An Old Citizen Passes Away.

Alamogordo, Dec. 31. Dr. J. V. Cowan, a well known physician of Alamogordo, died last night of apoplexy while on his way to see a patient.

Dr. Cowan was an old New Mexico pioneer, having settled at Kingston and Mesilla in the early days and is known throughout southern New Mexico.

He will be buried at Las Cruces under the auspices of the Masonic order of Alamogordo and Las Cruces.

When asked about statehood for New Mexico, by a Las Vegas Optic reporter, District Attorney Chas. A. Spless, just returned from Washington, D. C., would venture no decided opinion of his own, but stated that there is quite a sentiment favorable to joining New Mexico and Arizona together and admitting them as one state. The friends of the omnibus statehood bill are still hopeful of its passage. It is quite certain that there are enough votes for it in the senate, if it can be brought to a vote.

This is the largest number that has ever been in the institution.



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Rich Ore at Jarilla.

A rich discovery was recently made at Jarilla by R. G. Mabry and associates on the Little Annie mine, joining the Electric M. & M. Co.'s placer mines. A shipment was made recent to the El Paso Smelting works from the Little Annie, which netted to the shippers \$390 per ton in gold. Some very rich gold specimens were found in this ore, which would give assay values of many thousands of dollars per ton, some of the quartz being fully half gold. This discovery is very important, being, as many believe, the mother lode from which the rich placer gold came. The vein is about two feet wide and carries about \$25 per ton, with an occasional rich pocket in the vein, which brings the average up to value represented in the shipment. — Alamogordo News.

Valuable Metal Output Last Year.

The treasury department has issued a statement of the gold and silver output in the United States for the year just closed. According to the estimate Arizona's gold output was \$4,155,099 and her silver supply to the world was \$1,690,100. New Mexico's output was \$688,400 and silver \$298,372. The Texas output was, gold \$2,000,000 and silver \$250,372. The total production of gold in the United States was \$80,853,070, an increase for the year of \$2,187,770. The production of silver amounted to \$31,040,025, a net increase of \$4,352,084.

Poor Service.

Capitan is cursed with the poorest express service of any town in New Mexico. The office is located at North Capitan, over a mile from this place. Capitan is the distributing point for freight and the mails for this section, and hardly a day passes that someone does not call at the depot asking for express matter. When they find they have to go to North Capitan their curses are low and deep.

You never know when a package arrives, as the agent at that point considers it unnecessary to notify you of the fact, and it may lie for weeks before you know anything about it.

Our business men ought to get together and petition the Wells, Fargo Express Co. to establish an office at Capitan, the logical point for the office.

If the express company has any regard for the convenience of the general public it will not fail to grant their request, as it means dollars and cents to the company.

Shooting Match at North Capitan.

There was a shooting match at North Capitan last Sunday with a good attendance and much interest manifested.

In the first shoot at 150 yards, off-hand, Gumm, Hightower and Padilla were barred, but there were eight contestants with an entrance fee of \$5, the winner to take the \$40. Lee McBroom proved himself the best shot with a score of 12 out of a possible 25.

A second match at 150 yards with a rest, 17 entries at \$1 each, was then called. McBroom and Hightower tied on a score of 15, and agreed to shoot again next Sunday, each adding \$10 to the \$17 purse tied on.

Failed in the Attempt.

Last Friday, at Nogal, Sam Fernandez, who formerly resided at this place, made an unsuccessful attempt to commit suicide by the morphine route. Sam was to have been married New Year's night, but almost at the steps of the altar the damsel of his choice "bucked" and refused to take the marriage vow. He then concluded that life no longer held any charms for him and resolved to end his life.

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The canal will start a few miles below the New Mexico line in the Pecos valley and when completed will consist of the largest system of reservoirs in Texas. The Pecos river will be dammed at several points to take out sub canals and to reinforce the main canal. The company proposes to induce colonists to settle upon the land they irrigate and say that applications are coming in fast from home-seekers in the east. By March 1 they expect to have 28,000 acres irrigated and ready for settlement. The part of the Pecos valley to be covered by the canal embraces the most productive section of this great agricultural territory. It adjoins the land from which J. J. Hagerman recently shipped 200 car loads of apples in one shipment to the east. Among its possibilities is cotton raising, which will be experimented upon.

Major Bomar, in charge of the work, is the civil engineer who constructed the big El Paso & Southwestern railroad tunnel just west of El Paso.

PENSIONERS WARNED.

Should Not Pay Money to Pretended Pension Officers.

For the protection of pensioners and pension seekers, Pension Commissioner W. F. Ware has issued the following notice:

"All persons employed by the Bureau of Pensions are paid for their services by the government of the United States, and are not entitled to collect any money from any individual for performing their official duties.

"Any person who pretends to be an officer of the bureau, and demands compensation for his alleged services in that behalf, is an imposter, and should be turned over to an officer of the law.

"The object of this circular is to protect all persons having business with the bureau against the swindling schemes of unprincipled imposters, who falsely claim to be officers of the government, having power to grant pensions, arrears and increase, and who collect money from their victims. "Genuine special examiners do not demand or receive any money."

Values Due to Irrigation.

The striking statement is made in the current report of the division of hydrography of the United States geological survey, now in press, that:

"The open range of the arid region is generally stated to be capable of supporting one cow to every twenty acres. The same land when watered and put in alfalfa will frequently feed ten cows to every twenty acres, or in orchards at favorable altitudes will support a family of three, or even five, persons. The open range may have a value of fifty cents an acre, while under irrigation the price may jump to \$50 an acre, and if in orchards to \$500 an acre. Thus the values of the lands are directly reversed, the grazing land having the greatest extent and the least value and the irrigated land the least extent and the greatest value."

The progress of the west is so dependent on the amount and the intelligent use of its water supply that the geological survey, in its study of the water resources of the country, has made a special effort to collect full information regarding the character and regimen of all the important streams and other sources of water supply of that section. This investigation includes systematic measurements of flow, the survey of reservoirs, the study of water conservation and the consideration of the use of water on irrigation watersheds.

FOREST RESERVE NOTES.

The PROGRESS has arranged to publish each week extracts from the laws and rules and regulations governing Forest Reserves that are of interest to our readers. It is hoped that they will meet with the appreciation they merit.

Timber on Unreserved Lands.

The following extract is from the report of Commissioner of General Land office:

"When settlement began in the timbered regions of the west the universal belief appears to have been that the forests served no useful purpose except to supply fuel, building material, mining timbers, and similar necessities for pioneers who were building their homes there. It seemed that this supply was inexhaustible, and the destruction of the timber was considered only the removal of an obstacle to a new plantation.

Sale of Timber in Forest Reserves.

Timber will be sold, both live and dead, wherever the removal of such material will be beneficial, or at least not detrimental, to the forest reserves.

In the disposition of this material the local demand will have preference, and, in localities where this local demand is so great that available timber is likely to

be used, applications involving the material to dispose of it. No, mamma, give me time."

When an agreement is reached the applicant should sign a definition application, prepared on the regular form, with the assistance of the forest officer.

The the application, together with the forest officer's descrip-

tion and recommendation, is sent to the department at Washington.

If approved, the timber will be advertised in a local paper for thirty days. This advertisement will be waived only in cases where the amount involved in the sale is of \$100 stumpage value, or less.

Bids on this timber will then be in order. These bids, together with a deposit (insuring the good faith of the bidders), should be sent by the bidders to the receiver of the local land office and the bid will be forwarded from that office to the department.

At the end of thirty days the timber will be awarded to the highest bidder; and if the applicant is the successful bidder, the deposit is credited on the sale; if not, the money will be refunded.

When the timber is awarded the applicant will sign a contract containing the specifications contained in the original application, as to manner of cutting, sealing, and cleaning up, etc., and, if the case seems to justify it, he will be asked to give a bond, usually in an amount double the value of the timber, to secure the proper fulfillment of the contract.

Cutting may then begin. The material will be skidded or piled in the customary manner, and the purchaser is required to mark the tops of the logs to facilitate sealing.

The sealing will be done in the customary way by the old Scribner rule. The spoon is very ancient and many fine specimens are in existence that were used by the Egyptians in the seventeenth century B. C.

Meteorological Changes.

The regulating effect of vegetation on rivers is accompanied by an actual increase in the rainfall of wooded as compared with barren regions. This is so clearly recognized that in many of the treeless plains of North America and Australia tree planting is encouraged by the institution of an annual holiday called Arbor day, on which each citizen is expected to plant a tree. In Russia the cutting of trees is prohibited in the whole belt of forests which covers the Ural-Carpathian ridge whence all the rivers of eastern Europe flow to north and south. Palestine presents a very striking example of climate altered by human action. In the days of the Israelites the deep mountain slopes were terraced artificially by walls supporting a narrow strip of soil, on which grains, vines, olives and fruit trees of many kinds were grown. The rainfall was regular and gentle; and after penetrating through the terraces was a perpetual spring, at the base of the slopes, feeding the streams which rippled through the valleys. Now by neglect the terraces have been broken down and swept into the valleys, and the mountain sides, being exposed to the sun, allow the occasional showers to dash down in impetuous torrents to flood temporary streams, which when the rain passes, give place to channels of dry stones. The land becomes baked in the fierce rays of the sun by day and chilled by radiation through the clear dry air at night, the range of temperature having increased as the rainfall diminished. — Mills "The Realm of Nature."

To Remove Duty.
 Available Clay, of Georgia, has passed a bill to provide for the importation of commodities imported by trusts. The bill confers upon the president authority to issue a proclamation suspending the collection of all customs duties on such articles brought from foreign countries.

President Wants Trust Law.
 Washington, Jan. 7. — President Roosevelt had a conference today with Speaker Henderson and Representative Grosvenor, of Ohio, with regard to the proper anti-trust legislation. It is understood that the president impressed upon his callers his desire that some legislation dealing with the trust question should be enacted at the present session of congress. No particular measure was under discussion.


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
