Mining and Prospecting.

Eastern Capitalists Examine Lincoln County Mines.

On Monday morning a private car was side tracked at Carrizozo containing a large party of stockholders of the American Gold Mining company and the Eagle Mining and Improvement company, in charge of R. C. Sturgen, the vice president and treasurer of the American company.

The party comprises—Messrs. W. G. Glenn and M. K. Sheridan of the Union stock yards, Chicago; Dr. D. A. Kenedy, dentist, Chicago; J. B. Burkey, secretary of the Schriver Laundry company; M. E. Randolph, cashier of the Penn. Mutual Life Insurance Co; Ben P. Branham, of the Courier Journal Publishing company, Chicago; Dr. A. W. Pounder, Elkhart, Indiana; L. S. Frank, Elkhart, Indiana; W. Osgood, Orton, South Bend, Indiana; James S. Dodge, Jr. of the firm of Dodge & Dodge, attorneys at law, Elkhart Ind; E. G. Richards, Elkhart, Ind.

The party is here on a tour of inspection of the properties of the two companies and will remain a few days, going from here to El Paso and thence returning home.

The party is at present in charge of R. C. Sturgeon, A. T. Anderson and J. M. Rice of the American and Eagle mining companies.

A party of the jolliest fellows that ever came to New Mexico arrived in Nogal today and are in charge of W. W. Woodard, secretary and treasurer, and W. A. McIvers general manager of the New Mexico Oil and Development company. The party comprises Chas. R. Martin and J. McKay, Battle Creek Mich.; A. F. Fielder and H. A. Hodgman of Beelvin, Mich. and Fred Mills, attorney at law, Kalamazoo, Mich. This party will remain for several days looking over the property of the company.

G. W. Harbin, president of the Free Gold Mining Company left for Carrizozo last night to meet a party of eastern capitalists who are interested with him in the properties of this company. The party is composed of Mr. Finley, La Grange, Mo; Linnet, Carr, Sturhan and Hoffman of Quincy Ill.; W. R. Scott, D. H. Scott, Burlington, Iowa; C. W. Harbin and P. M. Shoemaker, Waterloo, Iowa.

The party will remain here for several days looking over the Vera Cruz placers and properties in the Sierrilla mountains.

H. L. Anderson, the efficient book keeper for the American Gold mining company returned Friday from a trip to his old home at Herscher, Ill.

Chas. R. Segil has a force of men at work on the Philadelphia group, west of town and adjoining the Helen Rea property on the north.

Phingsten brothers have just delivered 68,000 pounds of freight to the New Mexico Oil and Development company and are now busy hauling machinery to the American and Helen Rea.

M. McReynolds, the veteran livery man of Carrizozo, meets every train in person and stands ready to convey passengers to any point in Lincoln Co. He intends making extended improvements to his barns, teams, etc.

A crowd of 15 stockholders in the New Mexico Oil and Development Co., will be here from the East this week and if our friends McIvers and Woodard cannot entertain them properly then no two persons can and we are satisfied that when the party returns home the members of same will have a true idea of what this section of New Mexico is.

Prof F. A. Jones of the U. S. geological survey writes from the Oscura mountains of the immense deposit of hematite ore, which runs 68 per cent pure iron. Prof. Jones declares there is not such another body of ore west of the Mississippi, and he expects great things to follow. The gentleman says the stock ranges of the country are in excellent condition.

W. W. Woodard, secretary and treasurer of the New Mexico Oil and Development Co., was in town a few hours last Sunday and reported that the Mammoth derrick his company is erecting at the head of the Mal Pais is well under way with James Woodland as chief architect, some of the finest carpenter work ever done in this section is seen on this job, and when the work is completed it will be the admiration of all who look at it. This company is expending between \$10,000 and \$12,000 on its property and if the large well that is being drilled proves as good as the first it will be worth a fortune to the lucky stockholders of the corporation.

Wonders of Lincoln County.

Undoubtedly Lincoln county possesses more curiosities than any county in the southwest and if once explored by seekers of same would cause an excitement and curiosity rarely known. For instance there is the Mal Pais, signifying in English, Bad Land. It is composed of lava rock running a distance of some 60 miles with a width of from 3 to 5 miles. The lava is from 8 feet to 50 feet elevation and the old crater is still in evidence standing about 150 feet high above the surrounding country. The eruption of this crater is supposed to have occurred about the year 1550. It is a sight worth travelling a long way to see. Then there is the old buried town of Gran Quivira a few miles north of the Mal Pais, which from the most authentic accounts was a town of about 3000 population and the old bell found by excavation bears date of 1550 and is made of gold, silver and brass and now rests in a curio shop at Scorro. Then there is the grand cave at Fort Stanton, which in many respects surpasses the wonders of the famous mammoth cave in Kentucky. It has been traversed about four miles and is from 25 to 200 feet wide, and the general supposition is that the cave was once the bed of an ancient river whose waters were turned from their true course at the time of the burning of the Mal Pais nearly 400 years ago. Then there is the Old Abe mine at White Oaks and Cariza mountain the oldest mountain in America, and many other interesting sights. On the other hand Lincoln county is recognized as containing the greatest quantity of mineral of any county in the territory. An invitation is cordially extended to all the North and East to visit us and see for themselves.

Recent assay of ore from around the White Mts. shows \$14.50 gold and 50cts silver to the ton and the cost of mining and treatment not exceeding 85 cts per ton. Why is this not a good thing?

The improvements going on at the American mine will soon make that property one of the most desirable mining propositions in the southwest, and it will pay larger dividends than the great majority of the Colorado properties.

Eidson and Wallace to manage the affairs we hope to see the schools of Capitan placed under the principalship of some one who is competent to bring them up to a higher standard and the place become noted as a seat of learning as it justly deserves.

Articles of Incorporation, Rico Mining and Milling Company

KNOW ALL MEN by these presents that undersigned citizens of the United States desiring to form a corporation for pecuniary profit under the laws of the territory of New Mexico do hereby enter into and adopt for ourselves our associates and our successors, the following articles of incorporation.

ARTICLE I

The name of the corporation shall be **RICO MINING & MILLING CO.**, and its principal place of business shall be in the town of Nogal, in the County of Lincoln territory of New Mexico with a branch office in such other place or places as the Board of Directors shall determine.

ARTICLE II

The general nature of the business of the corporation shall be to acquire, own, buy, sell and lease mines, petroleum and natural gas claims and properties and the mining of gold, silver, copper and other ores, also coal and the development and operation of petroleum and natural gas wells from and on the property or claims owned or leased by this corporation; and to separate and reduce ores and metals, mill quartz, to acquire and use tramways, roads, railroads, telephone and telegraph lines, water power and water ways in connection with the operation of said mines, claims and properties; and to do and perform all other acts incident to a mining and development company as herein provided.

ARTICLE III

This corporation shall commence business on the fifteenth day of August 1902, continue fifty years from said date unless sooner dissolved in manner provided by law.

ARTICLE IV

This corporation may make and enforce contracts, acquire sell and transfer property possessing the same powers in such respects as private persons: may sue and be sued in its corporate name: may have a common seal: render, the interests of its stockholders transferable may adopt by laws and rules for its government and choose such officers and agents as shall seem proper and clothe them with all power and authority in accord with law and these articles and perform any and all acts necessary to carry out the purpose of its organization.

ARTICLE V

The capital stock of the corporation shall be six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000) divided into shares of one dollar (\$1) each.

One hundred thousand shares of the capital stock shall be set apart and held and known as contingent treasury stock and remain unsold as a contingent fund for further use until its sale is authorized by a majority vote of the capital stock actually issued and shall have no voting power until sold and entered upon the books of the corporation and cash paid into the company's treasury thereupon when it shall have the same voting right and power as each and all other shares have.

Two hundred and fifty thousand shares of the capital stock shall be set aside and held and known as treasury stock: each part or all of said stock to be sold at such amount and at such price, to be used in the development of claims and property and such other business of the corporation as these articles provide and the Board of Directors determine.

Two hundred and fifty thousand shares of the capital stock shall be issued in consideration of a due and proper

deed under the laws of New Mexico and the mining laws of the United States to the following mining claims and properties situated in the Jicarilla Mining District in the county of Lincoln, territory of New Mexico known and designated by the following names to-wit Black Hat; Brooklyn; Chicopee; Saint Patrick; G. A. B.; Buckeye; Channel; Durham; Gold Bed; Snow Flake; Gold Queen; Gold King; Gold King No. 2; Excell; Gold Crown and Gold Bar

The aforesaid mining claims and properties to be taken by this corporation at the face value of two hundred and fifty thousand shares of its capital stock, and to be received and accepted by this corporation in full payment for said stock and said stock when so issued shall be fully paid and forever treated and considered as non-assessable; and it shall be conclusively presumed as against all persons dealing with this corporation, whether creditors, stockholders, or others that the amount paid for said mining claims and properties, was at date of said location and purchase the value of the same; and all persons shall be forever barred and estopped from setting up any proceeding at law or equity that the said stock is not fully paid up.

ARTICLE VI

The capital stock of this corporation shall be non-assessable, the law and court decisions, if any there be, to the contrary notwithstanding and all of said stock then issued and paid for at the price agreed upon, shall be fully paid and forever non-assessable; and it shall be conclusively presumed as against all persons dealing with this corporation, whether creditors, stockholder or others, that the amount paid for its capital stock and accepted by the corporation, was at the date of purchase and payment, the value of the same, and all persons shall be forever barred and stopped from setting up any proceeding at law or equity, that the said stock is not fully paid up.

ARTICLE VII

The business and affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors, consisting of five or more, not exceeding nine stockholders of the corporation, who shall be elected at the annual meeting of the stockholders on the 4th Wednesday of September every year, except in case of a vacancy in said Board, or the maximum number provided be not elected, the Board of Directors may fill such vacancy, or deeming it for the best interest of the corporation; may elect additional directors up to the said maximum number to serve until the next annual meeting.

The officers shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and general manager. These officers shall be elected by the newly elected directors, at or about the time of the annual meeting of stock
