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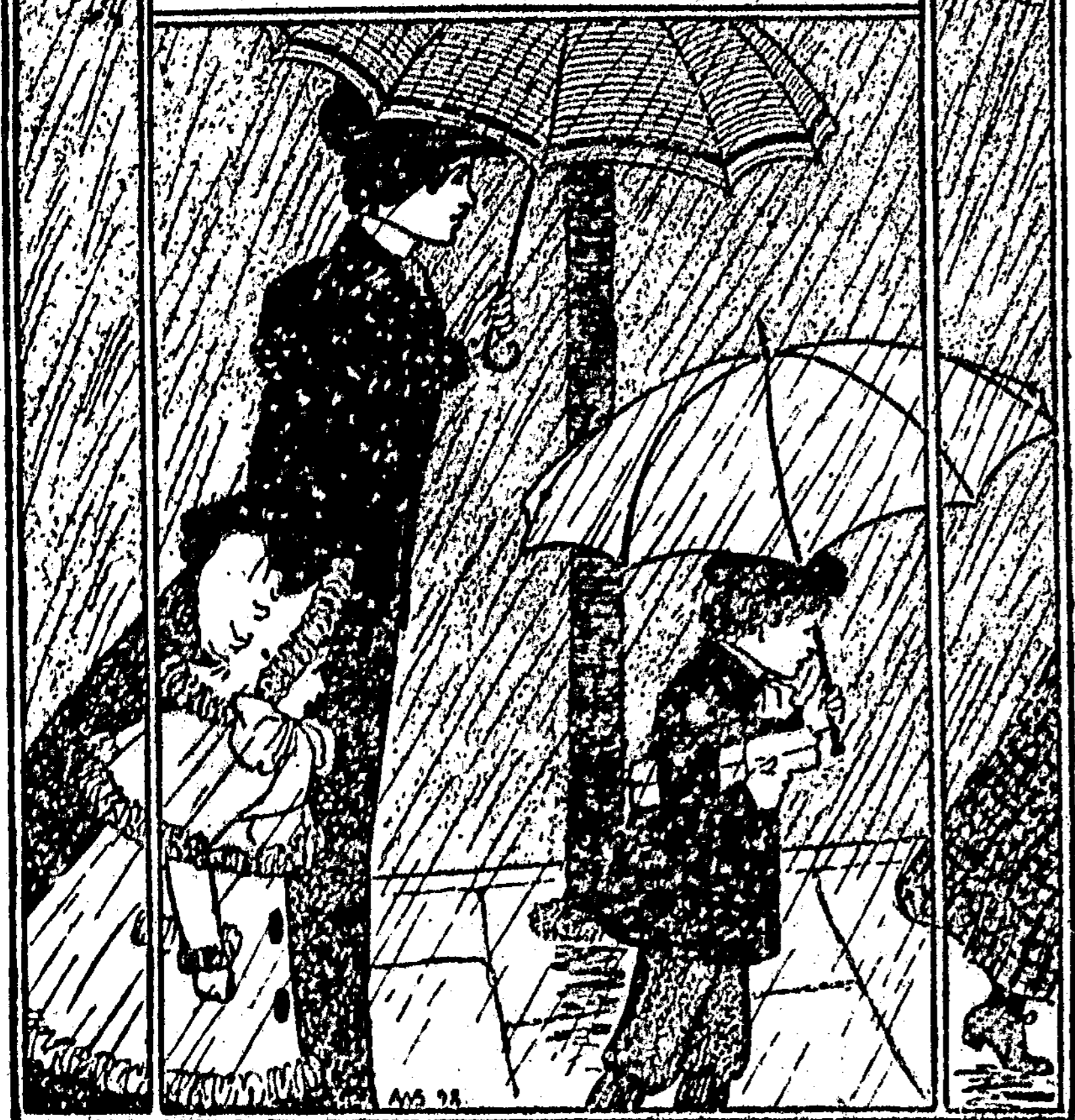

**Official Paper of Lincoln County**

Our troops have no difficulty in licking the Filipinos wherever they strike them; but somehow the Filipinos won't stay licked.

The Samoan question is still giving trouble to three of the most powerful nations on the globe—the United States, England and Germany. The difficulty, too, is over the point whether one native or another shall rule the islands.

The Las Vegas Daily Optic has just published a beautiful 28 page building Edition, in supplementary form. The supplement is well gotten up; neatly printed and shows many splendid buildings in Las Vegas. The Optic is easily the leading daily in the territory and it gives the Eagle pleasure to note its push and vigor.

Gen. Lawton is quoted as saying that it will require 100,000 men to "pacify" the Filipinos. He says that he can, with his brigade, march from one end of the island of Luzon to the other if he did not have to detail part of his command to hold the territory passed over. Get your volunteers ready, Mr. President, and end this war, or your public career will end in 1000.

The recent order of the Lincoln county Board of Commissioners, published in this issue of the Eagle, with reference to liquor dealers is calculated to improve and maintain both the moral and financial conditions of Lincoln county. The saloon business is a legitimate following and to a certain point is protected by law; but those recreations in its conduct that are regulated by law, and the Board seeks to restrain saloon men who are in the business to make money poles volens. This order does not interfere with a single legitimate business in the county and should be appreciated by all who conduct a saloon on business principles.

The legislative committee of New York, investigating the conduct of municipal affairs of Greater New York, has had Richard Croker, the Tammany chief, on the witness stand the past week. The "Boss" admitted frankly that he was the leader of Tammany, that that organization controlled the city and that its members were given the preference in appointments, etc., and in this the organization does not differ from other political organizations. "To the victors belong the spoils" is a maxim that "Boss" Croker believes in, just as "Boss" Platt or any other "Boss" believes and practices. The Eagle thinks that one "Boss" is about like another and fails to see where Croker's leadership is any more harmful than that of Platt.

The "pacification" of the Philippines reminds us of the years of "pacification" practiced by the Spaniards in Cuba. While our soldiers are not as brutal as the ruthless soldiery of Spain, they are, nevertheless, endeavoring to accomplish the same end—place a hated foreign yoke upon a people struggling for liberty. The spectacle of a free people forging the fetters on another people, striving to be free, is anything but favorable to republican institutions.

The \$10 dinner and the \$1 dinner have been eaten in New York, and the Democrats, as of old, continue to fight among themselves. The \$1 dinner, in point of numbers, enthusiasm and national importance, however, greatly exceeds that of the \$10 Croker Belmont blow-out and was a more representative gathering of Democrats.

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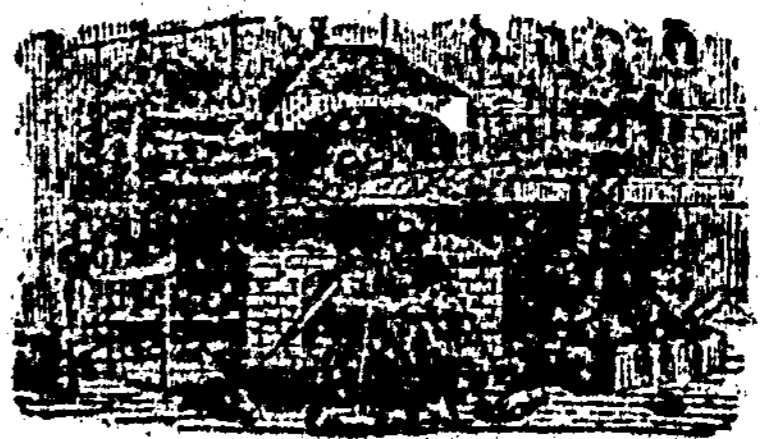

**GRAY CLEANINGS.**

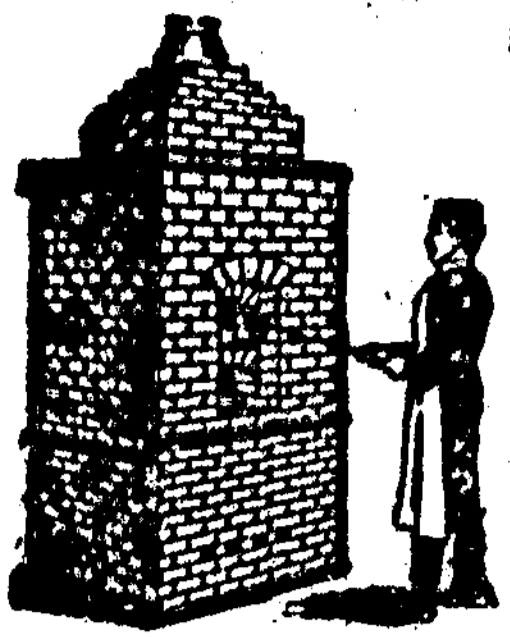
From our regular correspondent.
