson of a Chicago advertising agency, told the American Association of Advertising Agencies at the world advertising convention at Houston, Texas. "We have got to build up more consumer pull and have less selling push all along the line," Mr. Benson added. "There are too many dealers and too many jobbers."

Pola Negri recently returned to Hollywood from a vacation trip abroad. She had little to say concerning her differences with New York customs officials over the alleged contents of her trunks and jewel cases. "That will be all straightened out," she explained, and then went on to say that what puzzled her more was the story of Justine Valco, who, a few days ago, asked Hollywood police for protection against men she said had used her in a blackmail plot against Miss Negri. The actress star was positive no blackmailers had approached her in recent months.

To gather rare exhibits of South American plants and animals for the \$75,000 James memorial wing of the Colorado Museum of Natural History to be built in Denver next year, a scientific expedition, sponsored by the museum and financed by a wealthy Denver man, have left Denver for the region of Roosevelt's famed "River of Doubt," according to an announcement by J. D. Higgins, director of the museum. The party includes F. Walter Miller, expert in mammalogy at the museum, Frederick E. D'Amour, photographer and botanist, and Frederick Brandenburg, bird and taxidermy specialist.

Gunnar Kazson, Northland musher, who leaped into the limelight and a movie contract through his sensational dash to Nome with anti-diphtheria serum, has found little fame and no fortune since coming to Los Angeles with Balto and the rest of his dogs. He relates in a complaint filed with the State Labor Department at Los Angeles. Kazson alleges he was lured to Los Angeles by Sol Lesser, operator of a string of motion picture theaters with an offer of \$200 a week for him and his dogs, the contract to run ten weeks. So far, he says, he has received but \$37.50, and as a result finds himself without even transportation money back to Alaska, let alone dog biscuits for Balto.

WASHINGTON

Informal conversations relative to a French debt settlement are again in progress. It was disclosed recently at the State Department, confirming the fact of negotiations for the first time, the department reiterated that the Washington government had sent no formal communication on the question to France.

Modification of the Volstead act to a "decent law" that would be enforceable, or flagrant violation of it with the consent of the whole Congress," were held out by Representative John Philip Hill of Maryland, in an address in Washington, as the alternatives confronting the eighteenth amendment.

An indication of improved business conditions throughout the country is shown in the postal receipts of fifty leading cities, totaling \$23,633,231, in April, as compared with \$24,918,449 in April, 1924, an increase of \$2,104,762, or 8.4 per cent, the Postoffice Department announced last week. Dayton, Ohio, led all other cities in the volume of increase in receipts in April, amounting to 23.67 per cent.

President Coolidge has definitely decided to leave Washington for his summer vacation in New England on June 23, going direct to Swampscott, Mass. A large staff of White House clerks and secretaries will accompany him to the main executive offices near Swampscott.

Proceeds from life insurance policies totaling \$374,000, left by Henry C. Frick for the benefit of his widow and daughter, were not subject to the federal estate tax under the retroactive act of 1918, the Supreme Court held a few days ago.

FOREIGN

Dispatches from Sofia received in Vienna say that all the principals charged with responsibility for the recent bombing of the Sveti Kral cathedral, in which 160 persons were killed, have pleaded guilty with the exception of one defendant named Koefr.

White bread of American wheat flour is gaining in popularity in Sweden, according to trade and crop statistics for 1924 now available. But at the same time Sweden's own grain producing capacity is raising, so that in a pinch the country could supply its entire need in breadstuffs.

The French, British, Italian and Belgian governments decided to omit the usual formal congratulations to a newly elected chief of state in the case of Field Marshal von Hindenburg, Germany's president, in view of the fact that his name is still on the list of those charged with war crimes.

The Netherlands Olympic committee has issued a manifesto to the nation declaring it to be the committee's irrevocable decision to hold the 1928 Olympic games in Holland, notwithstanding the vote in the lower house of Parliament last week declining to grant funds to cover part of the expenses.

Field Marshal von Hindenburg was inaugurated president of Germany last week. Except for a brief shout of protest from the Communists, the inauguration was carried out according to schedule, the field marshal being sworn into office by the Reichstag president, Paul Loebe, before a crowd of thousands.

Notwithstanding the legend that St. Patrick banished all the snakes from Ireland, one has been discovered in Dublin and is now on exhibition in the National museum. It is a very small specimen, less than two feet long, and of the harmless variety. News of the find caused much comment in the press. Snakes have occasionally been brought into Ireland from overseas, but they have never been known to breed in Ireland.

GENERAL

President Coolidge hopes the conversations now progressing in Paris and Washington on the French debt settlement question will lead to some definite plan for a refunding agreement.

A burst of speed in the last fifty miles, clinching a persistent race from the start, won for Earl Cooper, veteran driver, the annual Confederate Memorial day 250-mile speedway race at Charlotte, N. C.

Sensational in the extreme was the win at Pimlico, Md., of Gifford A. Cochran's 8-year-old maiden Coventry of the famous Preakness stakes, the Maryland classic, which was worth \$52,500 to the owner of the winner. So little was thought of the colt's chance that he was a member of the field roster with the result that he paid the corking price of 23 1/2 to 1.

A group of fearless river men have resumed their task of lifting to the surface of the Mississippi river the remains of the steamer Norman in hope of recovering from the wreckage the bodies of twenty-one persons who have been missing since the vessel sank last week near Memphis. R. O. Schaefer, publisher of the Southern Contractor, is responsible for the statement that faulty construction of the steamer Norman caused the sinking of the boat.

Saying that F. W. Ruben, national secretary of the Amateur Athletic Union, had "assumed the role of defender rather than investigator," in considering charges that Hugo Quist, manager for Paavo Nurmi and Willie Ritola, had asked an exorbitant expense account for the appearance of the Finnish runners at the Drake relay carnival at Des Moines last month, Kenneth L. Wilson, athletic director at Drake University, in a statement made public in Des Moines, declared that he "was not surprised that the A. A. U. whitewashed Nurmi, Ritola and Quist from all charges."

Insurance by the United States treasury of 1/2 million 50-cent pieces, which will be sold to aid in financing the Stone Mountain Memorial to the Confederacy, was attacked in Joplin, Mo., by Louis Aracberg of Pittsburgh, Pa., commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Settling into the water while turning in the Mississippi river near Memphis, the government steamer M. E. Norman, carrying forty ex-convicts, sank within three minutes. Twenty-two persons lost their lives in the disaster. Tom Lee, a boatman, who saw the accident, saved nearly a score of persons when he dragged them from the river into his motorboat.

Pointing out a vital need for a revitalization of Judaism, strengthening of the synagogue and training of religious leaders, the executive board of the union of American Hebrew organizations, meeting in Cleveland, Ohio, approved a budget calling for an expenditure of \$113,500 for the fiscal year 1925-26 for religious activities conducted by the union and its affiliated bodies. The budget is an increase of \$50,000 over last year.

NEW MEXICO STATE ITEMS

D. W. Snyder, federal prohibition director for New Mexico, announced in Albuquerque that he had resigned, effective June 1, to take a more lucrative position in some other business.

Sharp reductions in coal freight rates from Colorado and New Mexico fields to points in Nebraska, South Dakota, Iowa and Kansas, have been ordered by the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington.

"Not guilty" was the instructed verdict brought by a Santa Fe jury in the case of the State vs. Joe de Lallo, charged with killing a five-year-old boy at Cerrillos in October, 1922, by running down the youngster with his motor.

Silver City has leased its water plant, now in the hands of a receiver, and will operate it itself pending the purchase of the system. The city recently voted bonds to the amount of \$300,000 to take over and develop the system.

The encampment of the four engineer companies of the National Guard opens at Las Vegas July 3 and closes July 17, according to an announcement made in Santa Fe by Adj. Gen. Vincent Jaeger. The dates have just been definitely fixed.

Silver City is making plans for an old time Fourth of July celebration which is to be held under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce. A committee of business men is back of the event which promises to be one of the best ever held in the county.

In spite of the drought and high winds of the early spring, orchardists of Socorro county believe that a bumper fruit crop will be harvested this fall. All kinds of trees are reported to be overburdened with small green fruit at the present time.

At a meeting of a large number of the business men of Portales held last week, an organization was formed to be known as the Portales Country Club. Plans will be started at once for the laying out of a nine-hole golf course and later in the season a fine club house.

The Commercial Club of Aztec has started a move for the erection of a \$50,000 hotel during the summer. Due to the ill activity in the county the present hotels are inadequate to handle the great influx of visitors. If present plans are carried out the structure will be under way in the next two months.

Construction of 509.15 miles of federal aid highway included in thirty-nine projects in this year's objective for the State Highway Department. The estimated expenditure is \$3,630,000. Both in cost and mileage this outlay is the largest program which was one of the biggest, if not the biggest, undertaken up to that time.

Nellie Apodaca of the Sacred Heart High school of Gallup won the first prize in the state essay contest on the subject, "The Constitution and the Courts," offered by members of the State Bar Association. The first prize was \$50. Abel Valdes of Menaul school, Albuquerque, won the second, \$25, and Virginia Gump, Immaculate Conception Academy, East Las Vegas, the third, also \$25.

The A. T. & S. F. has made a 35 per cent reduction in rates on feeder or range cattle, calves and sheep, from New Mexico points to Oklahoma, California, Texas, Kansas and Colorado, and between intrastate points, at the request of the State Corporation Commission. The reason is given as extreme drought in parts of the state. The commission has asked the Southern Pacific to make a similar cut, but has not yet received a response.

Thomas Garcia, herder for the Hubbell sheep company, pleaded guilty to the charge of setting fire in the Duff national forest and was given a fine of \$25 and thirty days in the county jail at Socorro. The jail sentence was withdrawn and \$20 added to the fine when company officials said that the herder would be hard to replace. The Hubbell company paid the fine. This was the second arrest made by foresters in the drive against persons who are careless with fire.

The New Mexico Federation of Women's Clubs will have its full quota of delegates at the council of the General Federation of Women's Clubs which is to be held at West Baden, Ind., from June 1 to June 6. Besides the state president, Mrs. Grace Thorpe Bear of Roswell, other delegates who will attend are Miss Frank Joyce of Carlsbad, Mrs. O. H. Brown of Las Cruces, and Mrs. Nina Otero Warren and Mrs. Frances C. Wilson of Santa Fe. Mrs. Bear will be one of the speakers for the occasion, giving an address on "Club Publicity." The object in the national council meeting is to discuss plans for national club work.

A United States field station which promises to be of immense benefit to the agricultural interests of this entire portion of the Southwest, is to be established by the United States Department of Agriculture at the New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. The contract between the government and the college, under the terms of which the government leases a tract of forty acres belonging to the college, has been signed by the secretary of Agriculture and has just been received by Dr. H. L. Keitt, president of the college.

RIFFIAN TRIBESMEN SEIZE AIR FIELD

MILITARY HOSPITALS FILLED TO CAPACITY; WOUNDED SENT TO OTHER BUILDINGS

FRENCH LOSSES ARE HEAVY

PARIS DISPATCH DECLARES LESSON IS TAUGHT MOROCCAN REBELS

Tetuan, Spanish Morocco.—Advices received from the French zone are to the effect that there has been hard fighting between the French forces and the rebel tribesmen, with heavy losses on both sides. The French military hospitals are reported filled to capacity, making necessary the evacuation of wounded to other hospitals.

It is asserted that the French high command used native Moroccan in the operations and that they received high praise for their conduct in battle, in view of the fact that some of them fought the French for twelve years, and only last year submitted to French rule. The Riffians have captured French airplanes which had to land in rebel territory because of damages.

Paris.—General De Chambrun's men, in cleaning out a strong position of the Riffians on the heights of Bilane, in Morocco, in one day, are declared to have administered a salutary lesson to the invaders.

In military circles it was said that it required close fighting with cold steel to dislodge Abd-El-Ouim's followers. The fact that a strongly organized system of trenches was taken in a single day of fighting gave basis for the belief that the pretender would not be able to win the tribes in the French zone to his cause.

The Riffians were strongly entrenched around the Bilane position, and the tribesmen knew it.

There are political as well as diplomatic considerations in this decision. Communists in France are being agitated against any military action against the Riffians. They assert in manifestos that the campaign in Morocco has been undertaken at the behest of capitalists and the imperialist elements.

Abby Rockefeller Weds Young Lawyer

New York.—Miss Abby Rockefeller, heiress to one of the greatest family fortunes in the world, was married here to David Metwayer, a young New York attorney, at a simple ceremony witnessed only by members of the immediate family and relatives. The wedding took place in the drawing room of the eight-story home of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., her father, at 10 West Fifty-fourth street. The Rev. Cornelius Woolfkin, pastor of the Park Avenue Baptist church, known as the "Rockefeller" church, performed the ceremony. Those in attendance were relatives of the bride and groom. With the exception of Everett Macy, an intimate friend of the bride's father, John D. Rockefeller, Sr., came from his Lakeview, N. J., home to attend the wedding.

Pre-natal Hearing Delayed

Trinidad, Colo. The lunacy hearing for Dr. Ulrich W. Praelman, charged with the murder last July of his wife near here, was delayed for forty days longer by a decision to commit him to the Woodcroft sanitarium at Pueblo for observation as to his sanity. The action was taken in the County Court at the request of Dr. C. W. Thompson, superintendent of the hospital, who had been called as an expert witness by the state. He asked the opportunity to observe the patient be given before he should testify.

Mrs. Shepherd Held Guiltless

Chicago.—The county grand jury absolved Mrs. Julie Shepherd, co-guardian and foster mother of William Nelson McClintock, millionaire orphan, of implication in his death and in the death of his mother, Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock. The jury voted a "no bill" in each instance. The case against William Darling Shepherd, her husband, already under indictment for the murder of young McClintock, was left open with respect to the death of Mrs. McClintock, the grand jury refraining from taking any action.

Radio Police Alarm Installed

New York.—A radio police alarm system will be installed in New York within a month, Police Commissioner H. E. Enright announced after a successful test of the system before the international police conference. Two hundred receiving stations will be installed throughout the city, he said, and so selective are the receivers that headquarters can transmit an alarm to any one of the 200 stations or simultaneously to every station.

U. S. Wine Point at Geneva

Geneva.—The United States won her point at the international conference on the control of the trade in arms and munitions, that arms can be shipped to a foreign government without previous recognition of that government. The resolution which was adopted unanimously was accepted on condition that an agreement would be reached later as to how shipments of war materials can be affected when the importing country is in the throes of a revolution.

Kermit and Theodore Off for Wild Places In Asia

AND when you leave this little country and ride three days northeast, always among mountains, you get to such a height that you said to be the highest place in the world. There are great numbers of all kinds of wild beasts, among other, wild sheep of great size, whose horns are good six palms in length. The plain is called Pamir and you ride across it for twelve days together, finding nothing but a desert without habitation or any green thing, so that travelers are obliged to carry with them whatever they have need of. The region is so lofty and cold that you do not even see any birds flying. And I must also notice that, because of this great cold, fire does not burn so brightly, nor give out so much heat as usual, nor does it cook food so effectually.


MARCO POLO.

How would you like to be this summer with Kermit and Theodore Roosevelt, hunting for Marco Polo's "wild sheep of great size" up in the Tian Shan mountains of Eastern Turkistan? I thought so. Apparently most of the ten million male Americans between ten and nineteen—to say nothing of the grown-ups and women—are simply consumed with envy.

For, according to their tentative schedule, Kermit and Su-to—they are so named in their Chinese credentials—are just about now in Brinagar, India, with George K. Cherris, who went abroad to arrange for an outfit of yaks, long-haired ponies and fifty or more natives. They are probably wearing some kind of queer native costume, casting over their "smooth-iron" faces impatient glances from the Vale of Kashmir toward the giant mountains overhead.

The Roosevelts and Cherris continue

an "American scientific expedition," organized by James Simpson of Chicago in the interest of the Field Museum of that city. The purpose is the collection of the rare animal life of a region practically unrepresented in the museums of this country. The grouped photographs reproduced herewith show some of these rare animals. Two rare beasts of prey are the snow leopard and the long-haired tiger. Then there are the goat, scharpa and burrel, not to mention gazelles,

antelope, deer and wild camels.

What the expedition wants most, however, is Marco Polo's mountain sheep, Ovis Poli, named for him by latter day naturalists. This sheep was long considered fabulous, but there is such an animal, unless it has now become extinct. This was settled in 1833, when Lieut. John Wood, an Englishman, sent to the Royal Asiatic society an Ovis Poli horn measuring 50 inches on the curve. The drawing reproduced is supposed to portray a male and female of the species. They strongly suggest our big born of the Rockies, still to be found in Rocky Mountain, Yellowstone and Glacier National parks.

This Marco Polo was a Venetian gentleman of the Thirteenth century. In prison at Genoa he entertained his fellow prisoners with marvelous tales of his travels. Later he and a scribe put the tales into "The Book of Ser Marco Polo the Venetian Concerning the Kingdoms and Marvels of the East." The book became the best seller of the medieval literary world. It was universally believed to be one gorgeous fabrication from beginning to end and Marco Polo was honored for many centuries as the world's biggest liar. But time played havoc with Marco Polo's reputation, for most of his tales were found to be true. The quoted extract from the thirty-second chapter of his book is a good

sample of his "true lies." He actually

was there about the year 1250 and his description is probably exact. The route he traveled runs up to 20,000 feet in places and water boils at about 178 degrees. The Roosevelts are "chips of the old block." "T. R." of "strenuous life" fame, The sons are upholding the Roosevelt tradition. Kermit is a seasoned out-of-doors man. He was with his father in Africa and Brazil and has hunted in Alaska, Manchuria and India. Theodore says he is the tenderfoot of the party. Cherris is a veteran naturalist who has made thirty-nine expeditions, including the Roosevelt expedition to the "River of Doubt," but this is his first venture in Asiatic hunting. Dangers encountered and hardships endured in the name of sport outnumber even the multitude of sins popularly supposed to be covered by charity. The month's trip from New York to Brinagar by sea, rail and motor, was easy. But here's a bare outline of what the hunters are now facing: It will take them a month or so to climb the Burzil trail to Gligit on the "Roof of the World," the jumping-off place of civilization. The narrow and dangerous trail averages an altitude of 17,000 feet, which taxes vitality and is an acid test of temper and disposition. Travel through snow passes is mostly by night for fear of avalanches. And Gligit is only about halfway to the lofty Pamir plateau. Gligit and the surrounding region is a famine country, fed from the valleys below. So the Roosevelts must carry food supplies to last to the Pamir plateau. Time is precious in these mountains. Winter comes early and if the Roosevelts don't get back into the Vale of Kashmir by early October they will either have to stay all winter or go out to the north by trails described as "heartbreaking."


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
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
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
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
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
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
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
Cradle in Church

From the thirteenth century it has been a rule that the most recently born baby in the parish should be taken to church on the Sunday nearest Candle-

man and dedicated to God.

On Saturday night the child is baptized, next day it is again taken to the sanctuary and placed in a tiny cradle inside the altar rail. The vicar then dedicates the child to God, and rocks the cradle. The ceremony is intended to symbolize the Biblical story of the presentation of the Child Christ in the temple. "Chivalry" Influence Chivalry was a medieval institution which arose out of the feudal system and City Hall.

That Legion Drive.

The American Legion is engaged in a "drive" for an endowment fund for five million dollars. Fine. Any organization has a right to build a sound financial foundation for its work. But we are wondering whether the American Legion is fooling it self or whether the drive promoters are fooling the public when they state the fund is needed to care for war veterans and their orphans. The income of the five million conservatively invested does not exceed \$300,000 a year. There are probably 200,000 more or less disabled veterans; the drive promoters place the number of orphans at 30,000. What's \$300,000 a year compared with these numbers? The average community of 300,000 inhabitants has a charity budget of several millions. And how is the American Legion going to divide the income among the needy veterans and orphans of forty-eight states? The stated purpose of the "drive" is a reflection on the patriotic gratitude of the American people. America is not only able and willing but anxious to take care liberally of all those who lost their health in the Great War. America has spent more than two billions, is still spending \$400,000,000 a year for the disabled veterans. Three hundred thousand a year additional is a mere drop in the bucket; the American Legion has only to prove the need of this sum to Congress to obtain it. It is wasting time and effort by appealing to the public for an amount which is less than one-twelfth of one per cent of the annual appropriations for the Veterans' Bureau. — May Sun-set.

State Fire Laws

Below is quoted the New Mexico state fire law which is effective after June 10, 1921. "Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico: "Sec. 1. Any person who shall wilfully or negligently commit any of the acts hereinafter enumerated in this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five nor more than five hundred dollars, or imprisonment in the county jail for not less than fifteen days nor more than six months, or both such fine and imprisonment. (a) Set fire, or cause or procure fire to be set to any forest, brush or any other inflammable vegetation growing or being on lands not his own, without the permission of the owner of such land; provided, that no person shall be convicted under this section who shall have set in good faith and with reasonable care, a backfire for the purpose of stopping the progress of a fire then actually burning. (b) Allow fire to escape from the control of the person or persons having charge thereof, or to spread to the lands of any person other than the builder of such fire without using every reasonable and proper precaution to prevent such fire from escape. (c) Burn brush, stumps, logs, rubbish, fallen timbers, fallows, grass or stubble, whether on his own land or that of another, without taking every proper and reasonable precaution, both before and after the lighting of said fire and at all times thereafter to prevent the escape thereof; provided, however, that any person desiring to burn as aforesaid during the months of May, June and July, shall give notice to the owners of adjacent land of such intention to burn at least 24 hours before setting such fire. Sec. 2. Any person who builds a camp fire upon lands within this state, not his own, without clearing the ground immediately around it free from material which will carry fire, or who leaves thereon a camp fire burning and unattended, or who permits a camp fire to spread thereon, or who shall be throwing away any lighted cigar, cigarette, match or by the use of firearms, or in any other manner start a fire in forest material not his own, and leave same unquenched, shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100) or, by imprisonment for not more than 30 days."

Sunday School Lesson

Lesson for May 24

GAUL BEGINS HIS GREAT CAREER LESSON TEXT—Acts 9:10-21. GOLDEN TEXT—"I determined not to know anything among you, save Jesus Christ, and Him crucified."—1 Cor. 2:2. PRIMARY TOPIC—How God Saved Saul From Danger. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Saul a Bold Teacher. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Courage in Witnessing for Christ. I. Saul Preached Christ in Damascus (v. 10-22). 1. Saul's Fellowship With the Disciples (v. 10). After Saul was baptized he remained certain days with the believers in Damascus (v. 10). How beautiful to think of the transformation which took place—the one who was so passionately bent on their destruction was now enjoying fellowship with the disciples. 2. Straightway Preaching in the Synagogues (v. 20). Saul, like every one who is really converted, begins to tell of the newly found Savior. As soon as he is saved he goes to save others. His message concerned the deity of Christ. His doctrinal belief is summed up in six words, "He is the Son of God." 3. The People Amazed (v. 21). They knew that the very one who had been the ringleader in persecuting the Christians in Jerusalem, and had come to Damascus for the express purpose of bringing them bound to the chief priests, was now passionately advocating that which he had so vehemently sought to destroy. When a man is saved there ought to be such a change as to cause the people to notice it. 4. The Jews Confounded (v. 22). Saul retired into Arabia for three years. During this time he was taught the full truths of his ministry (Gal. 1:17-18). Saul increased in spiritual strength and confounded the Jews, proving that Jesus was not only the Son of God, but their Messiah. II. Saul Escapes From the Jews (v. 23-25). He used the Scriptures with such skill that the Jews could not answer him. Finding that the argument was against them, the Jews took counsel how they might destroy Saul. So intent were they upon killing him that they watched the gates of the city day and night that they might take him. When this became known to the disciples, they let him down at night in a basket by the wall. III. Saul Visits Jerusalem (v. 26-29). This journey to Jerusalem was in strange contrast with the one from Jerusalem to Damascus. The one was as a leader of an important expedition under the authority of the Jewish officers with the prospect of a place of distinction in the council of the Jewish nation. Now he is an outcast, disowned by his countrymen, and fleeing for his life. There are the outward circumstances, but he knows the fellowship of the Lord Jesus whom he once hated. 1. Suspected by the Disciples (v. 26). The believers at Jerusalem had not heard fully about Saul's conversion. They knew nothing of his sojourn in Arabia, and his preaching at Damascus after his return. Therefore they regarded him as a spy. "Part of the penalty of wrongdoing is the difficulty of restoration in the good opinion of honorable men." 2. Barnabas' Confidence in Saul (v. 27). Barnabas was a man filled with the Holy Spirit (Acts 11:24) and therefore able to discern the reality of Saul's conversion. He was in reality a "son of consolation" and here showed his kind spirit. 3. Saul in Fellowship with the Disciples (v. 29). He was not content merely to visit with the brethren. He spoke boldly in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. IV. Saul Sent to Tarsus (v. 30). A conspiracy similar to that set at Damascus was formed against Saul. When the brethren knew of it they sent him to Tarsus. Saul's life was in danger everywhere except among the Gentiles. He now left back to the place of his birth. The first and best place for one's testimony is to his home. Saul's conversion was typical of the conversion of the Jewish nation. Their eyes will be opened by a personal revelation of Jesus Christ to them, and when they accept Him as their Savior and Messiah, they will go forth as witnesses to the Gentiles. Below will be found Section 4061 of the Pharmacy Laws of the State of New Mexico. "Section 4061. Any person not a registered pharmacist, as provided in this act, who shall conduct a store, or a pharmacy, or place for retailing, compounding or dispensing drugs, medicines or poisons, or chemicals, for medical use, or for compounding or dispensing physicians' prescriptions in the State of New Mexico, or who shall take, use or exhibit the title of registered pharmacist, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, be liable to a penalty of not less than one hundred dollars, or imprisonment in the county jail for not less than one month nor more than three months, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court. 





SUMMERY FOODS

Jellied meats, vegetables and fruits are always best enjoyed in the hot weather.



Jellied Veal and Ham.—Take a shank of veal that has not been trimmed, wash and place in a kettle, pouring over it a pint of boiling water for each pound of shank. Add one-fourth cupful each of chopped carrots, minced onion and diced celery, a few sprigs of parsley, a bay leaf, eight peppercorns, one-eighth teaspoonful of thyme and two teaspoonfuls of salt. Cook slowly until the meat falls from the bones, cool under weight, then it may be cut into slices. Strain the liquor through a fine sieve, cool, and remove all of the fat. Clarify the stock, using two eggs and crushed shells for each pint of stock, boil ten minutes, strain through a cheesecloth, add one-half teaspoonful of salt and a few grains of cayenne. Into a cold, wet mold or bread pan, pour a little of this clarified veal broth and allow it to stiffen. On this lay thin slices of the veal and very thinly sliced cooked ham. Cover with broth, cool until stiff, repeat until all the broth is used. Chill for several hours and turn from the mold. If the weather is very hot and there seems to be danger of the broth not stiffening add two tablespoonfuls of gelatin which has been softened in cold water.

Stuffed Celery. Mix chopped nuts with cream cheese and fill the hollows of tender celery stalks, adding a bit of mayonnaise to moisten the cream cheese. If filled carefully the stalks may be eaten from the fingers as one does plain celery.

When currants are plentiful can some fresh with sugar for winter. They are delicious. Crush every currant, using a potato masher, use an equal measure of sugar, stir and let stand until the sugar has been dissolved, then put into chilled sterilized jars and seal. Keep in a cool place.

Food for the Family. There are so many ways of serving potatoes that we should endeavor to vary the method from day to day.

O'Brien Potatoes.—Fry three cupfuls of cubed potatoes in deep fat, drain and sprinkle with salt. Cook one slice of onion in one-half tablespoonful of butter three minutes, remove the onion, add three canned pintones finely minced. When well-heated, add the potatoes, stir until well mixed, turn into a serving dish and sprinkle with chopped parsley.

Creamed Mushrooms on Toast.—The first warm days bring up the field mushrooms which are so delicious and may be served in so many ways. Clean one pound of mushrooms, remove the caps and cut both caps and stems into thin slices. Melt five tablespoonfuls of butter, add the sliced mushrooms and cook three minutes. Sprinkle with half a teaspoonful of flour, pour over one-half cupful of cream. Cook five minutes, stirring constantly. Serve on oblong pieces of toast and garnish with toast points and parsley.

Onion Purée.—Cook onions until tender, drain and put through a sieve—there should be two cupfuls. Melt two and one-half tablespoonfuls of butter, add two tablespoonfuls of flour, stir until well blended, then pour on one-half cupful of milk. Bring to the boiling point, add the onion purée, a well-beaten egg and season with salt and cayenne.

Bread and Butter Pudding.—Spread slices of bread generously with butter and arrange in a baking dish, butter side down. Beat three eggs slightly, add one-half cupful of sugar, one-fourth teaspoonful of salt and one quart of milk, pour over the bread and let stand thirty minutes. Bake one hour in a slow oven, covering the first half of the baking. Serve with hard sauce. Cream one-half cupful of sugar with one-quarter cupful of butter slightly softened and flavor with nutmeg.

Maple Cream Layer Cake.—Cream one cupful of butter, add one and one-half cupfuls of powdered sugar, and then add gradually one-half cupful of milk with one cupful each of flour and cornstarch sifted with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Beat well, add ten drops of bitter almond, two tablespoonfuls of orange flower water, then the stiffly beaten whites of six eggs, folding in lightly. For the filling put one and one-half cupfuls of shaved maple sugar in a saucepan, add a teaspoonful of butter and one-half cupful of this cream; boil slowly until it spins a thread. Take off, add one teaspoonful of vanilla and beat until thick, then spread on the layers.



FARM STOCK

RAISING SHEEP ON DIVERSIFIED FARM

There are three systems of sheep management in the United States. 1. Raising sheep in large bands on the range. 2. Keeping small flocks on the farms. 3. Fattening of range sheep.

The second and third are farm enterprises. The third is often more, or less a speculative business, but the second—keeping a flock on the farm—may well be considered a permanent part of diversified farm business.

Sheep fit well into a system of farming because of the small investment required, the quick returns, their habits of feeding, their benefit to the land and their "two-way" cash crop.

It is usually considered that sheep can be purchased cheaply in comparison with other live stock. At present prices, however, an animal unit of sheep (seven ewes), is not so much lower in price than in other classes of live stock. The investment for shelter need not be large, as expensive barns are not necessary. The fleece of the sheep will prevent it from suffering from cold if it is kept dry and given a windbreak. Proper fencing will be the greatest investment necessary.

It should never be but a few months after sheep are purchased until a cash crop may be sold, either wool or lambs, either one of which will return a considerable part of the purchase price.

A very large part of the feed for sheep should be roughage. This makes it possible to utilize large quantities of grain that would otherwise have very little value. They can also graze profitably on waste lands, fields, meadows, lanes and roadways.

Sheep benefit the land upon which they run, in two ways, by keeping down weeds and by increasing the fertility. Their value to soil fertility has been so generally recognized that they have been called the Golden Hoof. They have an advantage over other common classes of farm live stock because their lighter weight does not pack the soil and also because their droppings are distributed to much better advantage.

There Are Two Types of Runty Pigs, Says Peters

W. H. Peters, head of the division of animal husbandry at the Minnesota experiment station, University Farm, St. Paul, says there are two types of runty pigs—one the pig that is born small and weak, of which there are from one to three in a litter, and the other the pig that has become runty after getting a good start from its mother.

The problem as to what to do with the runt of the first kind is not difficult. If the litter is small, each runt will probably do fairly well and make nearly as good a pig as the rest. If the litter is large, it will probably be starved out, or it may be destroyed on the ground that it will not pay to attempt to raise it "by hand."

Runts of the other type, however, are more serious. Their presence indicates that the owner has made some mistake in caring for his pigs, and instead of one pig's becoming runty, all are likely to be runty. The real cause for the presence of such pigs is likely to be either lack of proper care and feed or else lack of attention to sanitation and health.

Mr. Peters believes that if the farmer is not able to determine the cause of lack of thrift among pigs, he should appeal to his county agricultural agent, and, if the county agent thinks it advisable, should call in a veterinarian. He says that the farmer cannot afford to ignore unprofitableness among his pigs, as it removes any chance of profit. A normal healthy pig should weigh about 200 pounds when 200 days old.

Live Stock Hints

Get the pastures ready for the mow. Dock lambs when they are about two weeks of age. A good 1,000-pound steer will dress out 330 pounds of carcass, while a common steer of the same weight will usually dress out about 320 pounds. The well-bred critter also brings more on account of quality.

Potatoes make very fair fattening feed for hogs, particularly when cooked. From 4 to 4 1/2 pounds of potatoes cooked are equal to a pound of corn. It is desirable to feed some other feed, such as oats or shorts, with the potatoes.

Plenty of good pastures mean the best and cheapest feed for live stock. Have pastures all the year. Sanitation in the hog lot sounds impractical but this method of preventing small pig ailments has kept a number of Kansas hog ties in the business.

In fattening steers for market don't over-stuff them. They will make faster gains if you keep 'em a little hungry. It's the last mouthful of grain that puts 'em out of condition.

Mark your spring litters of pigs so that you can select your best sows next fall from large litters. If you would have a strong-boned animal let him have plenty of pure, unadulterated sunlight. Straight light causes the assimilation of lime in the bones.

The lamb from a good ewe will sell for two or three times as much as her fleece. This shows its relative importance. It is the sheepman's most important source of revenue.


