**WESTERN COAL PRODUCTION.**

The statistics of 1898 give the production of coal in Colorado as 4,125,206 tons; of coke in Colorado as 1,226,294 tons. In fact, the coal industry of the west, considering its scanty population, is even more active than coal mining in the Alleghanies. The Wyoming coal mines are credited with 1,006,756 tons. Montana's coal production has reached 1,900,000 tons and the coal is of a quality which relieves the smelters from drawing any longer a notable supply from the Canadian northwest. Washington, even, contributes over 3,300,000 tons to the evergrowing demand. Thus these western coal areas, so recently opened, contribute to the total of the country's fuel requirements about 15,000,000 tons, or nearly 12 per cent. of the country's total production.

**ANOTHER PROMISING**

**MINERAL CLAIM.**

The Bonito Company is operating 63 acres of ground in the heart of the gold belt, the development work consisting of a tunnel at the intersection of the Tip Top and Admiral Schley claims. The work is progressing nicely and it is the intention to push the tunnel in 600 feet, which will give a depth of 400 feet and will tap a seven foot vein of mineral which gives assays of \$37 per ton from one of the shallow development shafts. Three known smaller veins and perhaps as many blind veins will be cut during the course of the work, but no attempt will be made to extract ore from them, for the reason that the work will be concentrated toward reaching the large ore body, which goal will at once make a shipping mine and pay dividends on the stock.

The tunnel is being run through fine mineralized porphyry quartz, which assays \$3 in gold throughout. The Bonito properties are located on the continuation of the rich gold belt which has shown up such producers as the American, Helen Ray, Vera Cruz and the big mines of the White Oaks district, and from the geological peculiarities of the country, Col. Thatcher believes that the Bonito district is another center of eruption and that the mineral deposition will there be found more permanent, more regular and in greater force than elsewhere on the belt, which means that mining can be prosecuted there at small expense, the certainty of large returns and freedom from danger of losing the veins.—El Paso News.

I made my fight for the presidency and I lost. I am not going to take other men's positions from them. W. J. BRYAN.

New York, Nov. 8.—Ex-Gov. W. J. Stone said of the proposed reorganization of the democratic party:

"This kind of talk always follows the defeat of any party. Had the republicans been defeated, they would be talking reorganization today. Those who have the most to say about reorganization are generally the ones who contributed to the defeat of their party."

Lincoln, Neb. Nov. 8.—W. J. Bryan sent the following telegram at noon today to President McKinley:

"Hon. William McKinley, president of the United States: "At the close of another campaign it is my lot to congratulate you upon a second victory. W. J. BRYAN."

The entire democratic ticket is elected in Santa Fe county.

Otero, Chaves and Eddy counties elect entire democratic county tickets.

Beckham is elected governor of Kentucky by twenty-two to twenty-five thousand majority.

Marcus A. Smith was elected delegate to congress from Arizona by majority of about 1,000.

The Hon. T. B. Catron was defeated for the territorial council, 1st district, by Charles F. Easley, democrat.

General Gomez, of Cuba, says he will not accept office. He says a soldier is not fit to govern anybody except his command, and he should never meddle in politics.

D. R. Robinson was elected surveyor of Lincoln county without opposition. The republicans are so well pleased with Mr. Robinson as county surveyor that the party did not nominate a candidate against him.

The remnant of Boers left in South Africa is still fighting. There is not much give-in to people who fight for home and self-government. The annihilation of the Boer is about the only way to end the war. Great Britain is now prosecuting the fight on that basis.

Every democrat in the county is pleased with the election of Porfirio Chavez to serve the people as assessor for the coming two years. None are uneasy that Chavez will not do his duty as assessor, and nobody will attempt to influence his action in the performance of his duties. They all know he is straight.

The republican party is in power. The Senate and House of Representatives are republican by safe legislating majorities. New Mexico is also republican in governor, delegate and territorial officials. Hence, according to republican doctrine the time is ripe for admission. Let us see how soon Mr. Rodey will deliver the goods.

The Eagle is very much elated to announce that the democrats of Lincoln county have elected a full board of county commissioners, the assessor, surveyor and possibly, the sheriff. The way the vote stood in the precincts not heard from when we went to press last week it looked very doubtful for the election of any democrat. But the people voted for the best interest of the county, against the nominees of the republican party opposing these particular candidates. Mr. Fox, Mr. Tully and Mr. Scrano were thought to be in the hands of the coal and railroad companies of Capitan, and were defeated by big majorities. Mr. Savier, who was an employe of the same influence, was defeated, very much to the surprise of himself and to the gratification of the voters of Lincoln county. In justice to good government the whole democratic ticket should have been elected, but the election of assessor and county commissioners forever puts to an end the chance of any combination securing favoritism in matters of taxation and insures the just rendering of taxable property.

**WILL INCREASE THE ARMY.**

Senator Proctor, of the senate committee on military affairs, and Adjutant Corbin have just concluded a conference with the President in which it was agreed that congress shall be authorized to increase the regular army to 100,000 men. It is also recommended by the naval authorities that the navy be so strengthened that it may cope with any power on earth. If this rapid military preparation on the part of the administration does not mean imperialism, what does it mean? The election is hardly over when President McKinley begins considering an increase of 75,000 men for the regular army, and the navy must also be built up to an indomitable war footing. If these changes were really needed and "Johnson was paying the freight" it would be all right, but since the dollars required to support a standing army of 100,000 men and to build up a big navy must come from the people through taxation, it appears to the Eagle to be all wrong, and it is questionable whether or not it will be submitted to by the people without great dissatisfaction.

It is claimed and so published that the country is at peace, and that the Philippine question is practically settled. If these sayings are true, why this increase in the army and navy of the country? If there is nothing for an army of 25,000 men to do what will 100,000 do? This country has grown from 13 states to 45 states; has fought successfully Great Britain, Mexico, Spain and other countries with a regular army of 25,000 and today when the country is at peace—which is claimed by the administration—why increase the strength of the army and navy? Does the president fear that in case of peril to the country the American citizen would not volunteer to fight for its defence? No, it is not that. But it is feared—rightly so too—that the citizen will refuse to take up arms against a people who are struggling for liberty and self-government. Colonization and subjugation of the Philippine Islands, Puerto Rico and even Cuba, is the implied intention of the administration, and a large standing army and a big navy are a necessity.

S. C. Wiener received 112 majority in this precinct, the biggest majority given any candidate in any one precinct in Lincoln county.

W. G. Hamilton, of Roswell, reports the sale of the C. S. McCarty farm—50 acres, to W. T. Jones of Marfa, Texas, at \$200 per acre—the highest price ever paid for agricultural land in the Pecos Valley.

The people of Lincoln county repose great confidence in S. C. Wiener as a man of superior business ability. Although the county is republican, probably by 200 majority, Wiener, democrat, was elected commissioner by 72 majority.

It is thought the ballot at Rabenton was tampered with. It is claimed by voters of that precinct that at least five straight democratic votes were cast there and only two were counted. Both the vote of San Patricio and Rabenton will probably be thrown out.

Mr. J. V. Tully's style of campaigning by attacking the character of his opponent has been repudiated by the voters of Lincoln county, and his opponent was elected county commissioner from the first district for four years.

Mr. Chas. Fox, the company man at Capitan, was turned down by the people of Lincoln county for commissioner by the election of Ed. C. Pfingsten, whom the people know to be a man of brains and upright—a man who will execute the duties of the office of county commissioner with fairness and impartiality.

**A KNOTTY PROBLEM.**

General McArthur speaking of the possibilities of self-government or the establishing of a republican form of government in the Philippine Islands says: "In the light of existing conditions, it is difficult to realize that there is any possibility of such a future for the islands, especially so, as at present and for many years to come the necessity of a large American military and naval force is too apparent to admit of discussion."

The loss of life, as reported to the war department, of our soldiers in the Philippines between November 1, 1899, and September 1, 1900, is 268 killed, 750 wounded and 55 captured. From Jan. 31, to July, 1900, there died 24 officers and 971 enlisted men of whom 4 officers and 204 enlisted men were killed in action. Three officers and 43 enlisted men died of wounds. Other deaths were from diseases. This it will be seen by calculation is an average of 4.7 daily, which death rate will soon make alarming inroads on this country's army in the Philippine Islands.

Colonel Greenleaf, of the U. S. army, has made a report upon the health conditions of the army in the Philippine service, which shows that in June 1900, out of a total of 68,284, there were 5,563 sick, or 8.79 per cent. Regarding the mortality of the army he says: "The number of deaths in the army has steadily increased, and a diminution of the death rate can scarcely be expected. The number of men shot from ambush by small guerrilla bands now exceeds those killed at any previous time, and as time progresses and the men become more and more debilitated by the tropical service, the more marked will become the ratio of deaths."

The responsibilities of the administration in the successful conclusion of this war are grave, and just how Mr. McKinley's plan of salvation in the matter will terminate is a conundrum. Spain's force of arms directed against them for a period, reaching over several hundred years, only accomplished the subjugation of a limited area of the Islands. The United States cannot hope for peace, except independence is granted, for an indefinite period, at least, and when by force of arms the race has been annihilated we will have paid the worth of every foot of the country a hundred times over in the unavoidable expense of warfare, aside from the consideration of American loss of life in the service.

Marcus Daly, the Montana copper King is dead. The death of Henry Villard, the rail road magnate of the northwest is also reported to have taken place on the 12th inst. Thus, the northwest loses two of her greatest financiers.

It is said that the Capitan Co. managers voted employes for the republican ticket. The penalty for not voting for the republican candidates was discharge from service.

The republicans are admitting the election of C. W. Wingfield for sheriff. The twelve votes at San Patricio which were cast without registration cannot be counted, and that loss to Gonzalez elects Wingfield. It begins to look like Lincoln county is democratic after all.

It was Serrano who caught the race horse.

Nebraska's electoral vote went to McKinley—pretty tough.

There is no doubt about Kentucky—she has wheeled well into the democratic column.

Rodey's majority over Larrasolo is claimed by the republicans to be about 4,000.

The great Paris show closed the 12th, inst.

**WHOSE PROSPERITY IS IT?**

Chicago, Nov. 9.—A flat increase of one cent per pound was put upon beef, pork and mutton today by Chicago packers. The Chronicle to-morrow will say: In one year this additional one cent will yield to the Chicago packers, basing the estimate upon last year's business. The following sums: Dressed beef, \$17,900,000; dressed pork and pork products, \$20,000,000; mutton, \$4,000,000. Total addition to increase to incomes, \$39,000,000.

In the adjustment of prices to consumers, choice cuts of beef have gone up as much as five cents. Pork tenderloins jumped to the same extent and mutton chops went up three cents. The advance by the packers is more than 10 per cent on the price of meat the day before election. The advance by the retailer to the consumer will average 25 per cent.

The packers claim they have been selling dressed meats at a loss for several years. In six months the price of meat stuffs has gone up \$2.50 per 100 pounds. There has been no corresponding advance in the price of cattle, hogs and sheep.

Representative packers in charge of the dressed meat department, say the advance was justified by the conditions of trade, and its imposition on the heels of the election is but a coincidence.

**STATEHOOD?**

The republican party elected its president and vice-president. Both the House and Senate are republican. New Mexico is in line with the party in power with a republican delegate. Now listen to that luntheaded Santa Fe editor tell us how Mr. Rodey will secure the admission of New Mexico. If the people of the territory had had any idea that either Mr. Rodey or his opponent would or could have secured the admission of New Mexico neither of them would have received as many votes in the entire territory as was polled for each of them in Valencia county.

Statehood is one of few things that New Mexico doesn't want for a while yet. It is becoming questionable whether or not some of the membership of the sisterhood would not be better off as territories.

**A NEW COAL DISCOVERY.**

A vein of very superior coal was opened on John M. Keith's ranch ten miles east of town last week. This coal will ignite from the flame of a match at the surface of the opening. It is so bright that it looks like it had been polished and is harder than the ordinary coal finds of this district. The extent of the deposit is not known, but thought to be extensive.

The fellows who can explain why Bryan lost in the race for the presidency are as thick as flies in summer.

Probate court convened at Lincoln Monday, the 17th instant.

United States court convened at Socorro Monday the 12th inst.

At San Patricio 12 votes were cast in that precinct that were not registered.

There is not much information afloat about the extension of the El Paso & Northeastern to Liberal, Kansas.

The Roswell and El Paso extension of the Pecos Valley & Northeastern, it is announced, will begin construction in a few weeks.

H. C. McDougal, of Kansas City, and Chas. D. Comstock, of St. Joe, Mo., are in the city. They own mining interests in the Gallina mountains and are now examining those properties.

The White Oaks public school is one of the very best institutions of the kind in New Mexico. A splendid corps of teachers are in charge and the enrollment is nearing 200.

The board of county commissioners has accepted the bid of Jas. R. Thorpe, of Denver, of \$5,152 for the \$5,000 in bonds to be issued to pay the indebtedness due Lincoln county by Chaves county.

A justice of the peace must soon be elected in this precinct. The Eagle has not heard of any candidates, but the election of a good competent justice is a matter of importance.

Paul Mayer's new stable and carriage house will be 50 feet square and ten feet high. Sam Neid has the contract for the construction. He is laying the foundation. The building is to be of adobe.

**STRIKE SETTLED.**
