TO OPEN RESERVATION.

The Com. Ittee on Indian Affairs Favours Opening the Mesalero Indian Reserve to Settlement.

A resolution has been introduced in congress to open to settlement the Mesalero Indian reservation in Lincoln county, N. M., says the El Paso Herald. This is in the country just opened up and made tributary to this city by the White Oaks railroad and hence important to El Paso.

The committee on Indian affairs has submitted a report in which they recommend the allotment of the Indian lands giving each 160 acres and throwing open the remainder to settlement. This course has been recommended by Capt. V. E. Stotler who was agent and for the first time in history succeeded in making the Apache ex-warriors dress in civilized clothing, cut off their long hair and get to work instead of living in idleness of the government and getting drunk.

The opening of the reservation to settlement has been under consideration for a long time and is being strongly urged by those most interested in the welfare of that section.

It is believed by some that valuable mineral is to be found on the reserve, but it is now useless as no prospecting is allowed under the law.

From the wording of the report of the congressional committee it is evident that its members are but poorly posted on the geography of New Mexico. They have located the entire reservation in Dona Ana county, whereas with a small portion in Otero county the entire reserve is in Lincoln county.

Washington should set them right before they do anything to muddle the matter so as to run the chance of nullifying their action by technical quibbles.

THANKS THE BOYS.

An Albuquerque Minister is Grateful for the Efforts of White Oaks Trainmen.

On last Tuesday, a passenger down on the White Oaks to El Paso was Rev. Frank H. Allen, pastor of the Congregational church at Albuquerque. He had received an intimation of a call from Topeka, Kan., and in some manner its acceptance depend on his making the Santa Fe connection in El Paso, and reaching Albuquerque by the next morning.

The White Oaks train had been delayed from various causes, and there was a prospect of the connection being missed. He told his troubles to Conductor Joe Graham, and that genial official in turn conferred with William Oliver, the "man at the throttle." The result was a quick run into El Paso which brought the connection in all right; and today the boys received from the reverend gentleman a warm letter of thanks, saying that their efforts had put him there on time, and had made it possible for him to accept the call to Kansas.—Herald.

Kansas City Auditorium Burned.

The big Kansas City Auditorium in which the Democratic National convention was to have been held on July 4, has been destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at \$850,000. The hall will be rebuilt in time for the Democratic convention.

CITY ELECTIONS.

Democrats Roll Up Big Majorities.

Santa Fe, Las Vegas and Albuquerque Carried by Democrats.

The returns from Milwaukee municipal elections give Mayor David S. Rose, democrat, a plurality over H. J. Baumgartner, republican, of 2,375.

People's Party Territorial Convention.

Las Vegas, N. M., March 31, 1900.



I have used White Oaks Coal for three years, and find it a very fine blacksmithing coal. I have used Penn., Wyo., and Colorado coals; the only difference I have noticed between White Oaks and Penn. coal, is that it takes a little more of this than the Penn. to do the same amount of work. This, however, is easily accounted for in that the Penn. article is taken from a greater depth, and is more compact than the White Oaks when our mines have not yet obtained sufficient depth. As to the Colorado and Wyoming coals this is better for blacksmithing purposes than either, for the reason that it contains less sulphur and clinkers. Selected, I consider this a No. 1 blacking coal. This coal I consider far superior to the Capitan coal for all blacksmithing purposes, and I have used both. The Capitan coal clinkers badly, is dirty, and is not good for welding, especially on steel. The White Oaks Coal makes a clean open fire, and comparatively free from all foreign substances that would be injurious to steel.


