



Uncle Sam: Mapmaker



Temple Act Provides For Completion of Topographical Survey Within 20 Years

LET'S suppose you are an able-bodied young American of the male sex who wouldn't object to a vacation next summer with all your expenses paid and wages thrown in for good measure. That being the case, you should get in touch with Uncle Sam at Washington, D. C. Uncle Sam, doubtless, will insist upon calling this vacation a job at map making with the geological survey. But don't let the dear old gentleman kid you.

Why, you'll go away off to some wild bit of country and cook at a campfire and eat bacon and beans and flapjacks off tin plates and sleep in a tent and bathe in a stream and fish and hunt and climb mountains. Or maybe, instead of climbing mountains, you'll go deep into some great forest where it's cool and dark and silent and the giant trees meet overhead, with just a glimpse of the blue of the sky. Maybe you'll travel by dog-sled over snow. Maybe you'll paddle down a swift stream between canyon walls. And maybe, if you stick long enough, you'll do all of these things—and more too.

And the surveyors don't make maps in rainy weather; they can't. And rainy days are when the fish bite best. And when the woods are wet is just the time to stalk deer. Why, I knew one surveying camp that had the most remarkable adventure with a grizzly—but that's another story and too long to tell here. Health, strength, an appetite that would "put a cool under the ribs of Death," dreamless sleep, adventure, the joy of "seeing what's beyond the next ridge"—why, if these aren't vacation joys, what are they?

And between you and me these topographers of Uncle Sam believe in taking things as easy as they can and do their job right. George Washington, when he was surveying for Lord Fairfax in Virginia, used to work straight across country, taking things as they came. But the topographic engineers of these latter days can put it all over George Washington—as a surveyor. You see, they have saw-fangled instruments and methods. So they just climb the nearest mountain—if there is one—and map the surrounding country from its top.

Why, these topographical engineers are so fond of this sort of map making that Uncle Sam picked out as their boss a man of the name of Birdseye. And he's made good on his name too. I haven't any idea of his mountain record, but I do know that as far back as 1812 he explored and mapped the crater of Kilauea in Hawaii National park. This great volcano has been

continuously active for more than a century and in its crater is Halemau-mau—Lake of Everlasting Fire—where dwells Pele, Hawaiian Goddess of Fire. And the next year this Birdseye—probably got cooled off—surveyed and mapped the top of Mount Rainier, in Mount Rainier National park, which is one huge ice-cap with a snowbank for a summit, 14,403 feet up in the air. But he doesn't confine himself to mountains. Two years ago he led an expedition by boat through the Grand canyon of the Colorado. Oh, yes; they lost a boat or two, had gorgeous adventures and narrow escapes; altogether it was a most satisfactory map making.

So, you see, Uncle Sam's map makers actually get paid for having more fun than anybody. Nevertheless, it's a poor question that hasn't two sides and—

In reality this topographical survey of the United States is a tremendously big and important job. It's so big that after nearly fifty years of work it isn't half finished. It's so important that the Sixty-eighth congress yielded to a popular demand and agreed to appropriate the necessary funds to finish the job in twenty years. And here's the why and wherefore of it:

The geological survey is charged "under direction of the secretary of the interior with the classification of the public lands and the examination of the geologic structure, mineral resources and mineral products of the national domain. In conformity with this authorization the geological survey has been engaged in making a geologic map of the United States and Alaska, involving both topographic and geologic surveys.

George Otis Smith is director of the geological survey. He is a geologist of note and a man of affairs. He was born in Maine in 1871. He is a college man, has the right to wear the Phi Beta Kappa key that denotes scholarship and can write after his name: A. B., A. M., Ph. D., Sc. D. and LL. D. He is a member of many scientific societies and the author of government reports, of papers and addresses and of a book or two. He has been director since 1907, with the exception of 1922-23, when he was a member of the United States coal commission.

The geological survey has several divisions and branches, among which is the topographic branch, of which Col. C. H. Birdseye is chief topographical engineer. He was born in New York state in 1878. He is a college man. After post-graduate work and service as university instructor he did several years of field work. He has been with the survey since 1909, except during his World War service, and took his present position in 1919.

The importance of the completion of the topographic survey lies in the fact that the geological survey's standard topographic map is the only accurate map. Moreover, it is in effect an exact model in miniature of the country it represents. It contains all that does the ordinary map; in addition it shows every physical feature represented to exact scale and every altitude is indicated by the contour lines. These maps are published in



convenient-size sections, each covering a "quadrangle" of ground. The edges of each map join on with exactness to those of adjoining quadrangles. And Uncle Sam sells these incomparable quadrangles at 10 cents each retail and 6 cents wholesale!

This topographic map, which at first glance of the uninitiated appears to be a map obscured by a mass of irregular reddish-brown lines, is of tremendous value to the country. For this is an age of construction—irrigation, drainage, waterpower, roads, etc., etc. And the topographic maps do away with the necessity of special surveys. The former, for example, can tell whether a drainage ditch is feasible. So that the engineering council, representing practically all of the engineers of the country, led a popular campaign for the completion of the survey, with the result that the Temple act became law.

Though this topographic survey has been in progress since 1879, congressional appropriations have been woefully inadequate. In 1921, for example, only 425 engineers and their assistants were making maps; they covered 12,811 square miles of territory. Only about \$15,000,000 have been spent in 46 years. Under the Temple act congress is expected to appropriate from \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000 a year. Moreover there is a provision by which states and municipalities may co-operate to speed up the work; such outside contributions this year total about \$400,000. About \$50,000,000 will be needed to complete the survey.

Director Smith and Colonel Birdseye have a big job ahead of them. The gross area of continental United States is 3,024,783 square miles; Alaska contains 684,400 square miles. About 45 per cent has been mapped—see map reproduced by courtesy of the Scientific American Magazine—of which about 15 per cent will have to be remapped because of the use of too small a scale. The standard maps are on the scale of one mile to one inch—one inch on paper to 62,500 inches of country. The completed map, if all the quadrangles were put in place, would cover about one acre.

Uncle Sam must have had a sort of "prophetic hunch" when he picked out Colonel Birdseye. Why? Because in the past forty-six years the topographic engineers have walked about 10,000,000 miles—which would be more than 400 times around the earth. But the topographic engineer of the future will likely do much of his mapping by photography from airplane!

NEW MEXICO STATE NEWS

The Military Institute at Roswell has some 475 students and the great mess hall with its huge kitchens serves over 1,500 meals a day.

Lieut. L. L. Dawson, who won third place in the famous Pulitzer air race at a speed of 169 miles per hour, is a native of Colfax county and a grandson of J. B. Dawson, one of the pioneers of northern New Mexico.

Four men giving their names as Bernard Gagner, Gustavus Howard, Ted Bintlily and Arthur Kea, all claiming to be from St. Paul, Minn., were arrested in Raton in connection with the robbery of two garages in Maxwell.

Leo Boudinot died in a Silver City hospital where he was taken after he was injured at Hurley, eighteen miles northeast of Silver City, when a Santa Fe engine switching in the yards, struck a touring car carrying a party of young people to a dance. Another member of the party, Adelardo Williams, was perhaps fatally hurt.

The Las Cruces city council expects to call for bids on from twenty-five to thirty blocks of paving in the business and residence sections of the city soon. If the present plans are carried out the main street of the city will also be made about 25 per cent wider than at present. New sewers will be laid before the paving is put down.

Waldo Rogers, son of A. T. Rogers, attorney of Las Vegas, has been elected editor of the Normal University Candler, the weekly publication of that institution. Harry Sama, formerly of Bolon, is associate editor. Clarence White is business manager and Raymond Marx is his assistant. The issuance of The Candler is under supervision of the department of English.

With Miss Eckles, John Milne, Frank Carroon, and the superintendents of the Estancia, Willard Encanto, Torrono, Cedarville, Moriarty, Ewing, Duran and Mountainair schools on the program, the music, talks by health officers, county nurses and so forth. Rattlesnake well No. 17, which has been brought in thirty miles east of Farmington by the E. C. Humes interests, will be good for 5,000 barrels in the belief of oil men. An actual test run during six hours produced 1,250 barrels of high-grade oil. The well was then shut down because of lack of storage. "The best oil well ever brought in on a Rocky Mountain structure," is the way oil experts described the gusher.

Two game refuges were established in Mora county, one to be known as the Turkey Mountain and the other as Hall's Peak, by the state game commission at a meeting held in Santa Fe attended by all three members—T. U. Hill, Dawson; Arthur Sisk, Albuquerque, and Charles Probst, Santa Fe. State Game Warden Thomas E. Dolgado was authorized to employ two deputies to patrol the Santa Fe national forest.

A. B. Ruah, a train dispatcher for the Pennsylvania railroad, believed to be from Cleveland, Ohio, was killed when his automobile plunged off a bridge across the Rio Puerco, near Gallup. It is believed Ruah was blinded by rain that was falling. His wife is said to be in Los Angeles.

Inclusion of thousands of Navajo and Indians in the literacy census in New Mexico does this state an injustice, Miss Isabel Eckles, state superintendent of schools, told the federal women's club in conversation in Santa Fe.

Self-Supporting Students

In the University of Nebraska last year 70 per cent of the men students and 38 per cent of the women were wholly or partially self-supporting, and records show that the average expenditure for the nine months of school was \$714 for the men and \$723 for the women.—Ohio State Journal.

Archery Revival Possible

Stewart Edward White's 19th hunting, may possibly revive interest in archery, but fashions in such things are capricious. They come and go with no more apparent reason than in the case of the craze for crossword puzzles. There was a notable revival of archery half a century or so ago, of which a pleasant souvenir is found in the works of Frank Buckton. His account of "Our Archery Club" tells

analogously how the craze hit one American village, says the Springfield Republican.

It seems to have struck this country even harder than it did England, where it started.

Interest in archery, since it ceased to have practical importance, has always had more or less of a romantic and antiquarian cast. Sir Walter Scott did much to revive it with his romances of chivalry and in particular with his exaggerated account of the exploits of Robin Hood in "Ivanhoe."



Climbed Matterhorn in Fast Time





Wildcat Drilling

Vaughn Oct. 23.—This city may now be termed the center of the most vigorous and extensive wildcatting campaign in the state of New Mexico. Approximately \$750,000 will be spent in this section before the first of next April. In their efforts to find a new oil field mid-way between the two producing fields of the state, independents have launched what is perhaps the biggest and most determined effort to be found in the Mid-Continent field. This applies of course, insofar as it obtains in a strictly unproved territory. With eight wells drilling three new locations announced this week two rigs just completed, and two temporary shut down, the Vaughn territory can account for 15 drilling wells.

In a short time. No unproved spot in New Mexico or western Texas can make even a respectable showing against the display of development here.

2. The Diligence of His Ministry (v. 20-21). (1) He made known everything which was of profit unto them. This every true minister or teacher will do.

(2) He taught both in public and in private. A minister's work is not done when his pulpit ministrations are over.

(3) He neglected no class, whether Jews or Greeks. The Christian minister must be exceedingly careful here.

3. The Theme of His Ministry (v. 21). This was repentance and faith. Men and women need to repent of their sins and believe on the Lord Jesus Christ.

4. A Successful Imitation (v. 22). 1. His Immediate Purpose (v. 22). This was to go to Jerusalem. The constraint of the Spirit moved him to go forward though he did not know the things that should befall him there.

2. The Shadows Lying Across His Path (v. 23). Though bonds and afflictions awaited him, he went forward to his work with undaunted courage.

3. His Fixed Purpose (v. 24). This was to complete his ministry, which was to testify the gospel of the grace of God, which he had received from the Lord Jesus Christ.

4. A Successful Imitation (v. 25). These among whom he had labored should see his face no more.

5. He Leaves No Debt of Obligation Behind (v. 26-27). He was pure from the blood of all men.

6. Paul Sets Forth the Ephesian Elders' Responsibility (v. 28-33). 1. Motives to Duty (v. 28). (1) They received their call and commission directly from the Holy Spirit.

(2) The flock for which they must care was purchased with the precious blood of Christ. 2. Perils Ahead (v. 29-30). (1) Grievous wolves would enter the flock and mercilessly devour them.

(2) False teachers would arise from among their number. 3. Incentives to Watch (v. 31). Paul's own example. For three years he watched night and day with tears.

4. He Comments Them to God, and His Word (v. 32). He knew that this Word was able to build them up. 5. He Was Unselfish in His Service (v. 33-34). (1) He did not covet any man's silver, gold or apparel.

(2) He labored with his own hands and taught. IV. Paul's Prayer (v. 35-38). Having spoken these words he knelt and prayed with them all.

Besides the Fort Stanton ladies, quite a few from Glencoe and Carrizozo were included on the invitation list.





THE RURAL TELEPHONE

The Telephone Itself

The greatest mistake the average rural telephone user makes in purchasing an instrument is in trying to save money on the purchase price. A cheap instrument, that is, cheap in price, will result in more work and trouble than cheap parts in any other part of the system. The first thing to be considered in purchasing an instrument is the importance of getting one of standard make.

There are quite a number of standard make instruments, each one as good as the other.

The principal reason for the purchasing of standard articles is that the manufacturer guarantees all goods against defects in material or workmanship. In addition, as long as the instrument is used worn or broken parts can be replaced, as all parts are interchangeable and kept in stock by the manufacturer.

In making an installation or a replacement, be sure that the resistance of the ringer coil or bell coils is the same as those in other telephones on the line. If this is not done, interference with the signaling of the entire line will result. For instance, if the telephones on a given line were made up with 1,000-ohm bell coils and a change was made in one instrument to the line in which the coils were 1,000-ohm, the 1,000-ohm bell would take the current from the other bells, thereby reducing the effectiveness of the other bells.

Another thing that should be given particular attention is the generator contained in the telephone. This should be heavy enough to ring a given number of telephones on the line.

The batteries used in your talking circuit should be telephone batteries, when possible, and not batteries used for gasoline engines. Your batteries will have much longer lives if you adhere to this rule.

As to the talking circuit, which consists of the transmitter and receiver, together with the induction coil and switch hook, for brevity we will only say that this is another reason why a standard telephone should be used. If you do use a standard telephone, you know that you have the best available, for years and dollars have been spent in perfecting it.
