SAW THE DEVIL IN A CAVE
Miner's Awful Night in a Gold Filled Cavern.

William J. Howard, a miner who is at present residing at St. Joseph, Mo., recently told a remarkable story of an experience he had in the island of Martinique, where he lived five years. Howard says that he was guided to a cave in Mont Pelée by a native of the island three years ago and that he saw tons and tons of gold in the cave. Howard further says that he saw the devil one in the cave, if there is a devil anywhere in the universe of worlds.

"I am not superstitious," said Howard, "and have no belief in kind of religion. Neither did I believe that there was a Satan, but I saw something in that cavern that would shake any man's ideas about such things. It is almost beyond belief, but it is a fact.

"I first went to St. Pierre about seven years ago," said Howard. "I did not go there in search of gold but was wandering about to see the world. I liked the place and decided to remain awhile.

"After I had been there a year or two I met a man known by the name of Jock, who claimed to be a native of Martinique. One night he told me about a cave on the far side of Mont Pelée, and said the devil lived there. I paid little attention to the story, but he kept on telling it, and I began to believe the story of the cave, but of course took no stock in the devil part of it. Finally I determined to see the cave and induced the native to guide me to the place.

"We arrived on the side of the mountain about 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and after a long search Jock showed me a place in a little ravine where he said the entrance to the cave could be found. He held aloof, and I searched the ravine, but there was no opening. I finally persuaded Jock to show the entrance to me. He was shivering with fright, but went close enough to show me a rock which he said covered the entrance and then fled.

"I tried to move the rock by pulling it or pushing it, but it appeared to be as solid as any other rock in the side of the mountain. While working at it I gave it a sidewise twist, and it moved out of its fixed place, showing an opening large enough for a man to enter. I crawled into the opening, expecting to find nothing more than a small cavern.

"I kept on going, passing through cavern after cavern until I came to one that was about 800 feet square. I had no light, but I could see everything in the cave. It was a beautiful place, and I stood looking at it a long time before I noticed the heap of what I at first supposed to be rocks in the center.

"I examined this heap and found that it was gold—gold in lumps as large as a boulder and in smaller lumps the size of a peck measure. There was ton upon tons of it, more gold than has been seen in all the world before. I tried to lift one of the smaller nuggets, but it was too heavy. I scraped it with my knife to be sure that it was really gold.

"It was such a stupendous pile of gold that I was awed and not in the least excited. As I stood there I saw a blue and green flame at one side of the cave, and then I noticed a man—or what I at first supposed to be a man—standing there. I took a good look at this being and at that time I believed that I was looking at the evil one.

"This monstrous being—spirit or whatever it was—stood near one corner of the cave. He was larger than an ordinary man. The body appeared to be covered with hair. I could see horns on the head and hoofs where the feet should be. Perhaps my early education had something to do with furnishing all these features. I am not certain about that. I am certain that I saw the gold.

"When the evil one—or whatever it was, I went at once. I had no fear at that time. The terror of the place seized upon me later, and I have never been able since to shake it off entirely. I stood face to face with that form and looked, as I believed then, on the feature of Old Nick.

"The face was covered with black hair, coming to a point at the chin like a beard. The eyes were very much like those of a human, but the short horns growing from the top of the forehead dispelled the idea at once that it was a human face. The limbs were long, and the nails were like claws. It was a glistening body that I looked upon. I was pushed into one corner of the cave, and the being beside me manipulated something at his side that turned on a stream of light or flame, which shot across the cave.

"This stream appeared to have no substance, but it was 10,000 times as hot as any fire on earth, it seemed to me. It was more like a searchlight and about the size of a stream from a street hydrant. He turned it upon the heap of gold, and the boulders of yellow metal were melted like tallow in a hot fire. I saw the yellow metal run on the bottom of the cave. I could not breathe the stifling air and fell down unconscious.

"When I regained consciousness, there was the same dim light in the cave I had seen when I first entered. The heap of gold was still there, and the melted gold was on the floor of the cave. After groping around several hours I found the opening and left the place more dead than alive. When I left the cave, I pushed the rock back in its place and finally reached St. Pierre again. Jock never appeared there to my knowledge, although he may have been somewhere on the island. I never learned how he got his information about what was in the cave, and if he knew there was gold in it he never intimated it to me. Although I had not fear while I was in the cave, a sort of terror seized me after I was safe outside, and I suffered from it so much that I was thrown into a fever from which I lay ill several months. I never went back to the cave again and had no desire to get possession of any of the gold there."—Exchange.

World's Fair Notes.

At Copenhagen, Denmark, recently, Mr. C. F. Wannerstrum of Iowa, representative of the World's Fair in the Scandinavian countries, delivered an address, during the course of which he said: "No happier choice than St. Louis could have been made for a place to hold a great international exposition, for that city has something which no other city in the world possesses, namely the Southern hospitality coupled with the northern energy that St. Louis will outdo all previous records in the Exposition line admits of no doubt.

Among the many interesting achievements of human inventive genius accomplished during the decade which has elapsed since the World's Fair at Chicago, and which will be seen at the World's Fair in St. Louis in 1904, there will be the wireless telegraph, the automobile, the dirigible balloon, the wireless telephone, the transmission of sight by wire and the telephoning from railway trains and trolley cars in motion.

The construction of the Press building at the World's Fair has begun. This is the same building used for the headquarters of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition at the Pan-American and the Charleston Expositions, the material having been twice taken apart and transported by rail first to Charleston and thence to St. Louis. The building is being erected in the extreme eastern part of the grounds and its verandas will command a view of some of the most beautiful features of the Exposition.

Five million dollars will be expended in terminal improvements by the railroads entering St. Louis in anticipation of World's Fair business. All the roads entering the city use the one great passenger station which covers eleven acres and stretches from 18th to 20th streets. The extension will carry it at least another block to the westward and in place of the 32 terminal tracks, as at present, there will be about fifty. Twenty-two great railways now use the station, and the need for more room has long been apparent. The present station cost \$6,500,000.

The man at his side, a secret service officer, was instantly killed.

Secretary Cortelyou, who stood beside President McKinley on the platform there at Buffalo when the assassin slipped up and did the deed that made nations weep, fell unconscious, with blood gushing from his hurts.

The president, stunned and scratched, his hand helpless, remembered the people, how they would wonder if the news should come in garbled form, and he himself ordered one of his attendants to ride quickly for aid, and to send the correct story of the of the accident over the wires to the waiting members of the earth, before a fabric I could be started in its way.

The president proceeded on his trip, but at his request there is no cheering as the conveyance passes the gathered multitude. The dead man was the president's friend, and the president's feeling of personal grief keen. The pious merry-making is become a sober passing by, and among the president's immediate party there is no desire for the waving, tumbling that has held sway when the president has been before an expectant public.

AIRSHIPS A PLENTY.
Experiments in Franco-Spanish of Several Important Machines Santos-Dumont.
The science of aerial flight now commands wide attention in Europe and America, and the magnificent prizes aggregating \$150,000 offered by the World's Fair have stimulated experimental work throughout the world. The velo of Paris quotes G. Tissandier as saying: "Those satisfied with making plans and sketching them on a slip of paper have no idea of the trouble it takes to execute them in the experimental way." The Velo further says: Last year at about

completing of previous aerial navigation. Every day we were entertained with some new projects to advance the science of aerial navigation. The writers went so far as to propose an airship race for 1902. Well; what became of all these "ballons d'essai"? It was thought that the death of Severo annihilated all idea of future aerial navigation. But it proves to be a great mistake, for, although there is not so much talk about the "Dirigibles", they really exist, many in course of construction, and some ready to begin their experiments. These are a few of them: First, the "Santos-Dumont" No. 7 and 8, which give the best chance of success. Next, the "Ville de Paris," which belongs to M. Henri Deutsch de la Meurthe, built by M. V. Tatin, one of our best engineers. It is probable that this "Dirigible" will be able to begin experiments at the end of the summer. In the village of Moisson, near Mantes, an immense building shelters the "Dirigible" of Pierre and Paul Lebaudy, built from the plans of don Simon. This airship will be ready to leave its shed at the end of the month. In the Park of Vaugirars M. de Braddock hopes to be able to experiment with his "Dirigible" in a couple of months. Many others are working hard to solve this difficult problem, for example, M. Tur, at Courbevois; M. Louis Pillet, at Vincennes; M. Roze, Colombes and Messrs. Smutter and Debayoux at Vincennes. Don't let us forget the "Mediterranean II" of M. Henry de la Vaulse, who will continue, in September, his very interesting experiment in maritime aeronautics. In Brazil Jose de Patrocino, seems to work seriously on the same problem. As for the Americans of the United States, their bright imagination does not know any bounds and their enthusiasm is stronger than ever. From that, we can see that the inventors have not lost any hope of success, and their desire being stronger than ours; we must be confident to see later on their experiments crowned with success.

How Commutation of and Second Homestead Entries May be Made.
 The Progress is in receipt of the following circular from the Land Office which is reproduced here for the information of the general public:

Registers and Receivers,
 U. S. Land Office,
 Gentlemen:
 Your attention is called to the provisions of section 2 of the act of Congress of May 23, 1902 (Public, No. 122), entitled "An act to allow the commutation of and second homestead entries in certain cases," which read as follows:

That any person who, prior to the passage of an act entitled "An act providing for free homesteads on the public lands for actual and bona fide settlers, and reserving the public lands for that purpose," approved May 17, 1900, having made a homestead entry and perfected the same and acquired title to the land by final entry by having paid the price provided in the law opening the land to settlement, and who would have been entitled to the provisions of the act before cited had final entry not been made prior to the passage of said act, may make another homestead entry of not exceeding one hundred and sixty acres of any of the public lands in any State or Territory subject to homestead entry: Provided, that any person desiring to make another entry under this act will be required to make affidavit, to be transmitted with the other filing papers now required by law, giving the description of the tract formerly entered date and number of entry, and name of the land office where made, or other sufficient data to admit of readily identifying it on the official records: And provided further, That said person has all the other proper qualifications of a homestead entryman: And provided also, That commutation under section twenty-three hundred and one of the Revised Statutes of any amendment thereto, or any similar statute, shall not be permitted of an entry made under this act, excepting where the final proof, submitted on the former entry hereinbefore described, shows a residence upon the land covered thereby for the full period of five years or such term of residence thereon as added to any properly credited military or naval services shall equal such period of five years.

Under said section any person may make another homestead entry who, prior to the passage of said act of May 17, 1900 (31 Stats., 179), made a homestead entry for lands in the ceded Indian reservations affected by said act of 1900, supra, and perfected the same and acquired title to the land by final entry under section 2291 U. S. R. S., or by commutation under section 2301 U. S. R. S., or any amendment thereto, or any similar statute, by having paid the price provided in the law opening the land to settlement.

You will require each applicant for another entry hereunder to furnish sufficient data whereby his former entry may be identified, and show that he has all the other qualifications of a homestead entryman.
 It will be observed that an entry made hereunder can not be perfected by commutation under section 2301 R. S., or any amendment thereto, or any similar statute, excepting where the final proof, submitted on the former entry "hereinbefore described," shows a residence upon the land covered thereby for the full period of five years, or such term of residence thereon as added to any properly credited military or naval services shall equal such period of five years.



Byrne is now lieutenant colonel of the new Pacific United States volunteers and owes his promotion to his remarkable achievement in the island of Negros last July. He was with his company among the mountains when he came upon a camp of 400 organized natives who live by plunder of friend and foe and incidentally play Agulmalde's game by waylaying, robbing and even fighting American soldiers. Byrne had 65 men. He attacked with a rush, using bayonets or clubbed sabres at close quarters. He left 113 bandits dead, including their chief, and many wounded and did it with a loss of but one killed and one wounded.
 On the 31st of August Byrne attacked a bandit stronghold at Gula and added to his renown as a fighter. The bandits were lodged in a town accessible only by a road leading up an almost perpendicular slope, where the assailants were exposed to view for a quarter of a mile. The bandits rolled heavy stones down the hill into the American ranks, but only three men were hit by them. At close quarters the bandits showed fight, and 21 were killed and many wounded. They numbered 400. A large quantity of Filipino supplies and weapons were taken from the bandits.
 Byrne did not receive a military training either at West Point or in the ranks of the army. He was appointed from civil life to the office of second lieutenant and learned his art on the plains fighting Indians. He led his company in the charge at San Juan Hill.

The boys of the First Colorado brought home a story quite the opposite of that relating to Byrne's exploit. It is one of heroic defense made by a handful. The night of Feb. 4, when the Filipino war suddenly burst forth, the regiment lay in front of the insurgent blockhouse No. 4. The American outpost in front of the blockhouse was located in a clump of trees known as "the orchard." It was manned the night of Feb. 4 by two corporals and 12 privates. They had all served through the Spanish campaign and knowing that a new regiment lay behind them felt that the cause rested in their keeping that night.

When the mutterings of the gathering storm reached the little band, it was agreed that they would hold the fort to the last and not be in a hurry to call for help. The opening shot was fired, and the insurgents in and around the blockhouse showered Mauser and Remington bullets into "the orchard." Lying in the rice ridges, the Colorado men answered as best they could, firing at the flashes of the enemy's guns. At the end of two hours it was found that the stock of ammunition was about gone. A hurried conversation was held, and it was decided not to abandon the post. All the ammunition on hand was given to five men, M. J. Parkhurst, H. J. Helm, G. E. Eichelrath, G. R. Schull and G. A. Hawkins. These five were to stay and try to hold the post in the face of swarms of Filipinos only 200 yards distant while the others went back three miles to the nearest American camp for ammunition and support.

An attack upon the isolated vedette post during the night was expected to a certainty, and, feeling that they were taking their lives in their hands, the devoted men gave last messages to their comrades to be sent to friends at home. When the envoys returned with help and bullets, the defenders stood, bayonet in hand, with their last round in the chambers, awaiting the insurgent attack. At daylight the First Dakota marched up from the reserves and charged the fort. In the first line the brave Colorado pickets of "the orchard" post advanced and helped rout the enemy which had missed the splendid chance to destroy them.
