THE FISHING SEASON.

THE FISHING SEASON REGULATIONS REGARDING FISHING IN THE PUBLIC WATERS OF THIS TERRITORY.

Chapter V, page 393, compiled laws of New Mexico 1897, provides that it shall be unlawful to kill, take fish for or have in possession any trout taken in any of the public waters of this territory during the months of November, December, January, February, March, April and May of each year. It shall be unlawful to take any trout smaller than six inches in length. Trout or other food fish shall not be taken within 100 yards of fishway, weir or artificial obstruction in any public stream or by the use of any drug or explosive substance, or by turning the waters from the channel, or by any seine, net or device except by hook and line. No fish can be taken from any private reservoir, stream, lake, pond or enclosure except by consent of the owner thereof. It is unlawful to sell or expose for sale any speckled trout or other food fish taken from the waters of this territory. It shall be unlawful for any railway, express company, or stage line, or public carrier to transport outside of the boundaries of New Mexico any fish.

Any person, firm or corporation erecting any dam, weir, artificial obstruction in any stream shall construct and maintain at all times a sufficient fishway for the free passage of fish up and down the stream. One half of the fines accruing from offenses under this act go to the informer and the other half to the public school fund.

A party is now surveying a line from Carrizozo on the E. P. & N. E. to Liberal, Kansas, where it will connect with the Rock Island route. This road if completed, and it certainly will be, will give to White Oaks its long needed railroad and to the mines a direct line over which to transport their products to market. This means a boom for White Oaks." This spoke Rev. C. C. Waller for the morning.

"White Oaks," says Rev. Mr. Waller, "stands probably the best chance to secure the college, on account of its building stone quarries, mountain springs, coal mines, and other inducements for the location."

She and a number of others were bathing and it is supposed that the undertow caught her. The body was carried out to sea and not recovered. She was a most estimable young lady and her sudden death is a shock to many friends in the Pecos Valley who knew her and loved her.—Roswell Register.

MINERAL AND METAL PRODUCTION

OF THE UNITED STATES.

The "Engineering and Mining Journal" of June 9th will publish the full tables of mineral and metal production of the United States in 1899, as prepared for the "Mineral Industry," Volume VIII. The total value of this output as estimated at the mines or places of production was \$1,211,361,861—an amount unexampled in the history of the United States or of any other country. This total, however, necessarily includes certain duplications, which amount to \$92,481,031, making the total net value of our mineral production \$1,118,780,830. This compares with a corresponding value of \$799,518,033 in 1898, showing an increase in 1899 of \$319,262,191, or 39.9 per cent. This enormous increase was in part due to an increase in quantities, and in part to the great advance in values of iron, steel, copper, and other metals. The United States last year was the greatest producer of coal, salt, iron, copper, silver and lead in the world, and was also a leader in the production of many of the less important metals. The value of its mineral production now far exceeds that of any other country. Of the total in 1899, crude ores and minerals contributed \$580,836,032, metals reduced from our own ores \$496,057,320, secondary products—such as alum, white lead, soda, etc.—\$63,996,969; while the value of metals smelted or refined from foreign material was \$70,471,540.

The extent of our production is shown by the figures which include 252,115,387 short tons of coal, 13,400,735 long tons of pig iron, 581,319,691 pounds of copper, 217,035 tons of lead, 129,675 tons of zinc, 57,126,834 ounces of gold, and \$70,096,021 in gold. The most important single item of production was iron, which furnished 25.4 per cent. of the total value. Iron was second, forming 20.9 per cent., copper third, with 8.3 per cent. Clay products were fourth in order, their value constituting 6.1 per cent. of the whole. Gold was fifth in order with 5.9 per cent. of the total, petroleum sixth with 5.3 per cent., stone seventh with 3.5 per cent., and silver eighth with 2.8 per cent., lead 1.6 per cent., cement 1.3 per cent., zinc 1.2 per cent., and natural gas 1 per cent. These figures show the relatively great importance of fuel and the materials of construction. They show, also, what is seldom appreciated, the extent of the building industries and the material employ, such as stone, clay and cement.

The New Mexico Mining & Extraction company which was lately incorporated in Colorado with a capital stock of \$100,000, is buying up a number of promising copper claims in the White Oaks country.—El Paso Times.

John S. Trigger, a prospector from the White Oaks country, has brought to El Paso some rich samples of copper ore from a claim he has located in Lincoln county, New Mexico. The ore runs 30 per cent copper, and also shows a trace of gold.—El Paso Times.

CATTLE SALE.

Tom Pridmore, range manager for the El Capitan Land and Cattle Co., sold W. R. Curtis 1,400 of one and two-year-old "Block" steers last Friday at \$17 and \$22, and started them on Saturday to the Texas line where they are to be delivered.—Roswell Register.

WHITE OAKS MINING EXHIBIT.

Now Being Prepared For the Chamber of Commerce of El Paso.

Maj. S. M. Davis, who has been selected by the Chamber of Commerce of El Paso to secure from the different mining districts surrounding that city, a collection of minerals representing the resources of the southwest, reached here last Saturday noon. He met the people of White Oaks just at the right time, and a very great interest was immediately manifested by everybody the Major became acquainted with. He remained over here from Saturday noon until Wednesday when he went to Nogal to meet the people there for the purpose of collecting an exhibit from that locality.

The Major expressed himself as wonderfully surprised at the immense resources in and around this town; and says White Oaks may easily have the greatest mineral exhibit that will reach the Chamber of Commerce from the entire Southwest.

All arrangements have been made and men are at work getting out minerals, cutting the stone etc. The exhibit will comprise the following variety of resources: Old Abe Gold exhibit as well as Gold from each of the other mines here; Copper, Iron, Coal, Fire Clay, Red Sandstone, Black Sandstone, Cream colored Sandstone, Black Marble, Variegated Marble, Lead, Gypsum, Lime and Sulphur. The Old Abe will have an exhibition ores from the mine showing Sulphides, Alunite, and a blue shale, all gold bearing and of sufficient quantities to be representative of the virtues of the property.

The exhibit embracing the above variety of resources will be sent to the Chamber of Commerce at El Paso as soon as it can be gotten together. Maj. Davis will meet the shipment at Carrizozo, and with a committee from here will deliver it to the Chamber of Commerce at El Paso.

CAPITAN NEWS,

(MINER.)

A deal of no little importance to Lincoln county, was consummated the past week, whereby over one thousand acres of valuable coal lands were sold to Archibald McCullough a millionaire of New York. The tract of land sold to Mr. McCullough embraces some of the most valuable coal land adjacent to Capitan. The deal was made through M. Griffin O'Neil, who was in Roswell the past week to meet Mr. McCullough representatives, where the sale was closed. Mr. McCullough has a number of eastern capitalists associated with him and development work on the property will begin at once. This, with two other deals now on foot, would indicate that we are to have several coal companies operating in this section in the near future.

A number of Lincoln county people have located valuable copper prospects in the Oscura mountains, fifteen miles from Malagosto on the E. P. & N. E. road. There is said to be a great amount of copper there and the outlook would amply justify the erection of a plant to treat the ores. Recently John H. Skinner of Bonito located a copper claim in the Oscura district, samples of which he has brought to this office. The smelter assay gives 15 per cent copper and Burlingame's assay give 14.24 per cent copper 3 per cent iron and no sulphur, zinc or lead, and worth 2.80 per unit. This prospect is called The First of March; has but little development work done on it but shows up a well defined 4 foot lead of vein matter. There are a number other promising prospects in the Oscura district.

A. K. Wells and a syndicate of eastern capitalists have recently purchased the American property and Mr. Wells is expected to arrive at Nogal in a short time to begin active mine operations. Messrs. Dolph & Robinson, who own the Helen Rea are men of considerable mining experience, and have made a success of the mining business in Arizona and other places. It is confidently expected that the Helen Rea will soon be again producing gold.

The new copper camp west of Nogal is attracting unusual attention, rich finds of copper glance are being made every day and preparations are being made for shipping ore from a number of prospects just as soon as the new wagon road to the station is completed. Experienced miners tell us that this is the richest copper find made in Southern New Mexico.

THE FISHING SEASON.

THE TROUT SEASON OPENS JUNE 1—REGULATIONS REGARDING FISH.

Chapter V, page 393, compiled laws of New Mexico 1897, provides that it shall be unlawful to kill, take fish for or have in possession any trout taken in any of the public waters of this territory during the months of November, December, January, February, March, April and May of each year. It shall be unlawful to take any trout smaller than six inches in length. Trout or other food fish shall not be taken within 100 yards of fishway, weir or artificial obstruction in any public stream or by the use of any drug or explosive substance, or by turning the waters from the channel, or by any seine, net or device except by hook and line. No fish can be taken from any private reservoir, stream, lake, pond or enclosure except by consent of the owner thereof. It is unlawful to sell or expose for sale any speckled trout or other food fish taken from the waters of this territory. It shall be unlawful for any railway, express company, or stage line, or public carrier to transport outside of the boundaries of New Mexico any fish.

Any person, firm or corporation erecting any dam, weir, artificial obstruction in any stream shall construct and maintain at all times a sufficient fishway for the free passage of fish up and down the stream. One half of the fines accruing from offenses under this act go to the informer and the other half to the public school fund.

MISS EFFIE EDINGTON DROWNED.

Mr. Samuel Brown received a letter a few days ago from Rev. C. C. Edington, formerly presiding elder of the El Paso conference now at Roanoke, Va., saying that his sister, Miss Effie Edington, had been drowned while bathing in the surf at Key West, Fla., where she was employed in teaching school. She and a number of others were bathing and it is supposed that the undertow caught her. The body was carried out to sea and not recovered. She was a most estimable young lady and her sudden death is a shock to many friends in the Pecos Valley who knew her and loved her.—Roswell Register.

MINERAL AND METAL PRODUCTION OF THE UNITED STATES.

The "Engineering and Mining Journal" of June 9th will publish the full tables of mineral and metal production of the United States in 1899 as prepared for the "Mineral Industry," Volume VIII. The total value of this output as estimated at the mines or places of production was \$1,211,361,861—an amount unexampled in the history of the United States or of any other country. This total, however, necessarily includes certain duplications, which amounted to \$92,481,031, making the total net value of our mineral production \$1,118,789,830. This compares with a corresponding value of \$799,518,033 in 1898, showing an increase in 1899 of \$319,262,191, or 39.9 per cent. This enormous increase was in part due to an increase in quantities, and in part to the great advance in values of iron, steel, copper, and other metals. The United States last year was the greatest producer of coal, salt, iron, copper, silver and lead in the world, and was also a leader in the production of many of the less important metals. The value of its mineral production now far exceeds that of any other country. Of the total in 1899, crude ores and minerals contributed \$580,836,032, metals reduced from our own ores \$496,057,320, secondary products—such as alum, white lead, soda, etc.—\$63,996,969; while the value of metals smelted or refined from foreign material was \$70,471,540.

The extent of our production is shown by the figures which include 252,115,387 short tons of coal, 13,400,735 long tons of pig iron, 581,319,691 pounds of copper, 217,085 tons of lead, 129,675 tons of zinc, 57,126,834 ounces of silver, and \$70,096,021 in gold.

The most important single item of production was coal, which furnished 25.4 per cent. of the total value. Iron was second, forming 20.9 per cent., copper third, with 8.3 per cent. Clay products were fourth in order, their value constituting 6.1 per cent. of the whole. Gold was fifth in order with 5.9 per cent. of the total, petroleum sixth with 5.3 per cent., stone seventh with 3.5 per cent., and silver eighth with 2.8 per cent., lead 1.6 per cent., cement 1.3 per cent., zinc 1.2 per cent., and natural gas 1 per cent. These figures show the relatively great importance of fuel and the materials of construction. They show, also, what is seldom appreciated, the extent of the building industries and the material employ, such as stone, clay and cement.

The New Mexico Mining & Extraction company which was lately incorporated in Colorado with a capital stock of \$100,000, is buying up a number of promising copper claims in the White Oaks country.—El Paso Times.

John S. Trigger, a prospector from the White Oaks country, has brought to El Paso some rich samples of copper ore from a claim he has located in Lincoln county, New Mexico. The ore runs 30 per cent copper, and also shows a trace of gold.—El Paso Times.

CATTLE SALE.

Tom Pridmore, range manager for the El Capitan Land and Cattle Co., sold W. R. Curtis 1,400 of one and two-year-old "Block" steers last Friday at \$17 and \$22, and started them on Saturday to the Texas line where they are to be delivered.—Roswell Register.

GAME AND FISH LAW VIOLATED.

M. S. Graves, of Bonito, was here Monday. Graves says if steps are not taken to prevent it, that fish in the mountain streams will soon be destroyed by outsiders who are camping in the river districts, who are either ignorant of the law, or who openly violate it.

The Eagle has suggested that Graves be given authority from the proper source to bring the high handed violators of the fish and game law in that locality to justice. This is a matter of importance and should be attended to by the inhabitants of the district.

TRUST PRICES.

The Democratic Congressional Committee has given out a statement showing to what extent the various trusts have increased the prices of their products. The list is so long to print, but the following articles, all of which are made by trusts, will give some idea of the burden laid upon the consumer by these institutions, which have been so fostered by four years of Republican tariff and Republican refusal to prosecute even in cases of the plainest violation of statute law. All the increases below are from January 7, 1899 to December 30, 1899: Linseed oil, from 41 to 50 cents; petroleum, \$7.50 to \$9.90; sugar, \$4.94 to \$5.12; ipecac, \$2.50 to \$3.65; camphor, 38 1/2 cents to 51 1/2 cents; quinine, 21 cents to 30 cents; sal soda, 62 1/2 cents to 70 cents; leather, 20 cents to 25 1/2 cents; calico, 2 1/2 cents to 3 1/2 cents; jute hemp, 2 1/2 cents to 3 1/2 cents; pig lead, \$3.95 to \$4.65; tin-plate, \$3.00 to \$5.25; Portland cement, \$1.95 to \$2.25; nails, \$1.10 to \$2.50; wire nails, \$1.35 to \$3.20; anthracite coal, \$3.75 to \$4.20; glass, \$2.57 to \$2.89; rubber, 94 cents to \$1.45. The only prices to fall were those of farm products. The Year Book of the Department of Agriculture for 1899, recently issued, shows that the farm products and farm animals in 1899, although vastly increased in quantity since 1890, had fallen off in value to the extent of \$706,969,971. This only counts as farm products corn, wheat, oats, barley, rye, buckwheat, potatoes, hay and cotton. If the farm products of 1899 had brought the same prices as did the same products in 1890, they would have brought more than they did by the sum of \$2,609,437,584. The farmers raised 1,013,000,000 more bushels of produce in 1899 than they did in 1890, and yet this produce was worth \$205,000,000 less than was the smaller crop of 1890. This only calculates the cereals.

ADMIRAL DEWEY.

Admiral Dewey insists that he stands just where he did three months ago. And furthermore, in the matter of retaining the Philippines, he wants it distinctly understood that he stands just where he did on the 1st of May, 1898. --Chieftain.

The whole country knows exactly where Dewey stands on matrimonial and expansion questions, but it is extremely difficult to locate him as a presidential possibility. He may fire though when he is ready.

LARRAZOLO WILL ACCEPT.

O. A. Larrazolo, of Las Vegas, announces that he is willing to accept the democratic nomination for delegate to congress. This of itself is convincing proof that Larry is a brave man. --Albuquerque "Citizen."

Yes, a brave, able and true man he is and strong enough, too. This is a democratic year in New Mexico. The looters must go. --Optic.

SLACKING UP.

Alamogordo, N. M. June 21. --Business and building is slacking up here lately. One of the saw mills shut down throwing about 100 men out of work here in the woods. The railroad company has laid off about 55 men in their shops, on the section and other departments and are cutting expenses all around. --Albuquerque Journal-Democrat.

ANTI-EXPANSIONISTS.

Bailey and anti-expansionists, captured the Texas State Convention. A resolution condemning the theory of expansion and instructing for Bryan for president was adopted. Eight delegates at large were elected from the state instead of four which is the usual number.

NOMINATED FOR GOVERNOR.

William J. Jennings, a cousin of W. J. Bryan, has been nominated by the democrats of Florida, for governor. He is 37 years of age. A democratic nomination in Florida means an election.

ALAMOGORDO GOT THE COLLEGE.

The Eagle received a letter from Rev. R. P. Pope, of Alamogordo, yesterday morning, announcing that that place had secured the location of the Baptist college, to be built by the Texas Baptist Association, in New Mexico.

It has been reported here that Alamogordo raised a cash subscription of something like \$5000, beside a land donation adjacent to the city, of 100 acres. This subscription will nearly, if not quite, build the \$7000 dormitory to be erected this year, and is a very creditable showing for the "business men of Alamogordo." White Oaks, of course, had no railroad or corporation to swell her subscription to this enterprise, and the amount raised here, which reached about \$6,600, was raised right in town by our own citizens.

While White Oaks regrets very much that the institution was not located here, there is no ill feeling toward Alamogordo; but on the other hand, we congratulate her energetic citizens in securing the enterprise for their town.

Considered from a standpoint of climate, water, building materials, etc., White Oaks unquestionably has some advantages over Alamogordo, but there's always two sides to every question, and evidently Alamogordo's cash balance, augmented by her other virtues, predominated in the estimate of Rev. C. C. Waller, who had the entire say in the matter.

There is a proposition on foot here now to use the amount of money subscribed to the college enterprise to the organization of a board of trade and local mining exchange to co-operate with the El Paso Chamber of Commerce in putting our resources of minerals, etc., prominently before the public. A handsome and elaborate exhibit is now being collected here for the Chamber of Commerce as a starter.

JUDGE WARREN DEAD.

Judge Henry L. Warren, one of New Mexico's most prominent attorneys, died at his home in Albuquerque, on the 22, inst. Judge Warren has been known in the courts of New Mexico as one of the territory's ablest practitioners for more than twenty years, as a lawyer of great natural talent as well as a very extensive acquired knowledge of law. It is often said that there is always some one to take the place vacated by another, but in this instance it will be difficult to find a legal mind so fortunately endowed as to wield the sphere of influence in New Mexico's courts as did that of Judge Warren.



WHITE OAKS MINING EXHIBIT.

Now Being Prepared For the Chamber of Commerce of El Paso.

Maj. S. M. Davis, who has been selected by the Chamber of Commerce of El Paso to secure from the different mining districts surrounding that city, a collection of minerals representing the resources of the southwest, reached here last Saturday noon. He met the people of White Oaks just at the right time, and a very great interest was immediately manifested by everybody the Major became acquainted with. He remained over here from Saturday noon until Wednesday when he went to Nogal to meet the people there for the purpose of collecting an exhibit from that locality.

The Major expressed himself as wonderfully surprised at the immense resources in and around this town; and says White Oaks may easily have the greatest mineral exhibit that will reach the Chamber of Commerce from the entire Southwest.

All arrangements have been made and men are at work getting out minerals, cutting the stone etc. The exhibit will comprise the following variety of resources: Old Abe Gold exhibit as well as Gold from each of the other mines here; Copper, Iron, Coal, Fire Clay, Red Sandstone, Black Sandstone, Cream colored Sandstone, Black Marble, Variegated Marble, Lead, Gypsum, Lime and Sulphur. The Old Abe will have on exhibition ores from the mine showing Sulphides, Alumite, and a blue shale, all gold bearing and of sufficient quantities to be representative of the virtues of the property.

The exhibit embracing the above variety of resources will be sent to the Chamber of Commerce at El Paso as soon as it can be gotten together. Maj. Davis will meet the shipment at Carrizozo and with a committee from here will deliver it to the Chamber of Commerce at El Paso.

CAPITAN NEWS.

(MINER.)

A deal of no little importance to Lincoln county, was consummated the past week, whereby over one thousand acres of valuable coal lands were sold to Archibald McCullough a millionaire of New York. The tract of land sold to Mr. McCullough embraces some of the most valuable coal land adjacent to Capitan. The deal was made through M. Griffin O'Neil, who was in Roswell the past week to meet Mr. McCullough representatives, where the sale was closed. Mr. McCullough has a number of eastern capitalists associated with him and development work on the property will begin at once. This, with two other deals now on foot, would indicate that we are to have several coal companies operating in this section in the near future.

A number of Lincoln county people have located valuable copper prospects in the Oscura mountains, fifteen miles from Malagosa station on the E.P. & N.E. road. There is said to be a great amount of copper there and the outlook would amply justify the erection of a plant to treat the ores. Recently John H. Skinner of Bonito located a copper claim in the Oscura district, samples of which he has brought to this office. The smelter assay gives 15 per cent copper and Burlington's assay give 14.24 per cent copper, 3 per cent iron and no sulphur, zinc or lead, and worth 2.80 per unit. This prospect is called The First of March; has but little development work done on it but shows up a well defined 4-foot lead of vein matter. There are a number other promising prospects in the Oscura district.

A. K. Wells and a syndicate of eastern capitalists have recently purchased the American property and Mr. Wells is expected to arrive at Nogal in a short time to begin active mine operations. Messrs. Dolph & Robinson, who own the Helen Rea are men of considerable mining experience, and have made a success of the mining business in Arizona and other places. It is confidently expected that the Helen Rea will soon be again producing gold.

The new copper camp west of Nogal is attracting unusual attention, rich finds of copper glance are being made every day and preparations are being made for shipping ore from a number of prospects just as soon as the new wagon road to the station is completed. Experienced miners tell us that this is the richest copper find made in Southern New Mexico.
