## Mining and Prospecting.

Last week we mentioned the sale of the Helen Rae mining property. The mine has been sold and the title passes to the American Gold Mining company.

In the future the Helen Rae property will be worked in connection with the American, all being placed under the management of J. M. Rice, with M. D. Gaylord as superintendent. The plants for the treatment of the ores from all will be consolidated and Nogal can soon boast of the largest stamp and cyanide plant in all the southwest, and the mines are to be worked on an extensive plan, giving employment to hundreds of men.

A short history of the Helen Rae mine will not come amiss here.

The Helen Rae mine was first discovered and located in the fall of 1861 by Peter Murphy and Wm. Steiner. These men did but little work on the property and in 1866 sold it to Wm. Rae for the sum of two hundred dollars. Rae worked the claim in a small scale, taking out over \$5,000 in gold nuggets from a 14 foot assessment hole on the cross cut. He sold the property the next year after purchasing it to Rolla Wells of St. Louis, Mo., for \$12,500.

Under the Wells administration the mine was worked on a small scale, and was looted of thousands of dollars.

In 1896 Wells sold the property to Dolph & Robertson, who strange to say, employed the same management to work the mine, that had so disgracefully managed it for Wells. The results was the same and the mine was shut down until about one year ago when development work was resumed on the property.

The Helen Rae group of mines consists of 47 mining claims, 42 of which are held under U. S. patents. The property adjoins the Nogal townsite and extends up Dry Gulch, laying between the town and the American mine. The deepest shaft on any of the property is down only 156 feet, yet there are thousands of dollars

of gold in sight, to say nothing of the acres of rich placer dirt that lays in the small canyons below the mine.

Capt. J. H. Bishop has had his splendid mining property in Nogal canyon surveyed and in doing development work has encountered a rich ore body about 200 feet from the mouth of the tunnel on the Nogal Queen.

Among the many big mining companies that are preparing to work Nogal mines on a large scale is the Iowa and New Mexico M. & M. company who own 29 claims at Turkey Creek and Sheelerville. This company have plenty of money to work with and have some of the best properties in the district. It is under the control and management of good men who exercise care and prudence in the affairs of the company and there is but little room left to doubt its success.

There seems to be a great deal of money being invested in the mines of the Nogal district, to judge from the various large companies being organized for operation around there. It has been fully demonstrated that all of that country is thoroughly mineralized, and that some of it abounds in a very high grade ore. The Record hopes to see the Nogal district prove to be one of the most successful and flourishing in the Southwest.—El Paso Industrial Record.

Prof. B. H. Dye, of White Oaks, has been in the city for a week or two. He has been to St. Louis where the Rita Consolidated Gold Mining company was organized, of which John W. Harrison is president, B. H. Dye vice president and C. K. Hohlitzell is secretary. Organization is under New Mexico laws. The company will work the Rita, Lady Godiva, Little Nell, Solitare and Large Hopes, all of White Oaks, and free gold mines. The company is now considering the kind of plant to be erected, which may be concentration and cyaniding. Operations are expected to begin some time this fall.—Industrial Record.

The Eagle Mining and Improvement company have purchased the Old Abe gold mine and the Old Abe coal mines at White Oaks. Now we may expect to see a large electric plant put in at White Oaks for the transmission of power to all the company's mines in the Nogal district.

The New Mexico Oil and Development company have received their big drilling outfit and are now moving it to Flat Top mountain thirty miles northwest of Nogal where they are prospecting for oil. The drill is equipped for going 3,000 feet and general manager McIvers says the prospects for striking oil at a depth of 1,000 or 1,500 feet are most excellent.

Reports from Estay City are to the effect that owing to the scarcity of water the work will shut down for an indefinite period on August 1st. The supply of water is obtained from Moonshine spring, which is less than 3,000 gallons in twenty-four hours, far less than what is required for the use of the boilers alone. Here is a case of bad mismanagement. Nearly \$300,000 was expended for machinery and establishment of a lixivating plant before water was secured. After prospecting for water for nearly one year, the plant must be abandoned, and Estay City must stand as an evidence of what men with more money than sense can do. Estay City is located 15 miles west from Oscura station on the Rock Island.

### Indiana Capitalists.

A jolly party of Indiana capitalists arrived here over the Rock Island Friday morning accompanied by J. M. Rice of the Eagle and American Mining companies. The party consists of, Clem W. Studebaker Wm. and F. W. Teopp of South Bend, Ind. Rudolph Kama Mishwaukee Ind. E. M. Albright, C. A. Davis Geo. Lint and Daniel Anderson of Goshen Ind., all stockholders in the Eagle Mining and Improvement company and the American Gold Mining company of Nogal.

After a careful investigation of the property mentioned the party left for home last night highly satisfied with their visit. Messrs Studebaker and Albright remarked that the property was much better than it had been represented to them and they considered Capt. Lloyd's report far too conservative.

Several of the party were so enthusiastic as to express the prediction that Nogal would be a second Cripple Creek soon.

Before leaving for home the party visited the Old Abe gold and coal mines at White Oaks in which they are interested.

If the Nogal mining district was in Colorado, men would go wild and newspapers never would quit booming it.

The largest mining deal ever made in New Mexico was made in Chicago last week in the purchase of Lincoln county mining property whereby the American Gold mining company and the Eagle Mining & Improvement company purchased the Helen Rae and Old Abe gold mines.

Things are lively around the American mine. There is about 125 men on the pay roll. Men are busy working roads, carpenters are building houses, and general activity is visible on all sides. Freight teams are being secured to haul ore from the Cashier and Clipper. There is now over 300 tons of rich ore on the Clipper dump. A big force of men in charge of Rich Hunt were put to work on the Helen Rae Monday morning getting things in readiness to start up that promising property.

J. M. Rice returned from Chicago last Saturday accompanied by eight capitalists from South Bend, Ind., who are stockholders in the Eagle Mining company.

Indians from the Apache reservation are a source of great annoyance to the stockmen near Ruidoso. The Ruidoso correspondent of the White Oaks Eagle says: "They raid the settlements at night and drive stock onto the reservation then take them to the agency, where the Indian agent allows them a dollar a head for getting them. The agent being willing to believe them found inside the reservation boundaries. This practice has reached a point where it is working a hardship on our people and should the agent fail to try to remedy the matter it must sooner or later result in serious trouble with the Indians."


