What Col. Bryan Calls "Nothing."
Col. W. J. Bryan is promulgating some queer doctrines. In one of his speeches in Oregon he said that the Republican party has done nothing since 1896. He forgot that it enacted a tariff law which gave prosperity to the country, that under Republican rule a successful war with a foreign country was fought, that Cuba was freed, that the American flag was carried around the world and became respected more than it ever was before. Under its regime the markets of the world have been conquered for American industry and enterprise and the furnaces and idle mills of the country have been re-started, until prosperity is in every home. If he calls that nothing, then let this country have some more of this do nothing policy of the Republican party. In Col. Bryan's opinion it is only the party that destroys instead of builds up, that denies instead of asserts, that retreats instead of goes forward that is doing something. But the average American will and cannot see it in that way.—New Mexican.

Then, it was the republican party that whipped Spain and freed Cuba. We didn't know before that Joe Wheeler, Fitzhugh Lee and Dewey were republicans, nor that the Southern States had so many republican soldiers. Well, all right. But, you forget our Philippine war which we got from Spain in exchange for the war we had with that country by giving \$20,000,000 "to boot." The republican administration is about as near the end of this war, under its present policy as the party in this Territory is to getting statehood for New Mexico.

Now, as for the republican tariff giving prosperity to the whole country you are partly correct. The mistakes of the democratic tariff caused by the free traders putting the products some of our leading industries on the free list, and the failure of the income tax provision of the law, caused a deficit in the revenues and seriously crippled the industries against which this discrimination was made. When the republicans came into power the country was already on the eve of a boom. The rush to the Klondike, short crops in other parts of the world and the war with Spain made demands for American products which alone would have revived business in this country and started our factories. Again, our factories get the lion's share of republican protection and this causes them to rush things that may "make hay while the sun shines," while they can, by the grace of the republican party, rob the people. One instance by way of illustration barbed fence wire a few years ago was sold at a profit at from \$2.75 to \$3.00 a hundred pounds. Now, it is \$4.75 to 5.00. Who gets this difference? The protected iron and steel corporations who helped to elect McKinley for this very reason and who will contribute millions to re elect him that may continue to rob the people. Of course, the factories flourish under republican rule. Favoritism in legislation is the thing that wins. Of course, these protected plunderers are against the democratic party which stands for equal rights to all and special privileges to none. Yes, you are right in part. The great prosperity, of the Hanna class of protected monopolist is due to the republican tariff.

Dewey as a Democrat.

The great majority of the 6,500,000 men who voted for Mr. Bryan in 1896 are in favor of his renomination. The organization of the party in nearly every State in the Union is in the hands of his friends. And this splendid renunciation could only come from a man capable of patriotic and heroic self sacrifice, induced by a positive conviction that his own election would be impossible.

Whether Mr. Bryan is this type of man it is not profitable to consider in view of the strenuous and persistent efforts of Mr. McKinley and his friends to make the election of Mr. Bryan (if he and his supporters are simply sensible) at least a possibility—after having removed, by the passage of the sound-money law, the danger which was the chief cause of his defeat in 1896.

It is gratifying to learn that Admiral Dewey is a Democrat. It is encouraging to know that he will be a candidate for President if the people wish it. But it is just as well for everybody concerned to understand the one condition of his nomination by the Democrats.—N. Y. World.

As soon as the Republican politicians and papers learned Dewey was a Democrat they began black-guarding him. The old naval hero will soon discover that the administration which tried to borrow his glory to advance its own selfish interests is an administration founded on intolerance and corruption; and that its creatures are now ready to try and drag his reputation in the mud, because they cannot use him. As long as the admiral was willing to praise McKinley he was worthy of being quoted. But the admiral has no right to be a Democrat.—El Paso Times.

ONE REASON WHY WE ARE NOT A REPUBLICAN.

We are not against corporations as such, and we are in favor of encouraging capital by just and proper means to invest in our county and territory. We believe, however, that capital whether invested by corporations or individuals, is entitled to the same protection under the laws as is given to investments made by persons of smaller means, and no more. In other words, we believe that capital is entitled to no special privileges under the law.

We don't believe that because a man, or corporation, has a million dollars that they should have special legislation in their interest and against the great mass of the people who are not so fortunate. We believe that laws, like the sunshine and the rain, should fall upon all alike. Believing these things we are forever barred from membership in the republican party. It is tempting at times to think of the good things the boys are having on the other side of the political fence. And, then, we see those who have gone over to the republicans, since the misfortunes of our own party made the future look gloomy, also reeking in green pastures and we almost get sick; but the fact remains that we are a democrat, not for gain, nor only when the party is prosperous, but because we can not be a republican and "will not" be a populist. There are other difficulties as serious as this matter of class legislation; but this one is enough, no need to name others.

We stop at the outside door and can go no farther. We lack the first requisite. Look at the growth of trusts and how they flourish. Look at the millions which are being piled up by big corporations who have been favored by republican legislation, and who take these vast sums of money from the people little by little. Look at our own territory. Only four democrats in the legislature, last winter and while the Coal Oil deal was voted for by nearly all of the republican members, the democrats were solidly against it. Coal oil is thirteen cents a gallon at El Paso and thirty cents all over New Mexico. Why not allow our people to buy oil at El Paso? We could lay it down at White Oaks at fifteen cents a gallon. The inspection law knocks us out. Our merchants could retail it at twenty cents. Yet, by reason of this infamous coal oil inspection law, we pay thirty five cents a gallon retail for our oil at

White Oaks fifteen cents is paid to the Standard Oil Company by every man, woman and child who buys a gallon of oil, as a gift from the republican party, but whose money are they giving by this law to this mighty corporation that defies both laws and courts? Count up the number of gallons of oil used in New Mexico and see how much money is taken from the people of this territory mostly the poor people and given to this giant of monopolists, The Standard Oil Co., by reason of this beautiful piece of republican legislation. This is one only of hundreds of such laws that can be referred to as showing the rottenness of the republican party. Yes, we shall remain on the outside until we shuffle off this "mortal coil" before we will gang with people capable of such legislation. Such laws are unjust - iniquitous! and the party that enacts them is no better.

The Alamogordo News says White Oaks coal has disabled a number of engines on the Southern Pacific and on the El Paso & Northern rail roads, and that it will not sell in the El Paso market because it has too much iron in it and makes too many clinkers. This is understood also to be Mr. Eddy's excuse for not allowing further shipments of coal from here. All right, gentlemen. Both these statements can be proven absolutely false by any one who will take the trouble to investigate the matter. How do these statements look by the side of the certainties we published last week. The fact is, the El Paso & Northern people want every thing in sight and refused to ship any more coal from here because they could make more by supplying the market with their own product, much of which is not equal to our coal. Then, why not tell the truth instead of offering such explanations and at the same time trying to injure White Oaks. However, we can expect nothing better from such a corporation tool and blatherskite as the Editor of the Alamogordo News.

STATEHOOD. Of course we all knew when we elected Pedro Perea that statehood would come as a matter of course, - that is, we knew it would come sooner or later; and perhaps, a good deal later. We think however, we are making progress. Before we sent Pedro to congress that august body was divided on the question of our moral or intellectual status; one party thought we were all an immoral set of ignoramuses and the other party thought only a part of our population were such; but since Pedro got to congress there is no further division. They are now all agreed that we are all fit subjects for education and regeneration, and no doubt they will lend some aid to those ends. If we had gone on in the usual way our chances were good for admission in about one thousand years, but now if we have really enlisted the sympathy of congress, we may get into the Union about the year of our Lord 2800,

Some may think we are after the republican party this week and if they do we shall not be very much surprised. It is not often we get a whack at the "G. O. P." and when we do, we rather like it. The Coal oil law, the salary grab of the officials &c., &c., are dainties; all passed with the approval of the Governor.

At the Territorial democratic convention which was held at Albuquerque on the 13th inst. the following were elected delegates to the national democratic convention, at Kansas City, July 4, 1900: E. C. de Baca, San Miguel; C. W. Easley, Santa Fe; O. N. Marrow, Bernalillo; F. J. Davidson, Grant; Macario Gallegos, Mora; H. M. Dougherty, Socorro. A platform was adopted favoring Silver, an income tax; denouncing trusts, imperialism, government by injunction and the levying of a tax upon Porto-Rican products. Hon. H. B. Ferguson was selected as a member of the national committee.

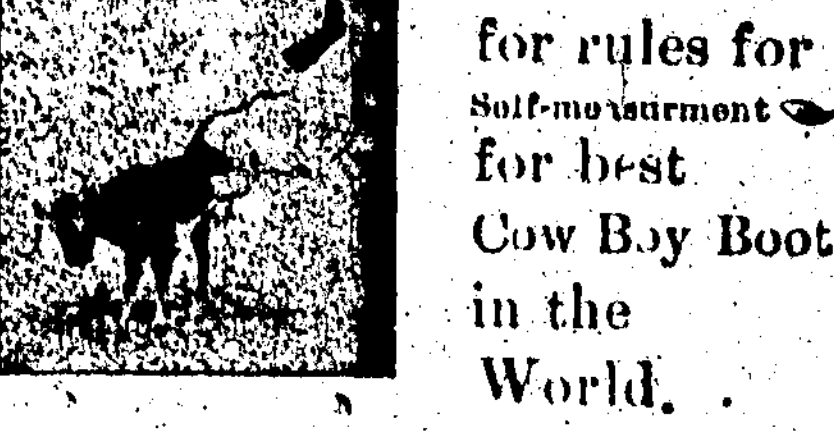

Realizing this, English capitalists are now completing a \$200,000 capital, for the purpose of manufacturing the native cotton. According to a statement of the Department of Agriculture, the average importation of cotton manufactures into the Philippine Islands since 1886, has been a little less than \$6,000,000. With the introduction of the cotton mills now building and in prospect, this importation will cease. The developments of the cotton industries in the Philippines means a direct loss to the cotton crop of the United States of \$6,000,000 a year. There seems, therefore, to be some doubt of the enormous market for cottons of which the imperialists tell us.

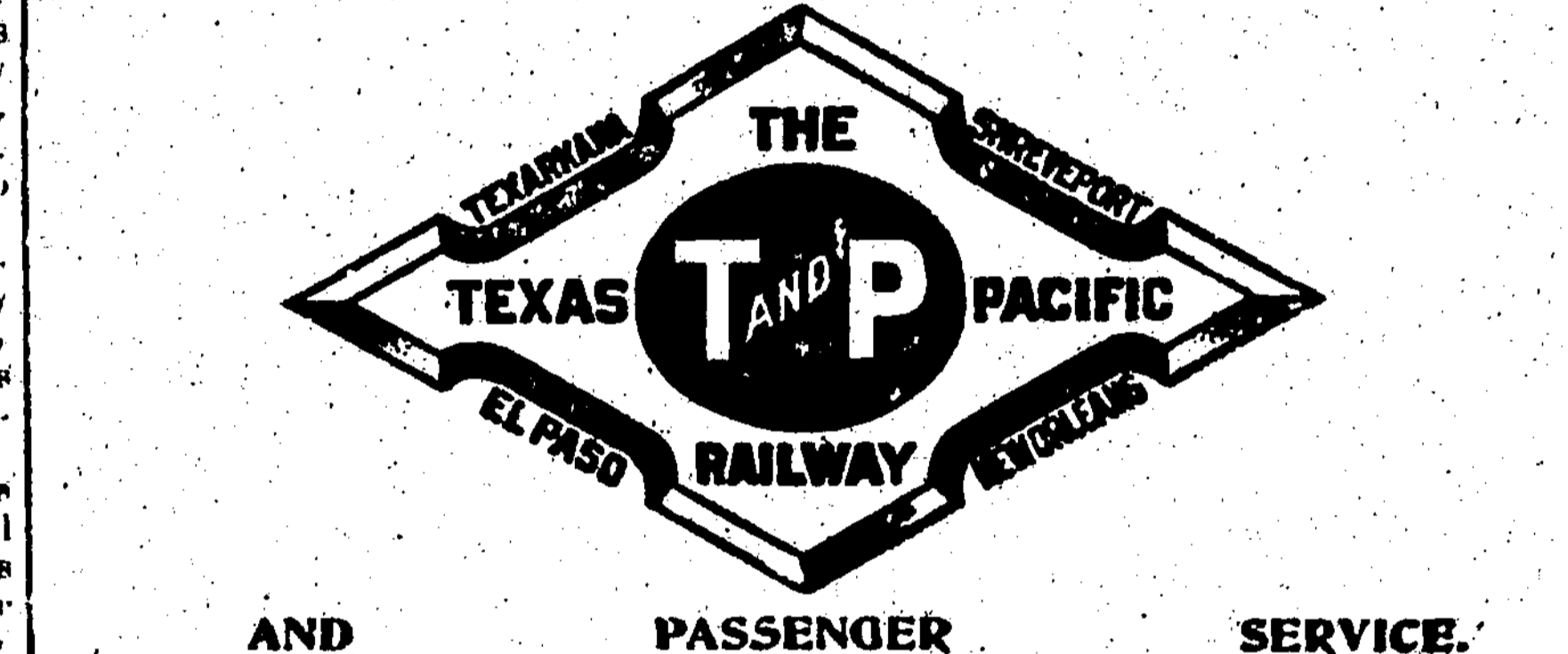
