THE GAME LAWS--

WHEN TO HUNT.

Hunters should comply with the following legal regulations enacted by the 33rd territorial legislature:

Section 1. That after the passage of this act it shall be unlawful to kill, wound, snare or trap any quail, grouse, prairie chicken, pheasant, partridge or wild turkey or kill, wound or in any way destroy any antelope, deer, elk or mountain sheep, except that said birds or animals, the animals being with horns, may be killed with a gun during the months of September, October and November of each year in the counties of Rio Arriba, San Juan, Taos, Colfax, Union, San Miguel, Gaudalupe and Santa Fe, and during the months of October, November and December in all other counties of the territory, and,

Provided, that no person shall kill or have in possession more than one antelope, elk, mountain sheep or deer at any one time.

Section 6. Upon petition of 25 voters, county commissioners may suspend the restriction as to killing quail.

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM

Reaffirms Faith in the Declaration of Independence—Denounces the Republican Party for the Closing of Silver Mines in New Mexico, Depriving Thousands of Men of Employment—Commends Fergusson for Securing Lands for Territorial Schools and Institutions—Land Commission Sales, Stephens Bill and attitude of McKinley's Administration Toward Irrigation Interests, Condemned—Favors Construction of Reservoir and Irrigation System by Government—Coal Oil Jobbery and Infamous Jury Laws Condemned—Fellow Servant Bill Favored—Bateman Bill Commended—The Record of the two Parties on Statehood—Liberal Support of Public School System.

We, the representatives of the democratic party of the territory of New Mexico, in convention assembled, do hereby reaffirm our faith in and allegiance to the principles enunciated in the Declaration of Independence and the platform of principles adopted by the national convention of the democratic party, at Kansas City, Missouri, and hereby declare our admiration for and confidence in our standard bearers, the Hon. William Jennings Bryan and Adlai E. Stevenson.

We condemn the policy of the present national administration, which involves alliances defensive and offensive, with sovereign powers, as being contrary to the spirit of the constitution, the sentiment of the American people and the letter of the Declaration of Independence. We denounce the tendency of the present republican administration of the nation to exceed the limitations of the federal constitution, and its evident proneness to disregard and discountenance the principles of human liberty set forth in the Declaration of Independence; and we behold with alarm the plain attempt by a republican president to ignore the organic law of the nation as inconsistent with the natural and legitimate growth and development of the country at home, national rights abroad, and the fulfillment of the republic's destiny.

We adhere to the ancient doctrine of the democratic party demanding equal rights to all and special privileges to none; and we condemn the republican party for its iniquitous tariff legislation, which has fostered and encouraged trusts, and denounce the declarations made by them in their recent platform against trusts as the sheerest hypocrisy, while relying upon them and their organizers for immense contributions to their corruption fund. We likewise denounce the national republican administration for its utter failure to enforce the laws now upon the statute book for the suppression of trusts.

We denounce the hypocritical pretense of the republican party of New Mexico in favor of protection, while it declares its adherence to the gold standard, which has closed the valuable silver mines of New Mexico, and deprived the miners of an opportunity of profitable employment, and has thereby driven thousands of industrious citizens from the territory and depopulated prosperous mining camps.

We condemn the republican administration for its attempt tyrannically and unjustly to make the Filipinos subjects of the United States; and we denounce any form of colonial government as foreign to the spirit of our in-

stitutions. We are opposed to the establishment of a large standing army in time of peace as a menace to free institutions.

We congratulate the territory of New Mexico in securing through the efforts of the Hon. H. B. Fergusson, our last democratic delegate to congress, large tracts of land to the territory for the benefit of the various educational and charitable institutions thereof; and also for securing, on behalf of the public schools of the territory the right to lease the public school lands for the benefit of our public school system, and we pledge the nominee of this convention to further efforts in this behalf. We commend the method inaugurated by that law of leasing the school lands and not selling them, whereby they will be reserved from the grasp of speculators and remain a source of revenue for public education. We are directly opposed to the leasing of the public domain by the federal government, and we charge that the similar declaration contained in the republican territorial platform is hypocritical because pending bills in congress favoring such leasing, are republican in origin and support.

We condemn the land commission of the territory for its selection and sale of large and valuable tracts of timber land at inadequate prices to favored speculators and corporations, and call upon the secretary of the interior to exercise close scrutiny of these transactions.

We are unalterable opposed to the Stephens bill. We further condemn the antagonistic attitude of the McKinley administration toward the irrigation interests of this territory. We deprecate as wholly unwarranted the pe. nicious litigation that has for four years, despite five decisions against the government, prevented the impounding of the flood waters of the Rio Grande, at Elephant Butte, for the irrigation of the farming lands of the Rio Grande valley, and the persistent efforts of the United States attorney of New Mexico in thus discouraging enterprise and driving capital from the territory.

On the other hand, we earnestly favor the construction of a reservoir and irrigation system by the general government, whereby the arid public lands of the west may be brought, as far as possible, under irrigation and disposed of to actual settlers, without in any way discouraging enterprise.

We condemn the McKinley administration for its appointment of an incompetent governor for New Mexico, whose disregard for the law and vicious partisanship has brought disgrace upon

the good name of our territory.

We condemn as a piece of political jobbery the present coal oil inspection law, which, while originally intended to bring revenue into the territorial treasury, was so amended by the last republican legislature as to improperly divert this entire revenue, amounting to between \$10,000 and \$15,000 a year, to the pockets of a gubernatorial favorite, and we concur in the recommendation of the republican convention that the said law should be repealed, though we believe that such recommendation on their part is only intended to deceive the people.

We condemn the last republican legislature for its unparalleled corruption and extravagance in raising salaries of county and territorial offices.

We condemn the last republican legislature for its amendment of the former jury law so as to enable a republican administration of the territory to select its political heelers for jury service.

We denounce the present territorial board of equalization as the tool of railroads and other corporations in the territory of New Mexico, the members of which board, for passes and other favors received, have kept the valuation of the property of such corporations far below what it should in justice have been, and enabled them to escape their proper share of the public burden.

We are opposed to the issuing by railroad companies and other corporations of passes, franchises and other privileges to members of the legislature, or to any territorial or county official, and we favor the passage of a law by the legislature of the territory prohibiting the same.

We favor the passage of a Fellow Servant act by the legislature of New Mexico, making railroad companies and other corporations and individuals liable for the death or injury of any of their employes while in the discharge of their duties, when caused by the negligence or fault of said companies, corporations or individuals, or any of their employes without the negligence or default of the employes so killed or injured.

We favor the continuance in force of what is known as the Bateman law, as a wise and salutary measure for the protection of public funds against the corruption and extravagance of public officials.

We heartily favor the admission of New Mexico into the sisterhood of states, but we believe useless the recommendation submitted in the republican platform concerning the appointment of a committee of fifteen citizens, seven of whom are to be democrats, because the history of the democratic party in congress has demonstrated that its representatives have always favored statehood for the territory, while the representatives of the republican party have always opposed it; and in support of this assertion we cite the fact that a democratic delegate, the Hon. Antonio Joseph, on three different occasions, introduced and passed through a democratic house of representatives a statehood bill for New Mexico, which, in each instance, was defeated in a republican senate.

We favor the enlargement of McKinley county so that its area shall be large enough to enable the citizens of said county to conduct its affairs without a rate of taxation so high as to work a great injustice to its people, and we condemn the republican party for restricting the area of said county for party purposes.

We demand the repeal of the present inadequate road law, and the substitution thereof of a satisfactory measure for the construction and supervision of the public highways.

We pledge the democratic party of the territory to a liberal support of the public school system, and we condemn the republican administration for its partisan policy in administering the school laws of the territory.

OF LOCAL INTEREST.

A MILL FOR THE GODIVA.
The Lady Godiva is going to erect a mill for the purpose of treating its own ores. The property is now in excellent condition and the company is preparing to operate it economically. With its own assay office, mill, and water supply, the property will be on a producing basis which will insure its permanent operation.

AT THE BOSTON BOY.
The Boston Boy force cut into ore Monday in the new tunnel which they have been opening for several months past. The tunnel has reached and passed the original shaft, and the ore encountered is rich and shows the body even more extensive than at first imagined. Mr. Preswick, the superintendent, is expected here in a few days to again take charge of the property.

OLD ABE GOLD.
The Old Abe Company is again to the front with very rich ore. John Y. Hewitt brought down a box of the prettiest gold the Eagle has ever seen, Tuesday evening. The box contained a large specimen of gold in white quartz that shined like diamonds, as well as numberless wires of the pure yellow metal.

The Old Abe, which has always been to white Oaks what Damon was to Pithias, when other strikes are exciting the people, comes to the front with something a little better than has before been uncovered. Other camps may talk about what they are doing, but White Oaks can show the goods every day.

THE P. V. & N. A. POSSIBILITY.
Engineer Casewell, of the Pecos Valley & Northeastern, is in the city from Roswell. He will be here for several days looking over the country. The Pecos Valley people have been prospecting for coal near here for some time, and the extension of that line to White Oaks is a reasonably well matured certainty. This company made a survey from the Pecos Valley to the White Oaks coal fields five or six years ago, and Mr. Casewell is now looking over the route, and incidentally taking notes on the resources of the country.

ORE IN NEW SHAFT.
Very rich ore was struck this week in the new shaft at the Compromise. This property is truly a wonder. It is opened in three different places, two of which show a very high grade of sulphide ores, and there is every indication that the bodies are extensive and continuous.

The third opening, which is 100 feet west of the new shaft, is a tunnel running into the mountain on a lead of free milling quartz, parallel to the sulphide vein. This vein of free gold is entirely a separate and distinct lead from the sulphide, and the conditions are of an entirely different character. The tunnel which is following the trend of the quartz lead is running south. The two leads will be connected by crosscuts at a depth of 100 feet under the surface. The width of the free milling quartz vein in the tunnel is about two feet and is now producing great values.

The ore in the new shaft sunk to cut the sulphide vein opened the lead at a depth of 60 feet, and the width of the vein in the shaft is not known, as it is extended across the bottom the whole distance each way, and is evidently one of the largest ore bodies in the camp. Assays of the ore taken from the shaft immediately after striking it, ran \$19.50, which, with the immense body of it, will make the compromise a famous producer.

Rich finds have taken place in four or five properties here this week, and a kind of new era is beginning to be noticed among mining men, the outcome of which is going to bring good and lasting results to White Oaks.

SCHELERVILLE ORE.

Fred Smith was in Monday from Schelerville, the new city founded by W. A. McIver in the White mountains, and delivered a number of ore specimens to the Eagle that are worth the while of any mining man to look at. One large chunk of galena which carries large values in silver and some copper, is a beauty. Others containing silver, copper and gold are also in the lot, and as a whole, is a fine collection of mineral.

Schelerville is destined to make a town that will rival anything else in southern New Mexico. W. A. McIver and the Smith Bros., who made the first discoveries there, are men who go about business matters in an intelligent way and who, when they see a business proposition, know how to handle it. They have already shown that district to be one of the most promising copper, lead and silver camps in this section of New Mexico, and they also have a number of gold properties that would cause a Colorado capitalist to get into the stock market in short order.

The corporation known as the Iowa & New Mexico Mining & Milling Co. has opened fourteen claims which alone will make Schelerville a busy camp. The enterprise is thoroughly organized, and the group of fourteen claims have been stocked at \$1,000,000 valuation, and much of the stock has already been taken on the showing now made. The era of wild cat mining that once existed in the Rocky mountains has been buried for years, and the fact that these parties have been able to induce capital to take hold of this tremendous enterprise at Schelerville means that they have everything they have represented to capital that they own, and even more.

Schelerville is near to White Oaks, and White Oaks would like to see the new camp grow and Messrs. McIver and Smith reap the reward that is justly due them for months of labor and the expenditure of capital necessary to show up the wealth of the Schelerville district, which has made it a permanent camp of the White Oaks country.

No frost has fallen yet on the grass lands of this county, and winter ranges are pretty well assured.

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
