Perhaps a few words of advice to parties who have mines for sale, and who are visited by experts or agents—call them what you will—who have been sent by prospective purchasers to examine and pass upon the property will not come amiss. This man does not come out to interview you, and get your opinion; he wishes to see for himself. All you have to do is to show him your developments says the Prescott Prospect. He will do the rest himself without any of your help. That is what he is there for. You need not keep picking up pieces of ore, and telling him, "Look at this! look at that!" if there is any ore there worth noting he will see it. He is there to make a study of the property; and how can he do so if you do not give him a chance to think? The wisest and most experienced mine examiners refuse to go into a mine accompanied by an owner or his agent. They examine the mine alone, and thus have a chance to form an unbiased opinion.

"Another thing; the owner never helps his own case with the examiner, by blowing up, or even calling attention to his property. He is much more likely to vex him and bore him, and thus get a bad report. For my part, I do not know of a worse bore than a man who keeps picking up pieces of quartz and handing them to you—never leaving you a chance to examine the ground or quartz on your own account." The over estimation of the value of properties and the exaggeration of the richness of the strike is too common to need comment here. As one writer says, the man who underrates rather than over-estimates the value of his property, is most likely to interest capital therein or effect a sale. Well posted mining men make deals on their own judgement and not on that of the seller.

Notice of Special Stockholders Meeting.

The Iowa and New Mexico Mining and Milling Company.

Des Moines, Iowa, May 5th, 1902

At a special meeting of the board of directors of the Iowa and New Mexico Mining and Milling Company, held at the office of the secretary, in Des Moines, Iowa, May 5th, 1902, the following resolution was adopted unanimously (a majority of said board of directors being present).

Resolved, That for the purpose of amending the articles of incorporation of the said Iowa and New Mexico Mining and Milling Company, a special meeting of the stockholders of said company be and is hereby called, to meet at the town of Nogal, New Mexico, on the 30th day of June, A. D. 1902, for the purpose of the consideration and adoption or rejection of the said proposed amendments which are as follows:

First, amend article one (1) by striking out the words "with a branch office in the city of Des Moines and state of Iowa, for the sale and transfer of stock," so that said amended article will read as follows: "The name of the corporation shall be 'The Iowa and New Mexico Mining and Milling Company' and its principal place of business shall be in the town of Nogal, in the county of Lincoln, territory of New Mexico."

Amend article two (2) by striking out the word "mineral" the 35th word in said article, also the 47th word "mineral." And after the following words, "telephone and telegraph" add the word "lines" and after the words "to plat and lay out town sites," insert the words "and to acquire and sell or lease real estate and property for that purpose," and at the end of said article strike out the words "done by a mining company" and add thereto after the word "usually," the words "incidental to such business," so that said article shall read as follows:

Article (3). "The general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation, shall be to acquire, own, buy, sell and lease mines and mining claims for the mining of gold, silver, copper and other ores, and to mine and reduce gold, silver, copper and other ores, taken from the claims and mines owned and operated by this corporation, and to mill quartz and to reduce ores, to use, and acquire tramways, roads, railroads, telephone and telegraph lines, waterways, and water power, in connection with the operation, of said mines, to plat and lay out town sites, and acquire and sell or lease, real estate and property for that purpose and to do and perform all such other acts as are usually incidental to such business."

Amend article VI (6) by striking out the words "and shall remain uncollected" and inserting the words "which may be sold by the directors to provide," and strike out the words "as such," and insert the words "by the treasury."

So that the first paragraph of said article shall read as follows:

The amount of capital stock authorized shall be one million dollars, to be divided into shares of one (\$1.00) dollar each, of which ten hundred thousand shares shall be set apart and held and known as treasury stock, which may be sold by the directors to provide a contingent fund for future use and shall not be voted while held by the treasury but when sold and entered upon the books of the corporation and cash paid into the company's treasury for them, the shares so sold shall have the same voting power as each and all

other shares have. (The balance of said section to remain as originally adopted.)

Amend article VIII (8) by striking out the words "the first Thursday in December" and inserting the words, "Tuesday following the first Thursday in October." So the amended article shall read as follows:

Article VIII (8). The general affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a board of directors, consisting of nine members, and shall be elected at the annual meeting of the stockholders on the first Thursday following the first Tuesday in October of every year. (The balance of said article to remain as previously adopted.)

Amend article XI (11) by striking out the word "personnel," the second word of said article and inserting the word "private" so that the article shall read as follows:

"The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall not be liable for corporate debts."

Amend Article XIII (13) by inserting after the first two words of said article, the words "except Art XI (11)" After the next word following strike out the word "changed" and insert the word "amended." After the next three words strike out the next sixteen words and at the end of said article strike out the word "by-laws in accord with the law" and in lieu thereof add the words "laws of New Mexico" so that said article XIII (13) shall read as follows:

"These articles, except article XI (11) may be amended at any time in the manner prescribed by the laws of New Mexico."

Amend said articles of corporation by adding thereto an additional article which shall be numbered XIV (14) and which shall read as follows:

"Article (XIV) The directors shall have the power to make by-laws for the corporation and to amend the same, when concerned in by a two thirds vote of all the directors, all directors having been previously notified."

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THE HAYES HOMESTEAD.

The President's Father Was Not Born in the Vermont House.

So much has been said and written concerning the historical Hayes homestead in West Brattleboro, which was built more than a hundred years ago and which has been credited, although erroneously, with being the birthplace of the father of President Hayes, that a brief mention of the old documents and other antiquities that are to be found there, relics of long past days, is needed to make the story complete. The old homestead was built about the year 1700 by Rutherford Hayes, grandfather of President Hayes, who came from New Haven, Conn., in 1778, and located in West Brattleboro in the house where Mrs. Myron Thurber now lives. It was first occupied as a private residence, but in 1790 it was converted into a tavern and became a favorite stopping place for statesmen, teamsters and others who felt, or imagined they felt, the need of invigoration by means of liquid refreshment. The bar-room was in the northeast corner of the tavern and the bar was next to the partition between the room and the hall, a hole being cut through the partition for the accommodation of teamsters, who could get their drinks without freezing out the bar-room loafers by opening the door and allowing the cold winter air to rush in.

The license to Rutherford Hayes "by the honorable county court to keep a tavern or house of public entertainment," issued in 1796 by Richard Whitney, clerk, is also in the possession of Mrs. Bigelow. But the oldest document of all is the deed of the land upon which the tavern was built from Israel Smith in 1763. Israel Smith was a lieutenant in the revolutionary war, and married a daughter of Rutherford Hayes. Another interesting document is that which gave Mr. Hayes the privilege to "shut up the road leading from his house by the pound to the village" on account of the turnpike road having been put in on the other side of the tavern, now the highway leading to Marlboro. This document was signed by Selectmen Walthill Cross, Jabez Wood and Joseph Clark. A certificate to keep a carriage, issued by G. Denison, collector for the second collection district of Vermont, as long ago as a carriage was an innovation and a luxury, is still well preserved, and shows that for the privilege of owning "a two-wheel carriage called a chaise and the harness used therefor," Mr. Hayes paid one dollar. "This certificate to be of no avail any longer than the aforesaid carriage shall be owned by the said R. Hayes."—Springfield (Mass.) Republican.

A Fatfish's Fish.
From the new woman's point of view the male catfish is a model for men. It takes sole care of its young after they are hatched, and may be seen surrounded by scores of its offspring, guarding them from the onslaughts of fish of prey. In an aquarium at the building of the fish commission in Washington a male catfish after the eggs were laid kept watch of them, not permitting the female to come near them. A catfish nest is made in a spot sheltered by aquatic plants, where there is no current. After the eggs have been laid the male hovers over them, and by continued rapid vibration of its fins drives fresh water into the nest keeping the eggs healthy. After a week the eggs hatch. A sea breed of catfish, however, which lays eggs of the size of small buckshot, keeps its eggs in its mouth until they are hatched, when the young fish are able to care for themselves. A species of fish found in the sea of Galilee also carry their eggs in their mouths.—N. Y. Sun.

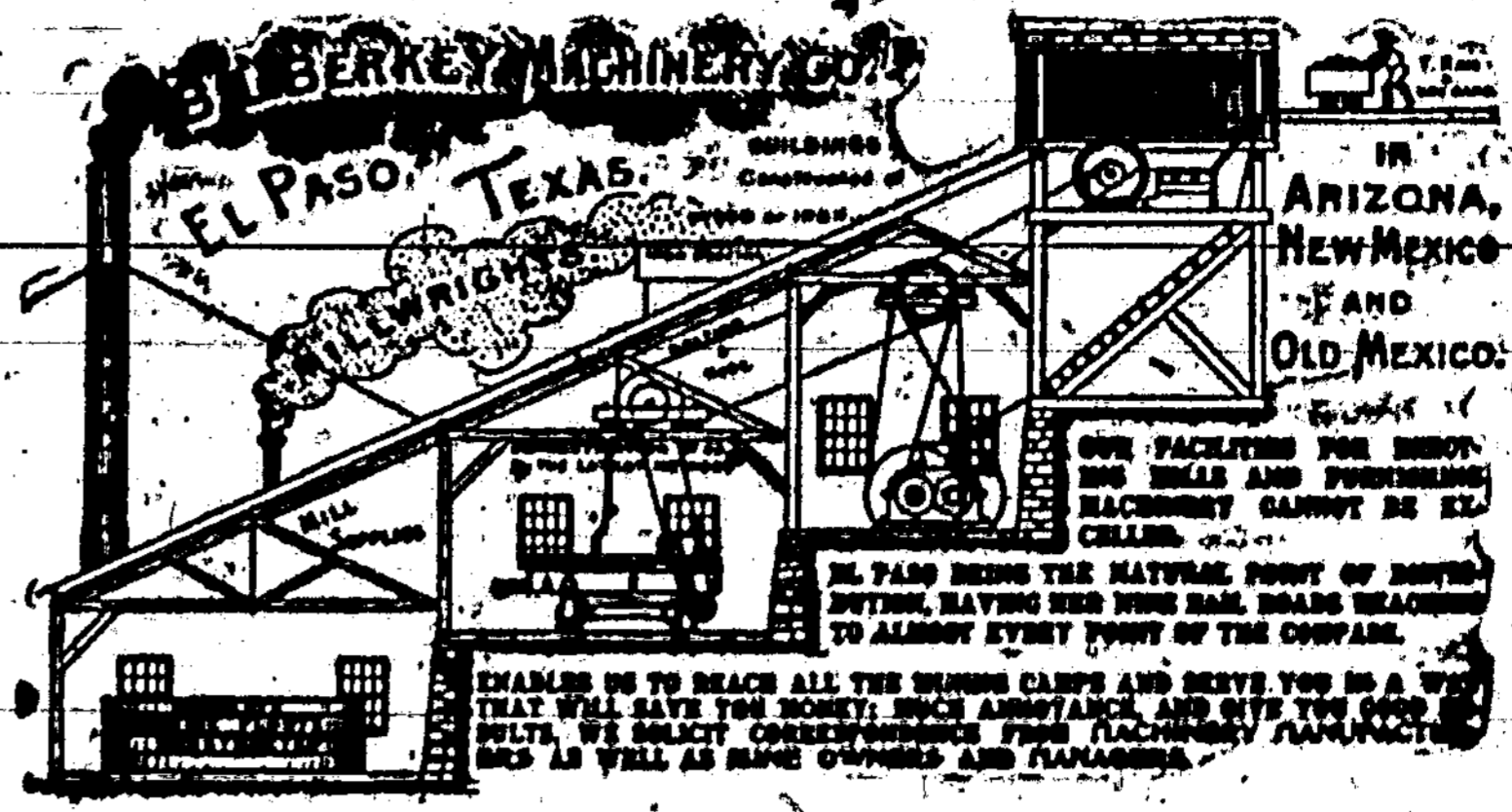

From Glencoe.

doubt Nogal has the bulge on all the other points but we want your readers to know that Glencoe is strictly "in it," this year in particular, not in a mining way, but as an agricultural and horticultural factor. Glencoe is the most important point in the Rio Doso valley; very nearly mid way between Rio Doso Post Office and Hondo, a distance of 25 miles. While all this valley is beautiful of course it tapers in importance both ways from Glencoe.

The worst thing this place has had to contend with is the bad condition of the wagon roads running into the valley from Capitan, Fort Stanton and other points. But most of our sleepy settlers have been aroused this year and a new wagon road running from Glencoe to Capitan via Fort Stanton Sanitarium has been prospected and will be built this year; which when completed will shorten the route to Capitan three or four miles besides it is proposed to build the new road on a solid foundation mostly graded with a width of twelve foot. This of course will be the greatest acquisition the valley could have now, when the hauling to market of the hay, grain and fruit here is taken into consideration. This year promises a much heavier crop than usual. Many young orchards doing their part this year.

While the dry hot weather of the past two weeks is telling on grass and outside vegetation every thing under ditch is looking fine.

We are having a splendid time rustivating and eating cherry pie at the Glencoe fruit farm. The dense shades with hammocks here and there, we find, are just the thing this hot weather. Cherries are now on the wane as we have had to fight the birds all the time for our share, but the Russian Mulberry has helped us in as much as the birds have fell back on them and left us in possession of the cherries. The orchards of the valley are going to bear a fairly good crop this year although the dreaded bale has already visited several good orchards and done a great deal of damage.

The young folks from Hondo and another lot from Angus stormed the Glencoe ranch Friday night unaware took possession of the school houses invited all our young folks to partake and proceeded to have a jolly dance which lasted until after midnight mixing cherries with the performance of intervale.
