MINERS' STRIKE

COMMISSIONERS

Testimony Before That Body at Scranton Shows Terrible State of Affairs.

Pathetic Story of Eviction Told-- Woman Aged 100 Turned Out to Die--The 10 Per Cent. Increase in Wages All a Delusion.

Scranton, Pa., Dec. 9.—Among the witnesses examined by the coal strike commission today was Henry Coil, a Markle miner. He gave a graphic description of how he was injured many times in the mines. He said one of his legs was no better than a wooden one, he had only one eye, his hands had been crushed, ribs broken and skull fractured.

The company gave him nothing until after the employes took up a collection for him; then he was given \$50 after being on the injured list two years. The company took out of the collection the rent he owed.

Then followed the most pathetic story yet told the commission. The old miner, decrepit from his injuries, told how he was evicted. The wife was sick and her 100-year old mother was blind and unable to walk.

The day on which they were thrown out was rainy. He took them as best he could to Hazelton, seven miles, and put them in a cold, empty house.

This was last month when the atmosphere was quite cold. His wife became worse. Medical aid was kindly furnished free by a Hazelton doctor but it did not help her much.

"We were greatly worried because of our having been turned out of the house, and one night, he said between sobs, she died.

"She died?" said Judge Gray, who was pacing to and fro across the room, as he quickly turned as he heard the last words of the old man.

"Yes, sir, she died, and I buried her yesterday.

All the commissioners and many others in the court room were much affected by the old man's story.

The witness went on to say he

did not know whether the centenarian was alive today or not. She was in a bad condition owing to her daughter's death when he left the house last night.

No one cared to cross-examine and Judge Gray said:

"That is all, Mr. Coil, and that is enough."

Other miners were placed on the witness stand who gave testimony to show that the C. B. Markle company refused to employ them because they belonged to the union, had evicted them from their homes for the same cause, that the docking system was intolerable, that although the men are getting an increase of 10 per cent. in wages granted because of the 1900 strike it is doubtful if they get it because the men do not know how the company is figuring out that the price of powder, which enters into the computation of the increase, has been raised and the size of the mine cars has increased; but wages have not.

Two Hungarian women told how the Markle company had deducted house rent from the last wages of their husbands, who were killed in the mines, and how the company attempted to get them to sign a paper which would absolve the Markles from damages for the death of the men. The women also confirmed the story told by a breaker boy that children had to work without pay till the debt owed by their dead fathers were paid.

The Markle company was not represented by its own lawyers before the commission, although it had ample notice that testimony affecting its collieries would be presented.

The commissioners were much surprised to learn that the 10 per cent increase granted in 1900 was not a straight out raise in wages but a 2½ per cent increase and a reduction in powder of 7½ per cent. The question came in for much discussion because the miners testified they were not getting more wages than they did before 1900. No one in the room could give a satisfactory explanation.

"It is stated, sir, that you berated this plaintiff and then assailed him with a dangerous missile," said the attorney, "I did not do it in the kind. I called him a lyin' pup and hit 'im wid a brick. Dhat's all."

ALAMOGORDO TO DEMING

Party in the Field Surveying the Proposed Rock Island Cut Off.

C. C. Small, an old employe of the engineering department of the El Paso & Southwestern, is surveying a line from Alamogordo to Deming by way of Las Cruces.

Mr. Small has thirty men in his corps and is surveying a line to connect with the El Paso & Northeastern at Alamogordo and with the Southern Pacific and El Paso & Southwestern at Deming.

This line if built would give the Rock Island a short cut to Deming and save several hours' time over the El Paso route.

The new route will form the third side of a triangle, each side of which will be approximately the same length and which will enable the Rock Island to run its through business over the shorter route and save about half the distance in the haul now necessary by El Paso.

TERRITORIAL ITEMS.

The Nogal Republican, like the Santa Fe Capital, is hibernating. J. H. Lightfoot, the publisher of the former, is reported by the Alamogordo papers to have lightfooted it from Lincoln county to Mexico.

Joshua Reynolds and A. W. Clellan jointly, have offered forty-five and fifty acres of land on west Lead avenue at Albuquerque for terminals for the Albuquerque Eastern branch of the Santa Fe Central Railway.

An epidemic of diphtheria has broken out among the children of the Indians at the pueblo of San Ilderfonso, thirty miles northwest of Santa Fe, and a rigid quarantine is maintained against the Indians.

Dela, the six year old daughter of W. H. Garner of Tiptonville, Mora county, was killed on Saturday afternoon of last week by a boy named Flores who was playing with a revolver that was loaded and discharged it accidentally.

At the term of court now in session in Taos county James Garland was indicted for assault to kill. Peter M. Dolan was appointed receiver of the Ranchos del Rio Grande grant on the pe-

tion of the claimants in order to prevent the cutting and removal of timber.

The people of Belen, Valencia county, have tendered the Santa Fe Railway Company the right of way for their proposed New Mexico Eastern Railway over the Belen grant and it is now certain that this cut-off of the Santa Fe will cross the Rio Grande river at Belen.

William Garrety, son of Section Foreman Joseph Garrety at Moriarty on the Santa Fe Central railway, was killed yesterday by a dump car running over him. The boy was playing in front of the cars and one of them ran over his hips, death resulting instantly.

On the first of last week Sheriff Higgins started to Santa Fe with thirteen prisoners for the penitentiary. Arriving at Carlsbad the convicts were placed in the Eddy county jail for the night between trains. But while there the sheriff got scent of a hot trail and he and Sheriff Stewart went off on a man hunt, just where no one knows. They had not returned Sunday and the Chaves county prisoners were still incarcerated at Carlsbad, making the jail there a full coop, indeed.

Thirty-five cars of 85-pound steel rails for the track of the Santa Fe Central railway from this place to Santa Fe, have arrived here and 100 car loads are on the way. These are expected to reach here between now and the last of this month. Track laying would have commenced before this but for the non-arrival of the Harris track laying machine, which machine is to do the work. This machine is expected here daily and will surely be here within the next five days and the putting down of ties and steel rails will then begin and will be prosecuted at the rate of from two to two and a half miles per day.—Torrance Cor.

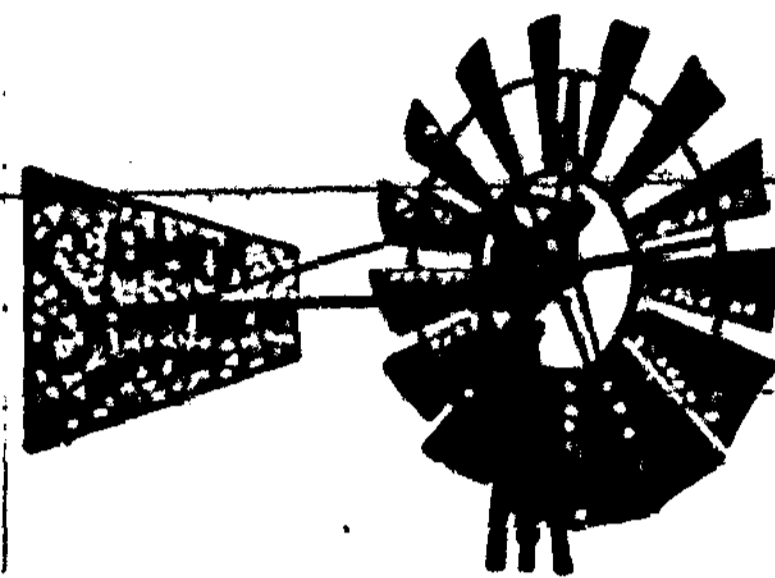
