W. S. Lloyd, of three Rivers, struck Lincoln this morning (Thursday). How's that?

Judge Terrell and sister drove down from the ranch Sunday and took dinner at the Ellis house.

Jake Miller, Wm. Stone, Jeff Grumbles and Jonny Patty came in from White Oaks Wednesday evening.

A. T. Gunter came up to the county seat with his partner, A. W. Bryan, who is one of the county commissioners.

Old bottles, shoes, rags, &c., doesn't help the appearance of any public place, and one thing also to be remembered is, that warm weather has come and if such trash is thrown into the street it is bound to bring on disease. It makes a splendid hot bed for diphtheria.

We understand that two brothers of Martin Nelson, the man that did such bloody work at Bonito a short time since, have been writing the postmaster of Bonito City that they intend to visit that section and find out why Martin was shot down in the street. Wouldn't it be a good idea for the citizens of Bonito, when they learn they are coming, to meet them outside the town and give them a hearty welcome? That's about what they'll get if they come in with a grand hurrah.

Just as we are going to press, news reached this place that W. H. Sanders shot Sid Moore, of Nogal, yesterday three times. They were playing cards for the drinks when the shooting commenced. At last accounts Moore was still living, but his wounds are thought to be fatal. Sanders came to Lincoln and gave himself up this morning (Thursday).

Chas. Danver, who is traveling for Gross, Blackwell & Co., Las Vegas, and Gillie Otero, cashier of the San Miguel Bank, of that place, drove into Lincoln, from a trip to Roswell and below, the last of the week. This is Mr. Otero's first trip to this county, but he was by no means lonesome. Any one who was ever in Las Vegas knows Gillie, and when once acquainted friendship springs up. Deputy Breat and Mr. Otero are old friends, and Jim did everything in his power to make Gillie's stay pleasant and he succeeded admirably well.

While J. W. Phillips was driving the fire span of cream, belonging to J. A. Alcock, on his way from Ft. Stanton to this place, Saturday, they became frightened at a piece of paper blowing under their feet and started to run. When the team started they were nearing the second culvert east of Delany's store, and while Mr. Phillips was endeavoring to keep them in the road, they ran into the corner of an adobe house, breaking the buggy up considerably and causing the top of the same to fall heavily on the neck of Mr. Mark Patty, who was riding with Mr. Phillips. If the blow had been been much harder, Mr. Patty's neck would have undoubtedly been broken. As it was his neck was turned to one side, and the wrench received causes him to carry his head as though he was too good for this county.

Bona Baca returned from a trip to Tularosa a few days ago. The day before he arrived in Tularosa, a man murdered his wife by choking her. Bona could not remember the fiend's name, but said that it happened in this way: The murderer had been working on a ditch and came home for his supper about dusk. He asked his wife, a young girl, if supper was ready and she told him it was. When she placed before him his supper consisting of tortillas and coffee, upon his asking if that was all she had, she told him that was all there was in the house. He became very angry and threatened to take her life. She ran to a neighbor, staying there until the next morning, when she told them she thought her husband had gotten over his mad spell and she would return home. When she entered the door of her humble home, she met the man who was supposed by law to be her protector; he grabbed her, kicked her across the room, knocked her down and then jumped upon her with his knees, and catching hold of her throat choked her until she was dead. Mr. Baca said that the people were in favor mobbing the scoundrel, but the constable of that place got him off to Cruceros where he now languishes in the county jail.

This calls to mind a boy we knew who arose with the sun on the morning of July 4th, some fifteen years ago, and touched off a fuse prepared the day before, that led to a hole bored in a solid oak log filled with powder. The boy's heart was filled with good wishes for everyone and he thought he would show the men, that generally shot off the anvils, what a big noise was. He showed them, but he was the sickest looking boy for about a week that that town ever turned out.

B. cars in Racine, to any address you may designate; each mill to be supplied with a regular outfit for cleaning wheat, oat, barley and corn, retail price of which is thirty dollars as you will see from the enclosed price list.

We have received some pretty galling offers from advertising schemers, but these fellows walk away with the pudding for monumental cheek. They first commence by giving us a little taffy about our "valuable paper as a medium for advertising" and then want us to do \$50 worth of work and send \$20 in cash for, making \$70, for a \$30 mill. If these men go to heaven we don't want to go. We don't want a mill anyway.

### INDIAN NEWS.

A report reached this place the first of the week that the Arizona Indians were making for this county, and that they had already passed through the San Andres Mountains. The following letter from W. H. H. Llewellyn, of South Fork, to J. J. Dolan, of this place, explains things, and shows how impossible it would be for them to get very far into Lincoln county.

SOUTH FORK, N. M., June 1, 1885.

JAMES J. DOLAN, Lincoln N. M.

DEAR MR. DOLAN:

Maj. VanHorn with three troops of cavalry and Capt. Branigan with 40 Indian scouts are occupying all of the water at the passes in the San Andres west of here. You can inform the people in your section that there is not one word of truth of any dissatisfaction among the Mesqueros or Jicarillas. They are co-operating heartily with the military, and rendering valuable services. As they are carrying dispatches and watching all the passes in the San Andres. In addition to the scouts now in the San Andres, I have organized four companies of 50 bucks each picked men who are ready to move in a moment's notice should the hostiles cross the Rio Grande and get within striking distance. I will accompany this outfit in person and if we come up with the hostiles and the Lord is not on their side or ours and will remain neutral and look on. He will see a first-class fight. Maj. VanHorn has with him, Capt. Wallace, Lieut. Stanton, Davies, Cruise and Station, burg also Dr. Sewell. He is in splendid position and is doing all that can be done to protect Lincoln county from an invasion of the

Paddock is camped here with 20 cavalrymen ready to move at a minute's notice. A telegram was received here at three o'clock this morning from Col. Bradley, Dist. Commander, who is on the Rio Grande and was at once forwarded to Maj. VanHorn, informing him that the hostiles were endeavoring to cross to the east side near old Fort MacRay. I wrote you this information that you may know the exact situation, and would thank you to contradict any false reports you may hear in regard to these Indians. It is my opinion that none of these hostiles should ever be permitted to surrender, they are entitled to no consideration whatever and the height of my ambition is to have these Indians get an opportunity to meet them. San Juan and Plata, who are in the office, send their regards.
