California has passed a law making prize fighting a felony in that state.

There is little of interest or importance in the week's proceedings of the legislature.

Mrs. McKinley's inaugural gown was the most expensive ever purchased in this country.

Sam Ketchum, alias Black Jack, the noted bandit and New Mexico train robber, will hang at Santa Fe the 22 inst.

William McKinley was inaugurated President of these United States Monday, the 4th inst., for the second and last time.

William R. Shafter is now a retired Brigadier General of the U. S. A. that is, he will draw a brigadier general's pay, and that is about all there is in it.

The river and harbor bill was talked to death in the senate by Carter of Montana. He talked for 13 hours and succeeded in ditching the bill. Senator Carter is retiring after six years of service and ended his labors by this 13 hours' speech which accomplished its purpose.

The possibilities of an extra session of Congress were removed by the House of representatives concurring in the Senate amendment to the army appropriation bill. The vote stood 159 to 134. It was strictly a party vote with the exception of McCall of Massachusetts, Lound of California, Driscoll, of New York, and Mann of Illinois, who voted with the democrats. Not a democrat voted for the measure, hence it was in the strictest sense of the term a party vote on behalf of the democratic members of Congress.

### CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR.

It now seems that Otero is to have opposition in the gubernatorial contest, and it is more than likely that it will result in his defeat. His opposition is made up as follows:

Hon. Geo. W. Wallace, Hon. Quinby Vance, a personal friend of President McKinley, Hon. Frank A. Hubbell, of Albuquerque. The Albuquerque Citizen truthfully says: "There is a large element in the republican party who are desirous of having a business man at the head of affairs of New Mexico." This being the case Governor Otero should necessarily retire as he does not in any measure meet these requirements.

### PRESIDENT'S CABINET.

Washington, March 5.—The president sent the following nominations to the senate:

John Hay, District of Columbia, to be secretary of state.

Lyman J. Gage, of Illinois, to be secretary of the treasury.

Elihu Root, of New York, to be secretary of war.

John W. Griggs, of New Jersey, to be attorney general.

Charles Emory Smith, of Pennsylvania, to be postmaster general.

John D. Long, of Massachusetts, to be secretary of the navy.

Ethan A. Hitchcock, of Missouri, to be secretary of interior.

James Wilson, of Iowa, to be secretary of agriculture.

The president issued a new commission to George B. Cortelyou as secretary to the president.

### KIDNAPPERS AND MURDERERS.

The Missouri legislature has just passed a law making the crime of kidnaping punishable by death or 100 years in the penitentiary. Texas goes Missouri one better, and makes the crime punishable by death. Hazing is also to be discontinued at West Point. Begins to look like real civilization.

The Military pageant making up President McKinley's inaugural parade totally eclipsed anything ever before witnessed in this country. The spectacle was one awe inspiring, and was dumfounding to the inhabitants of Washington. King Edward, VII, of England, will have to take second place, since this United States 20th. century event of the Military and imperial crowning of our first William. The shade of Jefferson would recoil in horror from this scene of imperialistic splendor so fraught with contempt for the simplicity of republican governmental functions. What another quarter of a century will bring forth to retard and menace the progress of the greatest government of the earth, is a question of dubious elements.

### CUBA LIBRE.

The following pledge signed by president McKinley was made to Cuba April 20, 1898:

"The United States hereby disclaims any disposition or intention to exercise sovereignty, jurisdiction or control over said island (Cuba) except for the pacification thereof, and asserts its determination when that is completed to leave the government and control of the island to its people."—Joint resolution of Congress signed by President McKinley April 20, 1898.

Following these pledges the president now will grant no real independence, demands American control of treaties, debts, right to intervene, and coaling stations. This looks very much like president McKinley intends never to relinquish supervision of Cuba. There may be other Weylers in Cuba before their dream of liberty is realized.

### G. A. R. MCKINLEY'S ESCORT.

Only Union Grand Army veterans were invited to take part in the McKinley inauguration parade. Root's instructions to the General Green, Grand Marshal of the Parade, were: "I am instructed by the president to request that the union veterans of the Civil war should be assigned as his personal escort from the executive mansion to the capitol on the occasion of his approaching inauguration.

There seems to have been considerable controversy among the G. A. R. veterans as to the part they would take in the program of the inaugural ceremonies. It had almost reached the point where the veterans were going to refuse to participate at all when satisfactory concessions were granted. According to the original program they were assigned to the rear of the military grand division of the parade. They refused this position when General Green requested that a detail of 20 men from each G. A. R. post form an honorary escort to the president. This agreement was likewise refused. In view of this awkward situation the President delegated Sec. Root to express to the G. A. R. his desire that they form his personal escort to the capitol in the inaugural parade, which was accepted.

### THE LADIES OF TAOS.

The ladies of Taos, of Taos County, this Territory, have petitioned the territorial legislature to enact laws for the suppression of liquor and gambling licenses in the territory, and as an argument in favor of such legislation cite the peaceful reign of law and order in Kansas as an eyeire of the goal to be obtained by similar legislation in New Mexico. Though the intentions of the ladies of Taos for good are not to be questioned, the reference to Kansas laws, with the consequent career of Mrs. Nation, which in trying to correct one crime commits others of a more heinous character, was certainly a piece of fatal diplomacy. Our legislators could not consider seriously the emulation of laws which have resulted in murder, rapine and lawlessness in Kansas.

This petition was referred by the legislature to Hon. Jas. F. Hinkle, a committee of one, with request to report at pleasure.

### BIG MINING DEAL.

A mining deal was closed in El Paso Saturday in which \$10,000 cash changed hands.

The deal was made by T. H. Goodman who sold ten claims in the White Oaks district to a Boston company. Mr. Goodman secured an option on the property for the Boston company some time ago and the time was to expire on the first of this month. The company sent an expert to the property who recommended that the deal be closed. G. Pray Smith, of Boston, made the purchase for himself and associates and left last night for the east.

Mr. Smith is the inventor of a machine to treat the metal in ores and will use one of the machines on his new property. The company is one of the largest in the country and owns two large mines in Utah. He has already put a number of men at work on his new mines in New Mexico and will develop them as fast as possible.

The mines are situated about 18 miles from the White Oaks railroad and have been shipping ore to the El Paso smelter for some time. The ore is found on top of the ground and is being quarried like stone. The ore is cheap in quality but plentiful and may develop into one of the largest mines in the country.—El Paso Herald.



### PROSPECTING FOR ASPHALTUM.

William Conner, a former stockholder in the Old Abe Co., and others interested with him, passed through Monday enroute to the Pecos River country 80 miles northeast of here, where they are going to prospect for asphaltum. Asphalt and petroleum were discovered some years ago on the Pecos River at a point near where the Rock Island survey crosses the river, and samples of both the asphaltum and oil were brought in to White Oaks two years ago by Ramon Ulibarri, which he claimed to have found on the west bank and near the Pecos River about 80 miles northeast of White Oaks. The find was in the nature of a spring, the asphalt and crude oil boiling up from a crevice between two large rocks, and flowing off east toward the Pecos river. The substance after being exposed to the air resembled cold tar, and would easily ignite from the blaze of a match.

The find created some excitement at the time, but was soon abandoned for the reason that it was supposed to be on the edge of a land grant, though the EAGLE has recently been told that the evidence of asphaltum and oil may be easily traced for some distance southeast of this find and off the grant. Though there are others going to this point prospecting from many other points in the territory, Mr. Conner and his party will be among the first to reach it, and will have an opportunity to secure some of the best grounds.

We will give the EAGLE's readers the benefit of such information as reaches us from the new field, from time to time, and hope to be able to inform them that it merits the investment of capital, and the opening of a new industry.

### CITY WATER WORKS.

The organization of a local water company has been perfected here recently and men were put to work Monday to develop a sufficient flow in Water Canyon to supply the city with water works. Investigation has shown that enough water can be disposed of among city residents to warrant immediate construction of the water system. The company is being engineered by Col. G. W. Prichard and Dr. M. G. Paden.

The estimated cost of the development, reservoir, and pipe line finished and ready for operation is between \$5,000 and \$6,000. The water which Messrs. Prichard and Paden are developing in Water Canyon is pure and perfectly soft, and cold as snow itself, from it has its origin. The reservoir site is on the south side of town, and has elevation enough above the town site to give sufficient pressure for fire protection. This enterprise is one that White Oaks people hail with delight, and it is safe to say that Messrs. Prichard and Paden will have the water system in successful operation by the time summer is here.

Now when water is to be had at a very reasonable figure, the town should certainly manifest public spirit enough to set out trees at proper places on the main thoroughfares, and keep them well watered. Such conditions would to a great extent rid us of dust and dirt, besides adding to the town's attractiveness, and to the comfort and satisfaction of its inhabitants. White Oaks will be the prettiest mountain town in New Mexico in a few months after water is thrown into it, and will be the most popular summer resort in the Rocky Mountains.

**OF LOCAL INTEREST.**

S. A. Neid has begun the building of his residence. He is building a four room adobe cottage.

Wagons went to Carrizozo yesterday after pipe for the American Placer Co. The company will begin the test of the big machine this week.

J. E. Wharton lost a horse this week. This makes a total of five head he has lost in a month, four head stolen and one killed by lunging against the corral fence.

A party of capitalists were here Monday and Tuesday looking up this district's coal resources. They also examined some of the gold properties of Lone and Baxter mountains.

The Old Abe mine closed down temporarily Monday, pending a meeting of the stock holders, for the consideration of a new plan of operation, after which the property will resume operations under new conditions.

Some material changes are brewing in the mining industry here at present, which is going to result in much good to the district. The EAGLE hopes to be able to chronicle some interesting news along this line during the next week or two.

This morning one of the windows of the postoffice was covered and besmeared with tobacco juice. It had the appearance of having been a target for a spitting contest participated in by a half dozen ruffians who had no respect for decency or any other virtue. Retribution should overtake these culprits, if they are boys a hickory should be wielded with effect, if men a blacksnake applied with vigor.

A couple of Carrizozo rail roaders were incarcerated in the bastille here Sunday by a rail road contractor, charging them with theft and embezzlement. They were to have had a hearing before Justice Collier Monday morning at 9 o'clock but the prosecution did not appear so the provision that no citizen can be deprived of his liberty without due process of law compelled Deputy Sheriff, Mayer, to liberate the prisoners. Larry Fisher, one of our local painters, was caught smuggling whiskey to the prisoners and was likewise thrown into the pound for an hour or two to reflect on the cause which led to his being placed behind the bars. Larry probably thought to do the prisoners a favor, not knowing that he thereby committed any offense.

**A FALL TO DEATH.**

Monday afternoon excitement reigned supreme for a few minutes, caused by a crowd assembling on the site of the old southwestern hotel on the south side of White Oaks Avenue. People were seen kneeling in a circle looking into a deep well on this lot, which well, since the destruction of the hotel by fire three years ago, has been covered over by a few thin planks, awaiting the reception of the first man or animal that came that way who would go down to a certain death.

An Eagle reporter arrived on the scene among others and found the first victim to be that of the fine Chestnut Sorrel horse of J.P. C. Langston, lying at the bottom crushed into a heap of pulp and of course dead from the moment he struck bottom. Twenty minutes before the horse was standing across the street from the location of the well and was being discussed by contractor Mendenhall and Mr. Langston, Mendenhall negotiating for his purchase. It is fortunate that it was not a human being to go down instead of a horse, and such dangerous neglect on the part of the owners or agents of this property is to be regretted, and this should be an inducement for them to do something to prevent the possibility of a second mishap, which might be more serious.

J. M. Rice, the Chicago capitalist, who is operating extensively in the Eagle Creek and Bonito mining districts was in the city Monday.

Eugene Heiniman left this morning enroute to Kansas City to bring his wife home from one of the hospitals of that place. Mrs. Heiniman has been in Kansas City for six months under special treatment for paralysis. She has almost entirely recovered.

**IN THE GALLINAS.**

W. F. Blanchard, and L. H. Rudisille returned Monday from the Gallina Mountains, where they have been making surveys of a number of mining claims belonging to Jones Taliaferro. Mr. Taliaferro has four men at work, and has now ready for shipment a car load of ore, which has been taken from the Hoosier Boy and Eureka.

There are a number of men prospecting in the camp at present, and some building being done. A three stamp mill, the property of Spence Bros. and Lincoln is in operation, and presumably paying, as it has been pounding away for some time.

**INVESTING IN WOOL GOATS.**

E. T. Collier is closing out his merchandising stock and investing in wool goats. Collier has an excellent ranch for the goat industry and must reasonably make a success of the business. He is at present negotiating with Oscar Hyde for a thousand of graded wool goats, which well cared for should start him in on a paying basis at the beginning.

**LITIGATION SETTLED.**

The suit of Patterson Bros. vs. Old Abe company for possession of a one quarter interest, in Old Abe and Robert E. Lee properties, has been decided in favor of defendants to the suit. This litigation has been pending for about 8 years, and this decision clears the Old Abe of any obstacle in the character of litigation. Convinced litigation has been a harassing menace to the development of many valuable properties of this district.

**ANGUS ITEMS.**

The past week the weather has been quite spring-like, and the farmers are cleaning up preparatory to plowing. The grass is starting up in sheltered spots.

P. G. Peters is preparing to plant 700 peach, plum and cherry trees this spring.

At "The Willows" they are whitewashing some of their Japanese plum trees, as they have a perverse fashion of blooming some two weeks earlier than other trees. In this it is claimed the Japanese plums do not bloom till after the early Richmond cherries, which is one of the latest bloomers we have in this section. It is thought that covering the buds with whitewash retards their early blooming.

The grade is finished eight miles out from Carrizozo, and track laying will begin about the 15th inst.

**STEWART'S MINING BILL.**

The text of this bill is as follows:

"That no person shall locate a mining claim as agent or power of attorney for another except as hereinafter provided. No person shall locate more than one placer mining claim in the watershed of any stream or creek in the same mining district, nor shall any person locate more than one claim on any vein or lode. Provided, that any citizen of the United States or person who shall have declared his intention to become such may, after the discovery of ore in place in a lode or mineral in paying quantities in a placer deposit, locate one such claim for one other person as agent or attorney, and no more, in any one mining district. Provided further, that prior to any such location for another he shall file for record in the recorder's office of the mining district a power of attorney authorizing him to make mining locations for the person named therein, which power of attorney must be acknowledged before a notary public or other person having a seal and authorized by law to take acknowledgements of deeds; and provided further, that the person for whose benefit the location is made shall be a citizen of the United States or shall have declared his intention to become such, and shall within six months after such location file his acceptance of the same, acknowledgment in the same manner as the power of attorney aforesaid, with the recorder of mining claims in the district where mining claims are recorded, and shall perform the amount of labor and improvements required within the time prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. That on all mining claims located as provided in section 1 of this act the assessment work required by law shall be performed on or before the 31st day of December following the date of location, except that on claims located after the first day of September in any year the time within which the said assessment work shall be performed may be extended to and including the 31st day of December the following year; and no person shall relocate, either by himself or by agent, any claim upon which he has failed to perform the said assessment work."—Mining Reporter.

From The GOLDEN ERA.

**BILLIE "THE KID" RUN TO EARTH BY GARRETT.**

A HAND TO HAND ENCOUNTER IN WHICH GARRETT WON.

July 21, 1881. We hardly realize that the notorious Billy Bonny or "the Kid" has at last come to his end but such is the fact. This individual whose criminal acts had become so numerous and so daring in New Mexico, that a whole nation looked upon him and wondered, is no more. The slayer of other men is himself slain at the hands of our worthy sheriff in a hand to hand conflict. The full details of the killing have not as yet been furnished as the following taken from the letter of the sheriff makes authentic the killing.

"Fort Sumner, July 16, 1881. Dear Friend: I arrived in this vicinity on the night of the 13th. Came to town on the night of the 14th and about midnight met Kid hand to hand, I won and he lost; Killed him dead the first shot."

At first the information was received with some doubt, but since receiving this letter from Mr. Garrett there can be no longer any question. To those who are not familiar with the deceased's criminal record cannot comprehend the gladness that pervades the whole of New Mexico and especially this county.

He was the worst of criminals. He not only had the inclination to take the life of human beings, but had also the courage to do so under any and all circumstances. He was the sworn enemy of many good men, and so long as he lived their lives were in constant peril. Beginning when but a youth his whole life has been one of continual crime of the darkest nature. Though young at the time of his death and without education, he was a shrewd manipulator in crime, and the natural leader of those associated with him.

His manner was especially happy and attractive. No one coming in contact with him could well resist the power he naturally had

over men. He was polite and handsome. He seemed to have no respect for human life and no fear.

The criminal deeds of the "Kid" would fill a volume and of course we cannot undertake to recite them in a newspaper article. We all remember the part he took in the Lincoln war either from observation or from information, the manner in which he aided in slaying Sheriff Brady, killing of Carlisle and the extraordinary feat of killing the Deputy Sheriffs Bell and Olinger who were guarding him but a short time ago, and his escape from prison. But it seems there was one man who was his equal and more than his equal in respect to nerve, quick and accurate shooting.

Too much credit cannot be accorded to Mr. Garrett, for his successful work at the time when we least suspected what he was doing, we find him quietly laying his plans and making certain the capture of the most daring and dangerous character on record.

It is needless to say that much ingenuity, discretion and good judgment was required to effect what Mr. G. did. The "Kid" had those near him who gave him all the assistance they could, in warning him of danger, and of the presence of strangers, and suspicious persons.

But with these odds against him and with the fact staring him in the face, that he was after the worst type of a man, who would not be taken alive, Mr. Garrett ventured all. It is not enough to be thankful and offer our sheriff congratulations only, we must give a stronger recognition. He must be amply rewarded. We must stand by our officers who do their duties so nobly, at such a great expense and at such great risks.

Let every one subscribe and pay freely for this brave and commendable act, that Mr. Garrett may not only know that his services are appreciated, but that for them he is entitled to be rewarded in a monetary sense.

**NEW DISTRICT ATTORNEY DISTRICT.**

Governor Otero has signed the bill creating a new District Attorney District out of Socorro, Lincoln, Eddy and Chaves counties. This will make a fat job for the appointee to the District Attorneyship of this new district. The remuneration of the district composed of these counties will amount to between \$3,000 and \$4,000. It is rumored that Col. G. W. Prichard of White Oaks will receive the appointment. Col. Prichard is thoroughly fitted for this office, and is considered one of the most vigorous prosecutors in the territory. Lincoln County will be much pleased to see a change in the District Attorneyship from the present incumbent to Col. Prichard.
