RICH GOLD STRIKE OF THE BONITO.

Richest Find Ever Made in Lincoln County Discovered in Bonito District Last Week.

As Result Excitement is Running High—The Yellow Metal Specimens Located as Mineral Claims—Some Have Been Located For.

The Bonito country is at present the scene of a great gold excitement that promises to rival the great Cripple Creek excitement when the yellow metal was first discovered in that district. In fact many old miners who was in that camp when the excitement was at its height have no hesitancy in saying that no such strike as the one made on the South fork of the Bonito last Sunday was ever uncovered in that district.

Be that as it may the strike is a big one without doubt the richest ever made in the county. In the past many rich specimens have been taken from Lincoln county mines but nothing has even been seen that can approach this new find either in richness or quantity of the ore. The fortunate parties are Messrs Geo. Dillard and Chas. Brown of Nogal.

Those who have been upon the ground say the richness of the strike can not easily be exaggerated as it is so far beyond anything ever seen in this part of the country that it is apt to be underestimated rather than over-rated. Specimens of rock from this new location have been exhibited that are a perfect network of golden wires some of which are as large as common sewing thread. It is also said that there is an immense body of the ore which if true makes the find indeed a bonanza.

Immediately after placing a notice upon their find warning others away Messrs. Dillard and Brown went to Nogal and spread the news of the strike. By night of the following day every foot of ground for miles around was taken up and the original discovery had changed hands twice, selling the second time for the princely sum of \$10,000. This price, according to good authority, was paid in cash right on the ground by A. R. Byrd, one of the largest mine-owners in that district. Mr. Byrd owns many good mines in this part of the county, but considers his latest acquisition worth more than all the rest put together and considers the price paid for it extremely low.

Since the news of this strike has become noised about people from all parts of the county are flocking to the scene of the discovery, hoping to be able to get hold of something which they can turn over at a profit. No assay has as yet been made of the ore, but as remarked by an experienced mining man "so assay is necessary as the gold itself can be seen throughout the rock in sufficient quantities to prove to the most skeptical that it carries high value in that metal."

This new strike needs a great deal to Lincoln county as it shows that this county contains richer mineral deposits than any other portion of New Mexico and is bound to create a new interest in mining in this part of the territory.

Another rich strike is reported, this time in the Nogal district, near Church Mountain. The

strike was made some time ago by Mr. Duke, who is in that section in the interest of eastern parties, but failed to attract any attention until within the last few days. Although several tests were made by assayers it was almost impossible to even guess at the true value of the ore as each assay differed so widely. In spite of this difference each assay gave sufficient values in each instance to justify the belief that a good thing had been struck and considerable work was done on the find. Last week the owners decided to have a mill test made and accordingly sacked up 500 pounds of the ore and sent it to El Paso for treatment. When the returns of this test came in it showed values of \$1,200 to the ton, according to reliable information. This new find is located one mile from the Helen Res and two miles from the American, the two mines that have made Nogal famous, and is thought to be on the same lead as those two erst-while large producers.

"JOHN P. ROBINSON, HE."
 Something About a Character Whom Lowell Battered.
 John P. Robinson, the subject of one of James Russell Lowell's "Hosea Biglow's" satires, was a brilliant lawyer of the town of Lowell, a scholarly gentleman and a wit. It is said of him that he had read Homer's "Iliad" so much that he could recite nearly the whole of it from memory. Mr. Robinson was a favorite stump speaker about the period of 1840. He was a Whig and had the ambition to represent his district in congress.

In 1842 he received the Whig nomination for this position. It was a bad year for Whig candidates, as the Liberty party had then begun to present nominees against it. A majority was at that time required to elect, and there was no choice at the regular election. The Whig party, always timid, feared Mr. Robinson could not be elected on further trial and induced him to withdraw from the contest that it might present a candidate more acceptable to the anti-slavery men. This was a severe disappointment to Mr. Robinson. He became disgusted with the Whigs and bitter toward the anti-slavery advocates.

A few years later, after General Caleb Cushing had been in the Mexican war, he was nominated by the Democrats as their candidate for governor of Massachusetts, upon which Mr. Robinson wrote a letter declaring he should leave the Whig party and support General Cushing. This induced Lowell's poem, "Governor Briggs was then the Whig candidate for governor, and Lowell had two refrains to his verses. The first read:

To John P. Robinson, he says he shall vote for Governor B.
 And the second:
 To John P. Robinson, he says he shall vote for General C.
 —Boston Herald.

Fate of the Helms Mercedes.
 Preparations are being made at the Norfolk navy yard for sending the former Spanish cruiser Helms Mercedes to Portsmouth, N. H., where it was determined some time since to station her. The department's original plan for converting the raised wreck into a receiving ship having been abandoned, the hull will be tied up at the Portsmouth yard and not even kept in ordinary condition, such expense being useless, says the Washington Post. It will be necessary to tow the Mercedes up the coast, as to place her engines in condition is a practical impossibility.
