NEW MEXICO FAIR AT ALBUQUERQUE.

To the people of the Southwest: The twentieth annual fair of the New Mexico Territorial Fair Association will be held in the city of Albuquerque from September 18th to 22nd, 1900, and like the exhibition given last fall, will be a grand free street fair and carnival.

There will be a base ball tournament, open to amateur clubs of New Mexico, Arizona and El Paso, Texas, professionals barred, and first, second and third money prizes will be offered.

Besides this tournament, which ought to stir the baseball players and fans of the Southwest into active practice, the executive committee has decided to give liberal money prizes for tug-of-war contests, rock-drilling contests, foot racing and numerous other athletic sports.

Arrangements have been made with a first class eastern amusement company, who will handle the "Midway Plaisance" features; while contracts will be mailed to a first-class aeronaut, who, with his lady partners, will give balloon ascensions every afternoon and evening during the fair. The ascensions at night will be with electrical effects, and on the race order, and while in the air the aeronauts will bombard each other with Roman candles and other firing devices.

One of the most interesting features of last fall's successful fair was the splendid fireworks, given under the skillful management of W. H. Wilson, a pyrotechnist of Los Angeles, Cal. He has been re-engaged for the forthcoming fair, and he writes that his designs will be entirely new and some of them will represent some of the great political questions now pending before the American people.

The platform features will be numerous, consisting in part of May-pole dances, serpentine dances, acrobatic and trapeze performances, and, if possible, the committee will reproduce the "American Flag," which was successfully given at the national encampment of the G. A. R. several years ago.

During the week a grand trades' display and parade, with numerous attractive and costly floats, will be given, and this feature has already been assured a success by the manifest interest of the merchants, the Elks, the Woodmen of the world, the C. Colombo Society, and other organizations, who will be represented by appropriate floats. Each and every division of the parade will be headed by a brass band.

The merchants of Albuquerque—the solid contributors of these annual fairs—extend a cordial invitation to the people of the Southwest to attend this fall's fair festivities, assuring all visitors that they will be royally entertained and that they will be well pleased and satisfied with their visit to Albuquerque.

The railroads will give greatly reduced rates to all fair visitors.

NEW MEXICO'S DEAD CITY--GRAN QUIVERA.

Its Fictitious and Legendary History to be Studied by Uncle Sam's Scientists this Summer.

Uncle Sam this summer is going to explore the least-known region within the limits of the United States—the mysterious country of Western Texas, where the old-time adventurer Coronado was lost, together with his band of followers, while searching for the golden village of Gran Quivera. He was led to believe that there was such a village, filled with stores of the yellow metal, by the tales of the treacherous Indians who conducted him into those wilds for the purpose of losing the party and leaving them to starve in the desert wastes. They were taken by their false guides across the Staked Plains into this vast and horrible trap; but, having discovered the snare, they managed to make their way out of it.

The government expedition will be headed by Robert T. Hill of the United States Geological Survey. Yesterday Mr. Hill said: "Notwithstanding the vast amount of exploration and scientific research that has been going on, some of the most elementary features of American geography are at present practically unknown. We may say to begin with that the most conspicuous feature of the North American continent is the great Cordillera or Rocky Mountain system, with its bordering ranges of gigantic Sierras inclosing vast basin deserts. This system stretches, in a shape that may be likened to a canoe, from British Columbia to the drop-off of the Mexican plateau south of the City of Mexico.

The eastern rim of the canoe, known as the Rockies, has been mapped up to date only as far as Santa Fe, New Mexico, Western Texas and Northeast Mexico are many great mountains and ranges which have never been delineated on any chart. No definite idea exists as to their arrangement, the elevation to which they rise or the details of their topography. It is known, however, that in Mexico, south of the mouth of the Rio Grande, the mountains of the mighty system run into the sea, where the great coastal plain that begins in New Jersey and runs down the east shore of the continent comes to an end.

The problem is to find out something about these mountains, with other details necessary for the mapping of this country, which at present is so completely unknown. Last summer I made a section across the east-front ranges in the Great Bend region of Texas, and this year I am going to reconnoiter the vast territory which lies between there and Santa Fe, to the north and west. From the little that is known of the country in question, it may be described as a land of peculiar conformation, mighty ranges of mountains alternating with vast stretches of waterless tablelands, bordered by precipitous cliffs and inclosing immense desert valleys called 'bolsons' by the Mexicans. The word bolson means literally a purse, and hence is applied to these inclosed areas which have no drainage outlet to the sea. Among the mountains one may mention the Sacramento group, the highest peak of which, El Capitan, is said to be over 13,000

feet in height above the sea level, and is covered with valuable pine forests.

This region has many very remarkable natural features, among which I might speak of Howard Bolson, on the line between Texas and Mexico, with its strange lake of crystal salt. It is quite a large body of water, and is always covered with a thin layer of salt, which up to very recent times was the chief source of salt supply for all of Northern Mexico. The natives used to come hundreds of miles to get it. But the railways arrived, civilization was introduced and an American named Howard took possession of the lake under settler's rights. That was about ten years ago. Inasmuch as the aborigines had always considered the lake the common property of all, they resented the monopoly and murdered the new owner. Of course, the salt is derived from the rocks of the mountains surrounding the lake, being carried into the latter by streams. There is no outlet, and evaporation being very rapid, the saline element steadily accumulates.

I ought not to forget to mention the wonderful Desert of White Sand, which covers several hundred square miles. Over all of its area, there is nothing but the purest white sand, which is not quartz, like beach sand, but composed of grains of gypsum or alabaster. As you may imagine, it is very beautiful. Contrasting with this are the equally interesting Malpais lands, the surface of which is made up of lava. This lava makes a broad ribbon running 40 miles southward from a crater situated midway between the Sierra Oscura and the Sacramento range, the volcano itself raising from the center of a bolson desert. The lava is bubbly, ropey and cinder-like in different parts, and has the appearance of having been discharged in a molten condition at a very recent period.

Again, there are the wonderful vermilion lands—vast stretches of blood-red landscape, broken only by occasional strips of snow-white gypsum. They are an outcrop of the red clays and rocks of the ancient Permian formation. Rising sometimes 1,000 feet or more above the desert plains are the superb escarpments of the plateaus, the summits cliffs of which are often so sheer and vertical that the traveler is obliged to follow the edge for many miles before he can find a place where it is practicable to descend. These tremendous cliffs are called by the Mexicans, in their picturesque nomenclature, 'Cejas,' or 'Eyebrows,' and of this character is the magnificent Ceja de Galisteo, not far to the southward of Santa Fe.

Hardly any water reaches the ocean from this weird and uninviting country and only two rivers lead out of it—namely, the Pecos and the Rio Grande. But these two streams are not at all like ordinary rivers, which all along their course gather fresh contributions from every creek and rill. The Rio Grande and Pecos can scarcely be said to have

The total tax levy as reported to the EAGLE last week by Deputy Assessor J. A. Gumm was too high, and should have been .0323 instead of .0352. The total levy for this school district, including territorial, county and special school levy, is .0363. This rate is, as the EAGLE has before stated, much too high, but is in a degree justifiable for the reason that probably the majority of the taxpayers render about one-half of their property for taxation; this necessarily makes the rate on the amount rendered much higher than it should be. So the degree of malfeasance falls alike on both taxpayer and tax assessor, leaving the expense of territorial, county and municipal government to be paid in undue proportion at least by the individual who justly renders his property for taxation.

It appears to the EAGLE that the first step to a successful remedy for the evil in question would be for each and every taxpayer to render his property for taxation at its just value, and subsequently demand a reduction in the rate, which could not well be refused. It is a question which commands the attention of the taxpayer, as well as the individual who aspires for political preferment. All are agreed that a lower rate is desired, and even is a necessity as an inducement to outside capital to invest in our territory and incidentally aid in the development of its resources.

IN THE COLONIES.

The withdrawal of troops from South Africa and the Philippine Islands for service in China is alike increasing the troubles of Britain and the United States in their respective colonial wars.

The Boers led by De Wet, cut through Robert's lines and successfully captured 100 Highlanders and a supply train, cutting off Lord Robert's communication both by rail and telegraph. The Filipinos are displaying great activity and are pressing the Americans at every point of vantage.

IN CHINA.
 There is no lack of confusion and uncertainty in the reports from the seat of war in China. Dispatches concerning the safety of the legations are discredited and the situation as a whole is a gloomy one and a confirmation of the truth of the rumors that all foreigners and foreign legations at Peking have been destroyed is expected.

BECKHAM NOMINATED.

The Democrats of Kentucky have nominated Beckham for governor, declared for the national platform, and recommended the repeal of the Goebel election law.

A FORTUNE IN GUANO DEPOSITS OF NEW MEX.

The bat caves of New Mexico are a source of much wealth to their owners. John R. DeMier of Las Cruces, who owns extensive caves in the territory, says that the annual deposit in his caves is 1696 tons. Bat guano is one of the richest fertilizers produced and is very valuable. The New Mexico guano and phosphate are valued at an average of \$48 per ton, and in a year and nine months 3,392,240 pounds have been removed. The caves are of lava formation and are sometimes six miles in length. Taking it all in all, big bat caves are as good as gold mines.—El Paso Herald.

NATURAL GAS WELLS AT LAS VEGAS, N. M.

A well 300 feet deep has been sunk at Las Vegas, and the Optic says of it and of New Mexico's natural gas product: "A lighted paper thrown into it roars like a cannon and a flame shoots up higher than the pile of dirt from an excavation not yet 300 feet deep. Let's see, up to date there has been oil, gold, silver and copper struck out there, and now comes natural gas. The formation resembles that formed in the oil regions of Pennsylvania and it would not seem to be a matter of depth. The assylum authorities will sink the well down 400 feet and then the citizens may join and make another contract with the well diggers."—El Paso Herald.

CATTLE DYING OF THIRST IN ARIZONA.

The wells, waterholes and reservoirs have gone dry and the drouth is causing the death of cattle by the thousands. The Gila, Salt River and San Pedro are all failing or gone dry. The alfalfa, barley and wheat crops between Florence and Casa Grande are lost and the Pima crops have practically failed. Forest fires are raging in the Santa Catalina mountains and the country is suffering terribly from the lack of water.—El Paso Herald.

NEW MEXICO'S DEAD CITY--GRAN QUIVERA.
(Continued from Page One.)

any tributaries; they are mere canals passing through the country, as one might say, their waters being derived from the snows of the mountains of Colorado. On a large map of Western Texas you will find a great many streams of various sizes, but they are all head and no tail, being absorbed eventually into the sands of the desert. It was a great volcanic country once—the territory I am describing. Its volcanic craters are not mere necks or cores, like most of the so-called craters of the United States; they are gigantic heaps of cinders, and preserve their contour so perfectly as to convey a vivid notion of their recent activity.

"In the vast stretch between the Pecos and the Rio Grande are many ruins left behind by an ancient aboriginal population. Some of them, as Gran Quivera—not to be confused by the way, with the mythical golden village of Coronado—show evidence of having been occupied by a once numerous people of which there is no record in history or tradition. There are remains of extensive irrigation works where now there is no water, and the only reasonable theory seems to be that the population was driven away by the drying up of the water supply, which formerly existed.

"Not the least interesting point about this country is that its settlement and development have preceded its exploration by geographers. Railroads are being built through it, its vast forests of pine ore being attacked by sawmills, and prosperous towns are growing up in those portions of it which are habitable, and yet almost nothing about the country is authentically known." Washington Post.

THE GRAN QUIVERA

BELL AT SOCORRO.

In the office of C. T. Brown, of the Buckeye Mining Co., with office at Socorro is found what is alleged to be the oldest bell in the United States. This historic bell was made in 1549, in 1680, the church was destroyed by the Indians. In 1734 the bell was dug out of the ruins of an old church at Gran Quivera, an old pueblo and Spanish city, said by several Spanish historians to have exceeded twenty thousand population. From Gran Quivera the bell was brought back to Socorro and hung in the old San Miguel church.

In 1781 this church at Socorro was destroyed by Indians and the people driven south to Ileta, near El Paso. In 1806 a colony of 70 families came from Belen, on the Rio Grande, and resettled Socorro and repaired the old church, which stands to this day. This old bell was again resurrected and placed in the church. The bell weighs 461 pounds. The metal used in it came from a mine in Grant county, called the Santa Rita de Copie. The women added all their jewelry of silver and gold to it. Chippings from the old bell have been assayed and it is found that it is worth over \$400 in gold and silver.

This bell was the first to ring on the American continent, and that on the banks of the Rio Grande. Seventy years before the Mayflower sailed into Boston harbor, this old bell with its clear tone, was calling together a brave little band of worshipers with their weapons of defense in one hand and the cross in the other.—Santa Fe New Mexican.
