CAPITAL COMING TO WHITE OAKS

Rich in Gold, Coal and Other Minerals
and Fruits--Many Other Resources.

IS A RICH GOLD MINING DISTRICT.

A Party of Eastern Capitalists Visit White Oaks and Adjacent
Camps. Looking at E. M. & Imp. Co's Properties.

ARE HIGHLY PLEASED WITH THE MINING SITUATION.

There arrived here last Thursday morning from the East, with J. M. Rice the following prominent gentlemen, among whom you will notice the son of the famous millionaire wagon maker, Clem Studebaker, of South Bend, Indiana, Milton George, Chicago, J. H. Lloyd, mining expert of national reputation, and others who rank high as men of money and brains:

This party, Mr. Rice, John Y. Hewitt and others, drove over the camp here showing them our resources of gold, coal and other minerals, and a more highly pleased party of men never before visited us than these. They saw and freely stated that the wealth of our mines, and our country's resources were much greater than had ever been represented to them, and that they were compelled to confess surprise at the great industrial possibilities in store for White Oaks, as the center of this mining region. We are located in the middle here, and have the coal here which

makes us the only practical place for the generating of power for the surrounding mining camps which is now an economical necessity and must soon be adopted.

Leaving White Oaks the party went to the Nogal and Parsons Districts. A Herald reporter caught them in El Paso and secured the following:

"A better pleased lot of men never were seen before and when seen at the Zieger this morning they were all glad of an opportunity to speak of the wonderful mining prospects and possibilities of that promising section of New Mexico touched by the Rock Island road.

They are particularly impressed with the great quarry (it is not a mine in the ordinary sense of the term) that constitutes the Parsons group and adjoining claims. It is a vast body of low grade free milling gold ore one mile long and about a quarter of a mile wide and runs \$4 and upwards to the ton.

C. E. Finley, of the party had with him a basket of apples from White Oaks and he was as well pleased with this exhibit as he was with the mines. The apples were of extraordinary size the largest one weighing 18½ ounces and others are very nearly as large."

The apples referred to in this article were taken from Dr. Paden's orchard.

Comrey Brothers have moved their drilling machine 3 miles southeast of Lake. They are going after water here, but intend to install heavy machinery at the oil well and push work there. A company has been formed to take the enterprise in hand.

THE NORTH HOMESTAKE RESUMES.

A New Shaft is Being Sunk 300 Feet South of Old One. First Connection Will be Made With Old Workings at 300 Foot Level.

HAVE RICH ORE TO BEGIN ON

Louis G. Brockway and John G. Foster, North Homestake stockholders, arrived here Tuesday morning from Lynn, Mass., where both gentlemen reside. They immediately announced the intention of the company to begin work on the North Homestake mine, at once. Miners are all employed here and they are having difficulty to secure labor.

Wm. Watson will be in charge of the work and Mr. Foster will be superintendent. They are not making any unnecessary parade about the matter, but have gone to work in earnest. In conversation with the EAGLE reporter, both Mr. Brockway and Mr. Watson stated that it was the intention of the company to operate the mine permanently. They will work all the force possible to hasten the sinking of the new shaft. When connection is made with the old works the force will be increased as fast as conditions warrant it.

There is rich ore at the bottom of the old shaft, 1070 feet, and the new shaft is being started in ore from the surface. By sinking the new shaft and connecting it with old one the old works will be supplied with good air, and while sinking drifts may be made from the new shaft into good ore.

The North Homestake was the first rich gold discovery made in this camp and until placed in the litigation column, was one of the camp's best producers and considered a valuable property. This difficulty now seems entirely removed and the mine is starting up under the most favorable circumstances.

Mining Low Grade Ore.

Gold mining in the Black Hills is conducted more upon a scientific basis than in any other section of the country. The monster mining enterprises of the Black Hills are earning profits by handling a tremendous tonnage of low-grade ore at a small margin of profit. While the character of the ore there has been an important factor of the success, Black

Hill operators have nevertheless furnished an excellent object lesson showing the marvelous possibilities in mining when conducted along business lines. Mining in the Black Hills is more a manufacturing proposition; the element of risk is largely eliminated, and mining gold has become to be regarded as safe an investment as manufacturing steel.

Dakota's old reliable, the famous Homestake, has a record familiar to most people. It is the most extensively operated mine there, and similar accomplishments to the Homestake is the goal to which others are striving. The Homestake company has recently issued its annual statement, in which are some interesting things. The year ending June 1, 1902, was the best so far in the history of the company, there being a larger production and a greater saving on ores. The report shows that the gross production amounted to 1,218,089 tons of ore of a value of \$4,314,059.12. This figured out shows an average value per ton of only \$3.54. The net profit for the year is placed at \$1,064,749.23. When it is considered that this represents a profit of over 87 cents per ton on every ton shipped, some idea can be had of the manner in which mining in the Black Hills is reduced to a scientific basis. The Alaska-Treadwell of Douglas Island has a record which beats this in so far as is concerned gross value and net saving per ton. This mine is not such a producer as the Homestake neither are mining operations so generally carried on a large scale there as they are in the Black Hills.

In time many other mining sections will follow the example of the Black Hills. Capital will be invested to develop other large deposits on a monster scale, often the only way they can be made profitable. Other classes of low grade ore, as well as free milling ores of the Black Hills, will in time be made profitably marketable by the application of improved methods. There are now ores which can be made so profitable by the handling of a sufficiently large tonnage. Operators of other camps would most undoubtedly do well to study the marvelous accomplishments of the Homestake and the other low-grade propositions of the Black Hills.

What The Trusts Are Doing.

President Roosevelt said that "all the government can do is to create conditions under which prosperity can come. If the individual citizen lacks in thrift, the energy, the power, and the mind to work, no laws will make him prosperous," and the New York World, referring to this statement, points out that "our paternal government, for example, so 'creates conditions' for the steel trust through the Dingley tariff that it has charged and got \$11 a ton more for rails in this market than in England, and other steel products in proportion. By the same law the beef combine is put in a position where it need fear no outside competition and can charge monopoly prices at home while selling lower to London in competition with meat from South America and Canada."—Commoner.

There is a tariff of 67 cents a ton on bituminous coal. If the big strike now on continues five months longer there will be a certain portion of northeastern population that will be frozen into a better understandg of at least this much of the tariff question. This tariff should come off and the EAGLE believes that even a republican congress would be justifiable in doing this for the cause of humanity, although a decree has gone forth that the tariff is not to be tampered with at the coming session of congress.

The republicans did not even put out a ticket in Otero county. Lincoln county will be in line with Otero in another two years of development and immigration.





election. There is another virtue the Chieftain might have added: in him we have a champion in the fight for the repeal of the coal oil inspection law, as well as other needed legislation, effecting the welfare of the people of New Mexico.

W. A. McIVERS.

For this issue we have been unable to secure a biographical sketch of Mr. McIvers. Mr. McIvers' home is at Nogal, Lincoln county, and although he is not an old settler, his reputation as an enterprising, honorable and progressive business man has already gone beyond the limits of his county. The Lincoln county democrats were enthusiastic for him at the recent convention, and Chaves and Eddy counties gracefully waived all claims to the position of representative and were glad to unite on Mr. McIvers. Mr. McIvers is extensively engaged in mining in the Nogal district, and a strong worker in his party. He is just such a democrat and business man that is needed in our lower house to attend to the interests of this district.—Roswell Record.

Although as the Record states Mr. McIvers is not an old settler, in this county, yet he has lived in the west for twenty years and is thoroughly conversant with the country's interests, and is heavily interested in Lincoln county property and is here to stay. There are many people here who have known him, and some of whom have been associated with him in a business capacity for the past twenty years. The fact that they have during twenty years of business association always found him honorable, capable and progressive, and that they are now putting thousands of dollars into Lincoln county enterprises, at his suggestion, is conclusive evidence of his worth, and should be a sufficient guarantee to Chaves and Eddy county democracy to roll up the greatest majority possible for him in the November election.

FERGUSSON FOR DELEGATE.

Albuquerque, Oct. 14.—The great popularity of Hon. H. B. Fergusson, one of the most able and faithful delegates New Mexico ever had in congress, was evidenced last evening when the big democratic convention refused to listen to his repeated refusals to make the race for delegate, and nominated him unanimously. All the morning the leaders caucussed and Mr. Fergusson held out.

In the afternoon he still held out, but when the convention reconvened, and Hon. A. A. Jones of Las Vegas being given precedence by Bernalillo county, rose to nominate Mr. Fergusson over his protests, the convention went wild.

The roll of counties was called and the spokesman of each delegation made an enthusiastic sec-

onding speech for Fergusson.

Attorney J. H. Crist, of Rio Arriba county, made a notable address.

Another speech with the true ring was that by Judge L. S. Trimble, twice congressman from Kentucky, who is now eighty-five years of age.

Mr. Fergusson said in rising to accept the nomination he could not decline, said that he would put all his objections under his feet and bend every effort to win the race. He was much moved by the many strong expressions of regard and confidence and believed with the loyal support of the democrats, he could carry the territory.

The resolutions declare strongly for statehood. The nominee has an excellent statehood record, and he will appeal to the people on the strength of the united support of the democrats in both houses of congress for the movement, he has done so much to advance. The resolutions sweepingly condemn republican misrule in the territory and in the nation, declare against the Philippine policy and against trusts.

A MALICIOUS AND INHERENT LIAR.

Lightfoot, Lincoln county's constitutional liar, again maliciously attacks our board of county Commissioners, and the EAGLE has this time secured proof from one of our most prominent republicans that in the slanderous piece of villiany we publish below from his paper that he is a criminal liar, seeking to besmirch the character of honorable men.

Following will be found his epileptic epithet and the answer to it by Hon. R. E. Lund, whose honor and truthfulness not even this billingsgate old hypocrite will question:

Lightfoot's Attack.

"Sol C. Wiener, the democratic candidate for Commissioner from the 2nd district has a suit pending against him in the district court for the misappropriation of over \$500.00 of the County funds as Chairman of the board of County Commissioners. He has for the past two years used the office at all times to further his own selfish ends."—Republican.

Lund's Reply.

"Editor White Oaks EAGLE
SIR:

My attention has been called to a Paragraph in the Nogal Republican of the 9th inst, seriously reflecting upon Mr. S. C. Wiener, County Commissioner from this, the 2nd District; and charging misappropriation of the county funds, on account of which a suit in the District Court is now pending against him.

In justice to Mr. Wiener, and at his request, I freely make the following statement: In the early summer of 1901 Mr. Wiener sought my council as to the matter of the sale of lands for taxes, within the county of Lincoln,

and the fact that at these several sales, a large part of the properties sold were being loaded upon the county instead of the money, of which he represented that the County was in pressing need. The question, a very anxious one for the Board of County Commissioners, was "What could the Board of Commissioners do?" "These lands turned over to the county at these sales, were a burden upon the county, how could they be turned into cash?" Among other properties spoken of, Mr. Wiener specially named a certain Mining property, on which the county had a judgement and lien to the extent of nearly seven thousand dollars. I advised that the matter of the validity of these sales be examined, and that prompt efforts be made to find purchasers for these properties, and specially for this mine. Mr. Wiener then and there, speaking for himself and other members of the Board of Commissioners, suggested that I undertake to find a purchaser for this mine, adding that he felt confident that if I could secure to the county the total amount of its lien against this property, the Board of Commissioners would be willing to pay me a commission of five per cent on the gross sum. I attended the July 1901 meeting of the Board of Commissioners, at which this matter was introduced and openly and fairly and fully canvassed; resulting in a contract between the Commissioners and me, that I should undertake the sale of the property spoken of, and in event of my effecting a sale, and covering the full sum due into the Treasurer, I should be paid the five per cent commission. In early October following the total demand of the county on this property was paid to the county Treasurer, as his books show, and sometime after the commission as agreed upon was duly paid. It is true that a malicious effort has been made to recover this amount from Mr. Wiener and the other Commissioners, by a suit against them, but nothing could be more unjust and dishonorable. To charge that in this matter, there was Malfeasance on the part of Mr. Wiener or any other Commissioner is either a gross Error or a Wicked Falsehood. The Commissioners acted in the utmost good faith and for the welfare of the county of Lincoln.

Our Fruit.

Geo. Coe was in town Monday with apples from his Ruidoso orchard. The Coe's orchards are known over most of the southern part of New Mexico and even into adjoining states, and the report comes in from the entire circuit, that their apples have as nearly approached perfection as it is possible for the skill of the horticulturist to attain. J. N. Coe's orchard will this year yield 100,000 pounds of fine fruit, and each of his brothers will market 50,000 to 100,000 lbs.

Besides these large orchards, there are many others in the county almost approaching them in points of size and quality of fruits produced. The splendid orchards of P. G. Peters and A. C. Austin at Angus, and that of J. H. Skinner at Bonito, and many others equally as profitable at Three Rivers, at Lincoln and on the Hondo, are yearly throwing their yields into a continually growing home market at good paying prices. These orchards are paying their owners from a few hundred to several thousand dollars every year, and will continue to do so for all time to come.

This is an industry that is important to the future of Lincoln county and we need more people engaged in it. When the industry receives the attention it merits it will take rank along-side our mining and stock interests.

Coke Keith is in from Texas and will dig for gold during the coming winter. Coke is not a mean philosopher, when he fails at cotton he buys transportation for the Rocky Mountains where he can mine the dust right out of old mother earth. Much of the yellow gold that goes to swell the fortune of eastern capitalists, our miners dig from the rugged sides of the Rockies.

Dr. M. G. Paden has grown as fine fruit right here in town as can be produced anywhere. Every man who owns a farm or ranch in Lincoln county would as well have an orchard.

John M. Keith has returned from Texas where he spent some time visiting the old folks at home, who live at cotton Wood, Eastland county.

W. C. Lea, a first cousin of Captain and Judge Lea who has a ranch not far from Nogal in Lincoln county, has been here for a week past, having dental work done.—Roswell Register.

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
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
