### J. H. CANNING IN NEW YORK

#### MARKET FOR GOODS.

Buyers from New Mexico are not often encountered in Eastern markets, much of the house-buying from that section being done in Chicago and St. Louis. Our reporter, however, met J. H. Canning, secretary and treasurer of the Taliaferro Mercantile and Trading Company at the rooms of the Merchants' Association. This company's headquarters are at White Oaks, with branches at Nogal and Jicarilla.

"Our business," said Mr. Canning, "was established in 1880 as Young & Taliaferro, and incorporated under the present name in 1898. We do a general merchandise business, with a department or two not generally included in a metropolitan bazaar—for instance, sheep and wool. With us, that is a most important department. We are expansionists our way, and from being on a branch road for years we are about to become a station on the trunk line of the Rock Island system. That will mean great things for our section. Our mining includes gold, copper and coal. Stock raising is no insignificant industry. As wool growers we are naturally deep-dyed Republicans. We have views, but no votes. We are still in the political kindergarten.

"This is the first time I have come to the New York market. We usually go to Chicago—sometimes St. Louis. There is no question, however, but that this is the market of this continent. There is but one New York."—Dry Goods Economist.

### INTERESTING NOTES FOR PROSPECTORS.

First—Remember that the gold in the surrounding surface is the only guide to a pocket.

Second—Never dig a hole on a quartz ledge with the expectation of finding a pocket unless it will prospect at the start.

Third—When tracing for a pocket, if the gold is smooth, leave it at once, for it's ten to one you will never find it.

Fourth—If your trace runs to a deep bed of clay, don't lose much time in looking for a pocket.

Fifth—Beware of serpentine traces. Most all will prospect and not pocket.

Sixth—Remember fifteen or twenty colors of gold as fine as flour to the pan, and occasional coarse colors as big as a pinhead, is a better trace to a pocket than a single piece of gold worth \$1, even if its rough.

Seventh—The best place to look for pocket ledges do not crop out near the pockets are larger and as easily found.

Eighth—Recollect that nine out of ten pockets ledges do not crop out near the pocket.

Tracing—Commence by panning the top of the ground. It will prospect better there than deeper unless you are near the pocket or on flat ground. Then go deeper, even to the bedrock. If on descending ground, face up hill, panning from right to left as far out as you can get gold and where you get the best prospect, move up hill from that point panning from right to left as before, and move up on the best prospect. Keep this up until you get above the prospect; then go back where you got the last best prospect, dig a small hole half way to the bedrock, and take a pan. Then take one on the bedrock, and if the last prospects best, rest assured you are near the pocket. From there trench up, and if you don't find the ledge and prospects give out, trench across, and you will be certain to find the ledge; if you do not find the pocket, trench both ways along the ledge, panning every inch, and you will be certain to find it, unless it has been distributed over the ground you have traced by the rocks decaying and rain washes. Where a pocket throws out a trace, you will find it at the top of the bedrock, if there is any left.

When you have taken out one pocket, note the formation around it; follow that and you will be likely to find another or a dozen. It is not advisable to sink straight down very deep, unless it will prospect or the formation runs that way, which can be determined by black rock, caused by fine stringers of iron and quartz running towards the ledge; where they strike the ledge, pockets are liable to occur.

Pocket chimneys—like those on the mother lode or any gold-bearing region—do not run straight down, but angle on the ledge. Pocket shoots are often not more than one foot wide, and even less. By the time your shaft is down eight or ten feet, you will have cut through your shoot and left it on the end of the shaft. The same system described to find pockets holds good in locating chimneys on milling lodes, if they contain fine gold or even gold-bearing.

### A BIG MAN QUITS REPUBLICAN PARTY.

John J. Valentine, president of the Wells-Fargo Express Co., makes a strong plea for Bryan, his country and humanity. He uses McKinley's own words to convict him of imperialistic tendencies. In his letter of acceptance Mr. McKinley said: "The Philippines are ours, and there will be no abatement of our rights; no policy of scuttle," etc. This Mr. Valentine calls confirmed imperialism, with an implied determination on the part to the administration to saddle it on the American people by ballot in the November election. Mr. Valentine has always been a republican and voted for President McKinley in 1896, but, unlike Senator Hoar, of Massachusetts, who sees clearly that his party is wrong, but says he has been a republican so long that he cannot now change; Mr. Valentine has declared his intention to vote for Bryan for president. In a letter published in the Boston Herald, July 23rd, Senator Hoar professed hope that McKinley or the republican party would experience a change of heart in its policy of "criminal aggression," yet he feels that he must change his principles to conform to the will of his party, believing it to be wrong, rather than stand on his own convictions and vote for the right.

In defining his position the Wells-Fargo president says:

"My comment upon the foreign policy of McKinley and the republican party is materially embodied in the following words from Benjamin Franklin, in 1776:

"Retaining a trade is not an object for which nations may justly spill each other's blood; the true means for securing commerce is the goodness and cheapness of commodities; and the profit of no trade can ever be equal to the expense of compelling it by fleets and armies"

But there is one—a greater than Franklin—whose admonition is irrevocable, and strikes at the very root of the matter:

"And he spoke a parable unto them, saying, 'the ground of a certain rich man brought forth plentiful; and he reasoned within himself, saying, 'What shall I do, because I have not where to bestow my fruits?' And he said, 'This will I do: I will pull down my barns, and build greater; and there will I bestow all my corn and my goods.' And I will say to my soul, 'Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease, eat, drink, and be merry.' But God said unto him, 'Thou foolish one, this night is thy soul required of thee; and the things which thou hast prepared, whose shall they be?'"

And this recalls to my mind: "Make not the vanishing thy friend,

Nor the permanent thy fool!"

How far and wide we have strayed from the true principles of democratic Republican simplicity may be judged from the happenings of the past three years. Only ten years ago Mr. William McKinley said:

"Human rights and constitutional privileges must not be forgotten in the race for wealth and commercial supremacy. The government of the people must be by the people and not by a few of the people; it must rest upon the free consent of the governed and all of the governed. Power, it must be remembered, which is secured by oppression or usurpation or by any form of injustice, is
