Mining and Prospecting.

The Rico Mining and Milling Company.

Articles of incorporation of the Rico Mining and Milling Company will be filed with the Territorial secretary at Santa Fe this week. The incorporators are Geo. W. Harbin, W. A. McIvers, Jones Tulliafero, John H. Canning and Geo. Sligh, offices at Nogal, New Mexico. The capital stock of the company is placed at \$600,000 divided into shares of \$1.00.

The company owns 360 acres of rich placer lands in the Jicarilla mining district Lincoln county. They will put in machinery to work the property at once. The machinery will be of the same kind used by the Free Gold company here, which is the new Johnson Jigs.

The Jicarrilla placers have been worked for gold for years. It is believed by many that here is where the people of Gran Quivira secured their gold of which there are so many traditions. In the '80s Hon. F. M. Manzanera of Las Vegas, N. M., constructed a temporary reservoir to catch the flood waters in one of the canons of the Jicarrilla mountains and in one season took out over \$50,000 in gold. It has been the custom since the settlement of New Mexico for a large number of Mexicans to flock into the Jicarrilla mountains as soon as the rainy season begins to wash out gold with the pan.

All the men connected with the Rico company are experienced mining men and are well acquainted with the conditions there and being conservative we predict that they will make a success in the venture.

It should be remembered that the Jicarrilla mountains and the Jicarrilla mountains are not the same. The Jicarrillas are located in north west Lincoln county and the Jicarrillas in southwest Otero county.

G. W. Underwood, Martin May, Henry Emerson and Abe May, owners of the Big Four mine west of town are making arrangements to run a fifty foot cross cut in the shaft of this promising property. The ore from the Big Four assay well and there is a large body of it.

As a result of the sale of the Old Abe and South Homestake mines at White Oaks, that place is taking on a new lease of life.

J. O. McCoy brought in from Water Canon, Tuesday, some ore that runs fifty per cent. copper, besides a large per cent. of lead and several ounces of silver.

Said a well informed mining man to us the other day: "I do not intend to say what was paid for the American and Helen Rae mining property but it is my firm belief that there is now sufficient gold ore in sight in the two mines to pay every cent of their cost."

Among the valuable mining property acquired by the American Gold Mining company in the purchase of the Helen Rae property, are a number of rich placer claims in Dry Gulch. Nuggets of gold weighing more than one ounce have been taken out a short distance above town.

Judge McMillan has finally dismissed the famous suit of Wm. Watson of White Oaks vs. Bolla Wells, the Worlds fair mayor of St. Louis. The suit was instituted ten years ago for the possession of a valuable interest in the promising Helen Rae mining property at Nogal. It was originally decided in favor of the plaintiff, but after being fought bitterly ever since, the defendant has won a decisive victory.

The American Gold Mine is a record breaker. Notwithstanding the mine has been working less than four months local stockholders were paid a dividend of one cent a share on August 1. This, too, in the face of the fact that the company have been at a heavy expense opening up the mine, building roads, putting in machinery, etc. There is no mine in the southwest that can make such a showing.

We have it from a very reliable source that one of the richest gold deposits ever found in the Nogal district has been discovered in the past month and as soon as the property is secured there will be another big excitement. The find is located in a new locality and is about four miles from Nogal. The ore body is said to be over 300 feet wide and runs into hundreds of dollars per ton.

Important Mining Deal.

A mining deal of great importance, not only to the parties interested but also to the people of Lincoln county was closed here on Tuesday last, when the Gallinas Mining and Smelting Company leased to W. A. McIvers & Co., of Nogal, the south half of its Red Cloud and Deadwood mining lode claims up in the Gallinas mountains.

The term of the lease is for eighteen months. Active operations are to commence within thirty days from date, and Mr. McIvers will spend many thousands of dollars in the further development of the property.

Judge H. C. McDougal of Kansas City, the president of the G. M. & S. Co. came to this Territory first in 1881, when the Red Cloud and Deadwood claims were mere prospect holes, was one of the original incorporators of the company, and has since then been here often looking after the interests of his company. He returned here some months since clothed with authority to sell, lease or operate these properties, in the development of which his company spent about \$35,000 in 1881 and 1882, and after negotiating with various parties finally concluded it was best to lease. Then he called for James P. Carnes of Trenton, Mo. and Claude N. Comstock of Albany, Mo., to come to White Oaks for consultation with himself and John Y. Hewitt and Joseph E. Spence, all directors of the company. They all met here on Tuesday and the result was as above stated.

The Red Cloud and Deadwood have long been known to be by far the most valuable mines in the Gallinas, and they are only six miles from the line of the new Rock Island railroad, there is no reason to doubt that their ores may be mined, shipped and smelted at a handsome profit.—White Oaks Eagle.

New stamps are being put in at the American. Sixty stamps will soon be pounding away day and night on American and Helen Rae ore, pounding out gold at a rapid rate.

The Democratic county convention to nominate candidates for the various county offices, will meet at Lincoln August 16. There is a lively contest for the empty honor of being nominated for sheriff.

There is a bitter fight on in the Democratic party of this county for the nomination for sheriff. The contest is between John W. Owens of White Oaks and J. W. Whitesides of Capitan. While most of the delegates have been chosen it is so close that a change of a few votes in the convention may turn the tide.

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
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
