More public land is being taken up in the vicinity of Albuquerque at the present time than was ever taken up before in the history of the country. Lands that have been passed over for years as comparatively worthless are now being eagerly picked up and land hunting parties are to be seen on the plains every day for a radius of ten miles around the town. The scheme to sink for artesian water caused the spurt.

The election is over and now we can settle down to business with the assurance that the seasons will continue as usual and that our prosperity or adversity is not dependent so much upon our officials as upon ourselves. Let us hope for better times and labor to fit ourselves to profit thereby. The general conditions are hopeful for N. M., or for our part of it at least.

Tuesday one year ago occurred the great blizzard in northeastern New Mexico, southern Colorado, southern Kansas, the Panhandle of Texas and the Neutral Strip. It was the worst storm ever known in the region it passed over. Several men were frozen to death and others injured for life. The cold wave passed within about twenty miles of Springer and was followed three days later by a remarkably heavy fall of snow.
