The Santa Fe Central.
Mulligan Bros., a railroad contracting firm of El Paso, has secured a contract to construct thirty-nine miles of grade on the Santa Fe Central. Their part of the grade commences at Torrance and runs northwest. They are to place immediately 100 teams and 150 men on the work.

The heaviest work of the Santa Fe Central is about finished. The long and difficult cut near Moriarty station will be done by the first of the month and work is progressing rapidly and satisfactorily on the last serious cut, at La Jara, two miles south of Moriarty. All the bridging and heavy bridge work is completed with the exception of two Howe trusses for the Gallateo bridge, which are expected to arrive from the east any day and which as soon as they are received will be placed in position.

Steel rails will commence to arrive at Torrance on the 15th of November and laying track will be begun December 1st. Track laying machines have been leased and will do the work. It is expected that two miles of track will be laid per day and that everything will be completed and trains will run from Torrance to Santa Fe by February 1, 1903.

Territorial News Notes.
The contract for the new county jail building at Alamogordo was let to V. E. Carson, a contractor at that place. Work will be commenced at once.

Alamogordo's public school will open next Monday. One of the new school buildings will be ready for occupancy at the opening of school.

The corps of engineers which started several months ago from Albuquerque to survey a railroad from Albuquerque to Farmington, is cross-sectioning as it goes and is at present in Largo canon, San Juan county, heading for the San Juan river.

The exhibit of fine cattle made by the Agricultural College at the Albuquerque Fair recently was awarded the only premium for live-stock. The cattle attracted a good deal of attention from the lovers of well-bred stock.

George M. Slaughter shipped eight cars of the Slaughter range Herefords from Portales to Kansas City for the big show. He took all classes so as to make all the entries possible and show the cattle raisers from other portions of the country what the Pecos valley can do.

The county commissioners of Chaves county have purchased twenty-five new benches and placed them in the court house square for the convenience of those who may desire to rest in the park or during time of court proceedings. The benches are in the vicinity of the court house.

On Sunday last Bud Clayton shot and killed and A. Tally fatally wounded during a brawl at Swanson's logging camp, six miles southeast of Cloudcroft. The shooting was done by John Tally and he is under arrest. Tally's wound was accidental.

Plans have been prepared and filed as required by the laws of the United States and of the territory for the building of extensive reservoirs by the White Mountain Irrigation company, and operations will be commenced at Temporal, above Tularosa in the near future.

The total bona fide enrollment of students at Mesilla Park College is now 186. This is an increase of 100 over the enrollment of the year. One of the attractive features of the work offered by the college is that of the work in domestic science. The college has this year for the first time offered a complete four years' course in domestic science for young women. It has been taken by a large number of the young women of the territory who evidently find it what they wanted for a long time. The course includes complete instruction in cooking, sewing, hygiene, dress-making, and similar work. For the young women especially a training department has this year been nicely equipped with necessary machines, furniture and other equipment. The work of this course is along the line of what the college is doing for young men and young women in practical training for life.

New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts, Mesilla Park.

The football game between the team of the Agricultural College at Mesilla Park, and the Albuquerque Indian School, which was played during the Fair week before a large attendance of visitors on the Albuquerque Fair grounds, resulted in no score for either side. Arrangements are being made to bring these two teams together again early in November on the grounds of the Mesilla Park College and much interest is being aroused in the outcome of this second contest between the two strongest football teams of the territory.

The practical demonstration of actual mechanical engineering work being done at the Fair, attracted a large crowd of visitors. Two students from the College at Mesilla Park were present with the carload of exhibit material which the College sent up to the Fair and were working at carpenter's benches and drawing tables. Another feature of the College exhibit that attracted much attention was its display of results accomplished in its work of pumping for irrigation. The College had also a fine display of fresh and preserved fruits from Dona county as well as work from nearly all departments of the institution.

A number of the young men who have been trained in stenography in the Mesilla Park College and most of whom have been born and raised in this territory, have gone out to fill lucrative and responsible positions. The rapid rise made by some of these young men is striking and illustrates forcibly the value of a practical education. One of these is now in Philippines engaged in prosperous commercial enterprise; another who left College only a few years ago is secretary of one of the largest business enterprises of Northern Mexico; still another is cashier of a strong bank in Chihuahua; and another is filling a desirable position for the government of Porto Rico. If it was generally realized by the young people of New Mexico what the value of a practical education is, the attendance in our high institution of learning would be much greater than it is.

The results of education as a means to success in life for the native young men and women of our territory is well illustrated in the case of those who have been educated at the Agricultural College, at Mesilla Park. A particularly striking illustration is that of Mr. Sanchez, Mr. Sanchez was raised in the little town of Mesilla and had no special educational advantages beyond those of the ordinary Mexican boy who he entered the preparatory department of the Agricultural College. Instead of dropping out of school after one or two years' work, he persisted in completing the full College course, graduating in 1901. His record for careful and intelligent work secured his appointment to a scholarship in the college for the following year, but before the close of that year the government at Washington had appointed him to an excellent position in connection with its division of work. Since last May Mr. Sanchez has been traveling in the west with a government soil survey party and his future success in life is practically insured.

The Territory of New Mexico, County of Lincoln.

Know all men by these presents, That we the undersigned, Manuel Aragon, J. J. Aragon and B. H. Moeller, and Joseph Hall, each and all being citizens of the United States of America, and residing within the county of Lincoln and territory of New Mexico, desire and hereby do resolve and form ourselves into a body corporate, in pursuance of the laws of the territory of New Mexico, appertaining to the formation of corporations within the limits thereof.

The name, purpose and powers of which corporation are as follows, to-wit:

First, The name of the corporation shall be, ARAGON-MOELLER COMPANY.

Second, The purposes and powers of the corporation shall be, to conduct and carry on a general retail and wholesale mercantile business, to buy, own, mortgage and sell any and all kinds and character of merchandise, farming implements, real and personal property including live stock of all kinds, to borrow and loan money, to cultivate and irrigate lands, to contract for and erect houses and buildings, to construct irrigating ditches for irrigating agricultural lands, to acquire, own, hold, improve, plat and lay off land into town-sites and additions thereto and sell the same; and to do all things necessary to carry into effect the foregoing purposes and powers.

Third, The capital stock of the company shall be Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars.

Fourth, The corporation shall exist for a period of twenty years.

Fifth, The stock of the corporation shall be divided into Five Hundred shares of Fifty Dollars each, and said stock shall be paid up and non-assessable.

Sixth, The number of directors of the corporation shall be four, which number may be increased or decreased by the stockholders at any regular or special meeting thereof. The names of the directors and officers of the corporation for the first three months shall be, Manuel Aragon who shall be president, J. J. Aragon who shall be vice president, B. H. Moeller who shall be secretary and treasurer and Joseph Hall who shall be attorney; and they shall manage the business affairs of the corporation.

Seventh, The business of the corporation shall be conducted and carried on generally in the county of Lincoln and territory of New Mexico, and more particularly in the town of Lincoln in said above named territory and county, where the principal office and place of business of the corporation shall be located.

Eighth, The by-laws of the corporation shall provide for a common seal of the corporation, and shall further designate the officer, person or authority to affix the same, who shall also sign the corporate name of the corporation in any and all instruments of writing necessary for the corporation to sign.

Ninth, The board of directors at their first meeting after the annual meeting of the stockholders, shall elect a president, secretary and treasurer, the office of secretary and treasurer being now consolidated but may be separated when the directors deem it necessary.

Hanshon, Pa., Oct. 30.—The strike at the seven galleries of Cox Bros., and the Silver Brook operations of West & Co., was officially renewed today through an order issued by district secretary Gallagher of the United Mine Workers upon instructions from President Mitchell.

The strikers at those mines were not permitted to return to work in a body, the Coxes insisting that their employes make personal application for their former positions, and Marple requiring that each man before going back to work promise to abide by the decision of the arbitration commission. The mine workers allege that the object of these requirements is discrimination against men who were prominent in the strike.

Seven thousand miners are out. The strikers will be supported by the relief fund.
