Mining and Prospecting.

Mining Companies at Nogal.

At present there are a number of big mining companies with headquarters at Nogal, owning and operating Nogal mines. They are as follows:

The Eagle Mining and Improvement company, capital stock \$10,000,000, shares of the par value of \$1.00 each. Own over three hundred mining claims in the Nogal and Bonito districts, including the famous Parsons property.

The American Gold Mining company, capital stock \$5,000,000, shares, par value of \$1.00 each. Own twenty five claims in the Nogal mining district.

The Iowa and New Mexico Mining and Milling company, capital stock \$1,000,000, shares par value \$1.00 each. Own 29 mining claims in the Nogal and Bonito districts.

The Free Gold Mining and Milling company, capital stock, \$500,000, shares par value of \$1.00 each. Own nine claims in Nogal mining district.

The New Mexico Oil and Development company, capital stock \$300,000; shares of the par value of \$1.00 each. Own 27 mining claims in Nogal mining district, besides 2,000 acres of oil lands in Lincoln, Socorro, Guadalupe and Santa Fe counties.

The Sunflower Mining company a private corporation, owning a number of valuable mining claims in the Nogal mining district and several claims near Estay City in Socorro county.

The Church Mountain Mining company, not incorporated, own 27 mining claims in the Nogal mining district.

The Hellen Ras company, Dalph & Robertson, Scranton, Pa., own 47 mining claims Nogal mining district, for which they have refused a \$125,000 cash offer.

A new company is being organized by Chicago capitalists to work a group of fifteen mining claims at the head of Nogal canyon.

C. C. Bourne and three associates own a fine group of mining claims four miles south of Nogal which they are developing and expect to ship ore from them soon.

More Capitalists Here.

A party of prominent capitalists from the north arrived here Thursday over the Rook Island, and have been spending the week in looking over the country with a view of investing in mining property.

Among the party are, O. T. Olson, capitalist, Hersher, Ill; Dr. S. C. Sigler, Niles, Ohio; H. M. Olson, law student of the University of Minnesota, of Bellview, Minn; A. J. Skobbo, real estate, Madison, Minn; W. Dennis, principal Park Manor school, Chicago, Ill; P. W. Whalon, banker, Cabery, Ill; Chas. Ager, a prominent retired farmer, Kankakee, Ill; Samuel Taylor, merchant, Emington, Ill.

Everything is moving along nicely at the American mine, and the yellow metal is still showing up plentiful. Excavations are being made for more new machinery which has been ordered.

W. A. McIvers has been out to Flat Top Mountain this week looking after the oil drill. They expect to go to a depth of a thousand feet before striking oil. The indications are said to be excellent.

J. M. Rice, who has been in Chicago for the past week, will return home the latter part of this week.

National Irrigation Law.

The bill as passed creates a reclamation fund from the sale of public lands in Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington and Wyoming, less the amount paid to local officers and 5 per cent due the state under existing laws for educational purposes, the reclamation fund to be used for the construction and maintenance of irrigation works in the states and territories enumerated. Provision is made for the payment out of the treasury of any deficiencies in the allowance to agricultural colleges owing to this disposition of public lands. The secretary of the interior is

authorized to examine, survey and construct the irrigation works and report cost thereof to congress at each session.

Section 4 provides for the letting of contracts for the works contemplated in sections when the necessary funds are available in the reclamation funds of such sections.

Section 5 provides that "no right to use water for land in private ownership shall be sold for a tract exceeding 160 acres to any land owner unless he be an actual bonafide resident on such land or occupant thereof, residing in the neighborhood of said land."

Section 6 authorizes the secretary to use the reclamation fund for the operation and maintenance of irrigation work.

Section 7 requires state control over waters of non-navigable streams, such as are used in irrigation.

Nogal has the champion baseball team in southern New Mexico and will play any team in Lincoln or Otero counties for money, chalk or marbles.

Articles of Incorporation.

Territory of New Mexico.

Articles of Incorporation of the New Mexico Oil and Development Company.

Preamble.

We, whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together to form a corporation in accordance with and by virtue of the provisions of Chapter 1 and Title 5 of the Code, and all acts and laws amendatory thereto, and hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE I

Section 1. Name. The name of this corporation shall be the New Mexico Oil and Development Company.

Section 2. Place. The principal place of transacting the business of the company shall be at Nogal, New Mexico.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. Business. The object and purpose of this corporation shall be to purchase, sell, locate or lease oil and mineral lands in the territory of New Mexico, and to sink and operate oil wells, mine and develop mines and mineral deposits in said territory.

Section 2. This corporation shall have perpetual succession; may sue and be sued; shall have a common seal; may make contracts, acquire and transfer property, possessing the same powers in such respects as natural persons and shall have all the powers and privileges now or hereafter conferred upon such corporations.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. Capitalization. The capital stock of this Company shall be three hundred thousand (\$300,000) dollars, divided into three hundred thousand (300,000) shares of (\$1.00) dollar each.

One hundred thousand (100,000) shares of the capital stock

shall be divided equally among the original claim locators in lieu of the cost of location work paid by them. One hundred thousand (100,000) shares to be sold at twenty-five (25) cents per share, payable as follows.

One fourth [$\frac{1}{4}$] cash upon completion of organization and delivery of certificates of stock; one fourth [$\frac{1}{4}$] in thirty (30) days thereafter; and one fourth [$\frac{1}{4}$] in sixty (60) days thereafter, and one fourth [$\frac{1}{4}$] in ninety (90) days thereafter. The proceeds of such

subscriptions to be used for purchasing machinery, developing the property and paying expenses of same; but if the full one hundred thousand [100,000] shares are not required to meet above demands, the unsold shares shall revert to the treasury and become the property of the original locators. The remaining one hundred thousand [100,000] shares shall remain in the treasury subject to the control of the directors for sale, but if not required shall become the property of the original locators.

Section 11. Transfer of Stock. Shares of stock shall be transferable only upon the books of the corporation in compliance with the By Laws of same subject to the consent and approval of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Directors. The business of the company and the management of its affairs shall be controlled by a Board of Directors to be elected by the stockholders and to be composed of not less than five (5) nor more than seven (7) members, who shall hold their respective offices for a period of two (2) years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

The first Board of Directors shall be composed of the following persons, whose term shall expire at the regular annual meeting of the stockholders in January of each year set opposite their names and such other persons as the Board of Directors may elect, provided that the total number of directors at any time shall not exceed seven (7) in number. W. A. McIvers, Nogal, New Mexico, 1903. W. W. Woodard, Nogal, New Mexico, 1903. C. R. Martin Battle Creek, Mich., 1903. Sam'l Compton, Nogal, New Mexico, 1904. John A. McKay, Battle Creek, Mich., 1904. Allen Havens Bellevue, Mich., 1905. James A. Pierce, Battle Creek, Mich., 1905.

Section 2. Officers. The officers of this company shall be a president, a vice president, general

manager, a secretary, a treasurer, and such other officers as the Board of Managers may deem necessary.

Until the annual meeting of the stockholders in August 5th. 1902, the following persons shall constitute the officers of the company:

Charles R. Martin, President, H. A. Hodgman, Vice-President, W. W. Woodard, Secretary & Treasurer, W. A. McIvers, General Manager, H. B. Ferguson, Counsel.

Sec. 3. Eligibility & Vacancies.

No person shall be eligible to any position in this company as a director or an officer thereof who is not the owner and the holder of at least two thousand (2,000) shares of the capital stock.

The directors shall elect all of officers from the original locators, annually, at a meeting to be held by them immediately after the annual meeting of the stockholders.

Section 4. Powers. The board of directors shall have the power to adopt By-Laws, rules and regulations as they may deem expedient to promote the interests of the company and not inconsistent with these Articles.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The annual meeting of the stockholders for the election of directors and submission of reports of officers, and the transaction of such other business as may legally come before the stockholders, shall be held on the third Tuesday in January of each year, commencing in the year 1903.

Section 2. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the stockholders may be held by order of the Board of Directors at any time on ten (10) days' notice in writing mailed to the address of each stockholder as shown by the books of the company. Such notice shall state in a general way the nature of the business to be transacted at such special meetings.

Section 3. Representation. Each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock owned by him to be cast either in person or by written proxy.

ARTICLE VI.

Section 1. Commencement & Duration. This corporation shall commence as soon as the certificate of authority is issued, and shall endure for twenty (20) years.

ARTICLE VII.

Section 1. Indebtedness. This corporation shall incur no indebtedness without the consent of a majority of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Private Property.

The private property of the stockholders shall not be liable in any manner for any of the debts or liabilities of the corporation.

ARTICLE VIII.

Section 1. Amendments. These articles may be amended at any regular or special meeting of the stockholders by a vote of two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) of the capital stock.

COSTLY INSTRUMENTS.

Some of the Pieces for Band Use Are Very Expensive.

The writer was recently accorded the privilege of a peep into the museum attached to the factory of one of the largest firms of brass instrument makers in London. Here are to be seen types, fac-similes and models of every kind of musical instrument that the mind of man has ever devised, invented or produced, says a correspondent.

In the corner is a duplicate of what is believed to be the most costly presentation cornet ever produced. It was made to the order of the late czar of Russia, and is of sterling silver, richly graven with various devices, among which the arms of the imperial house of Romanoff figure conspicuously. The whole of the ornamentation is of beaten gold filigree work, and the "bell" of the instrument is thickly incrustated with rubies and emeralds. Its net value is a trifle over 2,000 guineas.

The private band of the Rao of Cutch cost originally £200, and renews most of the instruments every four or five years. The tiger skin used by the Rao's big drummer, which was sent over here to be prepared and mounted, was taken from an animal killed by his highness, and measured over seven feet in length. It is lined throughout with heavy corded crimson silk, and the brute's eyes are simulated by a pair of big yellow diamonds.

Another very fine band was made three years ago to the order of the late shah of Persia. All the instruments were of pure silver—which, by the way, does not give forth so good a sound as brass, besides being far heavier to handle—lined with gold. The total of this band de luxe was a trifle under 3,000 guineas. A very different kind of band was that made last year, by the same firm, for the Simkiah Indians, a tribe of savages living near Alert bay, in British Columbia. The band is nearly all drum, and the mouthpieces of the brass instruments are tipped with India rubber, to obviate the inconvenience of applying metal to the lips in a temperature of some 30 or 40 degrees below zero.

A curious order was received a short time ago from the emperor of Morocco. It was for 60 clarionets for one band. As the instruments in question were all in one key, it is probable that they were to be played in unison. The effect upon an average man of 80 band clarionets blown simultaneously would be to create in him a wild desire to take to the woods and become an aborigine. Even to imagine such an ear-piercing combination sets one's tympanum quivering.—London Answers.

A Waste of Money.

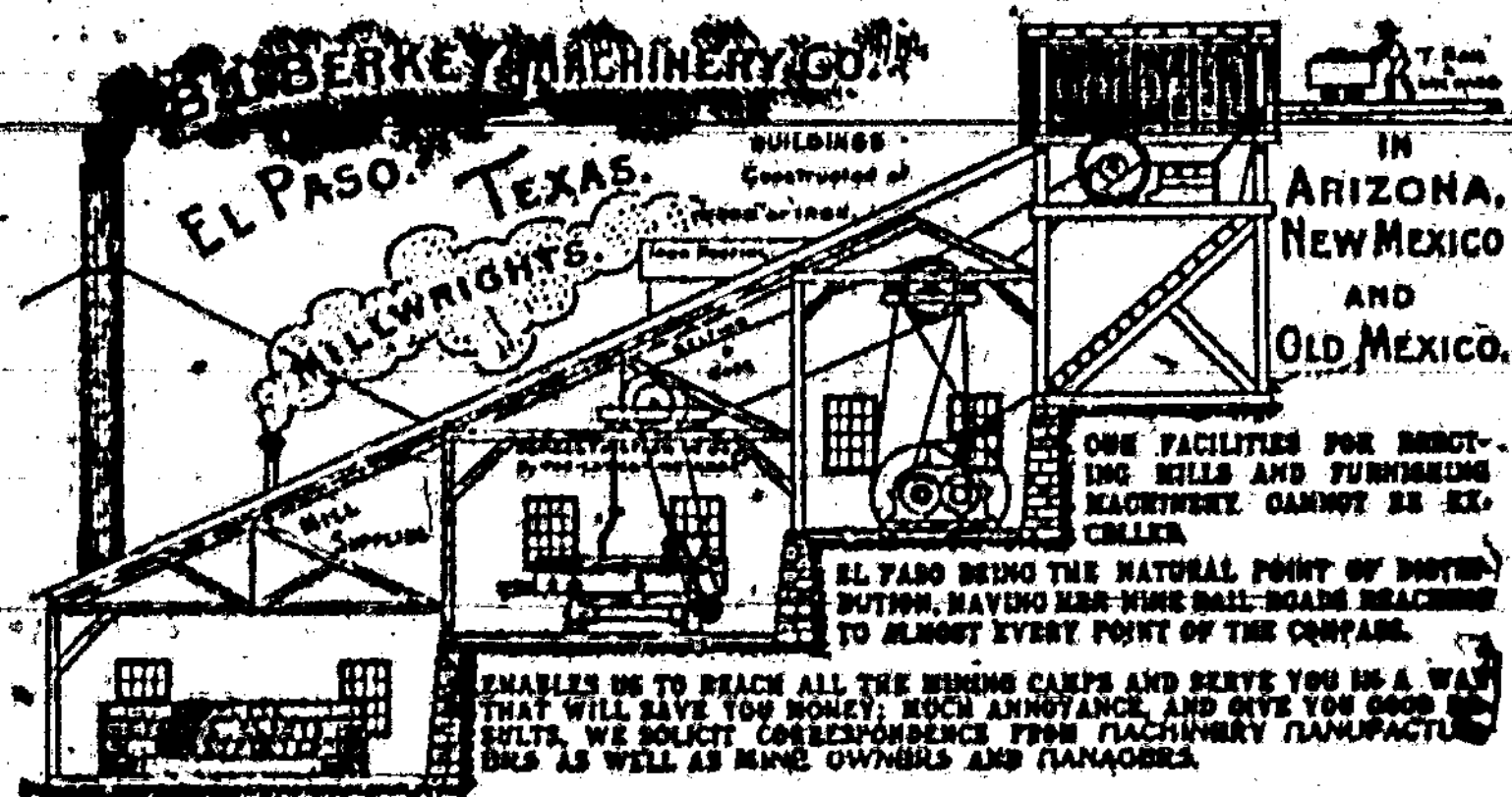
"I don't think very much of him," said the girl in blue.
