## ELECTION RETURNS SHOW Decreased Republican Pluralities.

**U. S. Senate Republican by 11 Majority;  
House Republican by 12 Majority  
New York State Republican by  
About 11,000, City Demo-  
cratic by 100,000.**

**COUNT CLOSE IN MANY STATES.**

**Territory of New Mexico Republican by 3,000 Majority  
Territorial Council and House Republican.**

The present Senate contains 54 republicans and 34 Democrats in a total of 90 seats, there being two vacancies in Delaware. The term of 30 Senators expire with this Congress. There is also a vacancy for Michigan caused by the death of McMillan. Of the 31 seats to be filled, not including two from Delaware, by including the vacancy from Michigan 19 are now republican and 12 democratic. Wellington of Maryland is classified as a republican and Harris of Kansas, McLauring of South Carolina and Teller of Colorado all democrats. Seven States have elected Senators to take their seats in March 1903. Maryland has chosen Gorman, democrat, to succeed Wellington, republican; Kentucky, McCreary, democrat, to succeed McBoe, republican; Iowa re-elected Allison, republican; Louisiana, re-elected McEnery, democrat; Vermont re-elected Dillingham, republican; Georgia re-elected Clay, Democrat. It is pretty certain that the next Senate will be 52 republican to 34 democratic.

As to the Status of the house, dispatches show that the democrats have elected 161 members of congress and the republicans 147, to which should be added the eight previously elected in Oregon, Maine and Vermont. This leaves seventy districts to be heard from. All the southern states which elect solid democratic delegations are represented in the total of 161. The dispatches show the election of the following:

Alabama, 9 democrats; Arkansas, 7 democrats; California, 1 republican; Connecticut, 5 republicans; Delaware, 1 democrat; Florida, 3 democrats; Georgia, 11 democrats; Illinois, 10 republicans, 6 democrats; Indiana, 4 democrats, 2 republicans; Iowa, 7 republicans, Kansas, 8 republicans; Kentucky, 10 democrats, 1 republican; Louisiana, 7 democrats; Maryland, 4 republicans, 2 democrats; Massachusetts, 10 republicans, 2 democrats; Minnesota, 7 republicans, 2 democrats; South Dakota, 2 republicans; Tennessee, 9 democrats, 1 republican; Texas, 16 democrats; Virginia, 9 democrats; West Virginia, 2 republicans; Wisconsin, 8 democrats; Wyoming, 1 republican.

The republicans of Valencia county say they are sure of 1,600 majority at the election next Tuesday. Valencia is the county where once upon a time, in one precinct, a man was allowed by the republican judges to cast a ballot for every sheep he owned. Have the sheep been counted?

They are now guessing that Maj. General S. B. M. Young will succeed General Miles as Lieutenant General of the U.S. Army.

### About the Orchard.

An exchange reports that a new and important use for refined parafine wax seems to have been discovered by a prominent resident of Ohio, living near Lancaster, who had two trees badly damaged by a storm, one being a Maple and the other an apple. In each case a large limb was broken down from the trunk, but still attached to it. The limbs were propped up and securely attached with straps, very much as a broken leg wound be fastened with splints, and then melted refined wax poured into and all over the cracks. The surgical operation was entirely successful. The parafine prevented the sap from escaping, kept out the rain and moisture which would have rotted the the trees, prevented the depredation of insects, and the limbs seem thus far to be perfectly re-attached to the trees. —Roswell Journal.



His friends tracked him over the mountains finding holes in many places where he had dug presumably looking for water to slake his burning thirst. The holes were dug with his naked fingers, the prints of which were plainly visible in the clay.

Daniels was taken to Cooper's home and given both food and drink and the best care possible. Monday he was driven home, having almost entirely recovered his right mind.

[Bonito Valley Items.]

Regular Correspondence.

In a former issue the EAGLE correspondent at Picacho stated: "Hogs run in the orchards for the want of any better use for their surplus fruit." This appears to be the condition of "fruit growing" by farmers all over the country, unless they are in easy reach of some large town. "Fruit growing" now-a-days has become a science requiring constant study and painstaking to make a commercial success of it, a specialty.

Requirements: frequent cultivation, irrigation, pruning branches and suckers, frequent spraying for insects, hunting trees over for bores and sunscald, watching for grafters and root knit, thinning out fruit, picking, grading and packing the fruit, hauling the same to market and selling. All these items require considerable knowledge and care, more than the ordinary farmer can summons.

Usually a third to a half of the crop are culls, windfalls and underling fruit that requires to be worked into cider or other by-products if one is to make an orchard pay more than just the labor and expenses involved.

When grown the crop has to be held in cold storage from two to four months to market the winter apples (the only kind that pays) to the best advantage.

Unless one is exceedingly well posted one half of the planting will be varieties of trees that are unprofitable as sky beans, not barrel fillers. The novice and culls are the nursery man's best friends.




