## Mining and Prospecting.

### Lincoln County

Lincoln county's emancipation from the throes of obscurity is a fact. "The Gem of New Mexico" no longer in the swaddling clothes of infancy, shakes the shackles off its too long slumbers and steps forth into the rank of progress, a mighty giant and a blazing star in the territory's galaxy of counties.

To those, who during the long apathy of the past have had the courage of their convictions, who, in spite of local envies and petty prejudices of the unbelieving, have proudly and honestly painted glowing word pictures of Lincoln county's fame, we say to you, brave souls, your labors were not in vain. A victory of mind over matter is surely yours. Nogal and Lincoln county is being talked of abroad more than ever before.

The rapid influx of capital into our country means that the general public, ever ready to applaud or hiss, to laugh or cry, to work or play are beginning to find out that away down on the southern border of the United States there is a county as large as a New England state, containing a population of less than 10,000 people, a mighty empire within itself, nature's storehouse, a land teeming with God's most substantial gifts to man.

Lincoln county with its silent and lofty sentinels, filled with the precious metals, its prolific soil, thousands of acres of commercial timber, its coals, slaines and millions of acres of rich grazing lands and last but not least, its perfect, healthful climate. These are a part of the assets of Lincoln county that its offers capital as security for money to develop its tremendous resources. And now that the moving tide of a general development is flowing in bearing on its broad expanse the diversified cargoes that lay the corner stone and establish the mile post of the richest section of the southwest. The time has come to Lincoln county to unfurl her banner and nail it to the mainmast so that the mighty searchlight of commerce will illuminate it to guide the processions of humans that are coming.

Lincoln county is today the seat of more precious metals, such as gold, silver, copper, lead,

etc., than any like era in the southwest. The American, Helen Rea, Parsons, Vera Cruz and like discoveries--which are wonderful--are but the beginning of a mighty development that will increase year by year. Nogal, Parsons, White Oaks and other Lincoln county enterprises will establish payrolls that will mean a solid prosperity that will gladden the workers heart and enable them to solve life's problem, it will be honest money, taken from Nature's storehouse and therefore clean.

This whole country is now prosperous and there should be a dearth of hardluckers, croakers and such, but there are straglers in all processions.

Lincoln county has other resources besides that of mining. Our climate is incomparable. Our agricultural, horticulture and timber resources are great. All of these combined form the nucleus for a mighty empire within itself.

### Does Mining Pay?

Some people contend that it does not pay to bother with mining and that mining propositions should be turned down. A few years ago stock in the famous Homestake mine, Deadwood, So. Dakota, could be bought at a low price. Look at it today. The largest stockholder in the Homestake mine is Mrs. Phoebe A. Hearst, of California, mother of the proprietor of the New York Journal, Chicago American and San Francisco Examiner. To the close of 1900 this great gold mine had produced over \$65,000,000 worth of ore. It is now mining about 2,500,000 per annum. Average value saved is \$4.11 per ton; net profit, \$1.41. The company works 900 stamps, each crushing three and a half tons every twenty four hours. For fine saving it has a 1,200 ton cyanide plant. This saving amounts to \$1 per ton. Twenty-four hundred men are employed, the miners receive \$3.50 per day of ten hours. In 1900 the company expended \$1,250,000 on improvements upon its mines mills. Yet it is regularly paying dividends at the rate of 50 cents per share per month. Its capitalization is \$22,000,000.

### The Cyanide Treatment of Ores.

During the past few months great changes have been inaugurated in the treatment of low grade ores, and it has successfully been demonstrated that ores which formerly were considered practically of no market value can really be treated at a big profit by the cyanide process. Another plan which is being adopted is to send all grades to the mills and ship the concentrates. By this method it is claimed that a satisfactory saving can be made over the smelter charges. By the old method, which is chiefly still in vogue, the high grade ore is sorted out and shipped to the smelter, and the low grade is either thrown aside on the dumps or reserved for future treatment. It is maintained that by the new system that at least 85 per cent of the metal values are saved.

The plan of not sorting the output of the mines is being carried out with flattering results by the Black Eagle Mining company, operating on Chicago creek, Colorado, and other companies in that district. They also use the cyanide process.

The most extensively operated gold and silver mines in New Zealand are the Waihi, owned by a London company. This company is said to furnish a striking example of the enormous profits that can be realized from the proper treatment of low grade ores. The Waihi company treated last year 230,910 tons of ore.

The average extraction, according to assay, was 84.3 per cent of the gold and 59 per cent of the silver equivalent to 81.3 per cent of the total value. The total return was equivalent to \$14.13 per ton and the costs to \$7.07 showing a net return of \$7.06 per ton.

The management of the company does not allow any of the ore to be sorted but it is treated just as it comes from the mines.

A prominent mining man of Colorado in speaking of the treatment of low grade ore by the cyanide process says:

While the cyanide adjunct is not a panacea for all the drawbacks attending extraction, it is nevertheless a very useful factor in many cases. I do not know whether the Waihi company of New Zealand uses it, but take it

for granted that it also serves a good purpose there. Those who are thoroughly familiar with this method assert without any qualification whatever, that it is the only cheap and efficient way to handle the low grade ores. They are beginning to advocate it for the gold belt of Leadville district. The difficulty is that no one will take the lead. But a very simple solution would be to send say half a dozen tons of the low grades to the testing works at some city and have them tested by the cyanide plan. It would cost but a trifle and the whole question of adaptability could be settled in a weeks time. If cyanide will work the gold belt ores it would be worth a lot of money to the owners of claims. The waste of ore is prodigious, due largely to steadfast adherence to old methods and the refusal to trying anything new. If it were necessary to expend a large sum in the erection of an experiment mill it would be a different matter, but where all sorts of practicable methods are embraced in one testing mill, where problems can be worked out in a few days at a trifling cost, there is no reasonable excuse for not using them."

Will Lykke and T. B. Wisdom both Chicago capitalists, were here the past week looking over the property of the Eagle and American Mining Companies.

The Iowa and New Mexico Mining and Milling company are making the necessary arrangements to start work on their property at Turkey Creek and Scheelville. General manager White will arrive here soon from Iowa and assisted by superintendent Doak, will push work.

J. H. Collard a mining man and capitalist from Cleburne, Texas, left this morning for Oaxaca, Mexico. He had just returned from the White Oaks district, where he is interested in mining ventures. He stated that on last Thursday before leaving White Oaks he completed a deal by which he sold to his partner A. R. Byrd a controlling interest in the Crow groups of mining claims. Mr. Collard intimated that the price paid was a trifle over \$100,000. Mr. Collard says that the new owner intends to do some extensive development work and has arranged for the purchase of a concentrating plant with a capacity of 100 tons a day.—El Paso News.

If Mr. Rodey is not returned as New Mexico's representative in congress such ungrateful acts on the part of the people would sound the death knell of statehood. Mr. Rodey should be returned to congress without a dissenting vote. The people of New Mexico should lay aside party and stand ready to reward an honest representative who has done so much for them. Mr. Rodey's energy, vim, vigor, and honest toil should be rewarded by a grateful people. If by chance, Mr. Rodey should be turned down by the Raton convention on October 10, it will be the work of a few selfish politicians and we here sound the warning—Beware! lest the people arise in their might at the polls and rebuke the Judases who thus betray them. The people want Hon. B. S. Rodey returned to Congress, and they want statehood—heed the demand.

**Small Coins.**

The United States treasury during the fiscal year which has just ended manufactured 70,611,143 cents and 26,480,214 nickles. Massachusetts took 5,000,000 cents, Pennsylvania 4,000,000, Illinois 7,000,000 and New York state nearly 10,000,000, says the National Banker. These are the great cent-using states and stand in the same order as to consumption of nickels. Ten years ago pennies were little used in California and the South, and were unknown things in Nevada, Wyoming and Arizona. Up to date Uncle Sam has turned out 1,000,000,000 cents, 340,000,000 nickels 100,000,000 dimes, 300,000,000 quarters and 150,000,000 half dollars.

Somewhere in the world are 119,000,000 big copper pennies.

What has become of them is a mystery, for, barring a few in the hands of collectors, they have disappeared, no one knows where. Many years ago the government issued 4,500,000 bronze two-cent pieces, and of those over 3,000,000 are still outstanding. The same is true of the nickel three-cent pieces, of which nearly 3,000,000 are unaccounted for. Slot machines have greatly increased the demand for coppers and so also have the penny newspapers and the odd prices made popular in dry goods shops.

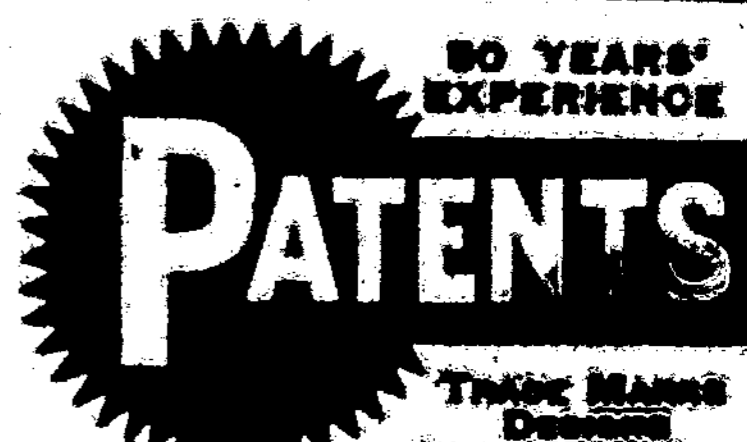

## Articles of Incorporation, Rico Mining and Milling Company

KNOW ALL MEN by these presents that we, the undersigned citizens of the United States desiring to form a corporation for pecuniary profit under the laws of the territory of New Mexico do hereby enter into and adopt for ourselves our associates and our successors, the following articles of incorporation.

### ARTICLE I

The name of the corporation shall be **RICO MINING & MILLING CO.**, and its principal place of business shall be in the town of Nogal, in the County of Lincoln territory of New Mexico with a branch office in such other place or places as the Board of Directors shall determine.

### ARTICLE II

The general nature of the business of the corporation shall be to acquire, own, buy, sell and lease mines, petroleum and natural gas claims and properties and the mining of gold, silver, copper and other ores, also coal and the development and operation of petroleum and natural gas wells from and on the property or claims owned or leased by this corporation; and to separate and reduce ores and metals, mill quartz to acquire and use tramways, roads, railroads, telephone and telegraph lines, water power and water ways in connection with the operation of said mines, claims and properties, and to do and perform all other acts incident to a mining and development company as herein provided.

### ARTICLE III

This corporation shall commence business on the fifteenth day of August 1902, continue fifty years from said date unless sooner dissolved in manner provided by law.

### ARTICLE IV

This corporation may make and enforce contracts, acquire sell and transfer property possessing the same powers in such respects as private persons may sue and be sued in its corporate name; may have a common seal; the interests of its stockholders transferable may adopt by laws and rules for its government and choose such officers and agents as shall seem proper and clothe them with all power and authority in accord with law and these articles and perform any and all acts necessary to carry out the purpose of its organization.

### ARTICLE V

The capital stock of the corporation shall be six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000) divided into shares of one dollar (\$1) each.

One hundred thousand shares of the capital stock shall be set aside and held and known as treasury stock and remain unsold as a contingent fund for further use until its sale is authorized by a majority vote of the capital stock actually issued and shall have no voting power until sold and entered upon the books of the corporation and cash paid into the company's treasury therefor when it shall have the same voting right and power as each and all other shares have.

Two hundred and fifty thousand shares of the capital stock shall be set aside and held and known as treasury stock; such part or all of said stock to be sold in such amount and at such price, to be used in the development of claims and property and such other business of the corporation as these articles provide and the Board of Directors determine.

Two hundred and fifty thousand shares of the capital stock shall be issued in consideration of a due and proper

deed under the laws of New Mexico and the mining laws of the United States to the following mining claims and properties situated in the Jicarilla Mining District in the county of Lincoln, territory of New Mexico known and designated by the following names to-wit Black Hat; Brooklyn; Chicopee; Saint Patrick; G. A. R.; Buckeye, Chiffon; Durham; Gold Bed; Snow Flake; Gold Queen; Gold King; Gold King No. 2; Excell; Gold Crown and Gold Bar.

The aforesaid mining claims and properties to be taken by this corporation at the face value of two hundred and fifty thousand shares of its capital stock, and to be received and accepted by this corporation in full payment for said stock and said stock when so issued shall be fully paid and forever treated and considered as non-assessable; and it shall be conclusively presumed as against all persons dealing with this corporation, whether creditors, stockholders, or others that the amount paid for said mining claims and properties, was at date of said location and purchase the value of the same; and all persons shall be forever barred and estopped from setting up any proceeding at law or equity that the said stock is not fully paid up.

### ARTICLE VI

The capital stock of this corporation shall be non-assessable, the law and court decisions, if any there be, to the contrary notwithstanding and all of said stock then issued and paid for at the price agreed upon, shall be fully paid and forever non-assessable; and it shall be conclusively presumed as against all persons dealing with this corporation, whether creditors, stockholder or others, that the amount paid for its capital stock and accepted by the corporation, was at the date of purchase and payment, the value of the same, and all persons shall be forever barred and stopped from setting up any proceeding at law or equity, that the said stock is not fully paid up.

### ARTICLE VII

The business and affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors, consisting of five or more, not exceeding nine stockholders of the corporation, who shall be elected at the annual meeting of the stockholders on the 4th Wednesday of September every year, except in case of a vacancy in said Board, or the maximum number provided be not elected, the Board of Directors may fill such vacancy, or deeming it for the best interest of the corporation, may elect additional directors up to the said maximum number to serve until the next annual meeting.

The officers shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and general manager. These officers shall be elected by the newly elected directors, at or about the time of the annual meeting of stock

holders, except to fill a vacancy, and their duties shall be such as are usual to such officers or as the by-laws prescribe or as the Board of Directors require.

Until their successors are properly elected and qualified, the Board of Directors and officers shall be as follows.

Directors; Geo. W. Harbin, Waterloo, Iowa. W. A. McIvers of Nogal N. M. Jones Taliaferro of White Oaks, N. M. Geo. E. Sligh of Nogal N. M. and W. R. Scott of Burlington, Iowa.

Officers: Geo. W. Harbin, President; W. A. McIvers, Vice President, John H. Canning Secretary, Jones Taliaferro, Treasurer, Geo. E. Sligh, General manager.

**ARTICLE VIII**

The highest amount of indebtedness for liability, to which this corporation shall at any time be subject shall not exceed one third of its capital stock credited upon its books. In no event shall it exceed the limit prescribed by the laws of New Mexico for like corporations.

**ARTICLE IX.**

All encumbrances or conveyances of real or personal property, shall be in the name of the corporation, by its President and Secretary on order of the Board of Directors. No indebtedness shall be contracted by the corporation or held as binding against it, except the same is authorized by the Board of Directors.

**ARTICLE X.**

The private property of every character of the stockholders shall not be liable for corporate debts or liabilities.

**ARTICLE XI.**

These articles may be altered or amended, except Article X (10) at any annual meeting of the stockholders by a majority vote of the capital stock issued or credited on the books of the corporation or by such vote at a special stockholder's meeting called for that purpose, thirty days written notice in advance of such meeting and its purpose having been given to each stockholder by the secretary addressed to the last recorded address of said stockholder.
