CZOLGOSZ PAYS THE PENALTY

The Assassin of President McKinley Dies as He Had Lived Hard of Heart.

Last Tuesday Morning at An Early Hour Czolgosz was Conducted to the Electric Chair and Four Minutes Later the President Murderer is a Lifeless Corpse.

AUBURN PRISON, N. Y., Oct. 29.—Leo F. Czolgosz, who on September 6 last shot and mortally wounded President McKinley, was electrocuted at 7:12:30 this morning. To the last he was unrepentant, and said he was not sorry he killed the president. Seventeen hundred volts was applied three times, but it was said that once would have been sufficient. The condemned man did not weaken.

The prisoner passed a quiet night, sleeping soundly until 4:45 o'clock this morning. He turned over on his cot once or twice and got up. Shortly after 5 o'clock he again laid down, but did not close his eyes. He appeared to be thinking deeply, but replied only in monosyllables when the guard wished him good morning and asked him how he slept.

Shortly after 6 o'clock the clothing which he was to wear at the execution was sent to his cell. It consisted of a new dark pair of trousers, a grey flannel shirt and a pair of new shoes. The left leg of the trousers was slit in order to allow the electrodes to be fast to the leg when the prisoner took the electric chair.

Czolgosz put on the clothes without a word. After he had finished dressing a substantial breakfast was served him and he ate heartily, apparently relishing the food.

After breakfast the death warrant was read to the condemned man. He barely raised his eyes, and made no reply. Thirty minutes before the time to march to the death chamber began.

Czolgosz spoke to the superintendent and warden and said: "I want to make a statement before you kill me."

"What do you wish to say, Czolgosz?" asked the warden.

"I want to make it when there are a lot of people present. I want then to hear me," said the murderer.

"Well, you cannot," said the superintendent.

"Then I won't talk at all," said the prisoner, with a slight trace of anger in his voice.

However the prisoner changed his mind when he entered the execution room. Before the apparatus was fastened to his body he said he was not sorry that he had killed President McKinley, that he considered the president a foe to good working people.

Just as the headgear was attached he said that he was very sorry that he had not seen his father. The current was applied at 7:13 and the heart ceased to beat thirty seconds later. When the current was applied the body stiffened out and the straps that bound it were stretched to their utmost.

When the current was turned off the form of the murderer collapsed.

The third time the current was applied there was no response in the stiffening of the body, show-

ing life extinct.

The march from the cell to the death chamber and the execution took less than fifteen minutes. The execution was one of the most successful ever held in the state. Immediately after the execution the body was removed to another room and an autopsy held.

The physicians who held the autopsy on Czolgosz stated that the assassin's brain was normal if not above the normal.

The body of Czolgosz was buried in the prison cemetery immediately after the autopsy. The remains were enclosed in a cheap pine coffin. After the coffin was lowered into the prison grave yard a large quantity of carbolic acid was poured over the remains. It is believed that nothing will be left of Czolgosz within twenty-four hours.

BRIDGE COMPLETED.

Trains are Now Running Over the Big Bridge Over the Canadian River.

The big steel bridge over the Canadian river on the new line of the Rock Island, the construction of which has delayed the extension for some time, is at last completed and trains are running over it. Now that this obstruction to the pushing of the line farther this way has been removed the work of laying the track is going on in a hurry. The track gang is laying 80-pound steel rails, on this side of the river now at the rate of three miles a day. A patent track laying machine is being used.

The construction of this bridge is considered on excellent piece of engineering. It is over seven hundred feet long and is ninety feet high. The surface of the bed of the Canadian river is quicksand to a depth of six feet. Underneath it is a seven foot layer of gravel and stone, underlaid by a hardpan bed. The excavations for the masonry to support the steel arch supports for the bridge are down through the quicksand and almost through the gravel to the hardpan.

The bridge is a flat one, there being no overhead steel work. Five steel arches, ninety feet tall, rise out of the river bed to support the girders. On one side where the bank is shelving, two shorter towers are built. Between each of the towers are eight 80-foot girders and over each tower a thirty-five foot girder.

Travel Continues Heavy.

Travel over the E. P. & N. E. continues heavy in spite of the fact that there is more to Cloudcroft. Quite a big cargo of human freight went out this morning. Among the passengers were about thirty coal miners and their families going to Capitan to work in the mines there. They are from Coalgate, I. T.—El Paso Herald.

BIG MINING CAMP BEING OPENED.

The Turkey Creek and Bonito District the Scene of Great Activity.

The Iowa and New Mexico Mining Company Doing A Great Deal of Work—Other Concerns are also Pushing Operations—Great Developments Looked For.

W. A. McIver, the Turkey Creek mining man was in Capitan last Monday. Mr. McIver is the present manager for the Iowa Mining & Milling company which is doing considerable work in the vicinity of Turkey Creek. This company controls practically all of the promising mining claims along this tributary of the Bonito and are preparing to open up one of the biggest mining camps in New Mexico. Mr. McIver states that the efforts of the company thus far has been confined to acquiring possession of mining properties and doing assessments work. The company has spent a great deal of money in building roads, running tunnels and getting their properties in shape for active development work. Mr. McIver has had a representative of one of the largest eastern machinery houses out at the company's properties for several days for the purpose of making estimates on the machinery necessary for operation of the mines which will be placed in position next spring.

In speaking of the mining outlook for the Bonito and Turkey Creek districts Mr. McIver took occasion to say that that he considered the prospects very bright indeed. "There is more mining going on in that part of the country than ever before in the history of the mining industry in Lincoln county," said Mr. McIver. "The entire Bonito country is the scene of great activity and some very promising mines are being opened. Aside from the work being done by my company there are other concerns which are doing a great deal of work and all are showing up some good mineral. Messrs. Byrd & Collard who are operating the "Old Crow" mine are perhaps farther along with their work than any one else and all indications point to their property being very rich. While there are many other good claims along the Bonito and Turkey creek in my opinion the Iowa Mining & Milling company by far the most promising claims in that part of the country."

Mr. McIver while not given to much talking seemed to be very enthusiastic over the future of the mining industry in that vicinity. The large amount of work which has been done in that part of the country has left no doubt in his mind but that the near future will see that section take a lead which will place it far ahead of any section of the territory as a mining center. Mr. McIver is not alone in this opinion for that is the view taken by every one who has visited that vicinity within the last few months for indeed one can witness the large amount of work that is being done there without being impressed most favorably.

BOURTING THOMAS.

The White Oaks Eagle Sweers at Lincoln County Progress.

The White Oaks Eagle of last week reprints a piece from the Santa Fe New Mexican that a company with a capital \$10,000,000.00 has been organized for the purpose of reopening the old Parsons mine on the upper Bonito and then proceeds to ridicule it in the following manner:

"This is just about as close as the New Mexican ever hit to the truth about mining operations in Lincoln county. Ten million dollars, wouldn't that jar you! Can't somebody suggest a treatment for the New Mexican's Lincoln county mining news? If they widen the pay streak a little more and increase that paper's capacity for lying, it will be necessary to cyanide the editor, in order to protect the mining interests of Lincoln county. Ten million dollars in the hands of an intelligent director and paid to Lincoln county miners would move the White mountains into the Carrizozo flat before spring. Say, give it to us in broken doses, won't you?"

Now if the editor of the Eagle had taken the trouble to inquire into the matter he would have found that the New Mexican's statement was true in every respect and that it is his incapacity for printing Lincoln county mining news that needs some kind of treatment. Had such an article appeared in any of the territorial papers relative to White Oaks the Eagle would have pursued an altogether different course. It would have been given the most prominent place in the paper, and to make assurance doubly sure, a scare head that would discount a circus poster would have been placed over it. But as it was some other portion of the county that came in for a complimentary notice the Eagle would characterize it as a newspaper story unworthy of credence.

There will be more miners at the carnival than perhaps any other class of people and this new feature will add largely to the success of the affair as it will be the means of increasing the interest among miners all over the country.

The Pecos Valley Stockman of Roswell seems to have a great deal of trouble in stemming the tide of existence and last week for the third time within the last few months changed owners. The paper while covering a very useful field seems to have had a great deal of trouble in restoring the confidence which it lost when its founders betrayed the trust of its patrons by getting hold of all the cash they could and skipped out leaving the paper to work out its own destiny. The latest purchaser of the paper a practical printer and a old newspaper man, Muncey Bull, in assuming charge promises to push the journal to the front and restore its lost prestige at all costs and the first issue, under the new management, the paper comes out greatly improved.

The McKinley National Memorial Arch association has been incorporated under the laws of the District of Columbia, for the purpose of raising funds for erecting a suitable monument to the late president's memory at the national capital. It is proposed that this monument shall be as arch at the Washington approach of the memorial bridge across the Potomac, connecting Washington with Arlington which President McKinley earnestly desired should be built as a monument of American patriotism. All contributors will be made members of the association. It is but a fitting tribute to the

of his most earnest labors and greatest achievements, to remind coming generations of how dearly he was loved by the nation over which he once exercised the highest authority. One so great and so devoted to his countrymen needs no monument to enshrine his memory in the hearts of those who knew him in his life, but that those who live after him may know more of his beautiful life is such a memorial needed and out of respect to him and deference to the seventy million people who so deeply deplored his untimely death such becomes a duty which the present generation owes not only his memory but to the nation.

When the light of last Tuesday's sun lit the eastern sky Leon F. Czolgosz, the assassin of President McKinley saw the light of the last day he will ever see in this world. As the tint of gold in the east announced the birth of a new day, in his cell with guards on every side of him, Czolgosz knew that he would be exploring the great beyond before the day was much older, and though coward that he is, he maintained his stolid indifference, which he has exhibited ever since his incarceration, to the very last. The shock which ended his miserable life sent a thrill through the nation—not a thrill of horror that such scenes usually inspire, but a thrill of satisfaction at seeing the world rid of such an inhuman wretch. The world is pretty large but notwithstanding this there is not room enough for such as he, displaced and abhorred as he is by the very universe. That the world must give him room for his bones seems an outraged civilization and dishonored the human family.

The deeper the matter is probed the more apparent it becomes that Admiral Schley has been grossly misrepresented by a certain clique in the navy department, who thought by besmirching his character and calling him coward they could make the American people believe that he deserved no honor for his participation in the memorable battle of Santiago. But they have been sadly mistaken and their criticisms have only had the effect of endearing him to the nation and of winning contempt for themselves. In all of the weeks which the court of inquiry has been in session not one iota of testimony has been introduced to show that the gallant admiral did not do his duty and do it well. On the other hand it has been brought out that much valuable information was withheld from Schley which if had been communicated to him would have aided him materially in locating the Spanish fleet. The whole matter has resolved itself into an attempt to belittle Schley and give credit to others which were in no manner deserving of it. But their attempts in this direction were balked when the department named Admiral Dewey as the senior member of the court. Dewey having himself been the participant in many great battles knows what the difficulties of a commanding officer are under trying circumstances and can appreciate Admiral Schley's position. Hampered by department orders and surrounded by subordinates who ignored him if he made mistake it is only what any other living man would have done under similar circumstances.
