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STATE NEWS From All Parts of NEW MEXICO

Construction work on the new steel bridge which will span the San Francisco river near Alma has been started according to reports from Silver City.

A three-day convention of electrical and telephone men, under the auspices of the New Mexico Electrical Association, was held in Albuquerque, February 15 to 17.

Approximately 5,000 acres of irrigated land on the Storrie project will be turned under in preparation for spring planting as soon as the cold abates sufficiently to enable the farmers to plow their fields.

For the year 1924, New Mexico had only sixty-three failures as reported by R. G. Dunn & Co., and they were for the most part able to pay a high percentage on the dollar. The assets were \$381,000 and the liabilities \$393,000—in round numbers. Hence, the total losses were only \$12,000, according to these figures.

Gov. A. T. Hannett has approved the court-martial sentence of one day in jail against Private William M. Childers of headquarters cavalry troop at Albuquerque, who was convicted on the charge of consistently missing drills. A warrant for Childers' arrest was issued on action of District Attorney A. A. Sedillo.

A bond issue of \$25,000, covering all kinds of city improvements in Albuquerque, was recommended to the city commission by a special citizens' committee. It calls for \$100,000 for parks, park improvements and playgrounds; \$50,000 for opening streets; \$400,000 for sanitary sewers; \$285,000 for storm sewers; \$250,000 for water mains and extensions.

Mrs. H. Prevost, mother of Maple Prevost, the film star, was killed and Al Christie, screen comedy producer, and Vera Steadman, motion picture actress, were injured in an automobile accident, twenty-three miles east of Lordsburg, N. M. The accident occurred when the car, a heavy machine owned by Miss Steadman, overturned while traveling about thirty miles an hour, the message said.

The Navajo Indian brought over \$1,500,000 into New Mexico last year was declared by Ruben Perry, superintendent of the Albuquerque U. S. Indian School, in a talk to the Kiwanis Club in Albuquerque. Through the sale of blankets last year the Navajos brought into the state \$250,000; piano shipped by them brought in \$300,000; silver articles, \$25,000; wool, \$60,000; sheep and cattle, \$500,000.

A temporary reorganization of the New Mexico State Farm Bureau, pending ratification of the proposed constitution by the county farm bureaus, was formed at State College in January by representatives of farm bureaus of Dona Ana, Hidalgo, San Miguel and Luna counties. Officers were chosen as follows: President, J. R. Poe, Las Cruces; vice president, J. A. Price, Balivay; treasurer, C. N. Moore, Dexter; executive committee, Mrs. C. E. Locke, Mesilla Park, and W. P. Thorpe, Las Cruces.

At a mass meeting held at the Gallop court house the new directors of the Intertribal Indian Ceremonial Association were elected and the dates for this year's program set for August 26, 27 and 28. Arrangements have been completed for the employing of a full-time secretary and the drive for funds will be started at once. The association is now out of debt and in good shape financially for the coming show. The directors for the present year are: Horace Moses, S. E. Stacher, Mike Kirk, F. E. Lawrence, W. H. Morris, T. H. Seymour and B. L. Staples.

In order to protect the regular and volunteer firemen of Roswell, the city council at the last meeting ordered a group policy to be written for the twelve men on the force. This insurance provides for the payment of \$2,000 to the beneficiary in case of death while the fireman is on duty and \$15 per week if disabled by injury. The cost of the group policy is about \$15 per man.

The state publicity bureau created by the Seventh Legislature to advertise New Mexico's natural resources was appointed last week by Governor Hannett. Kyle S. Crichton of Albuquerque heads the bureau as publicity commissioner and T. S. Trebell has been selected as secretary. There are nine assistant commissioners, one from each judicial district; R. M. Jackson, Astor; Miss Adel C. Holmquist, Albuquerque; N. C. Frenger, Las Cruces; M. E. Noble, East Las Vegas; C. P. Austin, Lordsburg; John Becker, Jr., Belen; Jake Lujan, Clayton; Tom Weatherford, Clovis. A \$6,000 appropriation is available for the bureau for the current fiscal year, but only the secretary gets a salary.

George H. Cook who has been in the office of public relations of the district forestry service for the past four years, has left Albuquerque for Washington, D. C., where he will become an expert in exhibits in the office of exhibits with the Department of agriculture.

The best sugar factory product for San Juan County is receiving what may be termed enthusiastic support from scores of farmers, all merchants, bankers and professionals here, in fact, every resident of the county is banding together to support it.

TURKEY PLANS ON BIG FARMS

Republic Will Make Agriculture a Science.

Constantinople.—The Turkish republic is going in for agriculture on a scale the like of which the country previously has never witnessed.

Recognizing the principle that there can be no enduring prosperity in a nation of oppressed and unwilling producers, the government has made numerous changes ameliorating conditions under which the peasants lived.

The feudal system which obtained during the rule of the sultans has been abolished. The overlords, who claimed vast stretches of land, and used the peasants as serfs, have been executed or exiled and the land divided among the people. With the departure of the sultans went the tax on the peasants which took one-tenth of their profits.

To create a body of expert managers, the bureau of education has established 18 agricultural schools, for which there were 2,000 applicants this year, and also is sending students to farm colleges in Europe and America.

The department of agriculture is encouraging scientific farming through the dissemination of information, distribution of seeds and institution of tractors and other modern machinery. It has elaborated upon a program, to extend over the next ten years, for the intensified production of tobacco and the "three whites" of Turkey—cotton, sugar and wheat.

As for President Kemal, he is so keenly interested in the development that he is running an experimental farm of his own on the outskirts of Ankara.

Patrolmen Save a Woman After Leap Into River

New York.—Her hands clasped as if in prayer, a gray-haired woman, about fifty-five years old, plunged from the bridge at the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad ferry slip at Twenty-third street into the Hudson River.

A throng in the waiting room saw the woman disappear in the icy water. An unidentified young man sprang to her rescue. As the crowd watched, he dived and brought the woman to the surface.

Patrolmen Young and Morrison lowered a ladder into the slip, but found it was three feet too short. As the watchers cheered, Morrison held Young by the ankles and swung him down until his hands grasped those of the rescuer.

Assisted by several men, Morrison and Young hauled the two ashore. The rescuer shivered a few seconds, shivered his shoulders and disappeared before police could learn his name. The woman, identified as Mary Hogan, fifty-five, unemployed and homeless, was taken to Bellevue hospital to be treated for submersion.

A SERMON

Preached by Dr. E. W. Scarber, at the Red Cross Hospital, El Paso, Dec. 16, 1928.

Rev. E. W. Scarber is the pastor at Capitan. Preaching every Sunday morning and evening.

There is a strange oversight in the whole evolution scheme. The Bible account of creation makes an orderly proposition, taking into account the whole universe. It gives us the story of all the world's old all the inhabitants of this our world.

The earth was chaotic, lacked form, was a vast pile of disorderly, unformed materials, in oppressive darkness. But God was light, life, energy. So he moved upon the face of the waters, and forthwith order and form became manifest. Light took the place of darkness, and order supplanted darkness chaos. No invisible germ, but a mighty Maker. No insect, striving for existence, but a glorious, divine, infinite Being that stretches out through limitless space the wand of his creative power, and pulsations of life thrill the immensurable universe! Here is power, intelligence, deity. God is manifesting the wisdom and glory of infinite. How belittling the blind, puny, protoplasmic germ of the evolutionist! Instead of an infinite God of power, wisdom and might, they would give us a quagmire of seething germs, a million of which could live and keep house in a child's thumb— and no Maker for them. And they ask us to accept their belittling, contemptible nonsense as science, as scholarship, as wisdom. But the great apostle labeled it more properly "science falsely so-called."

Genesis gives you the God of wisdom creating light, not a candle or an electric bulb, but light that permeates infinite spaces and sheds effulgent glory upon vast spheres until worlds great worlds as they majestically move in the infinitudes of deity.

God made these worlds. Not only this little world of ours, but the mighty king of day and the lovely queen of night. Not only the lovely pleiades, but the milky way. The great Sirius and immeasurable Hercules. It is so wondrous that the psalmist should say, "We consider thy heavens, the work of thy fingers; the moon and the stars which thou hast ordained; what is man that thou art mindful of him, or the son of man that thou visitest him? Thou hast made him a little lower than the angels, and hast crowned him with glory and honor. Thou madest him to have dominion over the works of thy hands; thou hast put all things under his feet: all sheep and oxen, yea and the beasts of the field; the fowl of the air, and the fish of the sea."



A Phenomenal Artesian Well in Chaves County

Roswell, Feb. 16.—What is believed to be the largest artesian well in the world was recently completely on the Whitney farm, about three miles east of Coulter Springs. The well was drilled with a ten-inch hole, and when the water was struck the stream spouted five feet in the air from the bottom of the cavity, the estimated flow being 6,000 gallons a minute.
