Second Colorado.

"Through southern New Mexico the mining industry is now attracting special attention," said S. F. Pennington "I am from Colorado, which you know is one of the greatest mining sections in the world. But from what I notice during my trip through New Mexico I am convinced that in time its mineral output will be equal that of Colorado or any other section of the southwest. What New Mexico needs is more capital. Many of its mining operators are seriously handicapped for want of sufficient means to develop their properties. I think that time will demonstrate the correctness of the statement that the best paying ledges will be found at a comparatively great depth. I believe that is true of the Jarilla Oregon, Sacramento, Nogal and some other districts. In New Mexico you hear of shafts being sunk from 50 to 200 feet, as though this was a great depth. In Colorado we would only call these prospect holes. There are some old mines in New Mexico that have been practically abandoned which have never been given a fair showing. I have in my mind particularly two lead propositions which I have been examining for parties in Denver. One is in the San Andreas and the other in the Sacramentos. At the present time I do not care to give out the details of the pending deals, as other are interested and I have no right to discuss their private affairs. Indeed, I do not wish to intimate what will be the exact nature of my report as it may effect the sale. However, generally speaking, I can say that some of our best paying silver mines today were started as a lead proposition with perhaps only a trace of silver. These mines when extensively developed, showed up a good pay ledge of the white metal. I think that in some of the districts of southern New Mexico the same conditions exist and the same promising indications can be observed. I also believe that these remarks are equally applicable to the copper propositions of the Jarillas and the gold mines of Lincoln county. However, I did not pay special attention to these matters, but confined my examination to the lead prop-

erties I went to look at. I visited parts of Grant, Dona Ana, Otero and Lincoln counties and in most of the camps I notice that there was a good deal of development work being done and considerable improvements in progress which gives great promise for the future."—Albuquerque Democrat.

Geronimo's Daughter.

Old Geronimo, the famous war chief of the Apaches, had a young daughter who is now a pupil at the Mescalero Indian school. A large photograph of her was recently sent to Washington and is now mounted on the desk of Col. J. H. Doertsch, the chief of the bureau of Indian affairs, to whom it was given by Superintendent Carroll of the Mescalero school. It is a fine specimen of the photographic art and was taken by Rolfe Bauer of Alamogordo. To the once fierce Apache warrior the young woman is the apple of his eye says the Washington Post.

Her name is Lenna Geronimo. She is 13 years old and belongs to the Mescalero tribe of Apaches. Her photograph indicates that the blood of the old leader of the red men is coursing through her veins. Her face and high brow, her dignified pose, all bearing the marks of strength and force of will and character, point to a superior breeding. Her eyes are keen and her smooth raven black hair is trained with an effect that would do credit to the most precise queen of the drawing room. Her features are regular and, although an Indian, she would pass as a handsome girl. She posed for the picture with her head archly poised and hands clasped in her lap.

Lenna's father is now a prisoner of war at Fort Sill abandoned military reservation in Oklahoma. There old Geronimo and some of his followers have been nominal prisoners for many years while others of his band were sent to Carlisle or other Indian schools. Geronimo was captured over a score of years ago by General Miles after leading General Crook a merry chase through the mountains of the Southwest for several years. Before being taken west Geronimo and many of his followers were prisoners at St. Augustine, Florida, and Mobile, Alabama.

Death of Miss Kitty Shirbly.

Miss Kitty Shirbly, the young lady who was so severely burned by the accidental overturning of a lamp at the mask ball Thanksgiving night, at North Capitan, died Tuesday morning of her injuries. While her injuries were regarded as very serious, from the first it was not thought they would prove fatal. She was given the best medical attention possible, yet even this could not check the great danger to be feared from blood poison, which was the ultimate cause of her death. The funeral services were held Wednesday at the Capitan cemetery, where the remains were consigned to their final rest.

Songs to Suit.

Then the choir sang "Hasten, Lord the Day," and everyone laughed. Even the minister had difficulty in repressing a smile when the choir struck up "Behold the Bridegroom Cometh," and the audience became positively hilarious as the organ pealed forth the opening notes of "What Shall the Harvest Be?" And through it all those wicked girls preserved their expression of saintly innocence and afterward said it was the most peculiar coincidence they ever heard of.—Exchange.

It is announced by the management of the world's fair, St. Louis, that 50,000 of the 250,000 gold dollars, to be struck in commemoration of the centennial celebration of the purchase of the Louisiana territory, will be sold at \$3 each.

Mrs. U. S. Grant, widow of Gen. U. S. Grant, died at her residence in Washington, D. C., Sunday night last, of heart failure. Her daughter Mrs. Nellie Grant Sartois, was the only one of her children present at her death.

Speaking of the admission of the territories, the Springfield Republican says: "If not all then none is the only fair way to deal with the problem, in so far as it bears upon the next presidential election. Yet if all three territories are ever to be admitted, why not now?"

No Man's Land.

It is stated in a dispatch from Washington that the curious discovery has been made by the Code Commission in its work of codifying the statutes that the northern boundary of Colorado overlap an entire degree of latitude. According to the official description in the revised statutes New Mexico's northern boundary is described as running along the

thirty-eighth parallel, while Colorado's southern boundary is fixed at the thirty-seventh parallel.

It is thought a new survey will be ordered as a result of the discrepancy. On government maps the boundary is fixed as the thirty seventh parallel.

TERRITORIAL ITEMS.

Snow in the Cochiti district is two feet deep.

Santa Fe proposes to issue \$20,000 for school bonds.

There are 80,000 acres of land under irrigation in San Juan county.

The city limits of Raton are to be extended to take in several flourishing additions.

The Placita ranch, near Las Vegas, was sold last week to Alabama men for \$57,000.

Las Cruces rejoices because the southbound passenger train managed to get in between sunrise and sunset.

San Juan county is longing for the time when the tripple team freight wagon will give place to the locomotive.

J. J. Hagerman has organized the South Spring Ranch and Cattle company, with a capital of \$100,000 to operate in Chaves county.

Sheriff Baza, of Luna county, wants the next legislature to organize a force of rangers to work on the southern border of New Mexico.

The enrollment of the public schools of Roswell has reached 1,000. Before Roswell built its fine \$25,000 modern school building the enrollment reached only 418.

Clay McLaughlin, champion steer wrestler, has gone to San Antonio, Texas, to show the cracks how to rope on the day after Christmas. There is \$1,000 in it for the winner.

B. H. Dye has resumed operations at the Rita gold claim and as soon as the necessary preliminaries are completed will begin regular development. The Rita joins the North Homestake and is thought to be a very flattering prospect. White Oaka Eagle.

The Tucumcari townsite company by its agent, Col. Heman, and its attorney, E. R. Wright, appeared before the board of county commissioners last Monday asking for a franchise for an electric light and water company for Tucumcari. The franchise was granted. Star.

Jerry Simpson, erstwhile sockless statesman of the popcorn country, but now reformed and gone to New Mexico, is doing the flank movement on the statehood bill by keeping the committees in charge loaded up with big red luscious New Mexican apples. For senator and representative alike are sure to feel more kindly disposed to the world at large when surrounding a good apple, being as human as the rest of us. —El Paso Herald.

The big Hagerman apple orchard near Roswell, N. M., has 40,000 trees on 450 acres. The trees are about seven years old. Last year's crop was the first, and 15,000 bushels were harvested. This year the output of fine shipping apples was 69,800 bushels, while about 45,000 bushels of seconds and damaged fruit were evaporated and made into cider and vinegar. About \$25,000 was paid the railroad for marketing the fruit.

The surveyors for the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf have reached Tucumcari after completing the survey for the Amarillo-Tucumcari extension. It is understood that graders will be at work on the Amarillo end within the next 30 days. The town is jubilant and a boom for the home of the Waldorf Astoria of New Mexico is assured. Land seekers and town lot buyers are coming in and the new town is taking on the airs of an important station.

The Capital Power and Light company of Las Vegas, has been granted a franchise for a power, light and long distance telephone line by the city council. The company is now ready to begin work immediately on its proposed power plant on the Pecos river, which is to supply Santa Fe, Las Vegas and East Las Vegas with electric power for industrial and lighting purposes. Professor Jas. G. Halapleus, engineer in charge, will arrive in Santa Fe from Las Vegas this week.

Secretary W. H. Shelton, of the El Paso Gun Club, has received a reply from Lake Valley, N. M., to an invitation extended to sportsmen to participate in the mid-winter carnival shoot. It is as follows: "Dear sir— they ain't ben eny shutin here lately, cept sum cowboys shot up the town a while ago and got \$12 and cost, the las shutin what was dun here was wen fore fingered jim wuz to quik fer to leged Bill and we ad to plant 'im—we wile sen rown sum fellers to make a few gun plays only sumbody mit git hurt."

Senator Beveridge did not come to New Mexico for the purpose of collecting evidence in favor of statehood. He did not come for the purpose of forming an impartial judgement of the territory's fitness for statehood. He made a perfect manifest while here that his soul purpose was to spy out the leanness of the land and fortify an opinion already held. The report of his committee against statehood for this territory is therefore not at all surprising. It is to be hoped, however, that senators of more mature years, experience, and judgment will yet pass the omnibuss bill. —Socorro Chieftian.

THE USE OF TIMBER.

Commissioner Herman Instructs Forest Officers as to Their Duties.

General Land Office
Washington, D. C.
November 29, 1902.

To Forest Officers:

In the matter of the free use of timber for the repair of bridges and highways in emergency cases, the Honorable Secretary of the Interior, under date of November 19, 1902, authorized the local forest officer in charge, to issue permits to county or town supervisors and other persons, upon proper application and official report thereon to that officer, for the free use of timber, not exceeding the stumpage value of \$20, in cases demanding the immediate repair of damages to the road arising from severe rains, floods or snowslides that have made washouts, destroyed bridges or otherwise made the road impassable.

In a special case of extreme emergency, when the forest officer is not accessible, and the timber is needed to at once render the road passable, the person repairing it may use what is needed for that purpose, and afterward make application to the local forest officer in charge. That officer is to see that this is done in every instance.

You are directed to give close attention to this matter and see that the above requirements are properly complied with in every particular.


