Hurray for Bonito, Corona and White Oaks.

The American precincts were three to one for Armstrong. It was the Mexican who did it with their political hatchet.

We take off our hat to the good people of Corona, Bonito, Nogal and White Oaks. They are on the right side of the question.

Now let us all lay aside our political feelings and pull together for the advancement of Lincoln county.

The election is now over and we will devote the next two years in giving our readers a "newspaper." We'll meet the other fellow "at Phillips," two years hence.

There has been so much interest in the election that we have somewhat neglected our paper. We propose to do better hereafter.

The Free Gold Mining Company are putting in a new plant in Juana canyon, Jicarilla district. The plant is being erected by S. B. Wise, an experienced mill man. It will consist of four concentrators of the combined capacity of 200 tons per day. This company have eight rich placer claims in Juana canyon and are now drilling for water.

E. A. Peters came down from the Nogal country Monday evening where he has been prospecting for some time in company with Frank Mayo. Mr. Peters is much elated over the country up there. He reports that a valuable shipment of ten sacks of ore was shipped to San Francisco, one nugget of which was worth \$100. He states that lots of people are coming in to that district and the Eagle and American companies are doing some important development work. —Ore County Advertiser.

Dacota's old reliable, the famous Homestake, has a record familiar to most people. It is the most extensively operated mine there, and similar accomplishments to the Homestake is the goal to which others are striving.

The Homestake company has recently issued its annual statement, in which are some interesting things. The year ending June 1, 1902, was the best as far in the history of the company, there being a larger production and a greater saving on ore. The report shows that the gross production amounted to 1, 218,089 tons of ore of a value of \$4,314,059.12. This figured out shows an average value per ton of only \$3.54. The net profit for the year is placed at \$1,064,749.23.

When it is considered that this represents a profit of over 87 cents per ton on every ton shipped, some idea can be had of the manner in which mining in the Black Hills is reduced to a scientific basis. The Alaska-Treadwell of Douglas Island has a record which beats this in so far as is concerned gross value and net saving per ton. This mine is not such a producer as the Homestake, neither are mining operations so generally carried on a large scale there as they are in the Black Hills.

REPORT OF NOGAL PUBLIC SCHOOL.

At the end of the first month we have 84 enrolled. School has very comfortable seats. Progress very unsatisfactory especially among the boys due to a lack of study.

The least progress made in this month is credited to Lena Highfill and Rolla Parker. Parents should be on the alert; see that their children are on the streets less and study more at home. I shall be honest with you in these monthly reports, and at any time I will tell you the needs of your child, so we may act in concert and accomplish much for your children.

The Golden State Limited is the name of the new Rock Island fast train. This train makes the distance from El Paso to Kansas City in twenty four hours. Leave El Paso at 7:30 in the evening and arrive at 7:35 the following morning.

Fred Peitz, a surveyor from Las-Cruces, N. M., passed through El Paso a few days ago on his return from a prospecting trip in the White Mountains in Lincoln county. He says that he started out from Tularosa and found after about half a day's travel a three-foot ledge of rich gold and copper bearing rock which was apparently right underneath the grass roots. Mr Peitz located some of the claims and says that he will have assays made and return to the place in about ten days to develop it. He says that the ore will run \$5 to the ton in gold and 15 per cent copper. A great many prospectors are rushing into that section and many claims are being staked.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE BOULTO MINING AND MILLING COMPANY

Know all men by these presents that the undersigned, all citizens of the United States, in order to incorporate under the laws of the territory of New Mexico...

Article 1

The name of the corporation shall be The Boulto Mining & Milling Company.

Article 2

The principal office of this corporation shall be located at Kansas City in the county of Jackson and state of Missouri. The majority of the stock being held and owned by non residents of the territory of New Mexico...

Article 3

The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000) divided into seven hundred and fifty thousand shares (750,000) of one Dollar (\$1.00) par value each.

Article Four.

Apropos to the mention of the nitro beds of Death Valley, it will be well to state that a large plant is being erected at Ancho, N. M. for the manufacture of plaster, cement, plaster of paris, stucco and building material from the vast deposits of gypsum, calcium sulphate that occur in that neighborhood, says the Mining Reporter. The white sulphate deposits are called are a powder, white as snow, but of which practical use has yet been made. They have been known to exist as have the nitre deposits of California, yet circumstances were such that they could not be utilized until a means of transportation and works for their treatment was provided. Some time ago we pointed out that there were instances to be made from more lowly sources than gold and silver. It is not our intention to discourage prospectors in searching for these sources, yet it must be borne in mind that for anything to have a value it must have a market or a means of getting it to a market, if one exists, at a cost that will leave a profit on its sale; in other words a commodity without a means of getting it to a market is valueless. Capital is one of the necessities in development of these deposits of natural chemicals. The prospector can locate his placer on the deposits but he must stand ready to interest capital in his claim. These claims cannot be worked on a small scale with crude apparatus at a profit. Extensive operations combined with labor saving machinery bring in dividends in these cases. Some of these deposits, as the nitro deposits, have been found to have been so protected by nature that the man who has not only poverty and failure but death itself in trying to gain profit from them.

It is today easier to get a mining property that will pay from 25 per cent to 50 per cent than to get hold of an ordinary business investment that will pay a sure 5 per cent. And in the investment that pays 5 per cent the investor or his friend receives have to get down in the pockets of other men to get it out in any way or dishonest way. They don't have give and get till value yet the transaction is only a swap. The money taken from the ground is as much of a creation as the money is regarded as was the earth itself when it was created says the Mining and Scientific Press. The money so produced is an addition to the wealth of the

world and helps not only him who produces, but him who receives it and helps every other industry, for every miner underground supports five people on the surface and the bullion he produces is forever more a part of the wealth of mankind.
