FREE GOLD IN FACE OF THE TUNNEL.

Free Gold Claim in New Klondyke Continues to Look Good.

Tunnel Cuts Vein at a Depth of About Twenty Feet, Where Gold is Visible Across Entire Face of Working--A Rich Mine.

A. R. Byrd, who is working the Free Gold claim in the New Klondyke on the Bonito is showing that property up rapidly. This week at a depth of about twenty feet the tunnel which was being driven cut the vein, which at this depth shows even more free gold than the surface rock, from which the samples were taken that returned such high values. The free gold is visible clear across the face of the tunnel. Several thousand pounds of the ore is now being taken out for a mill test which will be made in a short time.

That this one of the richest discoveries ever made in the southwest is absolutely certain as the ore has been given a fair test as could be had outside of a mill run. Up to date Mr. Byrd has had something like a hundred assays made from samples picked along the surface croppings of the vein for a distance of 600 yards, which give an average of considerably over \$100 to the ton. This is entirely outside of the rich pockets which occur every few feet. The lowest assay out of the one hundred was \$50, while the highest is close to \$5,000.

Should the lowest assay prove to be the correct one, even then the property is worth a fortune.

New Company Incorporated.

The American Gold Mining Company filed articles of incorporation with the territorial secretary this week. This new company is to work in Lincoln county and has a capital stock of \$500,000.00 which is divided into 500,000 shares par value \$1.00 per share. The incorporators are Andrew T. Anderson, of Husher, Ill., George J. Monroe and Robert C. Sturgeon of Chicago, Ill., J. M. Rice and Minor D. Gaylord of this county. The offices of this company will be at Nogal. The purpose of corporation are to lease, buy or otherwise acquire mining property, mining claims, mill sites, tunnel sites, water rights and to carry on a general mining business.

Removed Sale in New Klondyke.

A report has been current here for the past few days to the effect that Messrs. Byrd & Collard have disposed of a large interest in their holdings in the New Klondyke on the Bonito. Who the purchasers were has not been learned but it is supposed to be J. A. Eddy and others who spent a few days in that part of the county a couple of weeks ago. The Progress is not willing to vouch for the truth of this report, but considers it very likely that some such a deal has been made as it is certain that negotiations have been in progress for some time.

TO BRING THE BONITO NEARER.

It is Proposed to Connect the Two Places by a Telephone Line.

It is Estimated That Cost of Entire Line Will Not Exceed \$800--Will Undoubtedly Be Built as Half This Amount Has Already Been Pledged

A movement is well under way for the erection of a telephone line from Capitan to the Bonito country. Mr. J. H. Collard who is interested with Mr. A. R. Byrd in mining in that district is the originator of the movement. It is estimated that the total cost of such a line will not exceed \$800 and as about half this amount is already pledged the line will undoubtedly be built.

In view of the important part the Bonito district promises to play in the future of Lincoln county such a line is almost indispensable. It would not only be a great convenience to the people of that part of the county but it would prove a great factor in facilitating mining operations. The merchants and people generally of Capitan have signified their willingness to help to project along in every possible way. Mr. S. T. Gray is helping Mr. Collard in the matter of securing subscription and otherwise.

NEW KLONDYKE.

Representative of Boston Capital will Spend Week in District.

W. A. Connor, a mining expert representing Boston capitalists, spent Wednesday in Capitan, having come in the night before en route to the Bonito country. He left the following morning for that part of the county, where he will spend about a week looking over the new gold fields. Mr. Connor stated that if he found things as good as he expected his company was ready to put all kinds of money into the district. Mr. Connor is familiar with that part of the county, having been over it several times during the past ten years.

Contract Let for 100 Foot Level

Messrs. Byrd & Collard let a contract this week for a hundred foot level on the Crow mine. This is one of the most promising properties in the Bonito district.

BANDITS VISIT BLOCK RANCH

Eight Armed Men Stop Long Enough in Their Flight to Exchange Horses

Sheriff at Lincoln Notified and Sets out With Posse to Capture the Bandits. Return After Thirty-six Hours Empty handed.

According to reports which have reached here, Monday about noon eight armed men swooped down upon the Block ranch, about fifteen miles northwest of here, and secured fresh mounts, leaving gaunt and faded horses instead. The boldness of the men rendered resistance out of the question. The leader of the gang before taking his departure informed their unwilling benefactors that they were not horse thieves, but had robbed Good & Co., pay car and the Bank at Santa Rosa and were making their escape.

As soon as the men were gone a messenger was dispatched to Lincoln to notify the sheriff, who at once secured a posse of men and hastened to the Block ranch. On arriving there they found that the men had left there about 12 hours before and had taken a southerly course going in the direction of the Capitan mountains. These mountains have always been a favorite hiding place for such characters as their extreme roughness render them almost inaccessible. Sheriff Gonzales and party trailed the desperadoes well into the mountains when they lost all trace of them as the entire band had undoubtedly separated each man taking a different direction. After they had given up the chase they met Sheriff Higgins of Chaves county and six deputies who were searching for the same men, who on being in-

formed of the situation too turned back. It is supposed that one of the band doubled back on the pursuer, got in behind them and made their escape towards the well and that another pair are in the Gallena mountains hiding. What direction the other four took could not be learned.

It is supposed that these men are the same outfit that robbed a store at Puerto de Luna, killed two men and a little boy who were in the building at the time and who later robbed the pay car and bank at Santa Rosa. The path is strewn with blood all the way from Oklahoma territory where they were implicated in robbery and double murder a few weeks ago.

A rumor got afloat in Lincoln after the return of Sheriff Gonzales and his party to the effect that these men were in the county for the purpose of liberating a man by the name of Wood who is confined in the county jail charged with the Copeland ranch robbery and double tragedy. The report was given a good deal of color by the fact that a part of the band at least are from Oklahoma territory which was the former home of Wood. When this report first got out it caused no little uneasiness in Lincoln but as time passed and nothing of the kind materialized the excitement soon passed away. However such a report got afloat is a mystery.



There is much food for thought in the suggestion of Mr. A. C. Austin which will be found in another column that the fruit growers of Lincoln county should get together and have a smoke. While that industry is as yet in its infancy and it will be some time before the orchardists of the county will find it necessary to hunt an outside market yet it is well enough to join hands in an endeavor to fortify themselves against any loss from that source. The number of young orchards that have been planted during the past year shows plainly that it will not be but a few years at the longest until the production will greatly exceed the home demand. When this time comes other markets will have to be sought but the example afforded by the Roswell orchardist as given by Mr. Austin should be carefully avoided. There is no reason why the grower should sacrifice his profits simply in order to get his stuff upon the market nor is there any reason why the middle men should be allowed to put six-sevenths of the consuming value in their pockets as profit for buying the crop. That such is the case shows there is something wrong.

The large number of requests that have been made to this office within the last few weeks for copies of The Progress containing the articles in regard to the Bonito gold strike shows the high appreciation which the people of the county hold the effort of this paper to treat all parts of the country fairly. While a large number of extra copies of each edition containing anything in regard to the new gold fields were printed they have been completely exhausted by those who wished to send copies away. The Progress considers this a grateful recognition of the manner in which it has treated the matter. No matter in which part of the county, whenever anything happens which the public good demands it should be noticed. The Progress will be found ready to give it all the publicity it demands. It stands for the upbuilding of every part of the county.

and Have a Smoke--Birds.

EDITOR PROGRESS:

Herewith please find enclosed the portion of the proceedings of the last meeting of the Ohio Horticultural society that relates to our feathered friends. The newspaper is a great educator and if people once realized the great assistance birds are to the human family they will not wantonly destroy them.

Our Roswell orchardists sold their apples last fall on the tree for one cent a pound to a Chicago house. These apples are now being supplied by the grocers there to families at 75 cents per peck, which is equivalent to about seven cents a pound. So you see the middle people secure about six-sevenths of the consuming value. Extra selected table apples sell readily at \$1.00 per peck there now. It costs us about fifty per cent more to freight our fruit to California than it does to ship fruit from there to here. The fruit growers of Lincoln county should get together and have a smoke.

The article in reference to birds referred to above by Mr. Austin is as follows:

A short but interesting talk was given on birds. There are about 230 species of birds that nest with us during the summer season. They are man's best friend and benefactor. Without birds man would be driven from the earth. Among those that are most beneficial is the crow family. He is a sly, mischievous dog, but very intelligent and a great scavenger and worm destroyer. He does much meanness, but more to compensate for it than any other fellow. The blackbird family is a great insect destroyer. The Blue Jay is a Spaniard among birds; he has no redeeming qualities except his color. He is a great destroyer of the nests of other birds. The King bird, Bee bird, while he may take a few bees, is very helpful. The swallow family, to which the whippoorwill belongs, is beneficial. The robin is often charged by the fruit-growers as being a thief and doing much damage, but it also said that a young robin will eat thirteen feet of angling worms in a day and as all meat does not make a good diet, do not begrudge him a cherry to mix in. The Baltimore oriole, while being a sweet singer, is also bold and will defend his nest and family with his dying breath. The best that can be said of the English sparrow is that he is like everything English wants the earth.

The dove does no harm, emblem of peace and purity, and yet our late legislature took it from the protected list and this fall hundreds of these beautiful birds have been killed. The man who would kill a dove you could hear his soul rattle in a tobacco seed.

The quail works for us, is our best friend, an ornament to our homes and fields, and they must be protected. You might as well talk of the angels and satan compromising on sin as compromising with the gun clubs; there is no neutral ground. The bird-dog must be outlawed. The young bird-dog that is permitted to roam the fields during the summer destroys more birds in the nest than the hunter kills during the hunting season.

Prohibit the sale of Elobert rifles and toy guns to boys; with these weapons a great many birds are mangled, crippled and killed. "I am not much of a mathematician" said the cigarette, "but I can add to a man's nervous troubles, I can subtract from his physical energy, I can multiply his aches and pains, I can divide his mental power, I can take interest from his work and discount his chances of success."

and Industries of Lincoln County.

Providence has done more and man has done less for Lincoln county than for any section of the southwest. We can say it without fear of successful contradiction, that Lincoln county is richer in natural resources than any other section in the territory.

Lincoln county includes the largest and richest mineral belt in the territory, which has not yet been prospected, let alone being developed. The deepest mine in the county is the Old Abe at White Oaks and not to it outside of White Oaks is the American mine at Nogal. The American is only 170 feet in depth and has yielded over a half million dollars in gold. The Old Abe has produced nearly a million dollars in gold returns. There are hundreds of prospects in the county that are more promising on the surface than either of the above mentioned properties, that are lying idle for a lack of capital to develop them and place them among the list of rich producing properties.

The mines and prospects of Lincoln county include gold, silver, lead, copper, cobalt, nickel, wolframite, etc., and vast deposits of both bituminous and anthracite coal, adjacent to these vast beds of coal is the largest and best deposit of iron ores to be found in the United States to date at no distant day.

There are other valuable and rare minerals and precious stones not mentioned above to be found in Lincoln county, but up to date no prospectors have bothered to prospect for these.

The county will soon take the lead as one of the heavy producers of a first class quality of lumber. The timber is here in abundance. Just as soon as the demand is made upon us for building material large sawmills will be erected and lumber manufactured and shipped from Capitan. At present small sawmills in the White and Capitan mountains supply the local demand.

The country is covered with a most luxuriant growth of grass that serves to fatten thousands of heads of cattle yearly. No country in the southwest equals this as a stock growing section.

Water "the God of all harvest" which is a most important factor, is here in abundance, and is distributed throughout the country in the form of springs and running streams. The streams which flow down from the White mountains are the purest water found in New Mexico. It is a pure and healthful draught of life saving liquid, fresh from the brow of nature.

The climate is the most perfect to be found anywhere or at least that is what competent government experts say. The United States Government recognizing this fact has located the National Marine Hospital for consumptives at Fort Stanton, five miles from Capitan. In the mountains parts which include two thirds of the country, springs reign perpetually. The thermometer rarely ever registers as low as zero in winter or reaches the eighty degree mark in summer. The rainfall averages from ten inches per annum, on the plains to one hundred and twenty inches high up in the mountains. The average rainfall at Capitan is about sixty inches per annum. In most parts of the county the average rainfall is ample for the growing of crops.

All of Lincoln county is a veritable health and pleasure resort. One can find most any climate or scenery desired within a few miles of Capitan. Large banks of snow are to be found in the months of July and August, in sight of Capitan, some of which never melt the year around, while here we have a semi tropical climate in mid water.

Hundreds of pleasure and health seekers visit the White and Capitan mountains every year. They come in wagons, big game, etc., and it has only been within the past year that they could reach them by railroad, which is now completed to Capitan and Nogal. They come here to take an outing


