The strike at Alamogordo has been amicably settled and the employees have returned to work.

Let other states follow the examples of Arkansas and Missouri in suppressing trusts and the combines will soon be wiped out of existence.

At a meeting of the Democratic territorial central committee held in Santa Fe on the 1st inst., the Hon. H. B. Ferguson was chosen Democratic national committeeman in place of Hon. Frank A. Manzanares, resigned.

The government deficit for the first ten months of the fiscal year according to the April report reached \$109,000,000 in spite of the fact that the emergency war taxes are still in effect nearly a year after the actual end of the war.

The president of the Equitable Insurance Company, H. Hyde, died of heart failure in New York on May 2. Mr. Hyde for a number of years previous to his death received the largest salary of any business man in the world. His salary was \$100,000 a year.

Edward Atkinson's pamphlets directed against the administration's policy in the Philippines, have been ordered taken out of the Manila mails, the government thinking it being their purpose to incite mutiny among the Philippine forces of our soldiery.

The rise in the price of copper is adding the investment of many millions of dollars to the mining industry under a protective administration.—Donna Ana County Republican.

Yes, and the rise in prices of products of our factories that are controlled by trusts which are in defiance of protection, is costing the American people many more millions of dollars. Babel?

Senator Depew thinks the Republicans will undoubtedly adopt an anti-trust plank in their platform, but wherein they can consistently do so when the Dingley tariff law is the foster-mother of trusts and Attorney-General Griggs champion of the justification of trust control of everything in sight and a great portion of things out of sight, we do not understand.

Kautz's ultimatum has been submitted to by Mataka's forces in Simon and hostilities will be suspended for a while; but the indications are that the trouble is by no means settled. The rebels are delighted with the armistice which will give them time to refill cartridge shells and build forts. It is the general opinion that the islands will be uninhabitable except for Gorman and Frenchmen unless Mataka and the rebel chiefs are severely punished.

That politics make strange bed-fellows seems fittingly true in the case of Alger and Merritt, who have apparently buried the hatchet and are now on the most intimate terms. The first intimation of their esteem for each other was noticed in Merritt's praise of Alger at a recent banquet in Detroit, since when, it has been rumored that Alger has made up his mind that Miles shall be relieved from the command of the army and that his successor shall be Merritt. He has probably forgotten that this same Merritt is the man who recommended his dishonorable discharge in 1894 for cowardice and absconding himself from his command without leave. It may be, however, that he has had sufficient time to realize that the charges were well founded and that he should no longer cherish an ill will against his accuser.

The gallant charge of Col. Fredrick Funston of the Twentieth Kansas volunteers upon the Insurgent Filipino at Calumpit has been awarded with admirable promptitude by President McKinley, who immediately after receiving the news of the great victory of the Twentieth Kansas volunteers under his command at Calumpit made him brigadier general. That charge, along with the victory of the Rough Riders at San Juan hill will live in history as one of the bravest feats in the Spanish American war.

O. L. Merrill, ex-assistant superintendent of the Santa Fe penitentiary, was arrested last Saturday at Santa Fe on a warrant charging him with conspiracy to defame the good name of one T. B. Catron and others at Santa Fe. The arrest was the result of a statement made by an ex-convict, one Schultz, that Merrill had induced him, Schultz, while in the penitentiary, to make a false affidavit, charging Catron and others with attempting to have ex-superintendent Bergman poisoned. Schultz is now in jail charged with perjury—the perjury being the affidavit made against Catron and others while Schultz was in the penitentiary. As for Schultz, he is now a self confessed perjurer and as for Merrill, people who know him don't believe him guilty of any wrong whatever. We don't know whether any body wanted to poison Supt. Bergman or not; but we do know he was a mighty hard man for the Santa Fe gang to get rid of.

The republicans are now in the attitude of the chief caught in the net. Explanation, excuses and promises, are in order. Protective legislation has caused the wealth of the country to be organized into immense trusts to control and raise prices even of the necessities of life, and one result of these combines is to decrease production and throw many workmen out of employment. The trust can shut down half its factories and by raising prices make the same profits, it would make by selling more at a lower price. Again the government controlled by a protective administration and a protective congress, acknowledges itself unable to suppress or punish these, offensive organizations. Of course the administration is powerless, because it is from these protected robbers that the republican party gets huddle to carry elections. So long as the people support the republican party—the party of huddle and protection to these trust robbers, so long will they pay higher prices for the necessities of life and have the shackles of poverty more firmly riveted upon themselves and their children. The war of the Philippines is nothing compared to the evil effects of the war that is being waged against the masses of the people of the United States and against free government, by the plutocracy now controlling the administration.

DROWNED IN A SHAFT.

The following communication from Robt. Ferguson of Mineral del Oro, Mexico, explains itself:

Mineral del Oro Estado de Mexico 5 3, 1899. Editor White Oaks EAGLE.

Dear Sir: On account of the sad accident that happened to Frank R. Lloyd on Tuesday April 25th, I write you, thinking that his numerous friends in White Oaks and Lincoln county will be anxious to know the particulars of the accident in which he met his death.

The mine of which Mr. Lloyd was superintendent had been shut down six months previous to the date of the disaster, waiting the erection of new hoisting machinery. During this time the water had risen 63 meters to the shaft. Work had just been resumed on the morning of the 24th, and on Tuesday morning following Mr. Lloyd and his cage runner got on the hoist and ordered the engineer to lower them to the water level, and in executing the order the engineer, Faulkner, dropped them 12 feet below the water surface, drowning both he and his attendant. The engineer seemingly not cognizant of his mistake made no attempt to bolster them.

Indications were that Mr. Lloyd made a desperate attempt to save his life. Mr. Lloyd is prostrate with grief and for a time serious hopes were entertained for her recovery.

NEW MEXICO CROP CONDITIONS.

U. S. DEPT. of AGRICULTURE,
 Climate and Crop Bulletin of the
 Weather Bureau, in New Mex-
 ico Section.

(Santa Fe, N. M., May 2, 1909.)

Dry, windy weather, with cool
 nights, characterized the week end-
 ing with the 1st inst. General
 frosts occurred over northern sec-
 tion on the 27th and 30th, that of
 the 30th being the more severe
 and causing additional damage to
 the early fruit prospects of north-
 ern orchards. In southern coun-
 ties more favorable conditions ob-
 tained, although on account of the
 unusually cool weather and lack of
 rains, there is some complaint
 of a backward season.

The weather has been favorable
 for carrying on farming operations.
 Satisfactory progress has been
 made in central and northern coun-
 ties in sowing oats and spring
 wheat and new alfalfa fields. Corn
 planting is about finished in south-
 ern localities, and is well along
 farther north. Some southern al-
 falfa fields are in flower and nearly
 ready to cut. In the higher al-
 titudes of central and south central
 regions early fruits, as apricots,
 peaches, cherries, etc., will be
 short crops, but in the valleys of
 the lower Pecos and Rio Grande
 the prospects are good for all
 fruits. In the vicinity of La Luz
 it is claimed that fig trees were
 killed to the ground by the late
 frosts.

Pastures have started well, but
 are much in need of rain and warm
 weather. The lambing season
 seems more successful in southern
 than in northern sections. Some
 northern stockmen fear a loss of
 nearly 50 per cent on account of
 the drought and cold weather.
 Streams and rivers are swelling
 somewhat, and there is no com-
 plaint of a shortage of water for
 the ditches.

The following remarks are ex-
 tracted from the reports of cor-
 respondents:

Gallinas Spring—Jan. E. Whit-
 more—The high winds are injur-
 ing the fruit trees, and also grass.
 From the present outlook the fruit
 crop will be very short. All crops
 are coming on well, but pastures
 need rain badly. The highest
 temperature, 95; lowest, 35; no
 rain.

Lower Pecos—Warm, grow-
 ing weather since the frosts of the
 21st and 23d. Corn mostly plant-
 ed. All fruit damaged excepting
 apples, which will be a full crop.
 Cherries are also promising. Other
 fruits from a half to a quarter yield
 expected. Highest temperature,
 80; lowest, 41.

Richardson—Edward McEgue
 --Unusually high winds on the
 28th and 27th. Corn is all planted.

Alamogordo was the scene of a
 labor strike last week, Monday,
 1st. The employees at the saw
 mill and the lumber men in the
 mountains, including about two
 hundred men, quit work and de-
 manded shorter hours and better
 wages. They were paid \$1.50 and
 \$1.60 per day of 10 hours and
 demanded \$1.50 and hour and
 \$2.00 per day and ten hours. The
 employees are most of them from
 Italy, and they are very proud
 and say they will not submit
 to be replaced by Italians.
