School Library Rules

This organization shall be known as the Corona Public School Library.

The Library shall be located in the main school building.

We recommend that a charge of one dollar be made for admission to the Library association but that all school children be given free use of the Library, provided that pupils are not to be allowed to draw books for other people, and that the Librarian and the various teachers may place what restrictions they deem necessary as to the number and kinds of books drawn by their pupils.

We recommend that books be drawn for a period of seven days and that a fee of five cents a day be charged for holding books over time. As we obtain more books the time will be lengthened and the fees lessened.

No person shall have 2 books drawn at the same time.

Each person shall be held responsible for damage to or loss of books drawn by them.

We recommend that several current magazines be subscribed for and that the list contain the following numbers "Worlds Work" "The American Boy" "The Youths Companion" and the "Review of Reviews".

We will welcome the contribution for books and magazines and such as are contributed shall be subject to the same care and regulations as those belonging to library and returned upon request.

All books must be labeled, and numbered in a card index.

The library shall be opened on school days only, during school hours and from 3:30 to 4:30 P.M.

All monies collected for membership and fines shall be placed in the treasury for the purpose of buying new books and magazines.

We appointed Mr. Dnnlay Librarian and he shall be treasurer of library funds.
