To begin with, no man has any more right to force another to employ or to remain in his employ, than the employee has to force him to remain at work against his will. We do not believe in slavery as to either labor or capital. The mutual contention at Homestead have amounted to the slavery pure and simple of one or the other. All combinations of labor, which attempt to limit the right of one man to accept work up.

on terms which another objects are both illegal and immoral. All combinations of capital which attempt exaction of the laborer are open to the same condemnation. To employ or accept employment is or ought to be a matter of free choice.

WAR CLOUDS.

Since the Franco-Prussian war Germany has spent \$2,000,000,000 on her army and navy.

The French war office has provided for the enrollment of between 6,000 and 7,000 bicycles in war.

A vessel has been designed in England which contains some quite novel features. It is a double-ended craft to steam either way and run with either end. It is also to be fitted with capmental rudders.

Russia has the largest armored war ship afloat. The vessel is the *Rurik* (the name of the hero of the "Guimaraes of Moscow") and is of 14,000 tonnage. England is building two war vessels of 9,000 tons. Spain has ordered three armored cruisers of 9,000 tons displacement.

The French ministry of war has been engaged for more than a year in making experiments in the preservation of meat. The experiments have resulted in the discovery that forced meat can be kept for eight months without any change in its appearance or powers of nourishment.
