PROCEEDINGS

Of the Lincoln County Stock Association. Held at Roswell April 6th.

Meeting convened at 10 o'clock a. m. with W. E. Anderson, president of the Association, in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting, held at Lincoln, N. M., Jan. 5th, 1885, were read and approved.

On motion Mr. C. B. Eddy, the applications for membership to the Association were read and action thereon deferred until the afternoon session.

On motion Mr. H. Milne, adjourned until 1 o'clock p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Meeting convened pursuant to adjournment, and the following named gentlemen were balloted for and duly elected members of the Association: C. D. Cooley, Wm. Mailand, C. B. Pilkey, C. D. Bonney, M. S. Brazill, Chas. O. Cole and James Southland.

The application of Mr. J. C. White for membership was read and rejected.

It was moved, seconded and carried that officers be elected for the ensuing year and the following named gentlemen were proposed: C. B. Eddy, Esq., president; J. W. Poe Esq., vice-president; and J. J. Dolan, Esq., secretary, and were unanimously elected.

The following resolutions were offered by H. Milne and passed:

Resolved, That so much of article V. of the constitution which reads as follows: "and to perform the duties as hereafter provided of treasurer" is stricken therefrom and notice of same be published in the official organ of the Association for 30 days.

The following resolution was adopted.

Resolved, That the duties of the treasurer be hereafter performed by the secretary:

The following resolution was presented by H. Milne and passed.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Association be and are hereby most heartily tendered to our retiring president for the unceasing energy and ability displayed by him in the discharge of his duties, having shown at all times a most earnest desire to advance the interests of the Association, and, further, that these resolutions be placed upon the minutes of the meeting.

On motion, the following named gentlemen were appointed by the president to regulate round-ups: E. J. Wilcox, J. P. White, J. A. Alcock, Wm. Robert, J. J. Cox and W. E. Anderson. On motion, Mr. C. B. Eddy was added to the committee.

On motion the following named gentlemen were appointed by the president a committee on Grievances: J. W. Poe, J. P. White and H. Milne.

The following resolution was offered by H. Milne and passed.

Resolved, That all persons desiring to become members of this Association be required to inform the Association in their application the amount of living water controlled by them.

Adjourned until 9 o'clock a. m., the 7th.

April 7th, 9 o'clock a. m. Association convened pursuant to adjournment.

Reports of committees called for. The report of Committee on Round-ups submitted and reads as follows:

Mr. President your Committee on Round-ups beg leave to submit the following report:

WHEREAS, The territory of the Pecos river, under jurisdiction of our Association, being so large, we suggest that it be divided and worked as follows.

One outfit in charge of Mr. Thos. Finney, shall commence work June 1st on the east side of Pecos, on the state line, and work north to the mouth of the Felix. One outfit, commencing on the west side of the Pecos at the state line, June 1st, in charge of Mr. Buck Anderson, working north to the Rio Felix. Another outfit, commencing June 1st opposite the mouth of the Felix, on the east side of the Pecos, in charge of Mr. Philip White, working north to the Juan Dios. Another outfit, commencing at the north of the Felix on the west side of the Pecos river in charge of Mr. W. T. Peacock, June 1st, and working north to a point opposite Juan Dios. The above outfits are to work all tributaries to the Pecos river included in their districts.

For the Mountain District we recommend that the round-up commence at Pecos Spring, July 1st, being in charge of Mr. N. W. Ellis. From the Pecos Cienega del Macho; from there to Blue Water; thence to the Salado, Bujito, and Ruidoso; thence to the Pecos River and thence to the mouth of the Pecos. A committee be appointed to see that all pos-

sible care be taken the coming season to avoid mistakes in branding calves, and that all cattle that have strayed be cut and driven to their respective ranges.

Report of Committee on Grievance submitted and reads as follows:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Association, that all members and round-up bosses be instructed to carry out the resolution toward intruders, as passed October 25th 1884. And, further, that said intruders, namely, C. W. White or others acting in the same manner, should they desire to work with any of the round-up parties, composed of members of this Association, be positively refused permission to do so, or recognized in any manner. And should any member in any sense fail to comply with the intention of this resolution, said member subjects himself to, and shall be, expelled from the Association.

Moved by the vice-president J. W. Poe that an executive committee be formed from the members of the Association for the purpose of a general management of the Association. Said motion was seconded by Mr. Wilcox and carried, and the following named gentlemen were duly elected: J. J. Cox, district No. 5; J. P. White, district No. 4; J. W. Poe, district No. 1; M. I. Pierce, district No. 2; and George W. Williams, district No. 3.

Application for membership of L. W. Holt, representing the Holt Live Stock Co., was read and Mr. Holt was unanimously elected.

On motion J. A. Alcock, duly seconded and carried, time is extended to Carlos Armijo to the next meeting to give an explanation for his conduct towards the Association.

On motion the meeting adjourned until 1 o'clock p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Meeting convened pursuant to adjournment.

Report of the Executive Committee was read and adopted, which reads as follows:

All the duties hereafter assigned to the Finance Committee will be assumed and performed by the Executive Committee, and in addition thereto they shall perform all other acts, as seem to them best in the interests of the Association. And all bills contracted by the committee and approved by its chairman, in the interests of the Association, shall be honored by the treasurer after the approval of the president.

Moved, seconded and carried that the resolution offered by the National Cattle and Horse Growers' Association of the United States, in reference to harmonious action of local associations, be adopted.

Application of L. N. Long was read and objected to but on motion H. Milne, seconded by J. W. Poe, and carried, Mr. Long is allowed to work with the round-ups of the Association and derive all the benefits therefrom.

On motion C. D. Bonney was seconded and carried, meeting adjourned, without day, subject to the call of the president.

Stockmen's Convention.

CHEYENNE, WYO., April 8.—The Stock grower's association reconvened at 10 a. m., with the largest attendance of the season. The finance report, after some discussion, was adopted. Expenses for the past year \$18,929.22; receipts \$37,011.16; deficit, \$11,918.26. The question of assessment was settled by the adoption of the following resolution.

Be it resolved, That this association appoint a board of equalization to regulate an equal and equitable assessment on all its members from Wyoming, Nebraska, Dakota, Montana and Colorado, and that such assessment be equal in per cent. per head, and that all of its members share alike, and that each state or territory above named be represented by two members. It is further resolved that nothing hereto contained shall apply to any further than assessment.

The report of the round-up committee was then taken up and adopted. The veterinarian of the association reports that there are no contagious diseases among the cattle of Wyoming, but owing to the great danger of impressing contagion, the governor of this territory has given notice of his proclamation prohibiting the introduction of cattle from certain localities. This action the report considered wise and timely.

A resolution prohibiting the ran-

ing of horses on the ranges and the playing of cards, as injurious to the morals of the camps, was almost unanimously adopted. The old board of officers was re-elected for the ensuing year, and the convention adjourned sine die.

The Holletsville (Texas) Herald and Planter says the probable prices in that section for yearling is expected to be from \$6 to \$8. At present there are no cattle offered for less than \$10. One of our wealthiest stock dealers announced his intention to enter the market as a purchaser of any number of mixed yearlings when the figures touches \$8.

Clay Mann and Kin Elkins, of Double Mountain Fork have purchased of the Mexico and Texas Land and Cattle Company of El Paso, Texas 225,000 acres of fine grass land in Mexico, and a New York banker joins with a purchase of 95,000 acres alongside. [Texas Live Stock Journal.]

Cattle are being offered for \$7 a head in Coahuila Mexico, in Mexican money, which makes them worth something less than \$6 in our money.—[Ex.]

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

LINCOLN, N. M., April 6th, 1885.
 Proceeding of Board of County Commissioners, at their meeting held at Lincoln, Lincoln county, New Mexico, on this 6th day of April, 1885, being a regular term thereof.

Board convened at 9 o'clock a. m. Present: E. T. Stone, chairman, A. W. Bryan and J. A. Broderson, Members, and Clerk of Board.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.
 Now comes Ramon Lujan and presents list of fines imposed by him and the same are charged to the account of the collector.

The order made at last meeting for bonds, is hereby amended to read, "bonds to run 30 years."

The following bonds were presented and approved:

Demotrio Perera, constable, precinct No. 1, Epinenio Lucero, No. 6, Wm Kellum, No. 10, E. H. Handy, road supervisor No. 12.

Henry Stutz presents affidavit setting forth that he was erroneously assessed for the year 1884, on 1 horse and 20 head of cattle and that he was allowed no exemption, which he is entitled to by law; the same being taken under consideration, ordered that the clerk issue an order to the collector to rebate to the said Henry Stutz the sum of \$12.60, to be divided as follows: Territorial \$4.00; Special, \$4.00; regular county, \$2.00; school, \$2.00; penitentiary, 40 cents; capital, 20 cents.

R. E. Word presents affidavit stating that all his property was in Texas until July, 1884, and prays that his taxes for the year 1883 and 1884 be rebated. The same being duly considered, it is ordered that R. E. Word present sufficient proof that he paid taxes on said property in Texas for the year 1883 & 1884.

S. M. Putman presents affidavit setting forth that he was erroneously assessed for the year 1884, and prays for a rebate of taxes on \$3,115.00, being amount of erroneous assessment. The same being duly considered, it was ordered that the clerk issue an order to the collector to rebate to the said S. M. Putman the sum of \$49.03, to be divided as follows: Territorial, \$15.57; special, \$15.57; regular county, 7.78; school, \$7.78; penitentiary, \$1.50; capital, 77 cents.

Now comes Miles Stone and files affidavit stating that he was erroneously assessed for the year 1884. Ordered that the collector rebate to the said Stone the sum of \$10.46 to be divided as follows: Territorial, \$5.23; special, \$5.23; regular county, \$2.61; school, \$2.61; penitentiary, 52 cents; capital, 26 cents.

Now comes J. G. Danner and presents affidavit setting forth that he was erroneously assessed for the year 1884. Ordered that the collector rebate to him the sum of \$36.74, divided as follows: Territorial, \$11.67; special, \$11.67; regular county, \$5.83; school, \$5.83; penitentiary, \$1.16; capital, \$2.58 cents.

James W. Coats was appointed Justice of the Peace in Precinct No. 14.

Now comes Alyandro Gallegos and states that he was erroneously assessed for the year 1884, not having any taxable property on the 1st day of March, 1884. Ordered that the collector rebate the full amount of his taxes.

E. C. Connor files affidavit setting forth that he had no taxable property in Lincoln county on the first day of March, 1884, which, being duly considered, it is ordered that the collector rebate to him the full amount of his taxes for 1884.

John Rob files affidavit setting forth that he had no taxable property in Lincoln county on the first day of March, 1884. Ordered that the collector rebate to the said Rob the full amount of his taxes for 1884.

Now comes Ramon Olgin and sets forth that he was erroneously assessed for the year 1884. Ordered that the collector rebate to him the full amount of his taxes.

And now comes Ella P. Ellis, by Mr. Chapman, and applies for a piece of land joining the east side of the county garden, 100 foot front and running to the acequia at the back. The same being taken under consideration it is agreed that the said land be sold to Ella P. Ellis at the rate of \$35 per acre.

Now comes Rosa Esparanza applying for a certain piece of land in Lincoln county

and lying east of the piece sold to Ella P. Ellis, and it is agreed that the said land be sold to Rosa Esparanza at the rate of \$35 per acre.

T. C. Tilletson was appointed road supervisor of precinct No. 9. Bonds filed and approved.
 Bill of Chas Bull for services as deputy sheriff, amounting to \$5.50, allowed, and warrant No. 1187 issued therefor.

Bill of J. B. Collier for stationary &c., amounting to \$33.25 allowed, and warrant No. 1188 issued for same.

George Kimbrell was appointed road supervisor for precinct No. 4, and bond filed and approved.

The following described road is hereby declared a county road: Commencing at the junction of the Rio Bonito and Ruidoso, and following the present traveled road along the Ruidoso through precinct No. 2 to Dowlin's Mill.

B. A. Shapley presents bill for serving as justice of the peace, amounting to \$7.95, which was allowed for one-half and warrant No. 1189 issued therefor.

The following described roads are hereby declared county roads, to-wit: From Ft. Stanton over the present traveled road to Dowlin's Mill and then to the line of the Indian Reservation. Also the road now traveled from Henry's store, on the Upper Penasco, to Dickson's ranch, on the Lower Penasco.

Ordered that all warrants issued on or before the 31st day of December be funded in accordance with section 1, chapter L X I. of the acts of the legislation assembly of the territory of New Mexico, for the year 1884.

Ella P. Ellis makes application for a piece of land, described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the southwest corner of the land now owned by her and running westerly to a point opposite the northeast corner of the court house, thence northerly to the west side line of the property now owned by the said Ella P. Board adjourned till 1 o'clock p. m. Geo. W. Larremore is appointed to the office of justice of the peace for precinct 5.

Now comes Samuel Bitler and

presents warrants Nos. 940, 953, 981, 1015, 1018, 1047, and 1049, amounting with interest, to \$814.46, for funding and bonds Nos. 1, 2 and 3 for \$100.00 each and bond No. 1 for \$500.00 were issued therefor, and warrant No. 1,207 issued for the fractional part of above warrants, and said warrants ordered cancelled and recorded.

Warrants Nos. 236, 284, 299, 305, 397, and 517, amounting, with interest, to \$900.00, are presented by J. S. Lea for funding and 8 per cent bonds Nos. 40, 41, 42 and 43, for \$100.00 each, and bond No. 54 for \$500.00 issued for same, and the warrants ordered cancelled and recorded.

OUR EXPOSITION LETTER.

Special Correspondence.

NEW ORLEANS, April 10th, 1885.

There is but one New Orleans, and its distinctive traits, no less than its romantic history, have given it a world-wide fame. Unlike all other cities of its class it is built on a level plain below highwater mark, and reviewed from the upper deck of a river steamer, has the appearance of a partially submerged city, so that the stranger would not be surprised to witness the inhabitants climbing out of their upper windows to escape drowning; once however, inside of the place, the delusion vanishes, and you are no longer conscious of any immediate danger from water, unless possibly, from a mixed variety on sale in the tap-rooms, which are very numerous.

The magnificent exhibit made by the Mexican government at the Exposition, are a continual source of admiration and astonishment, not only exciting those made by any other foreign nation, but attracting more attention even than the exhibits made by our own government, fine and great as they are admitted to be. To the great mass of Americans, owing to the misrepresentation, and falsehood, the Mexican people have been made to appear as rude, semi-barbarous tribes, among whom life and property were unsafe, and to whom the arts of civilized life were practically unknown. Every trifling, petty riot, or mob, common to all countries, has been magnified by the foreign press into a revolution, and every band of thieves and robbers, also common to every country, has been made to stand as representative of the entire Mexican people. Enlightened and honest facts at once dispel all such libelous and false deductions, and it is found that such exceptional phases are no more representative of that country, or people, than the occasional degradation of "cow-boys," or a train robbery, is representative of society, or of government, in the United States. Their exhibit here, covering thousands of square feet of space and occupying hundreds of great cases, demonstrate that the Mexican people are as far advanced in civilized arts as our own, or the people of the older European nations. Briefly epitomised, her display includes, unvarnished woods of many tints

and many varieties, figured goods bearing like designs on both sides, in wool, silks or cotton; the very finest sugars, tobacco's, chocolates, liquors and essences, of such excellence as is rarely met with in any other country; and perfumes, spices, gums, fruits, vegetables, etc., which are unsurpassed by any other land. Their leather goods made from native stock, never have been and are never likely to be excelled, including saddlery and harness figured by hand, with gold and silver decorations of great beauty. Think of an exquisitely beautiful pair of lady's gaiters, valued at \$35, and of a gold and silver embroidered saddle valued at \$900! Where could such goods be found in any other country?

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
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
