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STATE NEWS from All Parts of NEW MEXICO

Francisco Chavez was burned to death in his home at Santa Rita.

Dr. J. G. Holmes, Alamogordo, has been appointed part-time health officer of Otero county, succeeding Dr. E. D. McKinley.

Tests taken from the bottom of the Eureka oil well, near Raton, show that nearly one third of the volume of sand is now oil. The oil is reported to be of high quality.

A total of \$309,981.75 in 1925 taxes have been collected to date by County Treasurer Hollrad of Chavez county according to announcement made this last week.

At a special meeting of the Sianeros-Marines post, of the American Legion, at Taos, plans were submitted and steps taken for the erection of a new home for the ex-soldiers of Taos county.

Prospects of a bean crop in the Estancia valley this year are very encouraging, in the opinion of E. F. Coard, general freight and passenger agent of the New Mexico Central railway.

Following Dr. L. L. Minor's resignation as part-time health officer of Grant county, Dr. N. D. Frazin, Silver City, was appointed in his place. Dr. and Mrs. Minor have gone to Los Angeles.

With the spudding in of the first oil well on the Fernandez ranch south of Springer and plans under way for the drilling of several others, Springer will soon be the center of a new oil field.

Ashley Brothers, living on the outskirts of Clovis, have recently completed one of the most modern poultry houses in the eastern part of the state and will start at once raising poultry for the eastern markets.

One of the largest business deals in Carlsbad for several years was closed last week when the light, power and ice plant was sold to the Southwestern Public Service Company, the price being approximately \$35,000.

Real estate men report that at least 50 new irrigation tracts will be opened in the Pecos valley during the coming year. Five pumping-outfits were recently unloaded in Portales and several more are now in transit.

County Jailor Bailey of Alamogordo, was badly beaten about the head and chest by three prisoners as he opened the door to the cell house. Had it not been for other prisoners coming to the rescue he no doubt would have been killed.

The fifth annual Pecos valley basketball tournament will be held under the auspices of the New Mexico Military Institute of Roswell, March 5 and 6. Capt. L. B. Plummer assisted by the athletic staff will be in charge and schools from all over the eastern part of the state will take part.

A favorable report on the Alamo dam site on the Pecos river in New Mexico has been completed in Washington by the bureau of reclamation. The purpose of the dam, located near Fort Sumner, is to create a reservoir for irrigation of the Carlsbad project, 170 miles down the stream.

Reports of petroleum explorations for the United States give New Mexico the highest average of producing wells for the number drilled. New Mexico made the best showing of any state in the Union on percentage of producers from oil well completions during the past year, according to these reports. Of the 53 tests drilled in the state 55 were listed as producers, one as a gasser and two as failures.

The Industrial Employment Survey report issued from the office of the U. S. Employment Service of the U. S. Department of Labor at Denver states that industrial and employment conditions in New Mexico showed a slight improvement during January. Increased activity and employment at the metal mining camps was noted, particularly the district near Santa Fe. While common metal mines labor is adequate, experienced metal miners are in demand. Coal mining continues active; labor in connection steady employed and ample. Oil drilling and developments increasingly active, particularly the oil districts surrounding Roswell, labor in connection with oil activities, sufficient. Lumbering, especially in the Bernalillo district, continues active, woodmen steadily employed and ample. Industrial plants, except those seasonal, are running normally. Cotton oil plants continue running, overtime. Building, other than residential construction, continues quite active in many parts of the state. Building-trades men of all classes ample. Railways show employment curtailed during winter period.

Eight towns outside of Las Vegas are being served by the extension service of the Normal University, according to President Carroon. About 120 people, mostly teachers, are enrolled in extension classes at Dawson, Raton, Ft. Symmer, Taiban, Pleasant Hill, Clovis, Grady and Melrose.

There are 11 cases of smallpox in Roosevelt county in the neighborhood of Casey and Richland, the biggest outbreak in New Mexico, which is normally free from this disease, since 1922, when there was a flare-up in McKinley county.

WILD DUCKS HIDE OUT ON HUNTERS

Can't Be Found When They Are Sought in Arkansas.

Little Rock, Ark.—Southeastern Arkansas, for many years a paradise of duck hunters, this season produced poor hunting despite the fact that there are millions of the green-headed water fowl.

Whether the weather is responsible for conditions, or the ducks have gained through experience of aged birds passed on to the younger generations, sportsmen are unable to tell. Officials, however, blame the weather.

For ducks there are, literally by the million, but not where the hunters are prone to hunt. They are in the less frequented lakes and the open rivers of the rice country.

Early in the season ducks were so plentiful hunters found no trouble filling their legal bags, and rice farmers appealed to the state game and fish commission and the migratory bird authorities that the bag limit be lifted.

The hunters had hardly arrived when the water fowl disappeared. The weather had turned warm again. Then came word that duck hunting in Illinois, Wisconsin and other northern states was better than in years. The hunters put away their guns and prepared to wait for colder weather.

Cold weather came. The ducks returned. Hunters again put out for the rice fields. But when they arrived the ducks had disappeared except in small numbers.

Guy H. Amster, secretary of the Arkansas game and fish commission, made a trip to the district to look over the situation. In several of the remote lakes he found four millions of the birds.

The official attributed the movements of the birds to the fact that when the weather turned cold enough to drive the water fowl out of the more northern states, it struck southern Arkansas hard enough to freeze the shallower waters in and about the rice fields. This, he said, had driven them into the open waters of the rivers and lakes.

Give 150-Year-Old Turk Job to Save His Life

Constantinople.—The famous old Turk, Zaro Agha, who claims that his one hundred and fifty years make him the oldest man in the world, is to be honored, and incidentally, saved from starvation by the city of Constantinople.

The aged man has been unable for the last year or two to carry on his life-long trade as hamal. The hamals are the human delivery wagons of Turkey, and it is a common thing to see one of these porters, bent nearly double, plodding steadily along the street with a piano or bedstead or dining-room table on his back. As Zaro Agha has grown somewhat too old for this herculean occupation, he has found it difficult to supply himself with the bread and cheese of existence, for the pension which he receives from the Association of Hamals is anything but large.

Now the prefect of Constantinople, Eminbey, has appointed Zaro as door-keeper for the municipal council. Therefore he will now have not only bread and cheese, a uniform and a warm place to sit in, but a feeling of importance befitting the dignity of his years.

Heat Mines Prepared to Destroy Icebergs

Montreal, Can.—Prof. Howard T. Barnes of the physics department of McGill university, whose assertion that it is possible to free the North Atlantic of icebergs and keep the St. Lawrence river open for navigation the entire year is being widely discussed, will leave for Greenland in June to study the effects of "heat mines" upon icebergs, attempting to break them up at their source. He will take several tons of chemicals to Greenland for this work.

End of Home Life in Fifty Years Seen

Liverpool.—That 50 years hence home life will have disappeared and people will virtually live in restaurants and hotels, is the prediction of Prof. A. M. Low, well known as a scientist. The professor prophesies that in 1976 present-day types of ships will be replaced by giant hydroplanes which will skim along the surface of the water at tremendous speed. Passengers wishing to cross the Atlantic will use airplanes and keep in touch with their homes by wireless.

Regarding clothes, the professor is of the belief that 50 years from now cotton, silk and wool textiles will be replaced by more cheaper and more durable forms of vegetable fiber. The wardrobes of women will not be so large as now because woman being by that time the most civilized will not be swayed by every passing wave of fashion.

Professor Low also envisages an era of tiny factories built underground. There will be no more chimneys belching forth smoke, and factory hands will be more polished and better educated as all thorough work of them will be done by machinery.

LITTLE RIVER OF GREAT IMPORTANCE

Thames One of World's Best-Known Streams.

Washington.—The Thames, one of the best-known streams in the world, went on a rampage recently and gave the residents of the usually peaceful valley sights familiar to those who live along such old hands at flooding as the Mississippi, the Seine and the Yellow river of China. Chicken coops and dog kennels, garden furniture, and even bungalows, swirled along where England's holiday crowds normally play on a gentle little river.

What the Thames is like ordinarily is told in a bulletin from the Washington (D. C.) headquarters of the National Geographic society.

"The Thames seldom has very destructive floods," says the bulletin. "It has no mountains in its basin, only gentle hills, and the run-off is usually slow. It is rather a small river, as rivers go, only 181 miles long with a drainage basin of about 5,000 square miles. The Danube is ten times, the Mississippi fifteen times, and the Rhine more than four times as long. Beside the million and a quarter square miles drained by the Mississippi, or even the 75,000 square miles drained by the Rhine, the Thames basin seems almost insignificant.

Grows Quickly.

"The birthplace of the Thames is only about 20 miles short of the sea on the western side of England, northeast of Bristol and Bath. A small spring formerly gushed up at what is known as 'Thames Head' and trickled in a lazy little rill down a meadow. The outflow of this head spring is now piped away to furnish water for the Thames and Severn canal. But springs abound in this region, and about half a mile down the meadow the infant Thames is to be seen in the shape of a little rill only two feet wide. Another half-mile, and the Thames is a really respectable brook. Soon its first mill appears, one of the many that dot its banks. By the time Oxford is reached, thanks to many little affluents, the stream is 150 feet wide, well deserving the name 'river'.

"The Thames flows through a country rich in historic associations and beautiful rural scenery. The oldest bridge across the stream, 15 miles above Oxford, was built in the Thirteenth century by monks of a nearby abbey. Paradoxically, it is named 'Newbridge.' Already some four centuries old, this structure was the scene of a skirmish in 1644 between Cromwell's forces and those of the Royalists. Not far below Newbridge is the only surviving rope-ferry on the Thames.

"At Oxford, still about 60 miles above London, one comes upon a little town known throughout the world, because of the men of note who have come from there to shape the destinies of Great Britain. This has been England's great university town since the Twelfth century. Traditions are cherished in Oxford, and equally so is architecture. Oxford's old but carefully preserved buildings give it a marked flavor of mediævalism. The waters of the Thames, nearly doubled in size at Oxford by the inflow of the Cherwell, have long been the scene of intercollegiate rowing contests.

"The Thames has a series of a score and a half of locks, and though a rather small stream, except near London, carries a considerable traffic on barges. By use of the Thames and Severn canal it is possible for barges to go through to the west coast of England.

"From Oxford to London, and especially between Reading and Windsor, the Thames flows through some of the most beautiful country in England. This is to London what Long Island and Westchester are to New York. Mansions, palaces, country estates, parks, colleges and quaint little towns are strung along for mile after mile; while the river itself, here about 200 feet wide, adds, with its numerous bends and lazy flow, a beauty and dignity of its own. At Windsor, 25 miles above London, is the show palace of British royalty; and almost in sight of it downstream is the modest little meadow—Runnymede—where the limited status of the British monarchy was fixed for all time when the barons forced King John to sign Magna Charta.

"At ten or fifteen miles above London the Thames begins to be colored by the great city. Factories have crept into the little towns along the stream; the delightful rural spell which has held away all along is broken. Tidewater comes to Teddington, 18 miles above London bridge, but the stream does not take on the appearance of an estuary until the muddy banks are reached at the upper edge of London.

Bustles With Commerce.

"Old London bridge, because of its narrow arches and wide piers, was almost a dam. It retarded the flow of the tide and made the river at London in old days a dirty eye-sore. The present London bridge and the dozen or more others do not obstruct the flow badly, and the river is much cleaner. The appearance of the Thames in the city, too, has been greatly improved in recent decades by the building of extensive quays which have replaced the mud banks that were exposed when the tide was low.

"The estuary character of the Thames is apparent at London bridge where the stream is 750 feet wide. It grows rapidly wider below London, and at Sheerness, 50 miles down, generally takes as the mouth, it is six miles wide. From London to its mouth the Thames is one of the world's greatest shipping centers.

SHRINKING EARS A SIGN OF EVOLUTION

Scientist Also Notes Decrease of Little Toe Bones.

Baltimore, Md.—Tendency of the human ear to become smaller, except the lobe, which remains a kind of provision of nature "to give women something to hang ornaments on," was cited among other things by Dr. Adolph Schultz as demonstrating in his opinion the present-day working of evolution. Decreasing number of small bones in the little toe and the passing of the wisdom tooth are others.

Doctor Schultz is associate in anthropology in Johns Hopkins Medical school and is widely known for his research concerning the bodily structures of man as compared with the primates.

For the edification of man—and woman, too—who is prone to believe that he is perhaps a perfect specimen, Doctor Schultz enumerated the following as not certainly but quite likely to be wrong with him:

His eyes are not in the same horizontal plane.

His ears are not of the same size.

His mouth is bigger on one side, and the sides are not on the same level.

His right arm is longer than his left.

One foot is larger than the other.

His collar bone is not symmetrical.

"Man, however, is not the only one of the higher animals to show a difference from the primitive ancestor," Doctor Schultz said. "The ears of the orang-outang, for instance, are small, and its big toe is only a stump of what it once was. Of course its mental powers do not compare with those of man, but the orang-outang probably has made as much progress away from the original ancestor as man has."

Make Strong Linen of Human Hair Mixture

Azules, France.—The manufacture of strong linen for the filtering of extra heavy oils and other fats is the latest use found for millard's beautiful hair.

The supply of women's hair being totally inadequate to meet the demand of the manufacturers, it is now being mixed with hair obtained in China from the fast disappearing queues of modern celestiala.

The carding, spinning and weaving of human hair for the manufacture of cloth is an industry just established here, but which has made great strides. The cloth or linen obtained from very close weaving of hair is virtually untearable and is in demand by refining plants and distillers of heavy oils, which require that the cloth used as filters be subjected to a very high tension.

Several washing operations are required before the hair can be sent to the carding room. Thereafter it is handled just like wool and woven on special looms.

EUGENE FIELD'S TOMB

Children's Beloved Poet Will Sleep in Church's Shadow

WHEN Eugene Field moved, thirty years ago last summer, to his Sabine Farm, in the outskirts of Chicago, he said, "Now that I am here in my own house, I shall do better work than ever before." The beloved children's poet assembled his thousands of books; arranged his treasured collection of antique bottles, old songs, bells, walking sticks and tops; hung on the wall the six Gladstones had given him; laid out Dana's scissors—and was supremely happy. But he died, that fall and was buried in Graceland cemetery, in Chicago.

Now, the Sabine Farm home is to give way to an apartment house; also, Field's remains are to be removed from Graceland cemetery to a specially built memorial tomb in the cloisters of the Holy Comforter Episcopal Church of the Holy Comforter at Kenilworth, Ill.

"It may be that there have been poets—not necessarily better poets, or more religious ones," writes Robert L. Duffus in the New York Times, "who would feel more at home in the shadow of a cloister than would Eugene Field. Yet the two incidents together have their significance. The Sabine Farm dissolves into the thin substance of dreams; but the memory of Eugene Field has not been corroded by the years.

"It may be, however, that those who pass through the Kenilworth cloisters will remember the author of 'The Sugar-Plum Tree' and 'Wynken, Blynken and Nod,' and forget the madcap editor and columnist of the old Denver and Chicago days; the wild humorist who gave utterance to 'The Tribune Primer'; the great jester who lived for the purpose of making pose and pretense ridiculous; the relentless satirist.

"Eugene Field came of a distinguished family, but not of one given to eccentric genius. His father, as counsel for the runaway negro Dred Scott, made a protest against slavery which for a moment gave him national prominence. His mother, a woman of beauty and charm, died in 1856, when Eugene was only six years old, and he and his brother were brought up by an aunt, Mary Field French, in Amherst, Mass.

"After he went to a school at Monson, Mass., kept by a clergyman and his wife, and at eighteen he entered Williams college. The influences that surrounded him were thus sobering if not absolutely Puritanical.

"He left Williams partly because of the death of his father and partly because of the faculty's lack of enthusiasm over the prospect of having him any longer. He had not committed any unpardonable offenses, but he too plainly lacked that respect for office and authority which was deemed essential. Next year he entered Knox college, at Galesburg, Ill., an event chiefly important because during that year he began newspaper work by contributing to the Galesburg Register.

He was restless, and in 1870 moved on to the University of Missouri, at Columbia. The most significant thing that happened to him there was his



meeting with the girl of fifteen who was later to become his wife.

"His share of his father's estate was \$3,000. At the age of the year in Columbia, Mo., he shook the dust of higher education forever from his feet and set out with his friend, Edgar Conestock, brother of the young lady with whom he was in love, for a billiard tour of Europe. From time to time he called home for money. When six months had passed and the two adventurers had reached Italy the \$3,000 was all gone.

"I came home broke," he afterward said, "so I got married." Mrs. Field was then sixteen. Their life together was a happy one. She bore him eight children and understood his whimsical variety of humor. She also managed the family finances—a task of which he was constitutionally incapable. Their only clashes came when he was caught trying to smuggle home books when money was needed to pay the grocer.

"Field knew that he was not in every respect a model husband, and liked to tell about a conversation he once had in a dream with the patriarch Job.

"It is true," Job was represented as saying, "that for a long time I enjoyed quite a reputation for being very patient, but now I have to take a back seat. You see, there's a woman in Chicago named Mrs. Eugene Field who has proved herself a lot patienter than I."

"Field had always wanted to be an actor. He even bought complete sets of costumes for Hamlet, Lear and Othello, and in 1872 actually went out with a company of other reckless youths on a barnstorming tour.

"In June, 1873, he went to the St. Louis Evening Journal as a cub reporter, and before the year closed was city editor. Subsequently he was city editor of the Gazette of St. Joseph, a paragrapher for the Journal and the Times-Journal in St. Louis, managing editor of the Kansas City Times, and then, in 1881, managing editor of the Denver Tribune.

"It was in Denver that he began to acquire more than local fame—not merely as managing editor of a lively paper, but as paragrapher, dramatic critic, and, it is essential to add, practical joker.

"In 1883 he was called to Chicago, at a considerable increase of salary, to write whatever he pleased for the Chicago News.

"He took over a nondescript column called 'Current Gossip,' which blossomed out, on August 31, 1883, as the famous 'Sharps and Flats.' 'Eugene Field did not talk, as a

rule, in terms of 'Little Boy Blue' or 'The Wandering.' He saved that of his nature mostly for pen and paper. Yet it spilled out.

"I always feel like shedding tears," he said to George Millard one Christmas, "when I see all those people at home with their little gifts for babies. I can't help crying. It overwhelms me."

"He did not have to unbend to a friend. He understood them because looked at the world through their eyes.

"For him, as for them, it had a tery, 'I believe,' he said, 'in glee in witches and in fairies.' He had air of a changeling; an air of know more than he meant to tell.

"That 'mummer's face,' as a friend called it, hid more than it roves. He laughed, as newspaper men b done ever since the Acta Diurna Rome, that his job left him insouciant and strength. A gaunt, awkward, homely figure, counted on to people laugh and cry. Not even wife knew, perhaps, what he was, when the make-up was off.

"Dana announced a standing of double the Chicago salary if he would come to New York. He offered to sit in the Record office let fame find him there, if it so desired.

"A Little Book of Western Verse" containing much of his best work, appeared in 1890, and in a popular form in 1890; so did 'A Little Book of Profitable Tales.' When he was in England in 1880 he found his newspaper into whatever literary life he cared to enter. He was conscious of growing powers, of larger plan.

"But his health had never been robust, and because he hated exertion, would not take enough sleep, it was worse. For years he fought, with morose gallantry, the inroads of pneumonia. In 1896 he nearly died of phlegm fever. His heart gave way, he died in his sleep during the night of November 4, 1896. He may have felt death coming, for he had a few days before: 'This is the d time of year.'

"He had grown gentler and more like the children's Eugene Field. 'The uncouth, dancing spirit of woods was less with him toward last. His final mood was that in a he wrote, by way of preface, to forth, little lyrics, and sang to hearts of men. 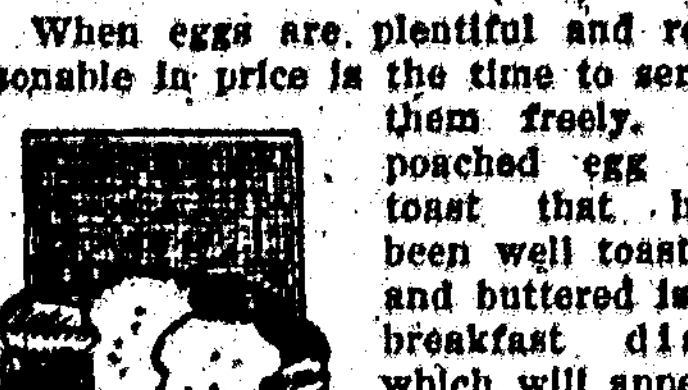
THE KITCHEN CABINET

GOOD THINGS WE LIKE



When eggs are plentiful and reasonable in price is the time to serve them freely. A poached egg on toast that has been well toasted and buttered is a breakfast dish which will appeal to almost any appetite. For a supper or luncheon dish an omelet or scrambled eggs will be liked.

Curried Eggs—Cut three hard-cooked eggs into eighths lengthwise. Melt two and one-half tablespoons of butter, add two tablespoons of flour, stir until well blended, then pour on gradually, while stirring constantly, one cupful of milk. Bring to the boiling point and add one-third of a teaspoonful of salt, a dash of pepper and one-half teaspoonful of curry powder; then add the eggs. Turn into a shallow buttered dish, sprinkle with one-fourth of a cupful of grated cheese, cover with three-fourths of a cupful of buttered crumbs and bake until brown.

Vassar Eggs—Finely chop two ounces of smoked dried beef. Add one cupful of tomatoes, one-fourth cupful of grated cheese, a few drops of onion juice, a few grains each of cayenne and cinnamon. Melt two tablespoons of butter, add the mixture and when well heated, add three beaten eggs. Cook until the eggs are creamy, stirring constantly. Serve on squares of buttered graham toast.

Hot Egg Sandwiches—Mix a tablespoonful of shredded onion and add to a tablespoonful of butter in a frying pan; when hot and partly cooked add an egg, fry until cooked and place on a piece of bread which has been warmed—not toasted; cover with another warmed slice well buttered and serve. An egg sandwich and a glass of hot milk or cocoa will make a good meal.

Hard-cooked eggs, chopped while warm, mixed with butter and a little mustard to season with salt to taste, make a most satisfying sandwich for any occasion.

Use Corn—Now is the time for all good cooks to come to the aid of their country, by using plenty of corn—corn meal dishes, such as corn-facial mush, corn breads, corn and sweet puddings, spoon bread and many other good things which will be easy to find.

Everyday Good Things.

Those who are fond of sweet potatoes will like this recipe:

Sugared Sweet Potatoes—Select medium-sized sweet potatoes, pare and slice. Place them in a buttered dish—add one and one-half cups of water and one-half cupful of sugar. Sprinkle with salt and four tablespoons of maple sugar; dot with bits of butter, using four tablespoons. Bake 30 minutes and then set into a pan of hot water to wait for serving time.

Eggs in Spinach, Nests.—Prepare six rounds of toast, butter well and cover each round with cooked and seasoned spinach, making a hollow in the center. Drop an egg into the hollow of each nest and place the dish in the oven until the eggs are cooked. Sprinkle with paprika, dot with butter and sprinkle with chopped ham.

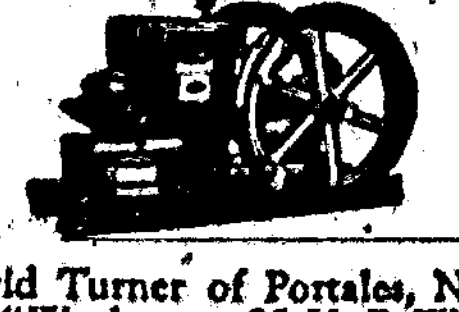
Cheese Sandwich Filling—Prepare a white sauce, using two tablespoons of butter and four and one-half cupful of milk. Put one-half of a can of pimientos, two hard-cooked eggs, and one-half pound of cheese through the meat grinder; add one raw egg, one tablespoonful each of sugar and one tablespoonful of salt, with one-half cupful of vinegar. Cook over water until smooth and thick; after combining mixtures. Cool and use as sandwich filling for white bread.

Breadth Sandwiches—Cut white bread into one-fourth inch slices. Shape with a heart cutter, spread with pimento butter, put together in pairs, press edges lightly and decorate with small hearts cut from pimientos, using the small vegetable cutter for this purpose.

Prune Mollish—Loil together one cupful of stoned and finely cut prunes with one and one-half cupfuls of water in which they have been soaking; add three tablespoons of sugar, the juice of half an orange, one-half teaspoonful of ground cinnamon and two tablespoons of currant jelly. Cook all together, adding the orange juice and jelly at the last. This makes a fine relish to serve with mutton or lamb, or with sliced cold roast. Raisins may be used with the prunes if desired, adding a different flavor. Prunes are one of our true native fruits. They add to many dishes. A little prune pulp added to boiled frosting makes a delicious cake filling. Cooked with a bit of flour, lemon juice and a few raisins, the filling is especially good for filled cookies.

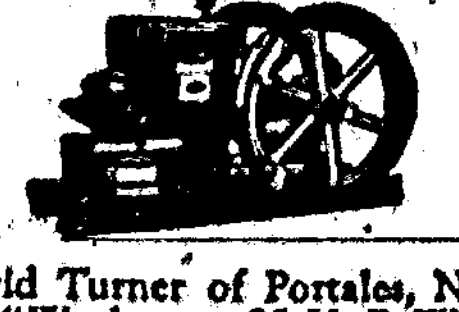

PROPER KIND OF RATION FOR SOW

The amount and kind of feed fed the sow during pregnancy determines very largely the size and vigor of the pigs at birth. If a sow is fed on a ration of corn alone, she will become too fat, thereby interfering with the development of the unborn litter. Corn is also deficient in protein and mineral matter which the pigs need for their development, states C. L. Morgan, associate professor of animal husbandry at the Clemson college.

Even when the ration of the brood sow is of the proper kind, judgment must be exercised in feeding the proper amount; as the sow may become excessively fat through overfeeding, or too thin for the subsequent suckling period through underfeeding. The sow needs a ration which furnishes a liberal supply of proteins and minerals of the proper kinds, in such amounts as will develop the pigs and put her in condition for the suckling period.

For best results a sow in average flesh should be fed so as to gain about 75 pounds from breeding to farrowing time. This is about two-thirds of a pound daily.

One of the best rations is a mixture of corn, 12 parts, and tankage or fish meal, 1 part. In addition, the sow should have access to rye or rape pasture. About 1½ pounds of the grain mixture should be fed daily for every 100 pounds the sow weighs. This amount will make her gain about the desired weight. In addition to the grain and pasture, the sow should have access to a mineral mixture which supplies lime, phosphorus, and salt.

If pasture is not available, bright, green, leafy alfalfa hay or soy-bean hay may be fed. It is surprising to those who have never fed these hays to see how much the sows relish them. A sow will consume about one pound of these hays per day. If the hays are exceptionally good, the amounts of tankage or fish meal may be reduced.

Raising of Baby Beeves

Is Usually Profitable

In feeding baby beeves, it is not necessary to have expensive equipment. A cattle shed, preferably a frame shed, enclosed on three sides and partly enclosed on the fourth side, is very satisfactory as a shelter. A supply of good water is essential.

The raising of baby beeves is usually a profitable business for the farmer who is in a position to handle it right. Usually, in the Northwest, it is necessary for the farmer to raise his own calves for baby beeves, as there are very few calves of the quality that will feed out well and mature early enough for baby beeves to be found on the live stock markets. This means that he must have either a grade or pure-bred herd of distinct beef breeding so that he can raise calves of the easy fleshing, early maturing kind. He should be an experienced feeder and have a farm where he can raise plenty of grain, good hay and pasture. It seems advisable to fatten the calves well before marketing them, as the well-finished kind bring considerably more than those which are only partly finished.

Baby beeves make more rapid and cheaper gains than older cattle. Since they are marketed at an earlier age, there is less death risk and a quicker turn-over of the investment. These advantages, linked with the favorable market which usually prevails for the well-finished yearling, make baby beef feeding a profitable business.

Time to Wean Colts

Colts should usually be weaned by the time they are six months old at latest. A severe setback at this time often occurs and is hard to overcome. If the colt has been taught to eat grain and has been accustomed to being kept away from the mare while she has been at work, there will usually be little difficulty. Colts that have been eating grain for two or three months will soon learn to get along without the mother's milk.

Live Stock Notes

Missouri reports good results from the following mineral mixture for hogs: Wood ashes, 4 pounds; 16 per cent acid phosphate, 4 pounds; common salt, 10 pounds.

Pigs should have a dry, comfortable place to sleep through the winter and should be compelled in some way to take a fair amount of exercise.

Crushed rock salt is the best chemical to use in killing the common barber which spreads the black stem rust of cereals.

In most cases on the busy farm there is no more satisfactory way than to turn the ram with the ewes and allow him to stay with them during the season.

If colts are turned out in a rocky lot for several hours every day, they will take care of the matter for themselves.

With plenty of good oats, colts can be grown quite well without corn or barley, but they will do better with a mixture of grains.

Yearling cattle are more likely to eat the full two pounds of grain per 100 pounds live weight per day and a little less alfalfa and a little less hay.

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
