## Certificate of Amendment to Original and Amended Articles of Incorporation of The Eagle Mining and Improvement Company. (No. 3561)

Territory of New Mexico, Office of the Secretary, Santa Fe, N.M.

I, J. W. Reynolds, Secretary of the Territory of New Mexico, do hereby certify that the following is a true and correct transcript of the original and amended articles of incorporation of The Eagle Mining and Improvement Company (No. 3561) as amended on the 4th day of November, A.D., 1903.

At a meeting of the stockholders of the Eagle Mining and Improvement Company, held at the Sherman House in Chicago, Illinois, on the 4th day of November, 1903, all of the stockholders of said company having been duly notified of said meeting and of the purpose for which the same was called, and three-fourths of the issued stock being represented, either in person or by proxy, the following, among other proceedings, were had: The President stated that one of the objects of this meeting in the amendment of Article Five of the Articles of Incorporation of this Company changing the number of Directors of said company from five to nine. Thereupon the following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Secretary of this company to all stockholders, advising them of this regular annual stockholders meeting, which notice was sent out twenty days prior to said meeting. It was stated that one of the objects of said meeting would be to vote upon an amendment to the Charter of this Company in order to provide for nine directors instead of five, and

Whereas, As it appears that this notice had been given to the stockholders of this Company of this meeting and of the time and place thereof, and the purpose for which the same was held,

Therefore, Be it resolved by the stockholders of this company that Article Five of the Charter of this Company be, and the same is hereby amended so as to increase the number of Directors of this company to nine instead of five as at present, so that the said Article Five when so amended shall read as follows:

Article 5. "The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted and managed by a board of nine directors to be elected from among the stockholders of this corporation at the annual stockholders meeting, which annual meeting shall be held at either of the offices of said company and at such time after the first three months as may be prescribed by the by-laws of said company.

The officers of said company shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, General Manager, and such other officers or agents as may be established from time to time by the Board of Directors, either by by-laws or resolution.

The president and vice-president shall be elected from the board of directors. The other officers above named or any other officer or agent established or maintained by the said company, may be selected from persons other than the board of directors. The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted for the first three months from the time of its commencement, until their successors are selected and qualified, by the following named incorporators: Milton George, H. C. Knight, Josiah S. Tilden, Paul L. Kropp, and John M. Rice."

And the board of directors of this company are hereby ordered to cause to be prepared in proper form, sign, seal, acknowledge and file the necessary amendment of the Charter of said Company, and that they cause said amended Charter to be filed in the office of the Secretary of the Territory of New Mexico, and in the office of the Probate Clerk of Lincoln county, in said

territory, which resolution was on the roll of the roll of stockholders voted as follows, there being present in person or by proxy seven hundred and eighty-five stockholders, voting 1,948,784 shares, of which 1,668,344 were voted in favor of said amendment and 280,440 shares voted against said amendment, said 1,668,344 shares being four-fifths of all the issued stock of said company.

### AMENDED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE EAGLE MINING AND IMPROVEMENT COMPANY.

Know All Men by these Presents, That we, Geo. M. Fuller and Milton George of the city of Chicago, State of Illinois, and John M. Rice of the County of Lincoln, Territory of New Mexico, being a majority of the board of directors of said company under the Charter heretofore filed, under and by the authority and direction of a general meeting of all the stockholders of said company, held on the 4th day of November, A.D., 1903, at the Sherman House, in the City of Chicago, State of Illinois, at which said meeting all the stockholders of said company were present or represented in pursuance of notice hereby that time regularly given as required by law, a copy of the proceedings of which meeting and the resolution adopted by said stockholders are hereto attached, do hereby make, make, know, judge and file, the following amended articles of incorporation of the said company:

#### CHAPTER. ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation and body politic shall be and in the Eagle Mining and Improvement Company, by which name it shall be known and under which it shall transact all of its business.

#### ARTICLE 2.

The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be the sum of Ten Million of Dollars, divided into ten million of shares of the par value of One Dollar per share.

This company and corporation is formed for the purpose of engaging in the following lines

of business, to-wit: It shall have the right and authority to lease, hold, buy or otherwise acquire, mining property, mines, mining claims and mineral lands, with milllets, tunnel sites, and water rights, and shall have the right to acquire and hold title to the same either by lease, deed, mortgage or any other manner authorized by law, and shall have the right to sell, lease, hold or mortgage the same, and shall have the right to engage in the general business of mining and of acquiring all machinery and supplies necessary for the operation, development and management of the said properties, and shall have the right to acquire, own and operate any and all mills, smelters, flotation works, or to erect, construct, maintain and operate any and all works necessary for the handling, treatment and reduction of ores to build houses, stores, warehouses, machine shops, saw mills and to operate the same; and shall have the right and authority to acquire water rights and water privileges, and to build, and to construct and operate dams, reservoirs, ditches and canals, and to build and construct roads, tramways, electric roads, cable roads, or any other kind of roads, for the transportation of the products and business of said company; and shall have the right to erect, construct and maintain electric light plants and electric power plants operated either by steam or water power, in connection with its business, and said company shall have the right to do all such other acts and things as may be incident to, or necessary for, the profitable and economical carrying on of the general business of mining and smelting of ores, and for the development of its business and of the mineral interests in the locality in which its operations are carried on.

ARTICLE 3. The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the date of filing of these articles of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of New Mexico, and the termination thereof shall be fifty years from that date.

ARTICLE 4. The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted and managed by a board of nine directors, to be elected from among the stockholders of this corporation at the annual stockholders meeting, which annual meeting shall be held in either of the offices of said company, and at such time after the first three months as may be prescribed by the by-laws of said company.

The officers of said company shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, General Manager, and such other officers or agents as may be established from time to time by the board of directors, either by by-laws or resolution.

The President and Vice-President shall be elected from the board of directors. The other officers above named, or any other officers or agents established or maintained by said company, may be selected from persons other than the board of directors.

The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted for the first three months from the time of its commencement, and until their successors are selected and qualified, by the following named incorporators: Milton George, and James C. Knight, Josiah S. Tilden, and Paul L. Kropp, and John M. Rice.

#### ARTICLE 5.

The principal office and place of business for the transaction of the business affairs of said company shall be, and is hereby established at Parsons, in the County of Lincoln, Territory of New Mexico. The principal office for the transaction of the financial affairs of said company shall be, and is hereby established in the City of Chicago, County of Cook, State of Illinois. It is also provided and understood that meetings of the board of directors of said company, either regular or special, may be held at its office in the said town of Parsons, Lincoln county, Territory of New Mexico, or in the said City of Chicago, Cook county, State of Illinois, or in the town of Capitan, Lincoln county, Territory of New Mexico; and it is also provided that meetings of the board of directors of said company may be held in any other town or place in the Territory of New Mexico on resolution duly adopted by the board of directors, fixing the time and place of said meeting, and notice thereof to each member of the board.

#### ARTICLE 6.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be forever non-assessable, and each certificate of stock thereof shall state upon its face the number of shares represented, thereby and that the stock is fully paid and non-assessable.

ARTICLE 8. The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall be exempt from the debts of the corporation.

ARTICLE 9. The board of directors of this corporation shall have the right to adopt such by-laws as may be necessary for the government of its business, and for the transaction of its affairs, and shall have the right to create such officers, or superintendents, or managers, or any other officers, as may seem necessary for the conduct of its business, and to provide the manner for the execution of the duties of its officers and agents.

ARTICLE 10. These articles of incorporation may be amended at any annual or special meeting of the stockholders of said company, called for the purpose by a two-third vote of the stock issued.



## AROUND THE WORLD.

Professor Hogg Claims Journey Will Be Made in Thirty-Three Days.

Colorado & Southern officials have received from Fort Worth, Texas, a pamphlet setting forth the theories of Prof. Alexander Hogg, who maintains it will soon be possible to go around the world in thirty-three days. A projected extension of the Trans-Siberian railway will enable the traveler to go to a point on Bering Strait, instead of Vladivostok, the present terminus. On the opposite side of the strait is the extension of the Alaskan railway. This road is making surveys from Dawson to Nome, and has a line of coaches at present running from St. Michaels to Nome. Within the next year it is expected a steam railroad will be in operation between St. Michaels and Nome. Professor Hogg figures that by traveling from Nome to Dawson and thence to Seattle the journey around the world will be greatly shortened.

Some time ago the Canadian Pacific railway authorities were considering a scheme to build a line from Hudson bay to Vancouver. It was pointed out the distance from London to Hudson bay was much less than to Canadian seaports. It was estimated that the ocean trip could be made in four days, thus effecting a saving of three days between London and Vancouver. Investigation proved, however, the line would be available only a few months during the summer, as the winters are too rigorous for railroading.
