Mining and Prospecting.

More Capitalist Arrived.

There arrived over the Rock Island from the north, last night a party of twentyone capitalists, to inspect Nogal mining property.

Thirteen of the party were in charge of Captain J. H. Lloyd and Clem W. Studebaker. This party consists of Captain J. H. Lloyd, Momence Ill., Clem W. Studebaker South Bend Ind., J. Q. C. VanderBach South Bend Ind., G. E. Feagans, P. G. Rulien, J. R. Hobbs, H. J. Weber C. E. Finely, Joliet, Ill., B. Congleton, C. E. Congleton W. H. Howland, T. B. Howland, J. W. Lee, Milton George, Chicago, and W. F. Allen, Waukegan, Ill.; The party come in the private car, "Lakewood" they will remain for several days looking at the property of the Eagle Mining and Improvement Company at White Oaks and Nogal. General Manager J. M. Rice and Floyd Parsons are with the party at White Oaks today; and tomorrow they go to Parsons to inspect the property of the company at that place.

There also arrived on the train, a distinguished party of Iowa capitalist, stockholders and officers of the Iowa and New Mexico Mining and Milling Company. This party includes H. B. White, C. O. The annual meeting of the stockholders and officers of the Company will be held today at Nogal.

Jicarrilla Placers.

The dirt on the very top of Monument peak pans and the richest placer fields are found around this peak. Thence the field extends in a northerly direction almost to the Gran Quivara forty-five miles away.

All the stratified rocks, are cut by dykes very similar in character to the rock of which the body of Church mountain are composed. Again we find a similar formation on all sides of the mountain. Taking these facts into consideration it would appear that on all sides of this center of volcanic disturbance where the conditions the same as at the American and Hellen Rao groups of mines, other leads similar there to, would be found.

This is the case on the South along Tortulita canon, where leads almost identical in character have been located, but very little development work has been done at present. We firmly believe that as good mines will be opened in this district as the above mentioned groups.

Again on the north and west side of the mountain slopes off to the planes and the ground which would be equidistant from the main center of the volcanic action is buried beneath the wash of several geological ages. It would seem likely that under this wash were it prospected, rich mines such as our most famous would be found. In fact it is reasonable to suppose that the same dykes and leads would be found here as, are found on the south and east, and they should carry gold and copper as the leads and dykes around Nogal do.

Articles of Incorporation-Rock Island Cement & Plaster Co.

Continued from Page 2.

treasury of the company and shall be issued by order of the directors as per cash or other valuable consideration and when so issued shall be fully paid up and non-assessable.

ARTICLE IV

The business of this corporation, shall be managed by a board of directors to consist of five members who shall be stockholders and the first board of directors shall consist of the following named persons to wit P. H. Bouquet of Paha, Iowa F. J. Bush of Ancho Lincoln Co. New Mexico, G. A. Bush of the same place and I. M. Earl of Des Moines Iowa and they shall hold their office of directors for the first three months and until their successors are elected and qualified.

ARTICLE V

The principal place of business of this corporation shall be in the territory of New Mexico at Ancho Lincoln county and a branch office of this corporation outside the territory of New Mexico shall be at El Paso Tex and also a branch office at Des Moines Iowa at either of which said offices meetings of the board of directors may be held and said directors shall elect annually from their number a president a vice president, a secretary and a treasurer and a general manager, and until otherwise ordered the said I. M. Earl shall be president the said F. J. Bush shall be vice president, the said P. H. Bouquet shall be treasurer and the said G. A. Bush shall be secretary and general manager, all of whom shall hold their offices until their successors are duly elected.

ARTICLE VI

The stockholders shall annually meet on the third Thursday of the month of July during the existence of this corporation for the purpose of electing directors and such other business matters shall then be transacted as properly fall within the scope of an annual stockholders meeting, of which meetings the secretary shall give notice in writing by depositing such notice in the post office at Ancho El Paso or Des Moines, directed to the last known post office address of each stockholder of record at least thirty days before the date of such meeting. The election of Directors and officers shall be by ballot unless there be but one name mentioned for either of said offices and at said annual meeting the secretary, treasurer and general manager shall each make a full and concise report of the business of the corporation during the preceding year of the condition of the property and the prospect for the company.

ARTICLE VII

The Board of Directors shall have power to do and to perform all things necessary for the proper and legitimate business of the corporation under these Articles of Incorporation with such powers as are generally exercised by similar corporations and not inconsistent with law nor the provisions of these Articles and may appoint such attorneys agents and servants as may be required for the Corporation whose compensation shall be determined or agreed upon by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII

No instrument affecting the title to any real estate or right therein held by the company shall be of any validity unless the same is executed by the president and the secretary and acknowledged by them according to law, and is so executed and acknowledged by virtue of a resolution

of the Board of Directors duly entered of record in the minute book or meetings of said directors.

ARTICLE IX

The private property of the individual stockholders shall be exempt from liability for corporate indebtedness.

ARTICLE X

The largest amount of indebtedness to which this corporation shall at any time be subject or shall contract, either direct or contingent shall not exceed the sum of fifty thousand (\$50,000) Dollars.

ARTICLE XI

The Board of Directors are hereby authorized to make and amend the by laws, rules and regulations in its judgment deemed necessary for the management of the affairs of the corporation, and these Articles of Incorporation may be amended at any annual meeting of the stockholders provided that stockholders owning at least three tenths of the capital stock shall vote in favor of such amendment. And if it be considered expedient or necessary by the directors to amend these Articles of Incorporation at any other time than that of the annual meeting the treasurer or the secretary and general manager may call such meeting by depositing in the post office at either of the offices of the corporation notice thereof addressed to each stockholder of record at his last known post office address thirty days prior to such meeting, said notice to contain the object of the meeting and the particular amendment proposed.

ARTICLE XII

Special meetings of the stockholders may be called at any time by the president and shall be called upon the request of holders of one half the stock, notice thereof to be given by the secretary fifteen days (15 days) prior to the date fixed for such meeting, by mailing a notice stating the object thereof and the time and place of holding said meeting from either of the offices of said company to each stockholder directed to the last known post office address of such stockholder as shown by the record of said company.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS; That we, the undersigned, G. A. Bush, of Ancho, New Mexico; L. M. Earle, of Des Moines, Iowa; and P. H. Bosquet, of Pella, Iowa, for ourselves, our associates and successors, have associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under and by virtue of the laws of the Territory of New Mexico and to that end we do hereby adopt and acknowledge the following Articles of Incorporation;

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be "THE ROCK ISLAND CEMENT AND PLASTER COMPANY", and by that name shall have continuous existence for the term of fifty [50] years from this date, unless sooner dissolved according to law, and shall have the right by that name to sue and be sued.

ARTICLE II.

Sampling Ores For Assay.

One cannot be too careful in choosing their samples of ore for an assay, if representative results and results that can be figured on are desired. It is obvious that if the sample does not fairly represent the ore the results will be valueless except to merely determine what the rock contains without reference to the amount or quantity to the ton.

The ore in different parts of the same lead are found to vary widely, and a single piece is very unlikely to be a fair representative of the whole body of ore. Parts of the same small piece of ore often gives decidedly different results. For this reason no two assayers may be expected to give exactly the same returns on an ore unless the two assays are made from the same sifted sample.

Accidently Shot.

While out hunting on Turkey Creek last Wednesday, H. Cochran accidently shot himself. The ball, a 48 calibre, entered the left hand near the wrist, passed through the arm to the elbow, breaking the bone; at the elbow it passed out striking again on the left jaw bone, tearing the flesh from the left side of the face, tearing off the left ear and entering the skull.
