ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

Know all men by these presents: That we, Andrew T. Anderson of Hersher, Illinois, Geo. J. Monroe, and Robert C. Sturgeon of Chicago, County of Cook, State of Illinois, and John M. Rice and Miner D. Gaylord, of the County of Lincoln, Territory of New Mexico, have associated themselves together for the purpose of forming and organizing a corporation for the transaction of business in the Territory of New Mexico, and for that purpose do hereby make, state, acknowledge, file and adopt the following articles of incorporation of said company under the laws of the Territory of New Mexico.

ARTICLE 1.

The name of this corporation and body politic shall be and is the AMERICAN GOLD MINING COMPANY by which name it shall be known, and under which it shall transact all its business.

ARTICLE 11.

The amount of capital stock of this corporation shall be five millions of dollars, and shall be divided into five million shares, each share of the par value of one dollar.

ARTICLE 111.

This corporation is formed for the purpose of engaging in the following lines of business to-wit:

It shall have the right and authority to lease, bond, buy, or otherwise acquire, mining property, mining claims, mines, and mineral lands, with millsites, tunnel sites and water rights, and

shall have the right to acquire and hold title to the same either by lease, bond, deed, mortgage or any other manner authorized by law, and shall have the right to sell, lease, bond or mortgage the same, and shall have the right to engage in the general business of mining, and of acquiring all machinery and supplies necessary for the operation, development and management of the said properties, and shall have the right to acquire, own and operate mills and smelters and lixiviation works and to erect, construct, maintain and operate any and all works necessary for the handling, treatment and reduction of ores; to build houses, stores, warehouses, machine shops, saw mills, and to operate the same; and shall have the right and authority to acquire water rights and water privileges, and to build, construct and operate dams, reservoirs, ditches and canals, and to build, construct and operate roads, tramways, electric roads, or any other kind of roads for the transportation of the products and business of said company; and shall have the right to erect, construct, maintain and operate electric light plants and electric power, to be operated by either steam or water power in connection with its business; and said company shall have the right to do all such other acts and things as may be incident to or necessary for the profitable and economical carrying on of the general business of mining, milling and smelting of ores, and for the development of its business and of the mineral interests in the locality in which its operations are carried on.

ARTICLE IV.

The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the date of the filing of these articles of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of New Mexico, and the termination thereof shall be fifty years from that date.

ARTICLE V.

The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted and managed by a board of five directors to be selected from among the stockholders of this corporation at the annual stockholder's meeting, which annual meeting shall be held in either of the offices of said company, and at such time after the first three months as may be prescribed by the by-laws of said company.

The officers of said company shall consist of a President, Vice-

President, Secretary, Treasurer, General Manager and such other officers or agents as may be established from time to time by the Board of Directors, either by by-laws or resolution.

The President and Vice-President shall be selected from the Board of Directors. The other officers above named, or any other officers or agents considered necessary by said company, may be selected from persons other than the Board of Directors.

The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted for the first three months from the time of its commencement, and until their successors are selected and qualified, by the following named incorporators: ANDREW T. ANDERSON, GEO. J. MONROE, ROBT. C. STURGEON, JOHN M. RICE and MINER D. GAYLORD.

ARTICLE VI.

The principal office and place of business for the transaction of business affairs of said company shall be, and is hereby established, at Nogal, in the County of Lincoln, Territory of New Mexico. The principal office for the transaction of the financial affairs of said company shall be, and is hereby established, in the city of Chicago, County of Cook, State of Illinois. It is also provided and understood that meetings of the board of Directors of said company, either regular or special may be held at its office at Nogal, Lincoln County, Territor of New Mexico, or in the said City of Chicago, Cook County, State of Illinois; and it is also provided that meetings of the Board of Directors of said company may be held in any other town or place in the Territory of New Mexico on resolution duly adopted by the Board of Directors, fixing the time and place of said meeting, and upon notice thereof to each member of the Board.

ARTICLE VII.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be forever non-assessable, and each certificate of stock thereof shall state upon its face the number of shares represented thereby, and that said stock is fully paid and non-assessable.

ARTICLE VIII.

The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall be exempt from the debts of the corporation.

ARTICLE IX.

The Board of Directors of this

corporation shall have the right to adopt such by-laws as may be necessary for the government of its business and for the transaction of its affairs, and shall have the right to create such officers, superintendents, or managers as may be necessary for the conduct of its business, and to provide the manner for the execution of the duties of its officers and agents.

ARTICLE X.

These articles of incorporation may be amended at any annual or special meeting of the stockholders of said company, called for that purpose by a two-thirds vote of the stock issued.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

Know all men by these presents: That we the undersigned citizens of the United States, desiring to form a corporation for pecuniary profit under the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, do hereby enter into and adopt for ourselves our associates and our successors the following articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE 1.

The name of the Incorporation shall be "Free Gold Mining & Milling Company," and its principal place of business shall be in the town of Nogal in the county of Lincoln, territory of New Mexico, with a branch office in such other place or places, as the Board of Directors shall determine for the sale and transfer of stock, and the holding of such Board of Directors' meetings and the transaction of such business of the Incorporation as the Board of Directors may direct and determine.

ARTICLE 11.

The general nature of the business of this Incorporation, shall be to acquire, own, buy, sell and lease mines and mining and petroleum and natural gas claims and properties and the mining of gold, silver, copper and other mineral ores, also coal, and the developing of petroleum and natural gas wells from and on the property or claims owned or leased by this Corporation; and to reduce ores, mill quartz, to acquire and use tramways, roads, telegraph and telephone, water power and water ways, in connection with the operation of said mines, claims and properties; and to do and to perform all other acts as are usually done and performed by a mining and development company as herein provided.

ARTICLE 111.

This Corporation shall commence business on the fifteenth

day of January 1902 and continue fifty years from said date, unless sooner dissolved in manner provided by law.

ARTICLE IV.

This Corporation shall have and possess all powers, rights and privileges and immunities prescribed and permitted by law, including the the right to take, hold and dispose of property, real or personal, to make, to perform and enforce contracts, to transact any lawful business, consonant with the purpose of its organization, to sue and be sued in its corporate name, to have a common seal, to render the interests of its stockholders transferable, to do any and all acts necessary and proper to carry out the purpose of its organization, the same as a private individual might do, and to possess and exercise these powers, privileges and immunities, within the Territory of New Mexico, or elsewhere that it may lawfully transact business.

ARTICLE V.

This Corporation shall have power to adopt By-Laws and rules for its government and control and to choose such officers and agents as shall be proper and clothe them with all necessary power and authority in accord with law and these articles.

ARTICLE VI.

The amount of the capital stock authorized, shall be Five Hundred Thousand Dollars, divided into shares of One Dollar each, of which Two Hundred Thousand shares shall be set apart and held and known as contingent treasury stock and shall remain unsold as a contingent fund for further use, until authorized by a majority vote of the capital stock actually issued and shall not be voted while held as such, but when sold or any part thereof and entered upon the books of the Corporation, and cash paid into the company's treasury therefor, the shares so sold, shall have the same voting right and power as each and all other shares have.

One hundred and fifty thousand shares of the total capital shall be set aside and held and known as Treasury Stock, such part or all of said stock to be sold in such amount and at such price, to be used in the development of claims and property and such other business of the Corporation as these Articles provide and the Board of Directors may determine.

One hundred and fifty thousand shares of the total capital stock, shall be issued in payment of the certain mining claims and properties, situated in the Nogal Mining District, in the county of Lincoln and Territory of New Mexico, known and designated by the following names, to wit:

The "Enterprise," the "Croker," the "Cracker Jack," the "Gold Bar," the "Ruby," the "O. K.,"

the "Nannie Baird," the "Mollie Gibson" and the "Side issue."

The aforesaid mining properties to be taken by this Corporation at the face value of One hundred and fifty thousand Dollars, at the time and date of their location, and to be received and accepted by this Corporation in full payment for said stock, and such stock, when so issued shall be fully paid and forever treated and considered as non-assessable, and it shall be conclusively presumed as against all persons dealing with this Corporation, whether creditors, stock holders or others, that the amount paid for said mining claims was at the date of said location and purchase, the value of the same, and all persons shall be forever barred and estopped from claiming or setting up any proceeding at law or equity, that the said stock is not fully paid up.

ARTICLE VII.

The stock of this Corporation shall be non-assessable and the par value of each share shall be One Dollar.

ARTICLE VIII.

The affairs of this Corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors consisting of five or more members, not exceeding nine, stockholders of the Corporation, who shall be elected at the annual meeting of the stockholders on the fourth Tuesday of September every year, except in case of a vacancy in said Board, or the maximum number herein provided be not elected, the Board of Directors may fill such vacancy or if deeming it for the best interest of the Corporation may elect additional directors, to the said maximum number, until the next annual meeting, and except that the first meeting of the stockholders shall be held on the 10th day of April 1902 at the principal place of business of the Corporation.

The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, General Manager and Superintendent. These officers shall be elected by the newly elected Directors at or about the time of the annual meeting of stockholders, except to fill a vacancy, and their duties shall be such as are usual to such officers or as the By Laws shall prescribe, or the Board of Directors require. The office of Secretary and Treasurer may be filled by one person, until their successors are properly elected and qualified; the Board of Directors and officers shall be as follows, to wit:

ARTICLE XI.

The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this Corporation shall at any time be subject, shall not exceed two thirds of its capital stock actually issued or credited upon its books. In no event shall it exceed the maximum limit of indebtedness prescribed by the Laws of the Territory of New Mexico, for corporations of like character and purpose.

ARTICLE X.

All incumbrances or conveyances of real or personal property of the Corporation shall be in the name of the Corporation by its President and Secretary, on order of the Board of Directors. No indebtedness shall be contracted by the Corporation or held as binding against it, except on order of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XI.

The Corporation shall have a prior lien upon the shares of stock and upon all moneys or property due any stockholder from the Corporation for all sums unpaid upon the stock or by him due to the Corporation.

ARTICLE XII.

The personal property of the stockholders of this Corporation shall not be liable for corporate debts.

ARTICLE XIII.

These articles may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the stockholders, by a majority vote of the capital stock issued or credited on the books of the Corporation, or by such vote at a special stockholders' meeting called for that purpose 30 days written notice in advance of such meeting and its purpose having been given to each stockholder by the Secretary, addressed to the last recorded address of said stockholder.

If President Roosevelt had sat up nights to devise a scheme to prevent popular acceptance of his decision as settling the Schley case he could not have hit upon anything more certain to accomplish that end than the conference of last Saturday. What faith can the people have in the judgment of a judge who has not enough faith in himself to formulate it without securing the approval of interested parties as to its effect on their joint fortunes? —Chicago Record-Herald.

They lose sight of the fact that we do not necessarily endorse all the convictions of others because they happen to become our guests.



AMERICAN PLACER COMPANY.

The American Placer Company is now getting down to business. The dredge is working like a watch except the shovel which has been partially disabled, being knocked out of plumb. This however, has been to a great degree overcome and the machinery is now in operation and the results are more than was ever expected. The well furnishes more water than is required to run the machine and it is believed that the company has water enough to run two other machines of the same capacity and plans are now being considered to put in others.

The grounds are even richer than was estimated, and the company feels jubilant over the outlook. H. B. Hatfield is the local manager, Wallace Gumm and Jas. Simms are the engineers in charge of the machinery of the dredge.

Horses For South Africa.

Representatives of the British government loaded 6 car loads of horses at Carrizozo Tuesday for use of the English army in the Transvaal. Jas. Woodland who was helping to load the horses tagged a noted outlaw Spanish pony; placing on the tag General De Wett, via Transvaal. 


