## DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE NUMBER TWO: THE DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM OF 1900.

KANSAS CITY, July 6.—The following is the official text of the platform:

We, representatives of the Democratic party of the United States, assembled in national convention, on the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, do re-affirm our faith in the immortal proclamation of inalienable rights to man, and our allegiance to the constitution framed in harmony therewith by the fathers of the republic.

We hold with the United States supreme court, that the Declaration of Independence is the spirit of our government, of which the constitution is the form and letter. We declare again that all governments instituted among men derive their just powers from the consent of the governed; that any government not based upon the consent of the governed is tyranny; and that to impose upon any people a government officer is to substitute methods of imperialism for those of a republic. We hold the constitution follows the flag, and denounce the doctrine that the executive or congress, deriving existence and power from the people, can exercise unlawful authority beyond it, in violation of it. We assert no nation can long endure half republic and half empire, and warn the people that imperialism abroad will lead quickly and inevitably to despotism at home.

Believing in these fundamental principles, we denounce the Porto Rican law enacted by the Republican congress against the protest and opposition of the Democratic minority, as a bold and open violation of the nations organic law and a flagrant breach of national good faith. It imposes upon the people of Porto Rico a government without their consent and taxation without representation. It dishonors the American people by repudiating the solemn pledge made in their behalf by the commanding general of our army, which the Porto Ricans welcomed to a peaceful and unresisted occupation of their land. It doomed to poverty and distress the people whose helplessness appeals with peculiar force to our justice and magnanimity. In this first act of its imperialistic program, the Republican party seeks to commit the United States to a colonial policy, inconsistent with Republican institutions and condemned by the supreme court in numerous decisions.

We demand prompt and honest fulfillment of every pledge to the Cuban people and the world, that the United States has no disposition or intention to exercise sovereignty, jurisdiction or control over the island of Cuba, except for its pacification. The war ended nearly two years ago, profound peace reigns all over the island and still the administration keeps the island from its people while the Republican carpetbag officials plunder its revenues and exploit the colonial theory to the disgrace of the American people.

We condemn and denounce the Philippine policy of the present administration. It has embroiled the republic in unnecessary war, sacrificed the lives of many of its noblest sons, and placed the United States, previously known and applauded throughout the world as the champion of freedom, in a false and un-American position, crushing with military force the efforts of our former allies instead of aiding them to

achieve liberty and self-government. The Filipinos can not be citizens without endangering our civilization; cannot be subjects without imperilling our form of government, and as we are not willing to surrender our civilization or convert the republic into an empire, we favor an immediate declaration of the nation's purpose to give the Filipinos first, a stable government; second, independence; and third, protection from outside interference, such as has been given for nearly a century to the republics of Central and South America.

The greedy commercialism which dictated the Filipino policy of the Republican administration attempts to justify it with the plea it will pay, but even this sordid unworthy plea fails when brought to test of facts. "The war of criminal aggression" against the Philippines, entailing annually an expense of many millions, has already cost more than any possible profit could accrue from the entire Philippine trade for years to come. Furthermore, when trade is extended at the expense of liberty, the price is too high. We are not opposed to territorial expansion when it takes in desirable territory which can be erected into states in the Union, and whose people are willing and fit to become American citizens. We favor trade expansion. But we are unalterably opposed to seizing or purchasing distant islands to be governed outside of the constitution and whose people can never become citizens.

We are in favor of extending the Republic's influence among nations, but believe the influence should be extended, not by force and violence, but through a persuasive power of high and honorable example.

The importance of other questions now pending before the American people is in no wise diminished and the Democratic party takes no backward step from its position, but the burning issue of imperialism growing out of the Spanish war, involves the very existence of the Republic and destruction of our free institutions. We regard it the paramount issue of the campaign.

The declaration in the Republican platform adopted in the Philadelphia convention, held in June, 1900, that the Republican party "steadfastly adheres to the policy announced in the Monroe doctrine," is manifestly insincere and deceptive. This profession contradicted by the avowed policy of the party in opposition to the spirit of the Monroe doctrine, to acquire and hold sovereignty over large areas of territory and large numbers of people in the eastern hemisphere. We insist on a strict maintenance of the Monroe doctrine, and on all its integrity, letter and spirit, as necessary to prevent an extension of European authority on this continent and as essential to our supremacy of American affairs. At the same time we declare no American people shall ever be held by force in unwilling subjection to European authority.

We oppose militarism. It means conquest abroad and intimidation and oppression at home. It means the strong arm which has even been fatal to the free institutions. It is what millions of our citizens fled from in Europe. It will impose upon our peace loving people a large standing army, un-

sary burden of taxation and a constant menace to their liberties. A small standing army and well disciplined state militia is amply sufficient in time of peace. This republic has no place for a vast military service and conscription. When the nation is in danger the volunteer soldier is his country's best defender. The national guard of the United States should ever be cherished in patriotic hearts of free people. Such organizations are ever the element of strength and safety. For the first time in history and coeval with the Philippine contest has there been a wholesale departure from our time-honored and approved system of volunteer organization. We denounce it, un-American, undemocratic, un-republican and as a subversion of ancient and fixed principles of free people.

Private monopolies are indefensible and intolerable. They destroy competition, control the price of raw material and finished products, thus robbing both the producer and consumer. These lessen the employment of labor and arbitrarily fix the terms and conditions thereof, and deprive individual energy and small capital of their opportunity of betterment. They are the most efficient means yet devised for appropriating the fruits of industry to benefit the few at the expense of the many, and unless their insatiate greed is checked, all wealth will be aggregated in a few hands and the republic destroyed. Dishonest faltering with the trust evil by the Republican party state and national platforms is conclusive proof of the truth of the charge that trusts are the legitimate product of Republican policies, that they are fostered by Republican laws and protected by the Republican administration in return for campaign subscriptions and political support.

We pledge the Democratic party to unceasing warfare in the nation, state and city against private monopoly of every form. The existing law against trusts must be enforced and more stringent ones must be enacted providing for publicity as to affairs of corporations engaged in interstate commerce and requiring all corporations to show before doing business outside of the state of their origin that they have no water in their stock and have not attempted and are not attempting to monopolize any business or production of any articles of merchandise, and the whole constitutional power of congress over interstate commerce and mails and all modes of interstate communication shall be exercised by the enactment of comprehensive laws upon the subject of trusts. The tariff laws should be amended by jutting the products or trust upon the free list to prevent monopoly under the plea of protection.

The failure of the present Republican administration, with absolute control over all branches of the national government, to enact any legislation designed to prevent or even curtail the absorbing power of the trusts and illegal combinations, or enforce the anti-trust laws already on the statute book prove the insincerity of the high sounding phrases of the Republican platform.

Corporations should be protected in all their rights, and legitimate interests should be respect-

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE NO. 2  
(Continued from Page One)

ed, but any attempt by corporations to interfere with the public affairs of the people or control of the sovereignty which created them, should be forbidden under such penalties as will make such attempts impossible.

We condemn the Dingley tariff law as a trust-breeding measure, skillfully devised to give a few, favors which they do not deserve, and place upon the many burdens which they should not bear.

We favor such an enlargement of the scope of the interstate commerce law as will enable the commission to protect individuals and communities from discrimination, and the public from unjust and unfair transportation rates.

We re-affirm and endorse the principles of the national democratic platform adopted at Chicago in 1896, and reiterate the demand of that platform for an American financial system made by the American people for themselves, which shall restore and maintain the bimetallic price level and as a part of such system the immediate restoration of free and unlimited coinage of silver and gold at the legal ratio of 16 to 1 without the aid or consent of any other nation.

We denounce the currency bill entered at the last session of congress as a step forward in the republican policy which aims to discredit the sovereign right of the national government to issue all money whether coin or paper, and bestows upon national banks the power to issue and control the volume of paper money for their benefit. Permanent national bank currency is to increase with population and business, the debt for the benefit of banks. We are opposed to this private corporation paper circulation as money, but without legal tender qualities, and demand the retirement of national bank notes as fast as government paper or silver certificates can be substituted for them.

We favor an amendment to the federal constitution providing for the election of United States senators by a direct vote of the people, and favor direct legislation wherever practicable.

We are opposed to government by injunction; we denounce the blacklist and favor arbitration as a means of settling disputes between corporations and their employees.

In the interest of American labor and the upbuilding of workingmen, as a cornerstone to the prosperity of our country, we recommend congress to create a department of labor in charge of a secretary with a seat in the cabinet believing that the elevation of the American laborer will bring with it increased production and increasing prosperity to our country at home and to our commerce abroad.

We are proud of the courage and fidelity of the American soldiers and sailors in all of our wars; we favor liberal pensions to them and their dependents and reiterate the position taken in the Chicago platform in 1896, that the fact of enlistment and service shall be deemed conclusive evidence against disease and disability before enlistment.

We favor the immediate construction, ownership and control of the Nianguan canal by the United States and we denounce the insincerity of the plank in the republican national platform for the isthmian canal in the face of the failure of the republican majority to pass the bill pending in congress.

We condemn the Hay-Pauncefot treaty as a surrender of American rights and interests, not to be tolerated by the American people.

We denounce the failure of the republican party to carry out its pledges to grant statehood to the territories of Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma, and we promise the people of those territories

immediate statehood and home rule during their continuation as territories and we favor home rule as a territorial form of government for Alaska and Porto Rico. We favor an intelligent system of improving the arid lands of the west, restoring and holding such lands for actual settlers.

We favor the continuance and strict enforcement of the Chinese exclusion law and its application to the same classes of all Asiatic races.

Jefferson said: "Peace, commerce and honest friendship with all nations, entangling alliances with none." We approve the wholesome doctrine and earnest protest against the republican departure which involved us in the so-called world of politics, including the diplomacy of Europe and in the intrigue and landgrabbing of Asia and specially condemn the ill-concealed republican alliance with England which has already stifled the nation's peace while liberty is being strangled in Africa.

Believing in the principles of self government and rejecting as did our forefathers the claim of monarchy, we view the purpose of England to overwhelm with force the South African republics, with indignation. Speaking, as we believe for the entire American nation, except its republican officers, and for all free men everywhere, we extend our sympathies to the burghers in their struggle to maintain their liberty and independence.

We denounce the lavish appropriations of the recent republican congress, which have kept taxes high and which threaten perpetuation of oppressive war levies.

We oppose the accumulation of a surplus to be squandered in such barefaced frauds upon taxpayers as the ship subsidy bill, which, under the false pretenses of prospering American ship building, would put unearned millions into the pockets of contributors to republican campaign fund.

We favor the reduction and speedy repeal of war taxes and return to the time-honored policy of governmental expenditures. Believing our most cherished institutions are in great peril, that the very existence of our constitutional republic is at stake, and the decision now to be rendered will determine whether or not our children are to enjoy these blessed privileges of free government great, prosperous and honored, we earnestly ask for the foregoing declaration of principles the hearty support of liberty-loving American people, regardless of previous party affiliations.
