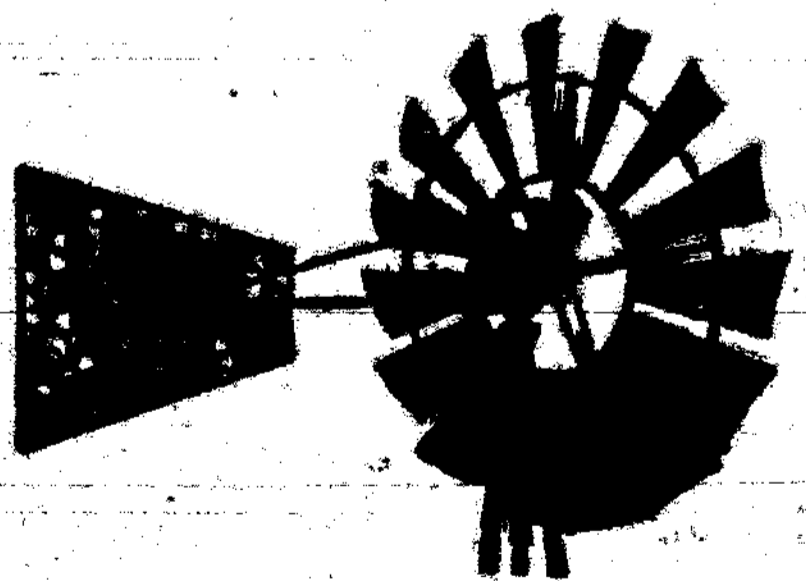

### W. A. McIVERS TALKS.

He is Very Enthusiastic Over the Outlook in Lincoln County.

Speaking of conditions in Lincoln county, Mr. W. A. Melver, then mining magnate, waxed eloquent. He said that a mining revival, the like of which had never been seen in the district, had taken place. Millions of dollars were being expended and great results would follow. The Nogal-White Oaks districts, Lincoln county, Mr. Melver believes, is not to be surpassed by an equal area of country in the west as a mining region.

"When the Albuquerque Eastern road is completed," he asserted, "and connections made with the Rock Island, Albuquerque will be an ideal place for a big smelter. All the output of my section of Lincoln county, which now goes to El Paso, will be available for Albuquerque. And the output should be enormous."

Mr. Melver is president of the Gallinas Mining company and the Helen Rae Placer company and general manager of the New Mexico Oil and Development company and of the Free Gold Mining and Milling company, all doing business in Lincoln county. The various companies are backed by immense capital and will do much for the development of the county and territory.—Journal-Democrat.

R. H. Henry, World's Fair Commissioner for Mississippi, has visited twenty counties of his state and delivered over thirty addresses on the subject of Mississippi's representation at the coming Exposition. Mississippi's appropriation for the World's Fair is \$50,000 but there is now talk of doubling it.

Col. John A. Ockerson, chief of the Department of Liberal Arts, attended the semi-centennial meeting of the American Pharmaceutical Association at Philadelphia. The pharmaceutical display will form an important section of Col. Ockerson's great department which will occupy a building covering nine acres.

Sixty-nine cases were treated at the World's Fair emergency hospital during August, of which 28 were cases of injury, but only three serious.

**ANOTHER EXPOSITION PALACE**

Construction of the Building for the Department of Mines and Metallurgy About to Begin.

Bids will be opened tomorrow for the construction of the Palace and Mines and Metallurgy for the World's Fair. This will stand near the Liberal Arts and Government buildings in the southern part of the main group of exhibit palaces. Its dimensions are 525 by 750 feet, covering over nine acres. The estimated cost is \$500,000. The contractor will be required to have it completed August 31, 1904. The design, by Theodore C. Link, is a radical departure from the general style of Exposition architecture. Two obelisks 150 feet high will stand at each of the four principal entrances. Behind the obelisks are globes nearly as high above ground, each surrounded by giant sculptures of human figures. The roof will project 18 feet beyond the wall line and a broad loggia will extend around the building.

The World's Fair's first baby, Louisiana O'Leary, was duly christened with great ceremony in front of the Administration building, Saturday afternoon, Sept. 6, in the presence of a large crowd. A Priest and two assistants conducted the ceremony. Florence Maynard, member of a prominent St. Louis family acted as godmother and Isaac S. Taylor, director of works of the Exposition, was godfather. Valuable presents were bestowed on the mite of humanity, who cried loudly when the ointments were applied.

**Territorial News Notes.**

A new school house is under construction at Andrews, Sierra county. It is expected to be completed and ready for occupancy by November 1.

On Thursday morning of last week, Adalema Francisca, the four-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Garcia, of Springer, died after an illness of fourteen days, of cholera infantum.

Richard De Graffeuried, residing at Puerto de Luna, had the misfortune last week, while at his ranch on the Yesso, to get kicked by a mule, breaking one of his legs.

The Roswell postmaster is putting on airs since his office has been raised to the second class. He will move his office in the Masonic Temple there and will have a complete new outfit.

The Otero county republican convention will be held in Alamogordo, Monday, October 6, at which time candidates for the county offices will be nominated and also delegates elected to the territorial convention at Raton.

D. B. Randall, in charge of work on the United Gold & Copper Company's Lordsburg mine, reports the excellent showing of ore continues, and that work will be pushed with the anticipation of having ore to ship as soon as the concentrator is started.

How Commutation of and Second  
 Homestead Entries May be Made.

The Progress is in receipt of  
 the following circular from the  
 Land Office which is reproduced  
 here for the information of the  
 general public:

Registers and Receivers,  
 U. S. Land Office,  
 Gentlemen:

Your attention is called to the  
 provisions of section 2 of the act  
 of Congress of May 22, 1902  
 (Public, No. 122,) entitled "An  
 act to allow the commutation of  
 and second homestead entries in  
 certain cases," which read as fol-  
 lows:

That any person who, prior to  
 the passage of an act entitled  
 "An act providing for free homesteads  
 on the public lands for ac-  
 tual and bona fide settlers, and  
 reserving the public lands for  
 that purpose," approved May 17,  
 1900, having made a homestead  
 entry and perfected the same and  
 acquired title to the land by final  
 entry by having paid the price  
 provided in the law opening the  
 land to settlement, and who would  
 have been entitled to the provisions  
 of the act before cited had  
 final entry not been made prior  
 to the passage of said act, may  
 make another homestead entry  
 of not exceeding one hundred and  
 sixty acres of any of the public  
 lands in any State or Territory  
 subject to homestead entry; Pro-  
 vided, that any person desiring to  
 make another entry under this  
 act will be required to make affidavit,  
 to be transmitted with the  
 other filing papers now required  
 by law, giving the description of  
 the tract formerly entered date  
 and number of entry, and name  
 of the land office where made, or  
 other sufficient data to admit of  
 readily identifying it on the official  
 records: And provided further,  
 That said person has all the  
 other proper qualifications of a  
 homestead entryman: And pro-  
 vided also, That commutation  
 under section twenty-three hun-  
 dred and one of the Revised Sta-  
 tutes of any amendment thereto,  
 or any similar statute, shall not be  
 permitted of an entry made under  
 this act, excepting where the  
 final proof, submitted on the for-  
 mer entry, hereinbefore described,  
 shows a residence upon the land  
 covered thereby for the full period  
 of five years or such term of re-  
 sidence thereon as added to any  
 properly credited military or  
 naval services shall equal such  
 period of five years.

Under said section any person  
 may make another homestead  
 entry who, prior to the passage  
 of said act of May 17, 1900 (31  
 Stats., 179), made a homestead  
 entry for lands in the ceded In-  
 dian reservations affected by said  
 act of 1900, supra, and perfected  
 the same and acquired title to the  
 land by final entry under section  
 2301 U. S. R. S., or by commuta-  
 tion under section 2301 U. S. R.  
 S., or any amendment thereto, or  
 any similar statute, by having  
 paid the price provided in the law  
 opening the land to settlement.

You will require each applicant  
 for another entry hereunder to  
 furnish sufficient data whereby  
 his former entry may be identified,  
 and show that he has all the  
 other qualifications of a home-  
 stead entryman.

It will be observed that an entry  
 made hereunder can not be  
 perfected by commutation under  
 section 2301 R. S., or any amend-  
 ment thereto, or any similar  
 statute, excepting where the final  
 proof submitted on the former

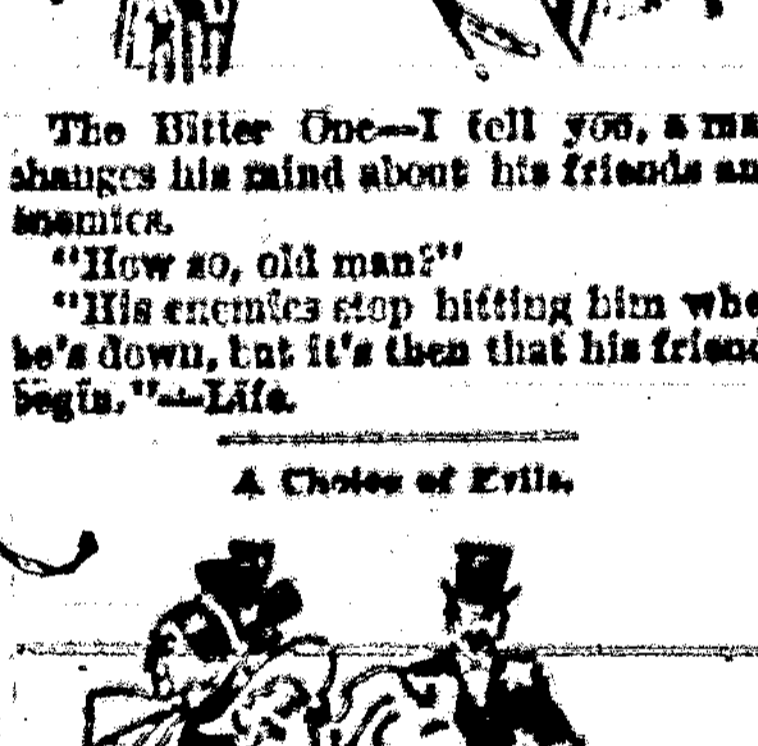
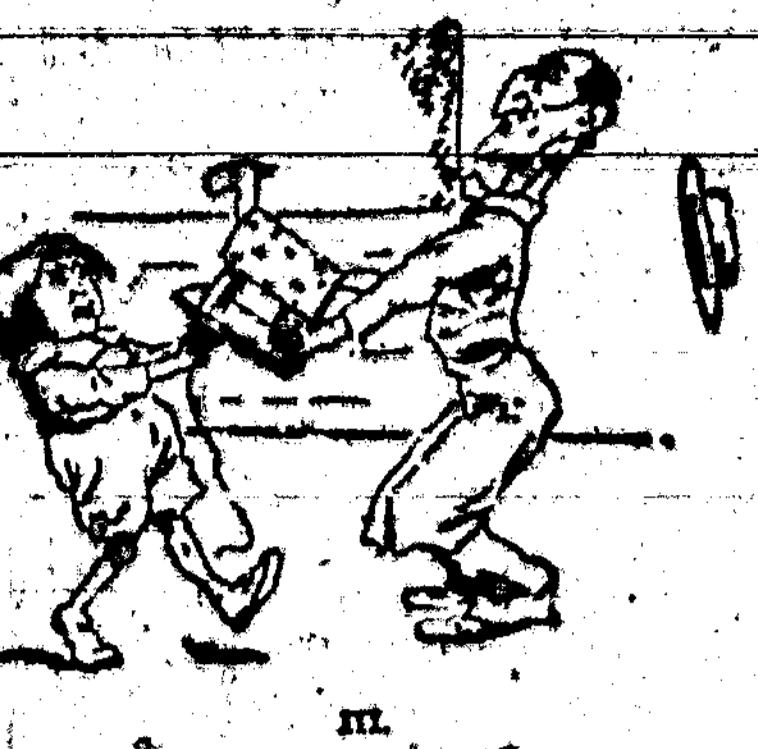
