It is understood that our Teddy has agreed to sign the bill.

The republicans, blinded by party zeal, seem to be able to swallow the nostrums of the trusts set before them—Lincoln's saying, that part of the people could be fooled all the time, surely must apply to the republican party whose barons crack the whip and all the rank and file fall in. Fred Roth sold Newton E. Whitney 800 acres of land five miles east of Roswell. Consideration \$6,400. The ranch is to be stocked with cattle and sheep.

ADDITIONAL LOCAL.

Water Canyon Copper

N. McCoy called at this office Monday, returning from White Mountains, and stated that Water canyon was enjoying a quiet boom, and that properties being worked there are showing up well. Many prospectors are going into the district from various places, and locations are being made over a wide area.

The properties of McCoy and his son, James McCoy, and that of E. L. Ozanne, are being continually developed and assays from the McCoy claim have given 50 per cent of copper and good values in gold and silver. A specimen sample of the ore may be seen in our office cabinet, they having mined and on the dump seven tons of this very rich ore since striking the vein. Development will be pushed until shipping can be commenced, when machinery will be placed and a force of miners put to work.

Grading Commenced

News from a reliable source has been received in Tucumcari that the Choctaw, Oklahoma & Gulf road has let a contract to grade forty miles of roadbed between Amarillo and Tucumcari and that grading will commence next Monday morning. This is certainly good news for Tucumcari and places this place above all question of doubt as the great future city of the staked plains.—Tucumcari Pathfinder.

J. T. Stripling, Roswell, school teacher, was in the city Wednesday from Parsons, the now flourishing Bonito town, and stated to the EAGLE that he had been employed to teach the public school—five months term—at Parsons, succeeding Miss Fannie Price, who has accepted a position at El Paso.

Mrs. E. Heinimen died of paralysis, at the family residence in this city at 7:15 o'clock Tuesday evening. The deceased suffered a paralytic stroke some two years ago and had never entirely recovered it, when recently a second attack resulted in death as above stated.

The school entertainment, owing to a long program, will begin promptly at 7:30 o'clock.

Shipping Ore at Tularosa.

The Lucky Star mining property is improving as development goes on. The mineral is changing as the tunneling progresses. The lead is well defined, with no barren spots. The mineral brought to town from that property in the last few days looks very encouraging. Tests made here this week show about 30 per cent copper to the ton. The owners are in excellent spirits and will put on two shifts in a very short time.

As it stands at present, it is the best prospect in the district and a shipping proposition. The lead at present runs \$11 in gold, fifty ounces silver and about 30 per cent copper.—Tularosa Democrat.

Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf.

It is now a good guess on the part of some of the craft that the Choctaw, Oklahoma & Gulf railroad has decided to expend more than \$13,000,000 in extensions and branches, roadbed improvement and additional equipment, and within a short time a complete survey will be made into New Mexico to connect with the Pecos Valley, probably at Las Vegas, and also west to connections with the Rock Island. Eventually, with the New Mexican connections and with the Rock Island, the Choctaw will reach the gulf and the Pacific ocean.

Patent Delivered at Last.

From Las Vegas Record.

The patent for the Washburn mine in the Cochiti district has been delivered by the federal land office to Fred J. Otero, W. B. Childers and E. W. Dobson, et al, of Albuquerque. The property has been under litigation for a number of years and is considered the most valuable proposition in the Cochiti. It has some \$150,000 worth of ore on the dump.

The Drift Fence.

The L. F. D. Cattle company has received notice from the government that its drift fences must be taken down within the next sixty days.

The Maxwell Land Grant has sold during the past year 600,000 acres of land to ranchmen and farmers.

Our friend and fellow townsman, Chris Yaeger, arrived this morning over the Rock Island from Setonville, Ill., where he has been on a three weeks visit to his family. He reports a royal entertainment at the hands of his children. He looks to be in splendid health.

Roswell is to get a sanitarium.

Copper Near Las Vegas

The Santa Fe New Mexican of the 18th inst. had the following account of San Miguel County's copper deposits:

"With the probability of three reduction plants being put in in and around Las Vegas within the next six months and with a dozen companies organized for the prosecution of development work on copper propositions in the country tributary to Las Vegas, it begins to look like San Miguel county will soon be to the front as a place for mining investments and a ripe field for the prospector. It has been a well known fact for the past thirty years that there is plenty of mineral in that section, but the great drawback heretofore has been that the ore was not of sufficient high grade to pay to get the mineral out of it. Now, with the coming of a process, in recent years, that will enable low grade ore running as low as 3 per cent to be handled at a profit, there is not the least doubt of the future of the mining industry in northern New Mexico.

What seems to be an anomaly in mining circles is found near Las Vegas—great bodies of sandstone carrying from 2 to 10 per cent copper, and lying in such shape that those who have developed claims assert with confidence that the ore can be placed on the dump for 25 cents per ton and hauled a distance of twelve miles to a reduction plant for \$1 per ton. It is claimed by the friends of the McCaffrey process, who recently had a carload of the ore treated by the Union Ore Reduction and Extraction company of Denver, that the mill cost for treating it will not exceed \$2.75 to \$3 per ton. This being the case it can readily be seen that there would be good money in handling even 3 and 4 per cent ore and of this class of ore there are several claims on which there are from 300,000 to 1,000,000 tons already in sight, and this in face of the fact that the development work on most of them can be said to have only just commenced.

In what is known as the San Pablo district the first work was done in January, 1901. This district is situated in the foothills to the east of the main divide between the Gallinas and Pecos rivers. It lies some fifteen miles in an almost due westerly course from Las Vegas, within ten miles of the Santa Fe road. The first discovery in the district was that of the mines known as the Overflow group which comprises forty acres. The rock is composed of a conglomerate of sandstones, carrying values in carbonates of copper, with some gold and silver."

NEW ENABLING ACT.

Delegate Rodey Meets Suggestions of the Committee.

Following is a copy of the new enabling act for New Mexico, introduced in the house of representatives by Delegate S. B. Rodey. It provides:

That all persons who have had one year's residence in the territory and are otherwise qualified under the territorial statutes, shall be qualified to vote for delegate to a constitutional assembly, to consist of 111 delegates, the counties to be represented as follows: Bernalillo 13 delegates, Chaves 3, Colfax 6, Dona Ana 6, Eddy 2, McKinley 2, Grant 6, Guadalupe 3, Luna 2, Lincoln 4, Mora 6, Otero 3, Rio Arriba 7, San Juan 3, San Miguel 12, Sierra 3, Santa Fe 8, Socorro 7, Taos 6, Union 3, Valencia 7. The election of these delegates shall be held on the eighth Tuesday after the passage of the enabling act. The convention shall meet at Santa Fe on the fifth Tuesday after the election and adopt a constitution, republican in form, making no distinction in civil and political rights on account of race or color, except as to Indians not taxed. The constitution shall provide perfect toleration of religious sentiments. All rights to unappropriated public lands must be unclaimed. Indian lands are to remain under the absolute control of congress. The territory and counties shall assume their legal debts and pay them. A system of public schools is to be established and maintained free of sectarian control. The minority shall be guaranteed representation on all election boards. There shall be a responsible limit of taxation and personal property must be taxed in the county in which it is located. The election for the ratification of the constitution shall not be held later than the first Monday in November, 1902. The representative to congress and state officers and legislature shall be elected the same day the constitution is voted upon. Sections 13 and 33 of every township are granted for public school purposes. Fifty sections are granted for public buildings at the capital. One hundred thousand acres of land are given by this act to the University of New Mexico, 100,000 acres to the agricultural college, the proceeds to be a permanent fund. Five per cent of the proceeds of all public land sales are to go to the public schools. For the improvement of the Rio Grande, 100,000 acres are granted; for the insane asylum, 50,000; school of mines, 50,000; deaf and dumb asylum, 50,000; reform school, 50,000; normal schools, 100,000; blind asylum, 50,000; miners' hospital, 50,000; military school, 100,000, and penitentiary, 50,000 acres. These lands are to be in addition to those already granted the territory for similar purposes. The state of New Mexico shall be one judicial district, the circuit and district court to meet at the capital, the judge of said district to receive a salary of \$5,000 a year. The regular terms of said court shall be held on the first Monday in April and the first Monday in October of each year. The new state shall be attached to the eighth judicial circuit, and only the

grand jury shall be summoned in the circuit and district courts. Forty thousand dollars are appropriated for the constitutional convention. The convention shall provide for the election of state officers, but the state government shall remain in abeyance until the state shall be admitted into the union. If the constitution is adopted, the legislature may proceed to elect two United States senators, to be admitted to their seats when the state is formally admitted into the Union.

County Commissioners.

As the time draws near for the selection of men to fill the various county offices, the EAGLE desires to call the attention of the Lincoln County voter to the extreme necessity of the selection of competent officials. If each of the parties select its best men, there will be little danger of regrets in the future.

All county offices are to be filled this fall except that of county commissioner in precinct No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 electing one for four years and two years respectively. While it is essential to have competency in every county office, it is indispensably so as regards the office of commissioner, that office being unquestionably of the greatest importance to the county. The commissioners' court is our legislative body, and has control of the county's finances, public improvements and, in a measure, the conduct of other officials, as well as many other things of vital import to the taxpayer. A commissioner who devotes the time necessary to the proper discharge of his duties is deserving of the commendation of his fellow citizens. The selections to this office should be made from among men who are successful in their own avocations, conversant with public affairs, and who are willing to sacrifice sufficient of their time to the conduct of the office to insure the greatest results to the county and its people.

Without any hesitation the EAGLE feels inclined to say that our present Board has in every way ably conducted the affairs of Lincoln county, and few counties in the territory are in better financial condition. Whether the present incumbents of the two expiring terms are available for re-election or not the EAGLE is not prepared to say, but the selection of men for these places, as well as for the various other offices is to be made in November, and every citizen of every community owes it to himself and to his neighbor to weigh carefully the fitness of each candidate, and especially that of county commissioner.

The war is over again in the Philippines.

Grosvenor Bill.

Mr. Grosvenor has introduced a bill which is intended to prohibit the manufacturers of shoddy goods from selling their products under label of pure wool. Those in authority on the subject say that a law to this effect would add at least twenty-five cents a head to the value of sheep, on account of the increased demand for wool that would certainly follow, when these shoddy goods would be taken out of competition with pure wool articles. If wool were substituted, in shoddy goods manufactured and branded pure wool, it would require 40,000,000 sheep to supply the demand occasioned thereby. This would be worth a small mint to the sheep industry of New Mexico, as the territory has about 5,000,000 of sheep.

The Grout Bill.

There is a bill before congress at present, called the "Grout Bill" which aims to prohibit the manufacture of oleomargarine. It is estimated that this would lessen the market value of each steer \$2.00 and would mean a loss of \$20,000,000 to the stock industry. Interests in favor of the bill have put up large amounts of money to aid in buying congressmen enough to secure its passage.

Our Bouquet.

Just why republicans are so interested in the re-organization of the democratic party is a conundrum. President Roosevelt has been warned by a number of prominent republican senators, that General Miles is not to be molested for testimony given before the Senate Committee, regarding the Root bill for the re-organization of the army, and that should any such action be taken he may as well look out for breakers.

Max Talks For Color.

A committee of the house of representatives is to investigate the election laws of the southern states. It is a well known fact that tens of thousands of citizens are not allowed to exercise the right of franchise in those states, on account of color, and that the vote in the southern congressional districts cast for members of the house is ridiculously small, so small as to be the laughing stock of the country. Investigation into these unjust and dishonest election laws can be productive of nothing but good.—Santa Fe New Mexican.

This is interesting gush for a Southerner, who is acquainted with the situation in the South. Max belongs to that certain class of animals who throw literary bouquets at every rapist in the South, and who yell bloody murder when one of these brutes is brought to the rope. There must be a kindly feeling, akin to consanguinity, in his enthusiastic make-up that causes him to substitute misrepresentation for argument in his advocacy of the supremacy of the colored voter in the South's elections.

Postal Currency.

There is a bill before Congress now which provides for a postal currency, a "postal check" rather, which would certainly be an improvement over the present system should it be adopted by making the bill a law. The Albuquerque Journal-Democrat says of

this measure:

"It provides for printing the one, two and five dollar bills in the future with blank spaces on the face. These bills, of course, pass from hand to hand before the blanks are filled. When it is desired to send one in the mails the blanks are filled in with the name of the payee, his city and state, a 2-cent postage stamp is placed in another blank space and canceled with the initials of the sender in ink, the name of the sender is signed on the back, and, presto! his money has suddenly ceased to exist as currency and has been transformed into a check on the United States government, having all the safety of any bank check and ready for inclosure in his letter. When the payee receives this check he treats it just as he would any other check—in-dorses it, goes to the nearest bank or postoffice and deposits it or has it cashed. The government charges two cents for transacting the business, and this charge is paid by the postage stamp referred to, and which, of course, is in addition to the stamp on the letter in which the note is sent. The advantages of a safe and convenient method of sending small sums by mail are so patent that it is not necessary to enumerate them, and the demand for such a method is so positive and so general that the only wonder is it was not devised and introduced long ago."
