

Smoke Coming from old Volcano. The correspondent of the Rocky Mountain News at Tierra Amarilla, N. M., is responsible for the following:

This is a land of extinct volcanoes. There is one a number of miles east of this town that must have been a "holy terror" in its days of activity. The surrounding country for many miles is thickly dotted with great beds of lava, which evidently came from this volcano. At Park View where the mesa dips down to the river bottom, three miles from this place, there is a large hill composed entirely of lava rock which was from the volcano ten or twelve miles. Some of the blocks will weigh several tons. The government cut a road up the side of this hill to get on the mesa. In the early days, at great expense and labor. The extinct crater of this volcano is now quite a large lake, the bottom of which has never yet been reached with a line.

Yesterday a Mexican who lives near the old volcano came into town and said that the water had disappeared from the crater, and that the bottom could not be seen. He also stated that small jets of smoke arose from the bottom of the crater, accompanied by rumbling sounds. His story has excited considerable interest, and will be investigated.






DEVICES IN VENTILATION.
Rooms are usually connected with the matter of drafts. Many people cannot have a draft of cool air, especially night air, upon them when sleeping without suffering unfavorable consequences. As a choice of evils they prefer to get along without the needed fresh air. It is possible, however, to avoid a current of air from an open window and still have good ventilation in one's rooms, says a writer in 'The Ladies' World,' in preference to suggestions, accompanied with illustrations, along this line. The illustrations show how the air on entering a room can be turned either to the right or left or can be turned up toward the ceiling, the air being thus diffused throughout the upper part of the room or turned, if desired, directly down to the floor.
Fig. 1 shows a device that is easily constructed. Two strips of board as long as the width of the window, ten inches wide at one end and curving to a point at the other, are covered on the curved edge with the thin board used for picture backing and fastened with round-headed tacks. This affair is then put into the window as shown. It is held there by little hooks and screw eyes. Turned in the opposite direction, the current of air would of course be changed in the opposite direction.
Fig. 2 shows how a light piece of cloth can be arranged so as to turn the air upward when the lower sash is opened. It is held at the top and bottom by hooks and rings, the hooks at the top being some eight or ten inches long.
In Fig. 3 only two triangular pieces of board are needed. The roller curtain is drawn down over the edge of these pieces, being held in at the middle by passing a small rod of wood through the curtain in blow out. A small weight can be attached to the curtain pull.
Fig. 4 indicates the plan used for diffusing the air throughout the upper

part of the room. A rod of stout wire or light iron is bent into the required shape and tightly covered with cloth. Triangular side pieces of cloth are sewed to the rod, a cord being "run in" at the upper edge to hold the weight of the whole. These cords have little rings at the upper ends, as shown. The ends of the wire or iron rods fit into screw eyes and are thus held firmly, their weight being supported by the cords in the edges of the side pieces above, as suggested before. All of these devices are so simple in construction that they can readily be made at home and at an expense altogether trifling.

Wheat Farming.
A Nebraska paper tells of a man who bought a farm there upon which there was a mortgage of \$700. He did not make much money the first year, but he sowed 50 acres of wheat the next year. It was a poor year for wheat, and the stand was so poor that he thought he would not harvest it. He returned to his old home and left the farm and the mortgage to fight it out as they pleased. The wheat ripened, fell to the ground and seeded it well. There was a fine crop, and as some one was kind enough to write about it to him he went back, harvested it and sold it for enough to pay the mortgage and all other debts.



Wheat Farming.
As many people have an idea that challenge is not a good food for horses, we will call attention to the fact that the Virginia experiment station has been testing it and reports that the results from his use has arisen from too much having been fed at the beginning, and as the horse then it he is tempted to eat too much of it, as he is not of green grass or clover. This is more apt to be the case when it contains a large amount of corn. When the station began by feeding small quantities and increased very gradually in the amount given, no injury resulted. And after the horses were well accustomed to it they would not eat too heartily at it even when given opportunity.

Territorial News Notes.

The commencement week exercises of the territorial normal school located in Silver City have been in progress since last Saturday. The field exercises were held at Athletic park Monday and sports of all kinds were on the program. The graduate class of the school this year is the largest that has ever been known in the history of the institution.
