### BRILLIANT SOCIETY EVENT

And Democratic Love Feast at North Capitan.

A FEATURE OF THE OCCASION WERE

Speeches by F. G. O'Connell, F. C. Matteson and Judge Ham.

One of the most warmly contested campaigns in the history of Lincoln county closed last Monday night at North Capitan, amidst the sparkle of lights and blaze of oratory. A most unique announcement had been issued requesting all Democrats and Republicans who were "out in the rain" to come to a grand Democratic Love Feast and Terpaichorean Revel and shake a friendly foot on the eve of another Democratic victory.

In response to this invitation the wit and beauty of Precinct No. 9 gathered in full force at North Capitan and with splendid music, on a well waxed floor, glided through the mazy dances until the small hours of the morning.

The fact that F. G. O'Connell, chairman of the Democratic county central committee, would make an address was sufficient to bring out a large number of people who expected to hear an arraignment of the Republican party, and they were not disappointed.

In plain language, which carried conviction with every word, delivered in a forceful, engaging manner, he held the undivided attention of his hearers, who frequently broke into applause.

Mr. O'Connell is a very popular young man of demonstrated abilities and has a bright future in New Mexico politics.

Below we give his speech in full.

Ladies and Gentlemen and Fellow Citizens:

On a festive occasion like this, when bright lights are flashing, when every heart beats happily and eyes look love to eyes that answer back, it would be out of place for me to discuss at length the issues which divide the two great political parties; but in as much as this dance tonight is given under the auspices of the Democratic candidates it is fitting that a few words be said in behalf of the Democratic party and the various candidates who compose our ticket in this county.

Never before have the American people been called on to consider such grave questions that cry aloud for solution as will be presented at this election. The working men of this country, who are vitally interested, will never have a better opportunity to enforce the rights of labor than at this election.

All over this broad country tomorrow men will march to the polls—Republican against Democrat. But, my friends, underlying it all is the old fight of Capital against Labor.

If a knowledge of existing conditions in this country today could be conveyed to the fathers of this republic, they would turn over in their sepulchers.

The rich are getting richer and the poor are getting poorer.

The prosperity that has been proclaimed with a brass band is enjoyed only by a privileged class, for the great mass of the American people find it hard to make a livelihood and then only under the most exacting conditions.

For years all Republican legislation has been in the interest of a privileged class and the Democratic party minority in congress has been absolutely helpless to prevent it.

But place the Democratic party in power and there will be an end to all legislation which creates trusts and millionaires and beggars helpless humanity.

The deplorable condition of the working man today was fully shown in the great coal strike in Pennsylvania just brought to a conclusion.

The Declaration of Independence declares that all men are created free and equal; but where is your equality and where is your freedom? When one man like J. Pierpont Morgan can dictate the happiness and welfare of one hundred and forty-seven thousand American citizens.

Morgan is a product of vicious Republican legislation and he and his class have no place on American soil.

What mattered it to Morgan that one hundred and forty-seven thousand honest working men were out of jobs with hunger staring their families in the face. Why he simply considered the miners of Pennsylvania as so much horse power, to mine so much coal, to pay so many dividends.

Morgan would not arbitrate until the ramblings of public opinion told him that his selfish and un-American treatment of honest working men must cease, or else the structure upon which his colossal fortune rested would be torn to pieces.

The power of this country rests with the people and what the people build up they can also tear down.

Gentlemen, the attitude of Morgan in the strike is the same attitude that the republican party bears toward the working men today.

Whenever a republican asks a working man to vote the republican ticket he insults his intelli-

gence. What has the republican party ever done for the working man?

Everything you eat, every thing you wear, and every article that goes into the construction of a home is controlled by a trust, and these combinations of capital have been the especial pets of the Republican party, which has fostered the evil and never tried to stop it.

Will you vote the Republican ticket and make your cost of living still greater?

Why every time a working man votes the Republican ticket he tightens the coils around him; he plays into the enemies hands.

It is a case of "walk into my parlor says the spider to the fly," and vote for the Republican ticket and a high protective tariff that protects Morgan and his class and robs every one of you.

I am a democrat because I am an Irishman; because the Democratic party has always been in favor of freedom in religious thought; because the Democratic party has ever been the friend of the poor and the oppressed.

The working man will never have a show until the Democratic party controls congress and the legislatures.

In the battle tomorrow work against Republicanism and the money power and do your best for the success of the Democratic ticket.

I believe the Lincoln convention nominated the best men in the county, who will serve your interests and they should be elected. We should be true to American principles and American institutions, and if you will stand up for your rights, you will find that in the ballot:

"You have a weapon firmer set And stronger than the bayonet A weapon that comes down as still

As snow flakes fall upon the sod But executes a freeman's will As lightning does the will of God."

Speeches were also made by Attorney F. C. Matteson and Judge Hall, whose remarks were well received.

### Apple Situation.

After scaring the eastern apple growers nearly out of their wits the commercial buyers (speculators) are now gathering the crop at low prices.

It is reported that the Armours are investing a million dollars in apples in New York and Maine, which they are shipping to their abattoirs in Chicago, Kansas City and other of their distributing points, El Paso being one point receiving wormy apples from afar.

El Paso desires the trade of this section, but is not buying our rick, clean, smooth apples.

The consensus of opinion now is that the crop is very spotted all over the middle West. Missouri and Kansas have only 50 to 60 per cent. of a crop of poor quality, while Nebraska, Iowa and Michigan have hardly enough for local use.

The export of apples to Europe so far this season is five times greater than last season.
